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HISTORICAL AND BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

Born July 14, 1936, in Kansas City, Mary L. (Jones) Gant served as a Democrat in the Missouri House of Representatives (1967-1973) and Missouri Senate (1973-1981). She attended Kensington Elementary School and East High School, Kansas City. She married first to Bill Dearing, then to Ronald Gant, and finally in 1979 to Peter Newquist.

After serving in Kansas City as a committeewoman, Gant entered statewide politics under the auspices of William Royster's Democratic Good Government Association. In 1972, after three terms in the Missouri House, she defeated Republican Daniel Guidici in the 9th District with 70.5% of the vote, becoming the first woman elected to the Missouri Senate. On being asked what it felt like, she said, "I don't know how it feels; I've never been a man. I'm a senator. A senator is a senator" (The Statesman, Nov 1992).

Although she avoided being identified with women's issues while a state representative, on the morning of her election to the Missouri Senate, she was asked her position on the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA). Off the top of her head, she said that she did not believe a change to the US constitution was necessary. She supported equal pay and equal opportunity but felt laws already on the books were sufficient. Gant also had concerns about possible unintended consequences to alimony and child support, protective labor laws, and women being drafted into the military.

To the new senator's chagrin, her anti-ERA stance lost her the support of the press and even the respect of other female legislators she admired. Because of the polarizing nature of the issue, her more nuanced approach to women's liberation, to be pursued not by new legislation but by the individual action of women, was lost.

Gant was never comfortable with the company she kept in the anti-ERA camp, particularly with those who believed the only rightful place for women was in the home. She found this particularly galling, as she herself was a groundbreaking politician and her sister was one of the early graduates of the FBI academy. "I was a feminist before they knew what they were," she said later, decrying how she'd been pigeon-holed by both sides. "I hate to go down in history as an obstructionist" (Missouri Times, 30 Aug 1982).

During her tenure as a senator, Gant championed legislation on child abuse, child support, elder abuse, and the rape-shield law; female judge appointees; banking and property tax reform; the Kansas City Museum (Union Station); and Grandparents Day.

In the primary election of August 1980, Gant faced a challenge to her Senate seat from two other Democrats, namely Lee V. Swinton, an African-American, and Bob Jacobi. For many reasons, the race was a difficult one. First, redistricting had changed the makeup of her constituency to primarily Italian and African-American. Not surprisingly, Freedom, Inc., which had previously support her, now backed one of its own. Jacobi mounted a negative campaign, sending out a flyer that stated Gant "lives with a man who runs an antique shop," implying she was not married to him, damaging her reputation. In addition, she lost some support when she crossed party lines to endorse Republican Kit Bond for governor over the Democratic incumbent Joe Teasdale.

Finally, Gant likely faced some backlash from her marriage in 1979 to banking lobbyist Peter Newquist, which caused an outcry of "conflict of interest," as she was the chairman of the Senate Banking Committee. In Gant's own words, "I considered resigning, because I wanted to do the right thing. But I decided it is not a conflict because I am an objective person" (Kansas City Times, 24 Apr 1979).

In the end, Gant lost by a mere 36 votes to Swinton, who became the first African-American in the Missouri Senate. In 1981, Governor Bond appointed Gant as chair of the State Board of Mediation, which resolved disputes between local and state government and unions, a position she held for thirteen years.

Levitt (15 Mar 1979) concerning an all-woman jury in a rape case; and a copy of a letter (19 Jan 1995) from Gracia Yancey Backer to John Kennedy of Tibbetts, MO, on "politics as usual." There are several letters of condolence addressed to Gant on her loss in the primary election in August 1980.

Scope and Content

This series contains a variety of subject-related materials culled from the original unorganized files of Senator Gant. Substantive material can be found on child abuse, collective bargaining, Equal Rights Amendment, Grandparents Day in Missouri, junior colleges, Kansas City Museum (Union Station), Missouri Housing Development Commission, National Order of Women Legislators, rape-shield law, Re-Elect Senator Mary Gant Citizens Committee, and taxation of financial institutions.

Most noteworthy are the files on the failed Equal Rights Amendment, both pro and con, in Missouri. To help inform her own stance on the amendment, Gant sent a letter on August 28, 1974, to judges in Missouri to get their legal opinion. Three Missouri Supreme Court justices (Donnelly, Finch, and Holman) declined to give an opinion as they might be called on to rule on the amendment if it passed. A fourth, Judge Seiler, also declined to give an opinion from the bench but said, "In general, speaking as a citizen, I support the Equal Rights Amendment. I do not foresee as a practical matter the imposition on women of tasks of obligations beyond their means as a necessary consequence. I am convinced that unless the Equal Rights Amendment is adopted, the existing discrimination against women in most fields of important work simply because they are women, will continue." Most appellate and circuit judges were more forthcoming on their views, both pro and con.

Several subject files from 1994-1995 consist simply of copies from *Keeping Up*, a collection of newspaper clippings about Missouri's state government.
