in the case of John H. Huyett and
Adam Young smugglers and rebel mail carriers,
I would say that no man had made a closer
scrutiny of the regulations bearing on the trade
of Virginia than John H. Huyett.

I do not write to reaccuse the parties, nor to
complain that you set aside my statement and
adopted the plea of the parties accused, but
rather to say to you that in all charges that
I may make in future (as in this first)
will be supported by ample proof, or no charges
will be submitted. if I had written you
my mere suspicions it would have made a
very Black sheet against John H. Huyett
and his son Jacob B. Huyett store keeper in
this place, but failing to get legal proof
against Jacob B. Huyett, I submitted the case
as I witnessed it when I arrested the parties

I wish to know what is the degree of punishment proper to inflict on such men, will await your instructions, through the Provost Marshall of Hagerstown I sent to your office last week one John K. Huyett and Adam Young charged with smuggling goods, drugs, and a Reble maid, the man Huyett made his appearance in this place yesterday to the great disgust of all good Loyal men here, he declaring that you had unconditionally released him, if he speaks the truth, such leniency on your part will destroy the vigilance of my Guards, please inform me what were the terms of the man Huyett's release, also what has been done with

the man young, I still hope that the man Huyett has been held to heavy bail for his good conduct in future and that the goods will be condemned, if I would have sentenced the man Huyett he with his accomplice Young would have been banished beyond the Federal lines, the man Huyett being a notorious Reble sympathizer

I beg you in the name of common Justice and the Cause of my Country not to set such men free to trample on my Command

It has been reported that Solomon and Mrs. Keeler have returned to their home ~~and~~ that so, and what operated to allow them to come within our lines? If petitions were obtained in their neighborhood vouching for their loyalty, very probably, if the names were forwarded to me, some of them, might be found not thoroughly loyal; at least so I am informed.

Bills for subsistence of portions of the guard while out in the country after deserters and stragglers, and where it was impossible to take rations, ought to be paid; if they are made out on Form 22 and certified by me as absolutely necessary, will the Commissary in Baltimore or Chambersburg pay them, or how shall they be paid?

I hear of several deserters who have taken advantage of the returning regiments to sneak away with them, being not far off from here, but as my small guard of ten men is now fully occupied in guarding U. S. stores here, they are permitted to run at large. If the guard asked for is sent promptly, 'twill be of benefit.

me stated that night of Fort Smith, and
my brother made me go with him & promised
me good thing, that he would furnish me a
~~horse~~ a horse, to be purchased at
Fort Smith, I went with him to Fort Smith
and the horse of Mr. Waldo was put in a
pasture about one half mile north of
Fort Smith and was there when I came
away. on my return my brother gave
me an order for a man & cult in
possession of a man living a mile
& half north west of Fort Lincoln & I stopped
& got said horse & brought it home with
me, and is now in possession of Mr. Orr.

And I solemnly swear that I never stole
was engaged in stealing horses & did not
have come for this object.

As we have enough "Bushwhackers" here now, we
can dispense with Mr Reese's services at this time

I think a man like either should ^{not} be allowed
to roam in Kansas, and if they were here I would
confine them during the war. (at least)

As I am not acquainted with the localities where these
men live you can probably forward this to a Federal
Commander nearer than you are

I forward my tri-monthly returns to date, the abstracts of Passes & Permits are in form with my former. The two prisoners that I sent to you yesterday in charge of Lieut. Kelly are (as I stated to you) John Howin & Geo. W. Britton. The former says "he & son left home Dade Co. to go to Springfield to join the regular Army, got lost was arrested" by furloughed Militia on Springriver seven miles West of here, I have not been able to learn any thing of his character. I believe you can get all required information about him by inquiring at Genl. C. B. Hollands Head Quarters for Capt. John Small or his ^{men} who the prisoner says he is well acquainted with, he also says his reason for leaving home was "he heard of Brushwhackers in the country, and that Melvill was Burned by them"; his son is said to be about 15 years old, is harvesting where arrested. I had ordered him to this Post, to forward him to Springfield.

but he has not come. If you want to have him sent to Springfield let me know. The other prisoner George W. Britton had left for Sedalia when the other prisoners were arrested that are said to be cooperating, on his return he came and gave himself up. The circumstances of the case. Testimony &c. you are in possession of.

In mine of yesterday. as to the selling &c. of Whisky Please inform me how to act at your earliest convenience.

There has not been any stock reported to this Office yet, I told the Col. Comd & other officers, your instructions to me as to the reporting of the captured stock. How will I act?

There are not many Troops here or at Bowers Mill a number being left to harvest. There has not been much of interest since 20th ult. Families pass with some stock from the South & West of here, they say they have been ordered to leave by the Federal soldiers, so they may have full scope at the secessionists, many of them have been raising a crop. Troops said to be Kansas, have taken a great many cattle & horses South & West of here. If my Abstracts, Letters, or any of my Papers are not right or satisfactory, Please let me know and I will try and remedy the deficiency hereafter.

I This day write to you & enclose my report, to the 20th. I give P. papers to all who I know to be true, loyal until further order. My very strict course on the permit matter, keep my customers at bay consequently my report in that branch of my office is quite limited.

I report by this days mail, to St Louis the sale of three Contraband horses, also the fine imposed upon Peck & Lewis

I received a communication a few days since from the Bureau of G. O. C. & P. giving me full instructions; also a list of all Bonds for Webster County, and for the last three days I have been quite busy, in taking evidence against those Rebels & Sympathizers who have laid their property liable to Confiscation under the Act of July 17th 1862. I have completed the evidence in eight cases, and forwarded the same to H. D. St Louis, retaining the original in my office.

On Tuesday last, I authorized J. M. Glenn, a good man, to take charge of the farms of G. Bryan & Thomas, (who have recently left for Santa Fe) — for the purpose of having the present wheat crop harvested; there is some 150 acres in wheat upon said farms, consequently I will ere long, have a fine lot of new wheat ready for Abel boys.

Two Scouts have just got in, effecting nothing; one went in pursuit of Peck who stole the 6 stage horses from Ward & Steward on Wednesday last.

The other Scout went in pursuit of some 20 women who were making for Disney with their property.

I deem it my duty, to set forth the proceedings of the
last named Scout.

Major Sump, since well that I had Orders
from St Louis to seize all rebel property, & hold the same
until reported to St Louis, when an order would be
sent me to sell the same, with this information he
sent out a Scout in pursuit of some 20 women
who were on their way to Dixie, each one of said
women having fraudulently taking the Oath of Allegi-
ance — Their husbands under Oath, & bond which
had been forfeited to the Gov. by the Obligors going
beyond the Military line of the United States.

Yet this Scout permitted these women to pass on
with six waggon & teams, all heavy laden, several
horses & from 30 to 40 head of good Cattle; the whole
Amt, as reported to me, worth some 6 or 8 hundred
dollars, now what is the use of placing Rebels
under bond, if they are permitted to go at will, forfeit
the conditions of the bond, and no attempt made by those in
Authority to check the removal of their personal property
beyond our lines — if such frauds are tolerated
the office of Pro-Mem is a farce & Commerce of Port a
fraud upon the Government.

There is considerable excitement at this Port
arising from rumor, that the Rebels contemplate a raid upon
Newfield at an early day; it may be true, or it may not be
true; of one thing I am certain, the sympathizers are quite
impudent — and I admire the policy of the 7th Ind. if they
do not trouble me with Prisoners; none on hand.

way. I wish a permit to take two servants,
"George" and "Lidie" to Glasgow, Mo. Said
servants are now at my aunts, Mrs. Gemming,
about six miles from St. Louis, on the St. Mo.
R.R. They belong to my brother, C. R. Mon-
tagne. They came into his possession, as
a gift to his wife, from her father, at
the time of marriage, sometime in the
fall of 1862, when they accompanied my
afore-said brother and his wife on their vi-
sual tour, to see my father, who lives in

Colonel.

I have the honor herewith to report to you that in accordance with Special Order No. 107 dated June 1st from Hd Qrs. Dept. of the Mo. I left St. Louis, June 1. in charge of twenty two prisoners on the steamer "City of Alton" with instructions from Capt. Jas B. Dwight Pro. Mas. Genl. to proceed to Memphis & thence to Florence Ala. if practicable. Whilst the "City of Alton" was lying on the Illinois shore awaiting the arrival of the Chicago train two of the prisoners viz. Wm. H. Knight & John Leonard, made their escape by jumping into the river at the stern of the Boat & swimming to the shore.

Owing to unavoidable delay the "City of Alton" did not reach Memphis until the evening of the 5th inst. I reported to Major Genl. Humboldt & was ordered to conduct the prisoners to Greenville Miss. I remained at the Gayoso House four days awaiting transportation during which time I kept the prisoners under guard while at the Gayoso House I caused the prisoners & their baggage to be searched, nothing of a contraband nature was found except \$10.40 in Gold and Silver.

I left Memphis on the 9th inst. prisoners on board the steaming John Brown & Autocrat arrived at Greenville during the night of the 11th

It was raining furiously and we found them to shelter the prisoners, upon consultation with Brig. Genl. Ellett it was concluded not to be a proper place of delivery.

I arrived at Pickensburg on the morning of the 12th and immediately reported to Major Genl. Grant and was ordered to report to Admiral Porter with instructions to the Admiral to send them to Hatchersport the Yazoo River. The latter plan was decided upon. The prisoners were accordingly embarked on board the Gun Boat Pallas on the evening of the 12th & reached their destination at Satastia, Miss on the morning of the 16th. I communicated with Col. Ferguson Comdr of C. S. Forces, who came on board & receipted for the prisoners. After which I communicated the order to them, from the Secy. of War. prohibiting them from returning within the lines of the United States Army under penalty of being imprisoned during the war.

Letter to War

APRIL 24, 1863.

SIR:

The Secretary of War directs me to acknowledge the receipt, by reference from Col. W. HOFFMAN, Commissary General of Prisoners, of your letter of the 5th ultimo, in the following words:

"HEAD QUARTERS, DEPARTMENT OF THE MISSOURI,

OFFICE OF THE PROVOST MARSHAL GENERAL,

St. Louis, Mo., March 5th, 1863.

"COL. W. HOFFMAN, 3d INF'Y.

"Com'y General of Prisoners, Washington:

"COLONEL:

"Yesterday, as you have already been informed, by telegram and letter, I sent, in obedience to your orders, 150 citizen prisoners for exchange to Washington city. There remain, of the guerilla and irregular prisoners, many of them captured last fall, and others along since then, in prison, a large number of similar cases. For the release of many of these prisoners a great influence and pressure is brought to bear. Many of them fall into bad health; the circumstances of the families of others excite the sympathies of their neighbours; and other circumstances combine to induce great efforts to release these Prisoners.

"I believe that some of them ought to be released, but a large proportion of them are as obstinate rebels as they ever were, and it will not be safe to enlarge such characters while the war lasts. I respectfully suggest that such prisoners be passed through the lines to be exchanged. A considerable number of such irregular prisoners, who are being captured continually, are determined rebels, whose purposes no length of imprisonment will change. Would it not be advisable, upon the capture of such men, to exchange them at once? To detain them, fills our prisons, at heavy expense to the Government.

"Several rebel mails have been taken in the last few weeks, and I find that a large number of women have been actively concerned both in secret correspondence, and in carrying on the business of collecting and distributing rebel letters. I have now the evidence upon which these women can be convicted. I have, for some time past been thinking of arresting and trying them, but the embarrassment is to know what to do with them.

"Many of them are the wives and daughters of officers in the rebel service. * * * * *

These women are wealthy, and wield a great influence; they are avowed and abusive enemies of the Government; they incite our young men to join the rebellion; their letters are full of encouragement to their husbands and sons to continue the war; they convey information to them, and by every possible contrivance they forward secretly, clothing and other support to the rebels. These disloyal women, too, seek every opportunity to keep disloyalty alive amongst rebel prisoners.

"I have been appealed to very many times by our loyal people to know why these disloyal women were not sent through the lines to join their husbands and sons. I respectfully suggest that such an order be issued by the Secretary of War.

"Again, there is a large number of active, intelligent wealthy disloyal men in St. Louis, who keep up a constant intercourse with the rebels in arms; and, by every means that they dare, they urge them on in the rebellion. These men exercise a telling influence upon the rebels in arms, and upon the disloyal masses in this

State. Open notorious disloyalty is preferred by these men, to even a reputation for neutrality. They abstain from open acts, such as giving money, arms and other supplies, but their secret acts, words, association and sympathies are unmistakably hostile to the Government; they openly rejoice at our reverses, and lament at our victories.

"Forbearance towards this class of people was first adopted because it was thought that leniency would reform them; but that forbearance has settled into a usage which has produced evil consequences, and has led these people to believe that it is their 'constitutional' right to speak and conspire together as they may choose.

"The quiet secret influence of this class is injurious, and greatly so. I suggest that they be sent to join their Southern friends, if such a course shall be approved by the Secretary of War.

"The views of Provost Marshal, Lt. Col. Dick, as expressed in the within letter, are fully approved. The policy which he indicates for the treatment of incorrigible rebels is unquestionably the true one, and a policy less lenient than this cannot be safely pursued anywhere, but especially in the State of Missouri. I recommend that he be instructed to carry into execution, promptly and inflexibly, the opinion he has expressed as to the proper disposition to be made, both of the men and women who are in rebellion against the Government in the State of Missouri, or who are actively, though secretly, giving aid and comfort to those who are so.



Since my absence two horses were stolen in the town here, one of Lieut. West and one of Capt. French. A band of about 10 stopped at the house of Mr. John Johnson between Dry creek and Concho and took her gun and plundered her generally. Three men chased the Constable who was out collecting taxes and only the plectrum of his horse saved him; they dropped a paper in his yard that they offered \$100. for his scalp. The two men who shot Jos. Dill at his place can be found out as Dill thinks he recognized one of them. Dill will lose his right name. Henry Smith, Thomas Smith and John Hopkins lay out in the woods and commit all kinds of depredations; they steal horses and plunder private houses. Two men stopped yesterday morning about day light at a house in the Chickadee and when they found that there were several men in the house they took to the woods. The footprints showed that they had been around the stable. In the prairies between here and Crawford Co. I hear of three different gangs. They are all emigrants from a Company which lays further south. They come in on that mail route, and I hear every day of parties going north and south on that route. If there is not at least 100 men cavalry stationed here to keep the country clean this must be a horse left and the life of a many good men will be sacrificed.

I hope you will press the importance of
this matter with the General as several of
the store keepers talk already of packing up
their goods and leaving.

Judge Manning one of our staunchest Union
men offers to sell out at 1/3 what every body
says his property is worth in order to get away
since he was taken prisoner two weeks ago
by a band of guerrillas and with a revolver
on each side of his head made to open
his stable when they took every horse he had.
They were just going to the store when some
of the 3^d Iowa came up, who killed one of
them but the rest got away and were seen
next day leading about 12 horses loaded
with plunder, one of them had three saddle bags
and a horn.

There is another "lady" in the vicinity of my Camp a Mrs. Gault who's husband is in the rebel army; she is the hottest rebel firebrand around but that is not the reason for my mentioning her; if I had no cause to believe her a dangerous spy, she has been at all Hd. Quarters since

Vicksburg and seems to be well protected,
yesterday an American vessel from
Baltimore and St. Louis arrived I was
informed, that this Mr. ² Fawcett attempt-
ed to cross the river same day last
week at St. Louis, but unsuccessful there,
really did cross at a private ferry
at a little distance from St. Louis and
returned on this side again.

I have her closely watched now
and find her already under a kind
of a parole to Major Genl. McPherson.
Some paroled Rebel officers have
so far recovered from their wounds,
that I considered it prudent, to for-
ward them to the river, they are
prowling around constantly and
make themselves obnoxious generally.
Every thing remains quiet here,

my connections with General
Sherman's troops are getting perfect.
a very strict system of patrols
in connection with the stationary
posts and videttes guards the river
bank, whenever accessible, from
Bridgeport to Baldwin ferry.

I enclose again my former appli-
cation for detail of Lt. John E. Wainwright
(3rd Miss Inf. Ad.) and hope, that the
endorsement of Col. Babbinger, you
require, will be satisfactory.

I have to report upon the matters contained in the statement of Andrew Kyle, sent herewith:

That I have examined the matter referred to and find as follows: Walter Gaken, mentioned therein, was arrested by the order of Capt. F. P. Chitty, Pro. Mar. of Alex^{ca} on the 4th of June 1863, charged with violating General Order No 4, issued from Brig Genl Geo P. Slocum's Headquarters, prohibiting the sale or distribution of liquors, to soldiers or others in Alexandria, and was tried before the Captain in person. The charge was proven by two witnesses, and in fact, it was not denied by Gaken. When the guard arrested the prisoner, he was in the act of removing liquor from his premises, and on a search being made, one barrel of

liquor was found buried in the yard in front of his door.

On examining the Records of the Proo Marshal's office, I find that the same party was arrested in April last on the same charge and convicted and sentenced to imprisonment for ten days in the "Slave Pen," and in view of the former conviction and clear proof of the selling as charged, as well as the concealment of the barrel of Whiskey, he was fined one hundred dollars, and sentenced to three months imprisonment.

On calling Mrs Gaken before me this morning, she admitted that this was the second conviction of her husband, that liquor had been sold at the house for six weeks prior to the 4th of June; that about two barrels in all had been sold; that the barrel was found buried on their premises, but claimed that it was put there by others, and without her knowledge. I also asked her to

state what occurred between herself and Lieut Sherwood, in relation to procuring the discharge of her husband.

She replied that he came to her house, and asked if she was offended at him; she said she was. He answered that she ought not to be, for he was only doing his duty; she then said that she would remain angry, until he used his influence to procure her husband's discharge. The Lieutenant said that if she would pay \$100 he could be discharged; that nothing was said about it being paid for the personal use or benefit of Lieut Sherwood; and further that she has never heard of any money being paid to Officers at Alexandria for their own use; that she had heard that fines were collected, and thought the officers might keep the money themselves. That she ^{knew} nothing personally in relation to the case of Michael Smith, but heard that he had been released on paying three hundred dollars.

Lieut Sherwood was also before me, and denied emphatically ever having made any proposition to procure the release of Baker, or having asked his wife, or any other person to pay him \$100. or any other sum of money for any purpose whatever, and I have no doubt his statement is strictly true.

The facts in relation to the case of Michel Smith are briefly these:

Smith was arrested some months since for violating the same Order No 4. and tried before Capt. Clark Provost Judge, found guilty and sentenced to pay a fine of \$50 and to give bonds in the sum of \$300, conditioned that he would not again sell. He paid the fine and promised to return with the bond, but did not do so. Captain Clark did not observe the neglect to comply with his order until several weeks later, when the same party was again arrested and convicted of the

same offence, and two barrels of Whiskey were found buried on his premises. He was fined one hundred dollars, and sentenced to two months imprisonment. He paid the fine, and subsequently applied for a release, and proposed to pay what he would have paid if the Bond had been given (\$300), and on his paying \$200, (having before paid One hundred) he was released.

All of the fines I believe have been honestly accounted for, and I think the charges are totally unfounded.

Depot or Freight house and water tank at Hen-
derson Station on the Mobile & Ohio R. Road and
embraced in the District of Jackson Tenn. were
destroyed by fire, by a Battalion of Confederate
troops, regularly in the Confederate service, as they
have been informed and believe, of Foster's Cavalry
commanded by one N. N. Cox, who with a portion of
his command has since been captured at Parker's
Cross roads on the 31st of Dec. by the Federal soldiers
and sent North as Prisoner of war to be exchanged,
that at the same time and place a considerable amount

of Cotton was consumed and destroyed, which had been collected at said Station for shipment over said road and which belonged entirely to speculators, who were not in any way or manner connected with the Government service, but were simply following, collecting cotton and running their chances to make fortunes.

Petitioners further state that said parties came to the Commander of this ^{10th district} ~~post~~ (Gen Sullivan) and by some sort of representations, procured a special order to be issued by No. 15, dated Nov. 12th 1852 assessing petitioners the sum of Twenty six thousand Seven Hundred and fifty one ³⁶/₁₀₀ dollars (\$26,751.³⁶) to pay the damage done to said R. Road and Government, together with the damage done said Cotton speculators by the loss of their Cotton, which makes up the principal amount of damages so assessed. Said order was sent to Col S. M. Hayes commanding the post at Bethel, who, thereupon issued special order No. 87 assessing your petitioners as follows to wit dated December 14th 1852.

Summing up considerable over \$30,000⁰⁰ Among the parties assessed by order No 87 issued by Col. Haysin are R. J. Busham, Thos. Covock and Richd. Hendrix who were not found, Col. Brown, who commands the company at said post, had a brother who had a stock of goods there and to enable him to do a good business, the Capt. seldom placed out pickets but gave the citizens full ingress and egress to said post and if any one is to blame for the capture of the post it is said Captain for his negligence and his said brother and these cotton speculators who were so anxious that the post should be accessible at all times to the citizens for the purpose of trading and speculating with them.

Petitioners further state that they each and all of them had long before that time taken the oath of Allegiance to the United States Government, that they each and all had faithfully kept and observed it in all its parts and challenge any one to show any thing to the contrary that they are firm with the exception of one or two who are merchants and were all guilty at leasting to their legitimate business and had no more knowledge that said raid was going to be made than the Federal authorities had them selves and the authorities can readily see from the proximity of the Station to the Tennessee River how easily a raid might be made without the citizens being closely confined at home, knowing any thing about it the raiders being able to travel the entire distance easily during a single night, which they did in this particular instance.

Petitioners further state that they understand that the order issued by Gen Grant making citizens liable for damages done to the R. Roads & Gov property by Guerrillas did not embrace damages done by the regular soldiers in the Confederate Army but was only to embrace ^{damages} ~~cases~~ done by Guerrillas and citizens themselves, and any other construction of said order would be an extreme hardship upon non-combatants, unarmed and not able to protect their own property, and they hereby respectfully refer to said order in an investigation of this case.

They further state that said money paid by them as above stated is still in the hands of the Federal Authorities and has never been distributed among said cotton speculators.

The petitioners consider and that justice may be done in the same, they respectfully insist that they are not liable for the damage done by said raid of Confederate Cavalry without their knowledge and consent as many of them has never had notice from the State of Action and heard nothing of it for several ^{days} after the raid had been made, and respectfully feel that they may have had investigation of the whole matter in some way to be prescribed by the Federal Authorities and upon an investigation they should show that they had nothing to do with said raid. They ask that an order be made refunding their money to them. Or if the Authorities should be of opinion that the ^{damages done} Government should be paid for by them, they ask that Commissioners may be appointed to assess its value and all of the balance of their funds be refunded to them except the sum required to pay for the damages to the Government, as many of them had already suffered

by the destruction of their ~~property~~ by the same
authority than destroyed said speculators and
against their will and consent

They ask for such relief
the premises as they may be just and right all
of which is respectfully submitted

On the 15th of May, 1863, I found at Senatobia, Miss, engaged in buying and shipping Bacon to Confederate Commissary at Iguala. I took the Bacon for my command, and what money he had with him for that purpose (Twenty-two hundred and ten Dollars, Confederate Currency) which I turned over to Brig. Gen. Smith at La Grange with Telegraph dispatches found in the office at Senatobia, stating the purchase and shipment of Bacon. On the recent raid I received information that Williams and a Dr. Fouch of Senatobia have been largely engaged in buying supplies in that region and also smuggling from Commerce and Austin on the Mississippi river.

I have learned from a correspondent, who is a temporary resident in a secession family of Somerset Co. Maryland, that a certain individual by the name of Hardcastle, an un doubted traitor, migrates frequently between that place and the La Pierre House Philadelphia. I also give you an

extract from one of the letters of
my correspondent. "Behoboth, an
insignificant fishing village con-
taining not more than half a doz-
en houses besides its store, is a very
nest of treason here renegades
secrete themselves - here Mr-
Hardcastle hides away; and, to
this obscure point come many
of those who wish to run the
blockade; knowing that the in-
habitants and neighbours will
assist them. Letters etc come
across from Virginia, in that
way it is that this family hear
continually from their relatives
on the other side. Many cross
over under the pretence of fish-
ing, and a dark night is generally
a busy night; they choose the

most unsuspecting and unlikely
looking crafts for their purposes.
Southern Whiles, the man who shot a
Union soldier last November, is
again on this side more independent
than ever from having escaped
so easily, and others upon whom
the law's hand should be laid here
feel themselves secure. If some
one would come among them
as desiring to run the blockade
or send contraband across he
could soon find out more than
I am able to tell. Hoping these
few items of information may be
available towards arresting the
spread of treason

They were sent to New York. On the accession
of Genl Butler to Command at New Orleans these
two persons returned to that city, But before being
allowed to leave the Boat, the Oath of Allegiance having
again been offered to, and declined by them they were

immediately brought back to N.Y.
I am told that they do not hesitate to express
their views and wishes in regard to the success
of the rebel cause.

Another informant stated that Dr Leacock was
not indisposed to concede the rights of the north
nor even to take the oath, but that all his
relatives, friends, his very children being more
violent secessionists had declared that they would
never recognize him again should he do so.

That the Dr said he was getting old and friends
and children were more to him than country.

Dr Goodrich left this city yesterday

I told them that I had no discretionary power, that my orders were imperative. They represented to me that in a few hours after I left they would be at the mercy of the worst set of men that ever cursed the earth (Guerrillas and Bushwhackers), which representation I have every reason to believe, and that if I could do nothing for them they would all leave with me. In this emergency I took the arms of Co K. (forty muskets) and receipted for them to Capt Thompson, and turned them over to the "Home Guard" a company composed of the volunteers of Harrisonville and vicinity, and took a receipt for them also the inclosed bond which will explain itself, and instructed them to act simply on the defensive.

The persons whose names are on the bond
represent at least a quarter of a million of
dollars.

I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt, on the 25th, of an autograph communication from the Major General Commanding, dated May 6th, directing me to have Mrs. Kirby Smith, Mrs. Judge Patnam, Miss Russell, the Buffingtons, G. Pacetti, and the Quincy family sent immediately beyond the enemy's lines and to treat in like manner all other rebel sympathizers abusing the protection of our flag.

Within the forty hours that I have detained the Boston, I have been so far able to execute the order that I send by that steamer the following persons, They desire to cross the lines from the places mentioned opposite their names.

To the crossing of the first list at Hernandura I know of no objection: indeed it would be impossible for the ladies to cross here. I address a note to Col. Putnam requesting his aid.

Of those desiring to be sent to Hilton Head Mr. Buffington and Gumeruido Pacetti belong to the class mentioned by the Major General

as persons whom it is "inexpedient to permit within the Enemy's lines". They are both men of superior intelligence and were leading citizens before the war.

Mr. Pacetti will apply for permission to return his family to this place while he can go to Cardenas, Cuba, where he is partner in a commercial house, & get funds to send his family to bear their expenses to the same place. There is no doubt that he was an active rebel before this place was occupied. Of his behavior since others can judge better than I. During the fortnight that we have been here we have had no trouble with him. It is generally believed that his sympathies ~~are~~ are against us.

Mrs. C. White is Mr. Buffington's housekeeper, and has lately expressed strong sympathies with the enemy.

Besanti Pacetti has six or seven sons over the lines, a number of whom have been and some of whom are in the rebel service. Three of them, mature men, resided in Savannah and would doubtless take care of their father and mother who are destitute here.

Mrs. W. Furner is the wife of Dr. Furner

of the *Sa Florida* and she and Mrs Arnou
(wife of the former U. S. Collector at this port) make
application of their own accord to be sent over.

There are others here who will desire, or
who ought, to cross to friends in their region,
and whom we can attend to when the *Bombay*
leaves. A few others will be sent by the next
steamer. I am not able to investigate their
cases in season for this trip.

Major Rodman, and a guard of ten.

Davidson, Geo. Davidson, Rich^d Davidson, and one other, the ^{names} of which I disremember, was the parties that placed it there. The second time it was taken down, and torn to pieces. The flag, the Negro, says, belonged to Mr Mitchell, a man, I have not the least doubt, that urged Mr Evergreen to participate in the capture and burning of the sloop Hard times, for which offence, he Evergreen, & Jas Tilyman have been sent South. Evergreen was at the time an Overseer on his farm. The hood that was on Board of the sloop at the time was marked in his name of Geo. Davidson,

These facts with the mere evidence I think
should cause these arrests. It will
take only a few more arrests to put a stop
to such things. A Mr Spencer Wright was
also heard to say that we are whipping them
like Hiss. he was then alluding more particularly
to the 6th Md Regiment, which a Company
of it went from our County, and reported
as being all either cut to pieces, or taken
prisoners. he Mr Wright visits Baltimore every

fortifications. At the time of this order to leave
the house, which they obeyed, they were receiving
forty dollars per month in advance as rent - for a
portion of the house, reserving four rooms for
use of your petitioners. Thus it will be seen
that your petitioners suffered by this order the
loss of a home and ready money for their support.
About the 10th of October 1862, your petitioners
leased the Charleston house, near Memphis to Charleston
depot, from the rental office, but your
petitioners were deprived of that house about
the 1st of January 1863.

Your petitioners were
put in the use of a small house on the corner
of Lincoln and De Soto Streets, but a Mrs. Hartley, under
the plea of British protection, took possession of it.

before your petitioners had occupied the same one month
Your petitioners have frequently applied for a
house at the rental office, but so far have
failed except as before described

Your petitioners would
further show that they received an order from
Brig, Genl Vetch to Capt Teddy enjoining it upon ^{him}

Allow me to call your attention to the fact, that there are several places in Canton where liquor is sold to the soldiers from this Garrison, kept by disreputable persons, who enter and harbor our soldiers from the Garrison by selling to them their poisonous stuff until their money is all gone. I sent out a Sergeant and two men yesterday to arrest some of the men of my company, they brought in four men which they found in two of these places one kept by a woman named Mary Henry and the other kept by a woman named Mrs Purkley in this last place the Srgt found some blankets and ^{soldiers} clothing which had evidently been taken from some of the soldiers, or perhaps sold by them she refused to give any account of how the property came into her possession, the sergeant seized the property and gave it into the charge of the officer of the Guard at this Post.

I respectfully ask that these places be broken up, or prohibited from selling liquor to the soldiers, as they are a great source of annoyance and trouble to the good order and

discipline of the Garrison, as well as a cure
to the soldiers themselves,

Biscoe) with his crew spent the day on Saturday 29 at a retired place on the western shore just below Plum Point - making up towards the Point after nightfall. There is certainly a depot for their traffic at the latter place - and they too are harbored it is thought by one calling himself a Union man. —

uniting with the Church South. This young
man is Amos S. Smith

~~man~~ has repeatedly said he would not

made the "scape goat" for the peculiar and
pernicious sins of those in rebellion against
the Government of the United States?

The disloyalty of the members of the Episcopal
Church in this country is so universal that

suspected by the few loyal men that at

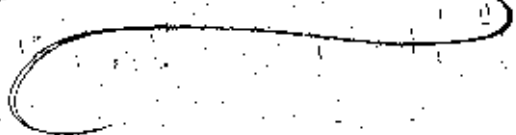

My Dear Sir:

I dislike to trouble you about a small matter, knowing how important your time is; but justice to an old widow lady demands it at my hands.

You will remember that I spoke to you when in Lexington about the case of my mother-in-law, Mrs Cooper, stating that I had received a letter from Gen. Wiley in which he informed me that a claim of that lady, ^{had been sent} to you with his recommendation for approval. Supposing that you may have overlooked the matter in the multiplicity of your official engagements, I earnestly invite your attention to it. It is a claim for ~~pay~~ furnished the army here; but as I suppose Gen. Wiley has fully explained the case to you, as he told me he did, I will not trespass upon you with a recapitulation of the facts. I will only add, however, that it is a case of simple justice, in which a loyal woman appeals to the Government through you as its representative, for not only half of what is rightly due her.

Will you do me the favor to devote a moment to this case; and visit it to me at this place (Lexington), and oblige

I send you herewith
a brief of rather a singular case which I am at
a loss to know how to dispose of

On Saty May 23th a man named Taft, formerly in
Glenn Regt. and always considered a good Union man, came
to me with two letters which had been written on the 6th May to
parties in Rebel army by two men in Cass Co. which he said
were handed him by a man named Pickington with in-
structions to deliver them to the writers of the same when
called upon by them, on their paying, one \$50, and the other
\$200. which amounts were marked in pencil upon the backs of
said letters - He said he had three letters at first, the other was
marked \$100 - The parties who wrote the same had called on
him but refused to pay the price asked expressing them-
selves unable to do so, and he thinking something wrong
in the matter brought the letters to me.

I at once ordered the arrest of Ben A. Spalding
(an old man), Robert Kendrick, and Francis E. Nolan
the writers of these letters - I arrested Pickington as an
important witness, taking his written parole of honor, to
report to me on Tuesday the 2nd inst. I also learned
that a Dr. Wilkinson of Macou City whom I have
known personally some time and considered to be a
Union man, was the man who collected the letters and
I also had him arrested & brought here -

On Tuesday June 2^d I examined the different parties - Pickington violated his parole & did not appear and I learned he had left the state. John E. Wilkinson testified that he was desirous of ascertaining how these rebel mails were received, by whom brought, and who were in correspondence to and he represented himself as a "mail carrier" and wrote two fictitious letters purporting to come from men in rebel army & gave them to the parties - He collected four letters (two of which I now have) and proceeded to his home in Moscow City - He states that he gave the letters to Pickington to bring to me that I might arrest the writers if I could do so without his agency in the matter being known. This on the 11th & 12th of May - Simon T. Taft - testified on Monday the 18th of May Pickington delivered to him three letters which were directed to parties in Little Rock and which would be paid for by the writers and they were to pay respectively \$50, \$100 & \$200 for the same - Parties called but could not pay so much and went home - Saw Pickington afterward who would not take any list - He notified them by letter that unless by Sat^y the 23^d they got their letters, he should hand them to the Pro. Marshal with other evidence against them - He brought the letters or rather two of them on Sat^y - Says Pickington had taken the other letters - Pickington carried Taft's letters to the parties in the country. Robert Kendrick testified he was approached by Wilkinson, solicited to write a letter Smith, that W. provided paper for him and ink for him & he did so - Says it is the first letter he has ever written Smith.

Francis G. Nalew testified he was at work in field letter from Capt McDonald was brought to him - was urged to answer it, went to his house, got his wife to write for him - did not read but a portion of what she wrote - Is recently out of Prison at St Louis where he was sent by me with Mr McDonald last Fall - He is under oath & bond.

The gist of the matter is these letters after they came into Pickingtons hands were used, not to benefit the authorities by the information gained - but to extort black mail from these parties who wrote the letters -

Pickington appears to have been the prime mover in the scheme - his breaking of his written parole of honor to report is evidence of his guilt, if there was not no other, and I had him arrested in Quincy yesterday and he is now here under guard.

I have some sympathy for the writers of these letters in view of the persuasions that were used to induce them to write, and they some of them seem to have been in correspondence before with the rebels.

General;

I have just had the honor of receiving your communication, bearing date of May 30th 1863, and sent under flag of truce through Col Carter, Lewis, calling my attention to "a couple of cases of arrest and gross and inhuman treatment of Citizens by my Command on my late expedition to Mo". I take advantage of the earliest moment to reply.

You state that Geo. W. King and Geo. Cassam, 'worthy' Citizens of Missouri, were arrested by some of my men; and particularly as regard to King, that "his house was plundered, his money taken from him, his horse taken from him, his boots taken off from his feet, and in this condition he was compelled to march on foot 500 miles, although an old man and in feeble health he was driven through swamps and bays, compelled to wade through mud and water to his middle, and constantly subjected to threats, taunts, and abuse from men of your Command in the presence of their officers"; and further stating that King and Cass had been liberated by the Confederate authorities at Little Rock, and all their wants kindly supplied by you when they reached Helena.

I am both pleased and surprised to find that your kindness of heart manifested itself in deeds as benevolent and humane as those you recount as falling to the lot of Messrs King and Lissau at your hands. Without granting all the virtues that you are pleased to ascribe to them, I must still confess that such humanity is worthy of all praise, though the recipients may be more or less damaged in their general characters.

It has struck me as barely possible, however, that we may differ somewhat in our ideas of virtue and worthiness in connection with a "worthy" pair like Messrs King and Lissau. It is possible that you would consider it highly creditable in them to combine against the life and aid in murdering Mr. Hile, the Sheriff of Wayne Co, because he was supposed to have "Southern sympathies" - that it was a commendable virtue on their part to track down Southern families, arrest Southern Citizens, throw them into prison, and appropriate their property to their own uses. That it was even noble to command Militia Companies that were never in the field, and whose highest ambition it was to rob, to plunder and to destroy, making themselves the pest, the plague and the nuisance of the surrounding country. In this opinion, however, I did and still do differ with you, and because of this difference

I took the liberty of arresting them, and sending them to Little Rock for trial, and I am confident in the belief that had it been possible to bring the proper witnesses from Missouri that their conviction would have been secured, and you would have been deprived of the pleasure of meeting them the recipients of your bountiful charity. As it was, the authorities finding that a case could not be made out against them by positive evidence, they properly released them - An example of justice in the abstract to which I would draw your attention, and commend to the imitation of your government.

I am not inclined, Sir, to examine very critically the statements contained in your list of charges regarding the man King; but I may say that if he marched 500 miles, either with or without boots, in coming from Fredericktown to my present encampment, or even going to Little Rock, he must have followed a very circuitous course and have travelled over a much greater distance than did my command. If you take the statement from him, a glance at the map will show you its fallacy; and if he has so grossly falsified in one particular, it would hardly be reasonable to place implicit confidence in his other statements. In fact, Sir, the man had good shoes; and my soldiers, instead of

robbing him, deprived themselves of their scanty comforts to loan him a portion of their blanket, - not that they admired or loved the man; but simply because he was a prisoner.

You are of course at liberty to protest as solemnly or as vehemently as you please in regard to any action in the present case or in any other that may arise hereafter; but allow me to say that a little more practice on your part of that "chivalrous and generous style of warfare" upon which you seem indirectly to pride yourself, would have more effect in mitigating the evils of civil warfare and in protecting the lives and property of non-combatants, than many flags of truce and a multitude of such communications as you were pleased to send me.

The Undersigned would respectfully represent to General Woodbury that his attention has been called by the Provost Marshal of this City, to a Communication made by Mr. Cornelius Curtis, to the General, in behalf of a Colored Woman calling herself Laura Willie, claiming to be the owner of a house and Lot situate in Key West, and known by the only title deeds of Legal Record, to be the property of one Captain Willie, which property has been taken charge of by said Provost Marshal as the property of said Capt Willie, and as enemy property.

The Undersigned represents, that said property has been under the charge and control of Christian Boye, a Merchant of this City, as the lawfully constituted Agent and Attorney of the said Willie, from the time of his purchasing said Lot and the building of said house, and up to the time

of the taking Charge by said Provost Marshal, and he had, up to the Commencement of the present Rebellion, accounted to said Willie for the rents thereof, and at no time had he received any instructions from said Willie, to turn over the property in question to the said Laura, or information, that he had sold or given said property to her.

He further represents that the said Laura claims a right to said House and Lot, on the ground that she has several Children by the said Willie, knowing at the time of her Claim, and at the time of living in open Adultery with him, that he had a wife with whom he lived, and Children also. And while I am disposed to extend to this woman all the rights and Sympathies of a Citizen under the Circumstances (White or Colored), I do not believe, that an example so pernicious and revolting to the Moral Sense; or examples of so flagrant Adulterous Acts, when brought to notice, will be tolerated or entertained for one moment by you.

If this woman can at any subsequent period show her title to this property, I do not think it unreasonable in view of the foregoing, that she should be refused possession until that time.

The Undersigned would

further Represent, that during nearly the entire time, since the building of this House (Some 8 or 10 years) to the present, a portion, and some times the whole of it (as is the Case now), has been rented and occupied by Miss Euphemia Lightbourn (and at present by my eldest Daughter with her) as a School House, and where they are now teaching some Forty Children, and should the pretended Claim of this woman succeed, they would necessarily be obliged to abandon Teaching, their favorite occupation, and one of the few institutions so much to be desired in our City, for these reasons also, I would respectfully suggest, whether this Case should form an exception to the general rule adopted, of hiring out all property taken by the Government under similar circumstances, and thus suspend an institution so desirable, to satisfy the pretended Claim of one who can show no reasonable or legal title to the same, or whether the Moral should yield (in the absence of legal rights) to the immoral.



On the 28th day
April 1863 the Steam Telegraph No 3 in the
Service of the U. S. was ordered to leave
Memphis Tenn and report to Capt
D. S. Craig at Smithland Ky
with instructions to take such passengers
who had proper passes who might
wish to go. We left Memphis the same
night at 11 o'clock with more
passengers than we could well
accommodate. About one hour after
leaving I found 5 Negroes concealed
in the State Room of the lower Cabin of
said boat. I asked them what
they were doing there. They answered
that a Mr King had them in charge.

I called on Mr King who showed me
a pass for himself and the 5 negroes
signed by Genl Beauregard to take
them to Cairo. I told him that I had
very respect for the pass. But that
they were run away negroes belonging
to Loyal Persons living in Memphis
and that he was assisting them
to run away and as they had violated
the Rules of my boat by secreting
themselves in the Ladies Cabin of the
Boat when he had only said seek
Passage for them. I should put
them on Shore at Foot Pillar.
I offered to refund him part of the
Passage money which he refused
to accept and plead very hard to have
it in go. He then called on Mr Boone
of Memphis to assist him in getting
them to Cairo. Mr Boone told him
what I was right in putting them
on Shore as they belonged to Loyal
Persons in Memphis. In conversation
with the negroes they told me that
they were slaves and wished to

go to Illinois and not to Erie Penn
as the gov called for and offered if
I would take them \$500 - Mr King
had \$1700 - belonging to one of the
negroes and \$2000 to another - which
he had returned them - they then
wished to get clear of Mr King as he
had deceived them. On our arrival at
Fort Tiffin I had them put on shore
and Mr King went with them.

On the 8th June I was arrested
for putting them on shore. By an order
of Genl Hulbert and as the boat
is now aground I would like to
have the case investigated here
and get permission to report myself to
Genl Hulbert at Memphis within
the next 10 days or sooner if
called upon to do so.

I wish to give you a statement concerning a drunken row that occurred on Monday Night the 5th Inst. at the 'Crystal Palace' and the part I took therein. I was on my way to the Jail, having in my charge two men whom I had arrested as suspected felons. When opposite the Palace my attention was called to the corner by loud cursing and other indications of a free fight. I immediately called upon Mr. Barnes to take charge of the men I had and went over to ascertain the cause of the disturbance. I there met Mr. John Wilson, Clerk at Provost Marshal's Office and asked him, what was the matter,

he became reproving and cursed and
abused me and all others present. I
told him, that he would have to
stop his noise and abuse or else I
would be compelled to arrest him.
Major Ditch stepped up to me and
remarked that he had heard of me
before and that no ^{God} damn Watchman
should arrest his Clerk. I told him
not to interfere with me as I was
discharging my duty, but he still
insisted that I should not arrest his
Clerk and the more I tried to
reason with him, the more he got
angry. I was compelled to release
Wilson and take hold of him and
put him out of the house and would
have put him in Jail had it not of
been for the interference of the crowd.
Not knowing his position at the time,
Wilson was drunk, abusive and very
noisy and threatened to arrest the
whole party with his guard (as he call it)

and did send after a quorum for
that purpose. If Major Ditch had
not of interfered with me I would
have been able to quell the distur-
bance without any trouble but as it
was his conduct emboldened the
voters and rendered my authority
of no avail, or if he had of made
himself known in his official capacity
one word from him would have
quelled the whole proceedings, as
his Clerk, John Wilson, was the
leading spirit of the crowd and
to have silenced him would have
put an end to the matter -

That on last Friday morning about 7 o'clock a stranger dressed in a dirty brown suit called at the house and asked for Mr Smith who was out so he then asked for Mr Smith and walked into the parlour. Mr Smith came down and some after-wards carried him quietly up stairs, where he remained concealed until Sunday night. They sent his needs up to him stealthily. Mr Smith put his needs in a plate at the table and his son carried them up stairs to him. Getting evening when the guard came to escort him they locked the front doors of the house ~~and~~ to keep the office and guard out until Mr Smith had brought him down stairs and get him out the back way, while he was getting out the back way the officer came in through the alley and I pointed him out to him. He immediately pursued and arrested him. I saw him after he was brought back and knew it is the same man I let in Friday morning.

I am a resident of Muen County. When I
joined the Knights of the Golden Circle, they
told me it was a Mason meeting. They
told me they wanted to see how strong the
the Mason party was in the north. I at-
tended the first meeting which was
held between nine and ten o'clock
~~which was held~~^{at night} at the Barker School
house in Iowa. There were between
40 and 60 in the meeting when I went
in. They first swore me to support the
Constitution of the U. S. and of the
State in which I lived. I did not
think there was anything wrong a-
bout the first meeting. But when
I attended the second meeting I

I did think there was. I found that the men who talked in favor of the South attended it and southern sympathisers. I only attended four meetings of the order. The two last were not regularly held because there ^{were} so few present. The whole society as far as I heard them speak was opposed to the policy of the administration in conducting the war. As far as I heard them speak in the lodge they were opposed to the conscription law and raising soldiers in that way. Some were in favor of fighting before they would be detailed into the Provisional Regiment - & all men in this district I opposed it. They most of them were in favor of fighting against the enforcement of the conscription act of Congress. I do not recollect I heard any of the defendants express their views. James Bixler was for fighting against being detailed into the Provisional Regiment - & all men ^{of fighting a-} and was in favor ^{of} against the conscription law of Congress. Defendant William Seach talked the same way. The sign the first night was the left two fingers placed behind the ~~eyes~~ ^{ear}. The answer was the right hand placed against the ~~throat~~ ^{throat}. On entering the door of a lodge

you give them caps and say "Hants"
The door keeper says "entroy" When you
but before you come to the door

to delay the matter until Maj Gen Scho-
field can be consulted in the premises
and desired me to write to you, so that
through you he might have the sanction
of Gen Schofield for these arrests. —
I formerly reported the condition of affairs
in this district almost daily, but disloyal
ty and anarchy in portions of the district
have become so public that I presume

all are aware of the prominent disturbing
causes that make the future anything
but cheering. It is better for disloyal
men to be punished by military au-
thority than by mob law. There is our
line of policy that will give peace to
this district. "Keep our own troops in
order and ~~be~~ be marsh our rebels!" These Knights
of the Golden Circle are the breeding dens
of guerrillas and ought to be broken ^{up} in
my opinion. If after consulting with Gen.
Schofield you shall come to that conclu-
sion, please advise me by telegraph
and more fully by letter.

Statement of Thomas G. Rayburn.

I live in St. Louis, am engaged in Hemp trade &c.

I have fought for the U. S. Gov't and in the year 1874 and would do it to-morrow. I am a loyal man, I hope to see the U. S. Gov't restored over the South, would like to see it done by a compromise, think it can be, even now, - think the South ought to give up, and the U. S. Gov't would treat them with justice, - on the score of humanity I would wish to see the South lay down their arms. - I have never given the President's Proclamation of Emancipation much thought, but I think he had the right to issue it, as a matter of necessity, under present circumstances. - I do not think it right to arm the negroes in this war, I have a horror of arming negroes. - I would rather see the U. S. Gov't restored, than the Union dissolved, even if slavery is entirely abolished. -

I have no relatives in the Rebel Army. - I have never sent to, nor received from the Rebel Army, nor the South, any letters since the Rebellion broke out. - Letters have been sent to me from the interior, to be sent South. - I did not send any of them, but left them at my house, where the most of them were burnt. I presume they were burnt by my daughter. - I think none of them were sent South by my daughter. - She has told me that

she never sent any of them south, but had written to the writers of them not to send any more, as she would not send them. I do not know who wrote these letters, nor why they sent them to me, unless because my name was well known in the interior, being a buyer in hemp, or from the fact of my daughter having called upon Genl Halleck when he was in command here, asking if she would be permitted to send letters south under a flag of truce, then going. Such permission was granted, and it may have been from that circumstance, that letters have been sent to me and to my daughter.

I do not think my daughter would do any disloyal act. I know that whenever a letter would be received containing anything of a treasonable nature she would inform the writer that she would not send it. I can not tell why she did not inform the authorities in such case. She once showed such a letter to Post Master Jay, and then burnt it. I do not know either a Mrs Galbot or a Mrs Grant living in the interior of this State. I do not know whether any of the letters received were from either Mrs Galbot or Mrs Grant. Such letters came addressed to me, with an inside envelope addressed to parties in the South, which I always considered as taking a great liberty with my name - as the parties sending them were entire strangers to me. I can not tell why I took these letters home to my daughter, no particular reason for it, further than that I wanted no trouble with them. I had no idea that my

daughter would send them, - some of them were sealed and some were not. I advised my daughter not to send them. - after leaving them with her, I thought nothing more of them. - I have taken the oath of allegiance since the rebellion broke out. -

Two Skeleton Keys has been found on Poyghton, and there is every evidence from their statements and refusal to answer my interrogatories - that they are a pair of most accomplished Hotel Thieves, and I desire to consult the Dist. Atty. and Justice Carter & explain the evidence & circumstances & if possible convict them both.

I am a nervous man, my pay was from 3.00 to 3.50 a day it cost me all I could earn for board &c. I paid 40c for the shoes I have on my feet. I came out the Fredericksburg R.R. (walked) to within 47 miles of that city then crossed the Rappahannock into Stafford Co. & made there for the Alex^d Telegraph Road & came to Alex, I should have said that when about two or miles out of Richmond I passed the pocket without their seeing me, at Beaver Station I saw 10 guards both Cavalry, saw 13 at Guinea Station, I think there are about 10 000 men at Richmond.

He has been living in this City for the past three months, since his arrival here, he has according to the best information, behaved himself in a quiet, orderly manner, abstained from the expression of any disloyal sentiments, has married here - and intends residing in this City permanently. McLaughlin is in a very delicate state of health has just recovered from a severe attack of Haemorrhage of the Lungs, and is evidently a confirmed consumptive.

Charles Hammer - In relation to Hammer - I have ascertained, that he has lived here for the past year with the exception of about thirty days, he has sustained a good character for peace and quietness - has abstained from the expression of any disloyal sentiments, and intends residing in this City permanently.

I think that on account of their good conduct whilst here, that it would be but justice to these men, that they should be heard by you, in their own defense.

I am investigating the case of the others included in your order, and as soon as I am posted will submit an additional statement.




