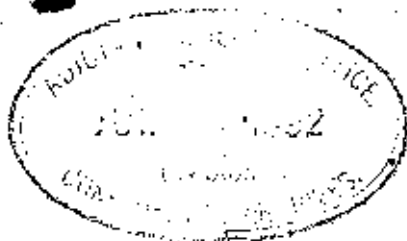

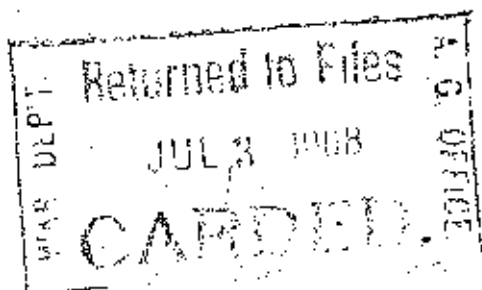

Notes of Evidence as to  
the Building of Lewis' factory

---

L. T. Jones

The factory took fire not more than 30 minutes before daylight in the morning.

The neighbors generally gathered to assist in subduing the fire as soon as it was discovered.

Mr. Brown was not seen at the fire until some length of time after the neighbors had all got there - indeed they had pretty much ceased work, having accomplished all that was possible to do.

He is one of the nearest neighbors to the Factory - don't live more than  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a mile from it, if so far; his brother who lives at the same house he does (at their Father's) was among the first who got there. Mr. Peyton who lives at least a  $\frac{1}{2}$  mile beyond him got there some time before he did.

Mr. Peyton who is a reliable gentleman says that he stopped at Brown's on his way to the fire - that he, P, saw Coleman Brown & Old man Brown at Brown's house that morning - that he did not see Mr. Brown there that morning - that C Brown went on with him, P, to the fire.

Mr. Brown has been repeatedly heard to say that the Factory would be burned - that it was in great danger &c. &c. The negroes who worked in the Factory say that some person on horseback left the Factory yard about the time they first discovered the fire - that the horseman started South towards Glasgow. Now that man on horseback, might have gone on through Glasgow or he might have turned to the left & gone around

on the East side of Lewis' farm out a North westerly direction, or he might have turned to the right & gone up the River road a westerly direction around on the west side of Lewis' farm.

Lewis has a large pasture extending around on the West, North & South of Brown's 10 acre tract of land. The road up the river runs immediately by Lewis' pasture fence west of Brown's. Two days after the fire a gentleman passing up the river road, discovered that the pasture fence at a point West & opposite Brown's house had been recently partly pulled down & a horse's tracks were plainly visible where he had crossed the fence in the direction of Brown's house.

A negro man who is somewhat advanced in years & who has lived in this vicinity for more than 20 years & who has always been noted for good conduct & fidelity as a servant & as a truthful person says that on the morning of the fire & about the time the fire was first discovered (a little before day) he was traveling on the river road going South towards Glasgow & that he met Wm Brown traveling North on said road - that he met Brown at a point about 200 or 300 yards South of the place where the fence had been broken & the house taken in. Some considerable time after the factory had been burned Wm Brown said that he Wm Brown, Platt, Meach & young John Hays was or had been accused of burning the factory, but would never tell any person

who it was who accused them, thus standing as his own accuser. It has been rumoured here that he (Brown) told Major Hunt that it was a negro who accused him - but Mr. Emerson (who is the brother in law of Platt Thrash) says that when he was trying (Brown) to tell him who it was who accused them, Brown said that he, B, would see the man if the man was willing for him to do so, he, B, would tell Emerson who it was; thus rendering it difficult to believe that it was a negro. Again it has been rumoured that the charge or accusation came through a negro woman the house servant of one Thomas Venable a trifling man the bitter enemy of the Lewises & a brother in law of Brown. He, V, might know more about Brown's whereabouts & doings on the night of the fire than some others. Bear in mind that neither Brown Thrash nor Hays was accused of the burning of the Factory by either of the Lewises or any other person that we know of nor indeed were they suspected until Brown said that they were accused & refused to tell who accused them, nor did Hays make any exertions to find out who accused him. Thrash did seem to try to get Brown to tell him who accused them but said Brown refused to tell him who it was.

Venable was heard to say not more than twenty days before the fire, speaking in harsh terms of the Lewises, that the Lewises did not know



him yet but would find him out in a short time.

I John Martin sworn testify as  
follows, I obtained the horse in question  
at the house of my mother, W<sup>m</sup> Warner  
and W<sup>m</sup> Carpenter had four mules and  
two horses in their possession, and W. W.  
Warner gave me this horse, stated to be  
Contraband as a free gift I kept possession  
of the horse for one week, then I traded  
him to W<sup>m</sup> Nule for another horse, upon  
information given me by Warner I considered  
I had been cheated, Warner went to Nule  
& complained of his cheating John Martin  
out of the grey horse. Nule came to me  
after that & wanted to trade back. I  
returned him his own horse & an old gun  
& his own ~~to~~ for ten Dollars & took the  
grey horse back. I then traded the grey  
horse to W<sup>m</sup> Allroyer for a yoke of  
cattle,

Martin & myself traded even for horses.  
I had the horse obtained from John Martin

was Mr Warner, I directly went & saw John  
Martin, John Martin returned with me  
& changed horses - back, he gave me my own  
Note & a gun in consideration of Fifteen  
Dollars - he gave me the Fifteen Dollars  
to keep me from exposing him for selling  
stolen horses. and I say to day if I had  
not had the fifteen Dollars I would have  
pushed him sure. Mr. Mr. Abroyer gave

a Gold of Cattle for the horse and the  
Widow Smith has the horse now,

William Osborne sworn says. That  
W<sup>m</sup> Warner made John Martin in  
presence of the grey horse, was a contraband  
and belonged to W<sup>m</sup> Warner. W<sup>m</sup> Nule

and made John Martin take his horse  
back and give him W<sup>m</sup> Nule his horse  
and Twenty Dollars to boot.

Henry Ogle sworn says, I heard W. Warner  
say that he gave the grey horse to John  
Martin, that he was a contraband horse  
Signed Henry Ogle.

Eliza Jane Warner sworn says. In the  
latter part of the year 1862. My husband  
E. W. Warner brought a grey and black  
horse either from Middlebrook or Pilot  
Knob. he said he bought the black and  
grey horses from the Quartermaster Stanley  
and gave twelve dollars a piece for them, he  
sold the Black horse to W<sup>m</sup> Osborne  
and Henry Ogle.

William Carpenter Teamster in  
the 1<sup>st</sup> Nebraska Regiment had four  
horses. at the house of my mother, he  
said two of them he fetched from

Arkansas. and the other two he brought  
 he sold the four mules to Henry Byle  
 and William Osborne. Wm Warner  
 says the men rode the mules and horses  
 in & sold them to Quarter master Stanley  
 for five Dollars each, and he sold them  
 to Wm Warner for twelve dollars each.

John Martin resown says Wm Carpenter  
 & Wm Warner brought four mules, one black  
 horse and one grey horse, the black horse  
 brand U. S. to my house in the fall  
 of the year, they said they brought  
 the mules and horses from Helena, Henry  
 Byle and W. Osborne came to our house  
 and bought the four mules and the black  
 horse, for one hundred and thirty Dollars  
 when asked as to how they got the mules  
 and horses, they said the Quartermaster  
 told them he had only to account for

 than he wanted and transfer William  
 Carpenter could take the four mules and  
 two horses and trade them off. Dock  
 Whitehead told me he bought some  
 mules of some of the men of the same

William Osborne, known say about

 came to Hemetite and said he came  
 after N. M. Whitehead and John Byle  
 that W<sup>m</sup> Warner had let him know  
 that he would bring some Mules and

 a horse to get some one to buy the  
 Mules and other horse, I told him they  
 were not at home, but in St. Louis with  
 horses, he then said that I or any one  
 could go up there and buy them Mules  
 and horses cheap, Henry Byles being  
 there proposed to go and buy look  
 at them. John Martin was riding  
 one of the Mules, we went to Martins  
 house and looked at the Mules and  
 horses, I asked W<sup>m</sup> Warner were he  
 got the Mules and horses, he said they  
 were contraband brought from Arkansas  
 I bought the four Mules & Black Horse  
 it was branded U. S. I told Warner at  
 the time on account of the hair being shaved  
 off so that I was afraid they were govern-  
 ment Mules and he said they were  
 not. I gave Warner One Hundred and  
 thirty five Dollars for four Mules  
 and the Black Horse. Tom Smith  
 living near Hemetite has a Racing  
 mare which he offered to trade to me

for the four Mules, the Horse had been  
worth three hundred Dollars but was  
not now worth more than one hundred  
I traded the four Mules for the horse  
I sold the Black horse to F. M. Cadwallader  
for thirty five Dollars. Tom Smith sold  
three of the Mules to Government for  
about 90 Dollars each. The finest  
Mule was sold to John P. Ashton  
living somewhere near Kustover, I heard  
he sold it for One Hundred and fifty  
Dollars. The men Warner and Carpenter  
since the Quartermaster gave them the  
Horses, to sell for him the Mules were  
their own.

About one Month or six weeks  
before I bought the four Mules and the  
horse, John Pyle told me that he got  
up very early in the morning from necessity  
when he met out a man called Jack  
belonging to the 1<sup>st</sup> Nebraska Regiment  
was close to the house of G. D. Whitbread  
with three Mules. he told John Pyle he  
had brought the Mules to sell him  
John Pyle bought the three Mules for seventy  
five Dollars ~~after that he took~~ he took  
me to St. Louis & sold him for seventy five  
or eighty Dollars, after that he took up  
the other two and got about ninety Dollars  
each for them. Signed W. J. Osborne.

Henry Byle, sworn says as follows. about the latter end of the year 1862 John Martin came to Pleasanton & said that W<sup>m</sup> Warner and W<sup>m</sup> Carpenter had ~~been~~ brought in some mules and horses, and wanted to sell them. we told him that we did not want to get into any trouble & he told us that there was no fear of that the boys took them from the rebels - and they were contraband Mules and horses.

I saw the black horse was branded U. S. we bought the four mules and the black horse, we gave \$135<sup>00</sup> for the five, we had them about fourteen days & then sold them to Tom Smith and John Byle for a racing share and one hundred Dollars in money that is the four mules, the black horse was sold to J. Badwallada for \$35<sup>00</sup> Tom Smith sold three of the mules to government, one of the mules he sold to W. H. Linton for \$150<sup>00</sup>

George P. Whitbread sworn says, that John Byle brought two mules. suppose of a soldier he gave fifty Dollars for them he kept the mules about four weeks, he said he sold them in St. Louis for government use, he brought home a surrel mule the same day he said he bought it of a soldier of the 1<sup>st</sup> Nebraska by the consent of a quartermaster Stanley, he took that mule to St. Louis & sold it. Signed G. P. Whitbread.

John Oyle, ~~sworn~~ says, I bought three  
 mules, two of those mules I bought at home  
 at the house of Mr. Whitehead, the mother of  
 G. E. Whitehead about 1/2 past six, A. M. a  
 soldier had two mules - then, there were two  
 soldiers, they asked sixty Dollars for the two  
 mules and I gave them fifty Dollars, I think  
 I kept the mules six weeks, I took the  
 mules to St. Louis & put them in Westbrook's  
 stable, and sold them to two Fishermen for  
 between 80 and 90 Dollars each, Happy Jack  
 told me the evening before that the mules came  
 from Helena. the odd mule I went to Hillsboro  
 & overtook the train, I saw some of the officers  
 and the Wagon master, they told me if I  
 could buy any of the stock it was all right  
 I bought one mule for 65 Dollars, I kept  
 that a day or two & then took it to St. Louis

 train and brought a sorrel mule, he told  
 me he gave sixty five Dollars for it, he kept  
 it about a week he took the sorrel mule

 soldier called happy Jack I gave twenty

Mitchell C. Clay of Boone County  
Va. being duly sworn says. I know Wm. St. Clair  
Ballant - he has been a very strong secessionist since  
the war broke out - does not know of his having  
been in the rebel army, but used his influence  
by inducing others to join, and speaking in strong  
terms against the Union. When I was taken prisoner  
by the secessionists, Wm. Ballant used his influence  
for them to keep me among them.

I have had information from those I know  
that Thos. C. Parrett belonged to the rebel army.

Alex. J. Hopkins, I personally know, he is a  
very good citizen, and always expressed a desire  
that peace should take place. When the secession-  
ists were down on me at home, he always acted as  
a brother to me, taking my part, and protecting me  
from their taunts and insults.

Capt. Wm. S. Chandler was a volunteer  
in the Rebel Army. That before he did so, came  
to my house on two different occasions to present myself  
to me, but when the rebel army commenced drafting he  
preferred volunteering than to being drafted. After  
the battle of Seely, I heard Capt. Chandler say  
that he intended visiting his new home and that  
he took up arms Aug. 1862. He remained at home  
some time - then he got word that his wife was  
going to hang him, if he did not take his new



and go on. When he got to where Genl. Hess was,  
he resigned, and came back home which was about  
the first week of December. When I came into his  
house about three weeks since, in a conversation I  
had with Chandler, he expressed strong feelings for  
the Union Cause, saying that the Federal troops  
now had possession, and would advise every person  
engaged in the rebel Army, to give themselves  
up, and that he himself would never take up arms  
again for the rebel Cause. He urged me to lay his  
case before Col. Gilbert in regard to his coming in  
and taking the oath of allegiance. Through negligence  
I overlooked the matter. Chandler was arrested  
by the Union party at the house of Mr. Hopkins  
with whom he lives, about three weeks since.

Statements of colored persons in reference to the riot at Chapel Hill.

W. B. Williams a freedman states that he went to Chapel Hill to attend a meeting of the freedmen, and that the Sheriff promised them protection. And that on Wednesday night Sept 13 while they were assembled the Students and some of the Citizens assaulted the house with guns and rocks, and that one of the freedmen was reported to be stabbed, that they blocked up the road and threatened to kill any freedman caught coming to Raleigh to report them. The Sheriff could not be found as he had gone to Hillsboro. Some of the Police interfered to quell the riot and he made his escape through the night and came to this office.

Henderson Washington also states that during the meeting some of the Students stood at the door and behaved very well and that about the close of the meeting some Students and Citizens assaulted the house with guns Pistols and Rocks and took the steps away and in getting out some were severely wounded with rocks. And that next morning he went back after his hat which he had lost in the melee. That a good many of the Students and Citizens were there and he remarked that he was going to Raleigh and Mr Wright a Student asked him what for and he replied to report how he had been treated and crippled. Mr Wright then said damn you I will cripple you worse than you are and started towards him with a stick and would have struck him had he not been prevented - and that Mr Pether a Citizen says you shant go to Raleigh. You are a damned

Sores head injury and ought to be hung, that he afterwards went to Dr Jones and while there (Mr Pitter and others came after him. Pitter stopped at the gate and cut in John Husky with a Bowie knife after him. Dr Jones took him up stairs in his house to prevent them finding him.

Frank Harris Goodman states that about the close of the meeting he and his wife started home and when they got to the door some one threw a rock at them and came near hitting himself and wife and that he threw a chair at them that they had taken the steps down which was on the outside of the building the only means by which the second story could be reached. He then tore off the ceiling and went down inside and put his wife under the bed. He then made his escape and went to Mr Pitter for protection. Mr P said he could do nothing with them but would send his sons. But did not send them. God Sarrain went down and tried to quell the riot but did not succeed. On the next morning he went to the Green Stable and John Husky and Mr Pitter were there. Husky remarked that some damned negro had knocked him down stairs and blacked his eye, and Pitter remarked that he stabbed at a negro and struck a post and cut his finger. Husky then borrowed Pitter's knife and went to Dr Jones after Henderson Washington swearing he would kill him if it cost him his life. Dr Jones hid Washington until they left.

William Fetter then mounted his horse and tried to  
get on a party to force and stop all freedom coming  
from Chapel Hill to Raleigh. heard Mr Wright a student  
say he would shoot Henderson Washington -

Hallow-Perkins on oath states that about the 11<sup>th</sup> day of January I met two men whom I have since heard were named Dunham and  
 at Morton's Hotel. I did not hear their names at the time - When I went in Mr Morton said to these men that I was a connection of the Lady that had the Negroes to sell - They asked me what kind of Negroes Mrs Carter <sup>very</sup> told them as well as I could what kind of Negroes they were - I then told them that their Master was in the Rebel Army - They ~~then~~ asked me if I supposed there would be any difficulty if they bought the Negroes in their taking them away - I told them I could not tell them myself but that I would try and ascertain about it - I then went down the street and talked with a strictly loyal man (A. H. Martin) on the subject. He said he did not believe that there was anybody here that had any right to interfere to prevent it - I told these men after I went back that I had talked with a loyal man who was supposed to know about these matters and that he had said that he did not think that ~~there~~ <sup>there</sup> was any ~~body~~ <sup>body</sup> here that ~~as might~~ <sup>be in danger</sup> - They asked me if I would see Mrs Carter and ask her what she would take for ~~the~~ <sup>the</sup> Negroes - I told them Mrs Carter was at my house and I would ask her when I went home - There was nothing further said about the Negroes that I remember of until next morning - I saw these men again that night - The next morning I think it was I told them that Mrs Carter said she would take \$500.00 for the Negroes

Woman Army her two children and a boy named John. They said they would take them - They then said that Mrs Carter was a woman and asked me if I would not show them the Negro. I said to them that the Negro woman and two children were at Mr Salles house and that if they would go to him he would show them the Negro - they insisted that I should go with them - I then went to Mr Salles and asked him where the Negro woman was and he told me that she was at his <sup>house</sup> where he left that morning - Some boy said that she (Army) had gone to Mr Millers to wash that day. Myself and the two men went there for <sup>her</sup> but finding she was not there. I went to Mr Salles kitchen where we found the Negro woman. One of the men enquired at Mr Salles if Army was there, they told him that she was - I then went in the kitchen and finding Army & the children there told them that she was the one they were looking for. ~~The~~ The man was in the kitchen some little time talking to the Negro woman but I did not hear the conversation as I had turned and went out after pointing out the Negro to them - When I came out Mr Salles was in the yard and produced a paper from the Pro. Marshal, ~~allowing~~ <sup>the</sup> allowing him to permit the Negro woman to stay at his house until he could get her Free papers from

Mr Salles at St. Louis - <sup>One of the men said to Mr</sup> I said to the men <sup>that under the circumstances I would not</sup> give five cents for five hundred aged Negroes - I then got on my horse and left - I ~~then~~ went down and had a conversation <sup>with</sup> the Pro. Mar. on the subject & went back and saw the two men in Mr Nortons bar room

They asked me where they could find Mrs Carter & told them she was at my house - they asked me the way there and I told them

Something was said about the Negro woman and the two men said they had concluded not to take her, I remarked that that was all right, that I had been talking with the Apt. Pro. Marshal and he said that if <sup>(Reed's)</sup> Dick Pro. Marshal had been here he would have arrested the whole party - but that he did not think that he had the authority to do so - I do not remember of speaking to them afterwards - The Negro boy John was at my house at this time - I have not seen him since, and could not say of my own knowledge that they ~~did~~ took him off - From the best information I have I believe these men took the boy John away with them - but I did not see them - I have not seen Mrs Carter since - These men said they wanted to buy Negroes to take to Kentucky, and that <sup>they</sup> could get a pass from the Pro. Marshal to do so - I understood them to say that Apt. Pro. Marshal Hines was the man who gave them passes -

You will first search their houses and premises to see if they have any articles belonging to the U. S. Govt. or that are Contraband of War which you will bring away in case any are found, also all or any of the following articles that may be found belonging to the aforesaid persons,

First

All Horses, Hogs, sheep, Cattle, and any other animals or articles of whatever description that may be valuable to the U. S. Govt., especially those that are valuable to the Quartermaster Commissary and Hospital Departments.

Second

All Stoves & stove pipes of whatever description and all Kitchen Utensils, presses, ware, beds, bedding, trunks, forks &c, also all chairs, sofas, sociables, Lounges, ~~tables~~ and everything of the character of household furniture

Third-

All window sash and glass, looking glasses -  
carpets &c.

Fourth.

Every article of Household Furniture which you  
do not bring with you, must be destroyed or burned  
with the house.

Fifth

All barns, stables, smoke houses, or any other out-  
houses, of any description whatsoever, or any  
building or article that could possibly be of use

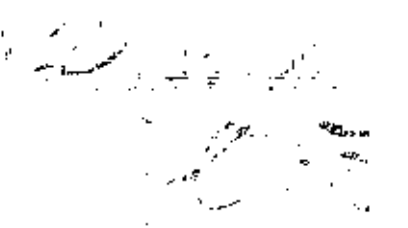

I am acquainted with Augustine Sturmi and David Goust. I am related to Sturmi but not to Goust. I live in their immediate neighborhood. Up to the time of Sturmi's attempt to avoid the draft he was perfectly civil and submissive to the authorities of the country, and Mr. Goust was equally so when sober but when intoxicated would talk too much. I have never known him to be guilty of any thing else. I have never known Sturmi to take up arms or in any way aid the rebellion. If admitted to bail I think they will respect their bond nor do I think the peace and quiet of the neighborhood would be interrupted by their return. Sturmi has frequently said to me that he did not wish to be drafted but was loyal to the Government. I have talked with several of the neighbors with regard to the return of the above named parties and none of them express any fears resulting therefrom. I voted against the Ordinance of Secession and all of my votes have since corresponded therewith and I am still loyal to the Government of the U.S. - have no sympathy with the rebellion nor with those engaged in it except so far as humanity and justice are concerned. I am the owner of real estate - man of family 30 years of age.

In obedience to instruction from the Pro. Mar. Genl's Office, I have investigated the cases of Charles Metzler and Benjamin P. Mitchell, two W. S. M. R. R. employees charged with stealing Sutler's Stores.

Both of the prisoners confess that on the 10<sup>th</sup> inst. a quantity of Sutler's Stores were lying unguarded, along the track at the lower end of the Rail Road "yard" of this Station; that Mitchell first saw the boxes, and after taking two of them to his "Caboose" informed Metzler when both of them went to where the goods were lying, and brought away three more; that after they were in their Caboose, they broke open the boxes and used the most of the contents; and, that they would have used the whole if they had not been discovered. You learn from their confession that five boxes were taken. The fact is, however, that seven were found in the Caboose which the prisoners slept in. This apparent discrepancy is

P.S. These men are confined in the Regt's Guard House. What shall be done with them? *Ans.*

explained by the prisoners saying that two other men, one a fireman on the Engine "Gov. Atty", and named Connelly, and the other a Switch tender in this R.R. "Yard" by the name of Jones, took the other two boxes.

I have examined these last named men together with quite a number of other R.R. men at this place, and the evidence all ~~seems to~~ show that Metzler and Mitchell are the only guilty ones in this case. They both have been discharged by M. J. M<sup>r</sup> Crickett, Act. Supt. N. S. M. R.R., and turned over by him to the Pro. Mar. Gen's Dept.

There is no evidence that I can find, going to show that any soldier broke open the Car and strewed these stores along the track. It is just as well to presume that these men committed the entire offense, as from what can learn, it is to suppose that part of it was done by Soldiers. I honestly conclude that these men know more than they are willing to tell.

He is exempt from military duty on account of being a school teacher (as his papers show). He is a native of Vermont but has resided and taught school in Virginia for the last fifteen years. His general reputation is good as several reliable men who know him state that he has always been considered a man of honor. He married a Southern lady and his interests are with the South, all of

property being located in Virginia but his sympathies seem to be with the North  
Mr Geo S Smith states that he has known Lord  
on for a long time and that he has always  
known a good character and been considered  
a man of honor and marked integrity

Mr Gordon states that he knows  
Mr G. Willis - that he is his brother in law  
that he was with him at the time of his  
arrest - was arrested with him - had been  
to Jack hole for the purpose of obtaining  
his Exemption papers. He is exempt from  
Conscription on acct of physical disability  
He is also a school teacher a par  
tner of Mr Gordon and a resident of  
Locustdale. There are no charges against  
him. Mr Willis has his Exemption papers

There are no charges against him! He is a man nearly fifty yrs of age and seems to be guilty of no offence.

The above mentioned men were all brought in by a scouting party of our cavalry. There are no reasons assigned for their arrest but the supposition is that they were considered to be liable to Conscriptio and were brought in on that account. The three

## Statement of Samuel Reese

In case of James Braid  
Saml. Reese, being duly sworn, testifies as follows:

I have known Mr. Braid over one year. The way I came to know him he was at a man's house by the name of Whurt. It was the Rendezvous of a party that was getting up to go to Tennessee. I think he went. I have seen him in town since about six or seven months afterwards. I know him to be a Union man.

He has taken the Oath of Allegiance once or twice.

## Statement of Chat Braid

Chat Braid being duly sworn, testifies as follows:

James Braid went to Tennessee about two months ago, to work in the Construction Corps. He had been to Tennessee once before that time. We heard he was coming home. Mr. Dairy wrote to my wife, the same letter you have now. He was in Washington, and in Tennessee but never in the Army. The latter part of 1863 he was working

at Siasboro Point. After that he went to Tennessee, 1864. remained two months and came home. He staid home until two months ago then went out this last time.

Janet Braid being duly sworn testifies as follows:

Gas Braid is a brother-in-law of mine. He has been living with me over nine months. My husband has a gang working for the Government. Mr. Baker is the Agent for the U. S. About two months ago he (Mr Braid) left for Tennessee. I heard from him through a friend, whose letter you have in your possession. I was expecting him home for two or three weeks. It was about three weeks ago when I first heard of his coming home, by letter which my husband has.

I am set down to write you under the most gloomy and desponding feelings owing to the conduct of some troops from Mexico said to be under the direction of the Genl at Mexico Mo. it is said that they left Mexico with about 40 men coming in the direction of Fulton when near the Callaway line it was estimated to some of the men that they were coming into Callaway they seized negroes & horses (so the report goes) some ten men rebelled and refused to engage in the business and went back to Mexico stating they thought they were going to fight Pushmataha and not playing the balance of the squad came on to Thomas Allen where the neighbors were met to help Allen saw a barn including some negroes belonging to some in the neighborhood the leader of the squad ~~talked~~ made use of the most abusive language to the men and ordered all the negroes to get horses and go to Mexico to wit

- 1 Negro man & horse from McLeve
- 2 " Men & 2 Horses from J. Masada
- 2 " Men " from Mr. Harrison
- 1 " " 2 Horses from H. Williams (fully loyal)
- 1 " Man Thomas Allen
- 1 " " " from Muddler & Horse
- 1 " " " Mr. Harrison and also took about 13 head horses. This was all done without any pretext or cause whatever. These men are all substantial farmers all staying at home attending to their own business and a majority of them doing all they can to stop this lawless horse stealing

and Marauding that is being practiced by these devilish  
bushwhackers. Mr. S. Williams has been twice robbed  
by the bushwhackers and once taken prisoner by them  
and now his last horses + Negro the only help is taken from  
if this is the way to make loyal. I have been badly  
mistaken in the course heretofore pursued. all these men  
are steady hardworking men staying closely at home  
trying to make <sup>money</sup> to pay their heavy three year taxes now  
long due -

These troops did their work in the most approved  
Roman style. Compelling the negroes to go against their  
wishes (that is several of them) and compelling them to take  
the neighbors horses saddles + bridles - arresting Jm  
Atkins + some others taking them to Mexico I suppose  
- They further say they are coming back to clean  
out this County. and if you dont do something to have  
this thing stopped the same scenes that have trans-  
pired in Jackson Pass + other Counties will  
be enacted here. There is no necessity for this  
plundering raid ~~in~~ this County and you both  
know how much the people are disposed to keep  
quiet here and the only pretext for this wholesale  
robbery is that these bushwhackers from Boone  
happened to catch Stauber in the road to  
Mexico - and you both know well that Stauber was  
warned not to go and that the Militia had had  
a skirmish with the thieving the day previous but  
Stauber you know made very light of it saying the  
Militia was frightened and no able, there and  
he was not a fraud &c. You both know that squad  
which came into our County on Monday morning  
travelling 40 miles to Putnam robbed the stores and  
got back to Col. July by 11 O'clock next day  
when the Militia had the skirmish with them



they then went west towards Boone County and took  
Stanton from the stage - travelling back & forth some  
80 Miles in two days in this County. Mr R Knows that  
McCracken reported them in his neighborhood and the  
Militia found them in Collins neighborhood by the  
time they lifted off their horses to rest so these  
Marauders from Mexico cannot have a plea  
that they were not reported on. for this neighborhood  
has invariably reported whenever these marauders  
pass through their section of Country.

and I cannot look upon this last transaction  
in any other light than to rob our peaceable  
Citizens and create a bad state of feeling  
in the Community - when I call on men to  
assist in putting down bushwhacking & horse thieving  
they often turn back in my teeth that they would if  
they were protected in their property that they live  
loyal take the oath give bonds and obey every  
order from the government and still they are  
plundered by federal troops who have sworn  
to protect all peaceable and loyal - Now I  
want you to see our Governor (for the people have the  
utmost confidence in his honesty and believe he wishes  
to do them justice) and try and get him to have the  
shoulder straps taken off of every officer engaged  
in that kind of lawless procedure and above all  
try and get that Bow Man from Mexico removed  
if you can accomplish this bushwhacking will  
not meet with any sympathy here in this County  
You must act quickly Callaway County does  
not need troops from other Counties to rob her  
most loyal & best citizens without even the slightest charge  
being brought against them

Stanton has been released and is now in  
Columbia —

Do you best to have those horses  
and mares returned and that will leave men  
to do in making men loyal than any thing  
else. — They generally of New Kent that Slavery  
is doomed and expect it to gradually disappear  
but they do not wish their property taken in this  
lawless manner and if the mares are taken  
they at least wish to retain their horses  
that they may raise something to feed their  
Children with.

You both know what is needed  
to bring peace and I have the utmost  
Confidence you will exert yourselves  
for this end.



Yesterday I sent a man to Brookfield to look up  
contraband property. There are two companies of  
Cavalry at that Post. Capt<sup>ns</sup> Lee & Humphreys, Capt Lee  
commanding the Post. Capt Lee being absent I could  
not get a correct inventory. Capt Humphreys gave  
me an account of 15 horses, 1 pair of oxen, one wagon  
& one pair of Mules, Harness & Wagon.

There are also at this Post (Brookfield) thirty four fine mules,  
As near as I can learn, by searching a few days or that  
Post, I can find not less than one hundred head of contraband  
mules & horses. You will please bear in mind that  
contraband and Government property has been handled in  
rather a loose manner in this section partly for the want of  
proper instructions, some of this property is scattered  
through the country, probably sold, traded &c. but it can be  
found. By my going along the line of R.R. from this place  
to Chilocome I can probably find ten or loads of Horses, Mules &c.  
which will otherwise, and great measure be lost to Government.  
Would it not be well to collect this stock to this Post.  
It requires one who is experienced, or he will not find  
one in ten.

Were part of a large lot of Powder turned over to Capt W. E. Prince (now Major) about the 19th of June 1861 and remained at the arsenal at Fort Leavenworth till recently by permission from the Sec of War it was restored to us to be shipped to Santa Fe N. M. The bulk was shipped to Santa Fe N. M. about the 8th of May 1862. The part of the lot we had in our Magazine <sup>was</sup> of an unsalable nature or so badly damaged as not to be in a transportable condition, and was intended to be shipped to Saint Louis Mo. but by procrastination on our part was delayed shipment until this seizure.

The balance of the powder was in store for other parties the most of which was purchased and shipped from Saint Louis Mo. and was all intended to

go to New Mexico, by the Trains that start from this Town.

We therefore protest against this seizure, and would respectfully ask for its release and permission to ship to F. B. Chamberlain & Co Agents of the Hazard Powder Co the part of the Powder that belongs to us.

Part of them were taken from parties in the bush and others running from our soldiers and leaving their horses. The animals are in fair condition, the mules worth about eighty (80) Dollars and the horses about fifty (50) Dollars each.

One of the horses was taken from John W. Bryant in Marshall, one from Frank Martin, and one from James Harvey, all having been used in aiding the Rebels in Armo, also two of the mules taken from a man by the name of Sidenstriker in Saline Co: Mo: they having been used to haul soldiers to the Rebel Army.
