There appeared this afternoon on the Marnethon Plantation, Parish St John, about five miles this side of the Pookery, a band of Guerrillas about two hundred, they made no demonstration further than to drive the negroes from their quarters, and endeavored to gain information of our forces, between that point and the Cut. The persons in command were Alphonse Becknell, a Mr Hazdell, son of Belfor Hazdell, and a son of Mr Marnar Brice.

For the safety of the loyal citizens of this side of the coast, (which are very few) it is absolutely necessary to station a company of Cavalry at or about Bonnet Carré Point. I will furnish every facility for their accommodation if a force is sent.

I send recently five prisoners, three deserters and two rebels taken in Illinois. J. B. Dwyer or Joseph Leaper. Perhaps it would be well to send the two last to the Patriot Marshal in Illinois. There are more rebels and of a very bad character in the same section. The man Hobson is yet there.

I also send papers in the case Mrs. Parkinson. She cannot prove her loyalty by any one to be believed, but she is crafty - and I do not think at present that any disloyal act can be proven

against her - You will see the two men whose
evidence I now take - is directly the reverse
of Mr Puckett's - if in consequence of the
woman being a rebel at heart, her property
should be held thus keep the home - but if
we must prove some act - then restore the
home -

There is a farm in my jurisdiction
belonging to a son of Mrs. Parkinsons now
in the rebel Army viz: Thomas Livingston. Please
inform me early what must be done with it -
The Evidence to prove Livingston in the rebel Army
is by two men who saw him there about
a year ago - down at Leesides. Mrs -

If I catch up an old rebel of some
influence about seventy years old - what
is it best to do with him? I have one
seed now - in arrest for recruiting for
Jeff Davis -

I thought I was going to have a
good stroke - when I sent to Illinois, but
the scout was poorly managed - there are
infamous rebels there certainly.

These men all live on the north west
 portion of Lewis County in what is known
 as Parson Creek Township and Jackson
 Township. These two townships of this County
 were about the only part of the County that
 the Bushwhackers remained in any length

of time. Some eight or ten of the many
Men who were recognized as among the
Brashbuckers live in this County and
also in the immediate neighbourhood where
they remained or long. I have necessary
my Evidence positive proof that they
the Brashbuckers were in the vicinity of
the Prisoners House from the 20th of
June until the 8th of July. as in the case
of Jesse Lewis and others. I made
this sort of Wholesale arrest that I might
be able to get more evidence. From the
Evidence I could not release but
two unconditionally. and they are regar-
ded as Rebels in the Community.

I had three Ladies arrested their
names as follows. ~~Miss~~ Jackson. Has
a son with Brashbuckers. left in May
from her house. and returned in the
night three times between the 24th of June

and the 8th of July. and told her he belonged
to Capt Koltzclaus Company. and that they
were recruiting for C.S.A. Her son-in-law
Frank Stewart. also with the same Company
Mr Lewis to see his wife in the night
two or four times. His wife is Mrs Eliza
Stewart

I have furnished Mr Eliza Jackson
also Mrs Eliza Stewart and Mrs Jane
Barkley. Sister of the Prisoner H.C.
Lynch.







I was arrested at my home in Lewis Co Mo on the 7th day of Sept 1862 by Col Readings Command and was taken to Sarras Mo. and then put in confinement by order of Col Reading and returned as a prisoner at Sarras until the 10th mile town then sent to Quincy with other prisoners & then remained in confinement some days. was then returned to Sarras, and kept in close confinement until about the 24th of Sept. I was then paroled by Mr Odor Prov. Mgr of Lewis Co to the limits of Sarras to report every day at his office - this continued for about one week. I was then allowed to go home for a few days each, until about Nov 13th 1862 when I was held at Sarras until finally released on Nov 13th 1862. The following are the circumstances attending my final release. About one week previous to release, Dr. Hay of Sarras sent for me, and wanted to know what we all old men would give to get clear. I told him I could not tell. He told me to get the boys

together and take a list of the names & what they would give, and return the list to him. This I did the same evening. The list consisted of 19 or 20 persons who were all prisoners at La Grange. He had previously agreed to release us for \$45 - and the men constituting the list agreed to pay that sum. The next morning I saw him and walked with him, and he handed me back the list and said it had got out that he was to procure the release & that it was too little money for so many and proposed to have me released for \$50 - I told him Mr Song was in connection with me and he must be released with me. He said he thought he could effect it. In the mean time my ^{Song} ~~brother~~ ^{Brother} ^{South Bigger} in law, had employed a Thomas Oden, a brother of the Pro Mar to instruct himself for ^{me} myself & Mr Song, and had agreed with him to effect the release of myself & Song for \$45 - About this time I again saw Dr. Hay. He told me that a sign would be given me & Song to follow the Pro Mar to his office, & which sign was to be a quick turn up of the face by the Pro Mar, or by a touch from the Pro Mar, at which I was to follow him to the office. The sign of turning up the face was given me about a week after this

by the Pros Mar, and I and Song followed
him to the office. He only allowed me to
go in with him. He remarked to me when
in the office that he had a way of doing
business and thinking. I then left. On Tuesday
of the next week (Nov 12) Thomas Odor
saw myself & Song & said he & his brother
Bill (the Pros Mar) would be at the office
that night, and for us to be on hand
that the Bonds were already written.
We accordingly met the two Odors, on
the Street and they entered a Saloon and
commenced a game of cards. Song joined
them in the game. There were several other
persons about who were watching us and
in consequence the game was postponed
and finally they broke up the game late at
night and Tom Odor said to me that
Song and myself must meet him &
Bill at the office early in the morning
that there were too many persons around
watching to do the business that night
Accordingly we met at the office the
next morning, & found Thomas & Bill
there. Song & myself each gave Bond and
took the oath of allegiance and were
released. We immediately left the Room
and in company with Thomas Odor

went to a private room where I handed over
to you other the sum of \$75.

After paying the money you other, Long
& myself went to take a drink, when Thomas
other remarked to me, that if I had any
friends there who wished to be released
to send them to him as he thought he
could fix it up with Pele. I have them
released. After this other prisoners applied
to me to know how I was released. I
told them to go to Tom O'ear, the Prisoner
Steward who to apply to was Joseph & Brown
then Jackson & John C. McPherson, these
men were afterwards released as I am informed
on payment of money. Afterwards I told
Stephen Prinsor & James T. Paul how to get
the release. About a month after my release
C. J. Sackland had told that he had paid
money to get out, ^{later} Willis C. Brown also came
to me to see me on the subject, and asked
to know the cost that I and other had paid
to get released. I said Brown said, if he
had known as much, he and his men would
not have gone round arresting ^{old} men for
those Sabrang men to be making money
of. I then told Brown what I had paid
to show much. In a few days after this
Dr. Hay sent for me to come by C. J.
Sackland to come to L. Appender's room

him. Sackland and I went in to town
together, and saw Dr Hay on the Street. He
said he wanted to see me. I told him I
was ready at any time. He invited me
to his office and said he would be there in
a few minutes. Hay joined us at his
office, and asked me how it was that I
& Sackland had told about paying him
money to get out. I told him that Sackland
had told it. Willis G. Brown had come
to see me on the subject, & asked me
how much I could pay him to. Hay asked
me why it was I had told it. I answered
Dr Hay that I would always swear the
truth whenever called on as to the transac-
-tion of any business. Hay then replied
that if he had known that Sackland would
have told it he would not have done business
for any such man. I then left and went
home that evening. Dr Hay again sent for
me by Sackland to come to town the next
day. This I did as there was a misapprehen-
-sion in our conversation. I accordingly sat
down and wrote the Dr. a note specifying the
conversation but did not go in Person.

I am 55 years old, & am a farmer
by occupation. I was arrested about Aug
1st 1862 in Lewis Co Mo, and was held
under arrest by ^{Pro Marshal} Wm Odor of Lewis Co Mo
until about the last of Nov 1862.

About that date I applied to Thomas Odor
a Brother of the Pro Marshal to see how much he
would take to get us released. He offered to get
myself & two others released for \$100 - this I
thought was too much, and having heard
that Dr Jas H. Hay was doing such busi-
ness at the cheapest rates, I applied to him.
He offered to do the job for \$20 - I paid
him this amount and was immediately
released on taking the oath of Allegiance.
I was never tried nor was there ever any
charges filed against me to my knowledge.
I never heard of any reason to cause being
attended for my arrest, until soon on my
release. I frequently applied for a trial but
could never get my case attended to until
I gave the money to Dr Hay, I was charged by Hay
to keep the matter of paying the money a secret.

I am 63 years old and a farmer by occupation. I was arrested in Nov 1862 and held a prisoner at Searcy Mo until, ^{about} Feb 1863. A short time before my release, Thomas Oden asked me how much I would give to be released. I told him I had not much to give. A few days afterwards he (Thomas Oden) asked me to loan him \$5.00 this I did expecting it would be considered as a payment towards my release as there was general talk, that money was being used to secure men released from arrest. The money has never been returned to me.

I learned from C. J. Hackland also a Prisoner that Dr J. A. Hay, had requested him to tell any of his friends who were prisoners and wished to be released to call on him for assistance. I accordingly called on him as did also my father John Jones, and he agreed to assist us in obtaining our release if we would pay him the sum of \$200 each. This we agreed to do and the money was handed over to him (Dr Hay) the next day we were taken before Prov Mar W. Alder who examined us and released us on our \$100 bond

To Genl Brown, Sir: We the undersigned
Conservative but unconditional union men of Galine
County, beg leave to make the following statement to
you in reference to the conditions of our County.
We premise that we have been driven away
from our homes and our business, having been
robbed and our lives hunted by the enemies of
the government for no other reason than that
we are loyal to the same. By reference to the
maps you will see that the greater portion of
our County lies in the bend of the River be-
tween Arrow Rock and Lexington, at which
two points there are military Posts. We have
then a Coast of some 70 odd miles unpro-
tected by government troops, and now filled
with armed guerrillas, who are killing, robbing
and driving out all the union men in
this extensive bend of the river including
the richest and we may say the best portion
of the County. The troops at Marshall
and Arrow Rock are inadequate to the
suppression of Bushwhacking and the
protection of the union citizens. The whole
County is filled with secessionists and as
soon as the troops from Marshall or
Arrow Rock start out to quell a distur-
bance in a neighborhood, these armed

guerillas are informed of the movements of the troops by their sympathizers, thus giving them time to hide in the brush and as soon as the troops leave they are at their devilment again. Between Lexington & Arrow Rock there is a scope of country on the River of not less than 75 or 80 miles and the river meanders entirely exposed to the inroads of Bushwhackers from Saline Johnson Lafayette and Jackson. This state of things could be remedied by placing troops at Miami and Cambridge Station. At these places acting in concert with those at Marshall and Arrow Rock would in a short time drive these armed bands from the brush and enable the union men of the county to finish their crops, which are bound to go to waste unless this state of things is altered. Portions of Quantrill's bands, reinforced by desperate men in Saline are scattered all about on the river and they have so intimidated the people by threats and recent murders that none dare to go forward and even for fear they may be killed before they get home. Can you not send us some troops from the more quiet parts

of your district to help us in this time of extreme peril. The people here are abundantly able to support any amount of soldiers that you can spare for an indefinite period. If this is not done soon, I fear every union man at any distance from the two posts in the County will be utterly destroyed.

On Tuesday night the 28th ult. about 75 or 80 of Quantrill's men made a dash into the Town of Cambridge & with terrible threats ran all the union men out of the place and then proceeded to rob the store of M. J. Powell & Co of 2500\$ in money and about 3000\$ in goods. They also robbed the union men of their horses and the union ladies of their jewelry. About 2 o'clock on the same day they robbed all the stores in Frankfurt and greatly maltreated the inhabitants consisting almost entirely of Germans. In a word General there is a perfect reign of terror in the County. Can nothing be done for us, or shall we have permanently to leave our homes?

I enclose list of Prisoners and Reports. Among the Prisoners are two Soldiers of the 47th Virginia. I will hardly be able to make any more arrests, without sending out scouting parties, nor keep up our supply of forage.

Statement of Mrs Agatha Pinkham.

I was living with my family in the Stone house belonging to Mr Keogh, having been put there by Mr Salana to reside in and take care of it; had been there about two months, when Capt Rollins and a Lieutenant whose name I did not know came to my house and asked for the Key of the wooden house adjoining on the corner, belonging also to Mr Keogh & which was closed up. I informed him that I had & not nor did I know who had. I had understood that the Furniture belonged to Mr Keogh was in that house. Capt Rollins then took a hatchet and broke open the door, and on that day and several times afterwards took out Furniture and sent it away in the U.S Wagon where to I don't know, except I saw that he sent crockery, Cups and Saucers, Knives, Forks, tumblers &c over to Mr Salana's house opposite, where Captain Rollins and other Officers were then taking their meals.

I have seen Furniture taken out of that house by Capt Rollins and another Officer whose name I did not know. I think it was about a month or six weeks after Capt Rollins came to St Augustine.

On August 8th last, I received an
order signed by you, directing me "to examine
the case of Mrs Hunt and take such action
as may be necessary."

From the documents submitted
by Mrs Hunt (numbered 1, 2, 3 and 4 accompany-
ing, and to which I respectfully refer) and
the verbal statements of Officers and Citizens,
who stated that they knew Libbey to be an

employee, of Hunt, receiving a salary of Fifty Dollars per month, and Twenty per cent. of the profits, I believed Hunt to be the rightful owner of the restaurant and therefore gave him possession through his Agent, Mr J. P. Tower, of all property within the building.

The Letter No 5, was received by me, and I notified the Adams Express Agent, not to permit the Wine to be removed, until the question of ownership had been decided.

I presume this is the \$2000. worth of Goods referred to by Libbey. The Wine still remains in the Express Office.

The store attached to or in front of the restaurant was closed sometime last winter by order of Colonel Afford, commanding Fort Monroe. for the reason that some Contraband articles had been sold there, and not by Genl Dix, as asserted by Libbey. It was opened by J. P.

Power, under a permit granted by you on August
11, 1868. I know nothing relative to where the
lumber used in the erection of the building,
was procured; The receipt of Mr Hopkins who
erected it may afford some information on
that subject. Mr Libbey has acknowledged to
me several times that he was merely an employee
of Hunt, but that he was not satisfied with the
share of Profits allowed him by Hunt.

but correct statement of this case.

from the Steamers "Anglo American" and
"L A Sykes" at the mouth of Bayou Plaque-
mine, that on the 25th day of August 1863
having finished working, and being about
to return with his boat to New Orleans,
Mr Austin a loyal citizen, having some
Sugar & other produce near the town of
Plaquemine, desired him to freight the
same to New Orleans, alleging that the
troops at Plaquemine were under orders

be destroyed by the Rebels as soon as

In the case of L. J. Shaffer I respectfully
report, that they apply for the permission of the Commanding
General to land and vend in the Department a large quantity
of spermaceti tapers being part of a cargo shipped from New-
York to New Orleans but not landed but not landed because
probably of the low prices of merchandise at that port at the time
of the arrival of the vessel.

It is fair to assume that the whole
cargo was intended for sale to the enemies of the United States. The
character of the cargo and the well ascertained fact that
90 per cent of all shipments to New Orleans are transported
to Texas within 48 hours after landing lead to the conclusion

destroyed they manufactured for the Rebels
large quantities of Gun Boat iron and other
materials for the Rebels. Their blacks were
employed in constructing the rebel forts at this
place, in August 1862 they furnished Maadd and
a Co. of the so called Confederate Army a large
quantity of provisions.



Incidents,

Tuesday morning, between nine and ten O'clock, twelve Negro Men, armed with knives and muskets came from Island No 10 - to the house of Mr A. J. Beckham. He was standing in the porch of his house, the negroes rushed upon him and held him fast - just at this time a piece of Mr B's rode by, the negroes halted her. Mr B told her to go on when two or three men started after her and shot at her several times but did not hit her; they followed her about two miles but she made her escape in the woods - A gentleman hearing the negroes were going to Mr Beckhams started to his assistance, when he got near the house he saw the negroes, some on top of the bank, and some under the bank - He saw the children in the river, they called to him, and he rode up

nearly to the place, when the negroes on the bank
shouted, shoot him, shoot him! he turned his horse
and made his escape. He saw the negroes strike
the children over the head with their guns as they
were above the water - Mr Beckham gave the negroes
all his money and begged them to spare his father's
life and the lives of his children but they showed
no mercy - After the murder they robbed the
house of every thing valuable, breaking every lock,
taking all Mr B's papers notes and pocket books,
with clothing and even Cupboard ware -

About 3 O'clock Tuesday the body of Major
Beckham was recovered - He was severely cut in
the left breast and across the left ear, and his arms
were tied behind him. Wednesday morning, the body
of Richard was found, the head face and arms were
much bruised - At about 3 O'clock the same day the
body of A. F. Beckham was recovered - He had been
shot, the ball tearing away the lower right jaw and
right eye - his throat was cut and a heavy cut was
on the shoulder, severing the joint and cutting the
cap of the joint almost off - his arms were tied
behind him - The body of Kate was found Thursday
morning - she had a severe bruise on the left side,
on the upper part of her back, neck and face, she was also
much bruised, the eyes were started from their sockets
the tongue swollen out of the mouth - About 10 O'clock

the body of Louisa was found - her skull was fractured, the forehead badly cut, and the face neck and arms and body badly bruised - the left eye burst nearly out and the right eye sunk in.

About 12 O'clock the same day the body of Rouma Caroline was recovered - she was shot under the left ear - both eyes were burst out and the hands were raised above the head as in an attitude of great fear or agony - Her statement is made by one who saw all the bodies after they were recovered



Since the removal of Col Foster with his command from this post there has been considerable consultation among the Union men hereabouts as to the best means to protect ourselves, and from guerrilla raids & their attendant consequences.

If there are no troops stationed at this point we are satisfied that these marauders will soon again commence their depredations in this part of the state. There are now no troops between this and the Tennessee line. Nothing but the vigilance & energy of the Commandant between Green & the Cumberland River (Col Foster) has hitherto prevented, like scenes as those committed in our community during the last season, from again transpiring among us. Simultaneously with the removal of the troops from this portion of the state, several of the most noted guerrillas, (who infested the country last year,) made their appearance in adjacent counties to this, with

The intention we presume of reorganizing
their bands & removing their depositions
In addition to the danger ~~of~~ to the community
& the unobstructed navigation of the River
we much fear that the contraband trade
will be revived & practiced as it was
previous to the location of troops among
us. We therefore respectfully solicit
you to reinforce Capt Hargrave so as to
enable him to render more efficient ser-
vice in the way of scouting & that he
will be able to do with the one company
now under his command. We do not know
whether the removal of Col Foster from this
post is intended to be permanent, if it is we
would respectfully petition you to make

Make statements that Dr. Samuel
Mud, Henry Burch and Henry Mud, residents of
Brentown Md. are now and have been
for a month past enrolling the colored slaves of that
District and County for the Rebel Army, and that
they have to their certain knowledge harbored, aided
and comforted Rebel officers and soldiers ever since
the rebellion commenced. They further state that
these parties have carried away colored persons, both
free and slave into the Rebel lines and that they
are now engaged in this work - that these parties
caught a slave named George Hawkins while
trying to make his escape to the city of Washington
brought him back to Brentown, held him in a
most unmerciful manner and then carried him
into the Rebel lines. This slave was from the
farm of James Mud who is, and has been a
long time in the Rebel army.
Simms and Washington state that they were to be

carried into the Rebel army. Simms belongs to Henry Hud
and Washington to Samuel Hud, and states that
there is a quantity of arms and accoutrements buried in the
ground in the vicinity of Samuel Hud's house and that
as some cavalry were making a search in the vicinity,
Samuel Hud's wife ran into the kitchen and threw
a bundle of Rebel mail into the fire and Henry Hud
said after the cavalry had gone, that he had hid a
lot of arms under the bed and that as they were not
found, he considered himself a smart man.

Richard Washington states that Dr Samuel Hud,
his master, is one of the parties who assisted in en-
rolling the names of the slaves amongst whom, was
himself and, Deey Eagley, for the purpose of sending
them south to go in the Rebel army as soldiers.

Hud lives in St Charles Co. Mo. - Brentwood
District - 17 miles above the town - has been in the
habit of harboring Rebel soldiers.

These parties receive the slaves in Haggins to Mill
Landing in St. Mary's county, keep them in the
cave until an opportunity presents itself to carry
them off. Henry Buck watches and reports when
the way is clear.

Mr Samuel Mud took from the house of Henry L Mud, some arms, that were made a present to Samuel Cop, in the Rebel Army, by the Ladies in the neighborhood, Miss Mary Clare Mud, was one of the Ladies, These arms was taken on the 6th of March 1863 by Mr Baker, Mr Wm Simms, & George Jarver, These arms consisted of Swords, J Smith took them to Centerville, in a Buggy

I have the honor to report that on investigating, the case, in regards to certain parties, in the State of Maryland, charged by the Contrabands, with enrolling the slaves, for the Rebel Army, and various other charges. The colored people both free and slave also white people of undoubted loyalty, in St Charles and Talbot Counties Md, state the charge is without foundation. There is (I learn) a patrol composed of citizens, who patrol the country around, for the purpose of apprehending fugitive slaves, which, when caught, are placed in jail, until such times as their owners shall call for them, and then being considered unsafe to roam at large, are taken and sent south, to make their escape more uncertain. This, I find, are the grounds upon which the charges are founded.

Refus Mc Kinney, living near Mc Pleasant Ferry, is now, and has been recruiting for the Confederate Army.

I understand the Military Authorities of Baltimore, have been trying to accomplish his arrest, for some time but he has eluded their vigilance, I was informed, Mr Kinney was now at his place, and that his arrest might be easily accomplished. Some information might be obtained of the Military Authorities at Baltimore, I think, if desired.

Birdy Mason and Benjamin Green in the vicinity of Marlby's Landing St Charles Co Md, have been seen to carry Groceries, Clothing and men over the river to Virginia, for the Confederate Army, they secret their boat in the marsh, Mr Marlby is a Loyal man, and could give some information, in the matter, J. J. Jarboe of Long Old Fields, Prince George Co Md, has been confined in the Old Capitol Prison, twice, but is still to all accounts, a Rebel, on the 6th of July 1863, Jarboe urged two young men of the same place, to make an attack on a party of Col. Baker's Detectives who were passing through the village, saying he would assist them, that he was prepared &c. These young men, two brothers, named Felix B. and Budd

Suit, are the young men alluded to, they will give statements, to the case, if so required. Jarboe has a son in the Confederate Army, who has been there, since the commencement of the Rebellion. He came home some time since, and went back again. From information received, I am of the opinion, that the majority of the people, in the ^{lower part of the} state of Maryland, especially, St Charles County, are disloyal, and that the loyal people, are deterred from giving information, through fear. It is my impression, it would be a good remedy to station a negro Regiment in their midst.

J. S. Boothby.

Sailed in Nassau, New Providence, prior to that in Savannah - Sailed in Savannah 2 years leaving there about 9 months ago. - On the 9th of March he was arrested by the Steamer Gemville about 20 miles from Port Royal. He landed in a Schooner, which came from Nassau and was bound to Beaufort, N. C. - His intention was to run into Beaufort which he understood was in possession of our forces - The Schooner was loaded with coffee.

Dr Charles Henry was a passenger - The crew being foreigners were set free in N. York - He is 37 years old & was Capt of the Sch. named "Lightning" and was taken on his birth day. He intended, he says to go to Beaufort, and his papers show that he cleared ~~for~~ there - He returned intended to get a return cargo there for Nassau.

But my impression is he intended to run the blockade

somewhere. - Charles Henry he says, did intend to run the
Blackbird and go to Savannah after getting to Beaufort.

While in Savannah he had no particular business -
Was interested in a tanning house.

He says he is suffering severely from kidney
disease, which is greatly augmented by his imprisonment.

He does not quite know, whether he wants to take the
Oath or not - He has been in prison 5 months & is wasting
away - His money is all gone, and he has to take prison
fare - His personal clothing was all taken from him - his trunk
& everything.

He says he is willing to take the Oath if he can't
get out by Exchange or any other way - He is an honorable
man, he says and if he takes the Oath, will keep it
honorably.

He says he must go out, and go out immediately
or he will die.

We believe were other troops sent here in the place of the 5th Cav. U.S.M. - their labours would not be so effectual. That by an increase and proper disposition of the 5th Cav. U.S.M. in this region - quietness and safety would again prevail in this section of our State.

The room of Capt. A. Miller, 38th Iowa Inf. on duty in this office, was entered by burglars, Saturday evening last, and he was robbed of what money he had in his possession. Mr. M. Jones, no 52, North 5th Street, was robbed at his room, Saturday night, of a small amount.

Various complaints from parties whose names are unknown to me, that soldiers in different parts of the City, enter houses, insult the women and children, and in some instances threaten the lives of the inmates. The manner in which this drainage is conducted into the stone-quarries is as follows: about twenty-five feet from the fence which encloses the Fair-Ground and on the North-East side of the same, three sewers empty into a small wet-

water ~~from~~ ravine, following the ravine about fifty yards, a drain empties into the same from the Government stables. Said offer was declined, for the reason that he had seen the same four men but a short time since running goods across the river, and into Richmond. He feels confident that the object of their present visit is to do the same thing again. The day following the receipt of this information, four men reached this vessel claiming to be Refugees. They answer the description given me, in every particular and during the time they were onboard this vessel, one of the party accidentally let out that this was the same party who had made the above offer to be ferried across the Potomac. Their baggage is extremely limited, and an examination of which only revealed a memorandum Book containing a Note of Hand, payable in Baltimore. The Book and note you will find accompanying this. I recommend a close watch kept upon them. The owner of the Boat is very much concerned about it, and has repeatedly desired me to assist the United States

To the Provost Marshal,
at Kansas City, Mo.,
Sir;

I received some time ago a list of parties whose property in Kansas City was stated to be subject to confiscation, viz:—
John W. Bousman, W. J. Chew, Joseph Hodgson, G. M. A. Maughis, W. W. Harris, Thomas B. Sykes, John E. Threlkeld, Robert Wilson, Richard Wilson, and Bernard McGee. There were other names in the list, but Capt. J. S. Case indicated the above, as persons of whom it can be proved that they were in arms in the rebel army within the period specified in the act of Congress of the 17th July 1862, termed the Confiscation Law. The sixth section of the act provides "that if any person within any state or territory of the United States, after the passage of the act, being engaged in armed rebellion against the Government of the United States, or aiding or abetting such rebellion shall not, within sixty days after public warning and proclamation duly given and made by the President of the United States, cease to aid, countenance and abet

such rebellion,
abet, and return to his allegiance to the
States United States, all the estate and property,
money, stocks, and credits of such persons shall
be liable to seizure and confiscation - and
all sales, transfers, and conveyances of any
such property, after the expiration of the said
sixty days, from the date of such warning and
proclamation shall be null and void, and it
shall be a sufficient bar to any suit brought
by such person for the possession of such prop-
erty, or any of it, to allege and prove that he
is one of the persons described in this act -

The sixty days expired on the 26th day of Septem-
ber 1862, as it was issued in pursuance of the said
sixth section on the 25th day of July 1862.

You perceive therefore that if any of the persons
above named were engaged in rebellion against
the Government of the United States, or aided, or abetted such
rebellion, and did not after the 26th day of September 1862,
cease so to do, and return to his allegiance to the
United States, their property is subject to con-
fiscation. I respectfully ask if witnesses can be
procured in these cases to prove the facts in Court
and if so, that you will send me their names.

Dear Sir:

Permit me in behalf of the Union Cause in this county to write to you for information in regard to certain Rebel Sympathizers, returning home after having served their term of service in the Confederate Army - this county has sent a great many to the Rebel Army, some have returned, giving them oaths up to the Military Authorities, have taken the oath of allegiance and given bonds for their future good behavior, & have been permitted to remain, others refusing to take the oath have been sent out of the line, it is in regard to this latter class that I desire to say some thing about, an attempt is now being made by several persons who have been banished the state of Kentucky, to return to their ^{homes} in this county, upon their taking the oath & executing bonds, to this point I would most respectfully call your attention, and if possible I trust you will not permit them to do ~~so~~ ^{so}. Persons who have served the Confederate Army, and have done every thing in their power to break down the Federal government, have no right to come back here in our midst to claim the rights & privileges of us who are now & have always been true & loyal citizens. They remained in the Confederate Army until it has been

almost crushed by the strong arm of the Federal government,
until they ^{had} lost every thing & have found out that their pretended
Confederacy is a failure. Now come home and ~~ask~~ be let
alone, simply upon their taking the oath of allegiance and
giving bonds for their future good behavior & loyalty -

I refer particularly to Mr Wm R Hoffman & his wife who
have both been in Cincinnati for some time past. Hoffman
joined the Rebel Army some time ago. He has been in several
battles. Sketch Fort Donelson &c having served his term out (12
months) he came home reported to Col S R Mott 118 or 19 the
Commandant of the post, wanted to take the oath & give
bonds. he was not permitted to do so - but he and his
wife (who by the way has been actually engaged as a Rebel
news carrier) were sent out of the line of Kentucky - with
instructions not to return again. They reported to me the other
day. having permission from you to remain until the
18th inst. to prepare bonds. Mrs Minerva Rice is -
another party who is equally obnoxious to the loyal
Citizens of this place. And if it can be managed in
any way, I would most respectfully ask that they may
not be permitted to execute bonds. for by so doing
they will be thrown on our midst again, to corrupt

In reply to inquiries made through you by Major Genl. Hubbut (received by me on the 25th instant) I have the honor to report that the number of cases entered on our Docket up to this time is four hundred and ninety nine (499). Of these three hundred and seven have been disposed of in the following manner, to wit:

In judgments by default upon Promissory Notes and Bills of Exchange no other evidence than the note, &c. was required, but in cases on accounts, claims, &c. a writ of Inquiry was always ordered and evidence required as to the amount actually due. Among the causes dismissed are those in which the plaintiffs took non-suit. It will be perceived that the number of cases settled is large, the Commission being always anxious to afford parties every facility in avoiding or terminating litigation. Of the five causes dismissed for want of jurisdiction four were suits for divorce, and one was an appeal from a Justice of the Peace in a case when the Magistrate clearly had no jurisdiction. The Commission has in addition to these five refused to receive or in any way to entertain at least fifty cases offered and presented, but which we have deemed to involve the title to real estate, or to be cases which should be presented to the Provost Marshal or to the Military Authorities, or otherwise to be beyond our jurisdiction. The Recorder has always been instructed not to file or receive

any cases but such as we were authorized to hear and determine, and he has usually been successful in doing so, referring the matter to the Commission where he had doubts. Sometimes, however, it was impossible to know that the case was an improper one, until after hearing. Thus, Case No. 50, Boro vs. Merrill, brought as an action of unlawful detainer, but upon hearing the evidence and full argument in the case it was adjudged to involve the title to Real Estate and was therefore dismissed. Case No. 187, David Jameson vs. Annie Graham, as an action of forcible entry and detainer. The defendant was regularly served with process but failed to appear and on the 10th of June judgment by Default was rendered against her. Inquiry was held and due proof being given, a writ of possession was ordered to be issued in the usual way. On the 16th of June you sent us your approval of said judgment, and on the 24th the writ and execution were issued. On the next day the Marshal reported to us that the defendant claimed to be in possession under Capt. Eddy. I directed him to suspend all action until I could see Capt. Eddy. On the 26th you addressed inquiries to Capt. Eddy and upon receiving his reply, upon the

27th. You sent us orders to suspend all proceedings, which was accordingly done, and made immediately in the Court Docket the following entry: "June 27th - By order of Gen. Hatch this day, execution and all proceedings in this case suspended until further orders, it appearing that defendant is in possession under Capt. Eddy by Military Authority." In this case Mrs. Ibrahim ought to have made her defense before the Commission by showing how she held. Had she done so no judgment would ever have been rendered against her. We of course could not fore-
see the facts and we suspended all action in the case as soon as she even intimated to our Marshal that she was a tenant under Capt. Eddy, and by Military Authority.

We have proceeded as nearly as circumstances permitted according to the Code and have been dismissed. The Code has a-

abolished the old forms of pleadings, and the proceedings before us have been upon Petition (Bills, in Chancery Cases) and Answer sworn to. Many of the Cases classed above as "Actions for Debt", would be assumpsit under the old practice. Under the head of unlawful detainer are included cases of Forcible Entry and Detainer as the Code treats them all alike.

The six Deeds of Manumission recorded were simply Deeds of Emancipation of six Slaves formerly the property of Benjamin Wright, of Philadelphia. At his death he by his will ordered them to be made free, in accordance with the Laws of Tennessee, and his executor, Joseph Wright, in carrying out the provisions of said Will, finding no County Court in existence wherein he could have said Deeds recorded as required by law, applied for permission to have them recorded in our Commission as the nearest approach he could make to the forms of the law; We granted him his application as a proceeding in memoria regis, but not assuming any jurisdiction. Subsequently in one other Case parties applied to have a Deed recorded, but the Commission has not yet acted upon the application at all, in

tending when it comes up to refer it to you for instructions. You will perceive that they do not ask us to determine anything, but simply in these troubled times to preserve for them the record of a fact done.

Divorce Cases have uniformly been dismissed by us, in accordance with your instructions, as fast as they came before us.

We have, however, entertained two cases by wives for maintenance of themselves and children, supposing such to be cases especially requiring investigation and relief.

One of these cases though strongly contested, was simply an application for the enforcement of a decree claimed to have been rendered in the Chancery Court by Judge Dixon, a short time before the taking possession of Memphis by the United States forces.

The Habeas Corpus cases perhaps required our action more pressingly than any others. Women, youths, and all classes of persons, from the vilest Criminals to those who probably had no acquaintance with crime were thrown together in the city jail; committed sometimes by magistrate without any investigation or being heard in their own defence, with the prospect of remaining there a long and unknown pe-

find them being no Criminal or other Court in existence to try them. In a couple of those Cases where the offence charged was trivial the parties were discharged upon such bail as the laws required. In the other Cases upon a thorough and patient investigation it was found that there was no just reason whatever for committing the parties to prison. The Seduction Case was clearly proven and was for the infamous ruin of an orphan girl only fourteen years of age.

There have been two slander Cases. In One the Judgment was Pro Confesso, the defendant admitting his wrong doing and making terms with the plaintiff. In the other there has been no trial; the lawyer for defendant, B. M. Sharp, demurred to the petition as not sufficiently formal for a declaration, but made no question at all as to our jurisdiction, and that question therefore has not yet come up.

The Commission has not in any Case of administration made any order for the distribution of any part of the Estate or personal property of any deceased person, and heavy bonds have been required in all cases from administrators and guardians. In the Case of Stone's Estate, his will ex-

3

profely absolved his executors from giving any bond or securities, but upon his wife and son coming forward with their claims and praying for the appointment of Receivers, the latter parties were required to give Bond with ample securities in the sum of Two Hundred Thousand Dollars. The Commission did not undertake or assume, in any way whatever to give the Receivers any jurisdiction over the Real Estate left by deceased or over any of the premises in the possession of the Military Authorities, but in relation to such matters, ^{they} were referred to the proper authorities and to them they applied. Had the Commission known, however, of the peculiar circumstances connected with said estate I should have applied to the proper authority for instructions before taking any action at all.

In regard to the regular fees and costs charged by this Commission, Rule No. 4. prescribes that, "Costs shall be charged in this Commission until otherwise ordered, at rates double those prescribed in similar cases, as near as may be, in the Code of Tennessee; but such additional charge may be made in cash cases as shall be deemed ne-

cessary." (See Printed Rules.)

The fees in this state were fixed at a time of great depression in prices and were exceedingly low. In practice they were usually as great as we charge. The "Additional Charge" mentioned in Rule, No. 11. we call the "assessment" and in ordinary cases it has been usually ten or fifteen dollars, but in those of great importance, where large amounts were involved, or long and tedious trials took place, larger sums have been charged, and in the famous case of *Kefferman and Cummins vs. Porter*, which occupied over a week of the time of the Commission, the assessment was one hundred dollars (\$100). In a case also where judgment was rendered for \$13,750.28 the assessment was \$125.00, and in one or two others the assessment has been as high as One hundred dollars, but in a great many cases no assessment at all has been made, and in every case where a party has asked for a reduction of costs his application has been patiently considered and granted. Any person who makes affidavit of inability to pay costs is allowed to bring suit

in former paupers, and twenty or thirty have done so. Justice in this Commission is as free and as prompt to the poor as to the rich. Law-suits which formerly used to occupy many years are now concluded in as many months, or less, and old lawyers have assured me that the expenses are less than they were in other days, while the remedy is far more prompt and efficient. There has been an application for a new trial in but few cases, and in a majority of these few it has been granted. Every defeated party has full power and opportunity to appeal from our decisions with very little cost or trouble, but out of all the cases decided by us only three or four have been appealed.

The mode in which execution of judgment is enforced is, (after you have approved the judgment and ordered execution to issue) by the usual levy upon personal property, and sale within thirty days after the execution is issued. By a special order to our Marshal, all parties who choose to give a Delivery Bond are allowed to obtain possession of their property for thirty days undisturbed. If in any case they are really entitled, from

any cause to a longer indulgence they can obtain it by a proper showing, upon application either to the Commission, or to yourself or to Maj. Gen. Haibut. It has been granted in a number of instances, and in one case by yourself within a week. Where perishable property has been taken it sometimes becomes necessary to order a sale at an early period, and in one instance where a small boat, (The Propeller Enterprise) the property of an absconding debtor had been attached for various debts, some of which had matured, while others would not mature for two or three months, and the attorney in the case, B. W. Sharp, brought in very strong affidavits showing that said boat was daily lessening in value and would continue to do so, while the expense of providing watchmen for said boat, &c. was very burdensome, the Commission ordered the boat to be sold, and the proceeds to be paid into Court to be held subject to the final adjudication of the case.

"The amount of fees received by each member and officer of the Court" for four months services rendered up to Aug. 25th

1863, is fully shown by the Report of the Recorder herewith submitted marked "Exhibit A", which is respectfully referred to as a part of this report.

The members of the Commission have worked constantly in the performance of their duties as a court eight to ten hours daily and sometimes more. An immense amount of business has been accomplished, but there still remain 192 cases to be disposed of and new ones are being presented continually. Many of these are important.

It gives me great pleasure to bear testimony to the efficiency and ability of each member of the Commission associated with me, and to the faithful discharge of his duties by every clerk and officer. Our relations with all the attorneys practicing before us, with one or two unworthy exceptions, have always been perfectly harmonious, and they have cordially cooperated with us in all our ~~trans~~actions and duties. Regretting that this report is so lengthy.

It is our wish to commence business again at this locality but we feel that it would be unwise and improper for us to expend our time and money in endeavoring to rebuild what was one of the most flourishing towns of Kansas, while such a feeling of insecurity exists among the people in consequence of the late successful raid of a barbarous and fiendish foe.

We feel that what has been done may be done again. If we can be assured of permanent protection until such a time as the danger shall have passed, the confidence of our people will return and their

Dear sir I received your note yesterday in reference to Mr. Anthony Dr Aspley, and Mr Moore. In reply I say most unequivocally that I have no doubt of their being fully acquainted with all the movements of Harper and all the balance of the Guerrillas in that section of country. I had one of Harpers men acting as guide for me two days and nights while I was scouting in Summers and Mason counties and everybody believed us to be rebels. This man informed me who Harpers spies and confidants were in different sections and the above named persons are his partners at present I talked with his agents in other parts of the country and they all agreed that they were all right and told me to place implicit confidence in them although they had taken the oath. They furnished Harper with a full list of the Allen county Home guards and are always ready to assist in having them rode ~~and~~ run out of the country.

We deem it our duty to lay before you a plain statement of facts gathered from personal observation and from the most reliable sources at our command relative to the feelings and actions of the sympathizers in our community, For the past ten days and since the depredations in Poline County by the Bushwhackers, we observe a marked change they have become daily more bold and defiant in their abuse of everything pertaining to the Federal Government indicating plainly that an uprising of some kind is contemplated by them and that very soon. The fear of threats being made by Jackson & Co against our Town to the effect that the Banks will be robbed and the various Factories burned. With our present force only one Company and that poorly drilled, it would be an easy matter for them to carry out their threats, as they are well posted in regard to our strength & position, aside from the inefficiency of our force we lack a head since Col. Quincy left. We fully agree with you that Col Quincy is the man for the times and for the place we all feel secure under him when here. Do you not think Genl. that in consideration of the amt of Tax ^{Five tops} derived from the district, by the Government which is at least one hundred & fifty thousand Dollars would justify the keeping of a sufficient force at this place to protect this district to say nothing of the Homes & Property of Union Men. By this course it would encourage the Manufacturers to increase their business, instead of which as

Things look now they are trying to curtail their business as
far as possible, feeling daily life security.

These views are not, ^{to be} by us from any hasty impulses but from
mature considerations on all the bearings in the case.

We submit our views to you knowing the interest you feel in
the welfare of our Union Citizens and town generally for
your consideration, leaving it wholly with you to act
in the matters you think best.

Miss Mariah McKeehan lives 2 miles east of Knob Noster Johnson Co. Mo.

Miss Mariah McKeehan on the 9th day of August told Dr. James M. Mitchell that she had been that morning at the bushwhackers camp and the bushwhackers told her that they had just that same morning killed William Dillingham (a union man who lived about 2 miles from where Miss Mariah was then staying) and she told the Dr. (James M. Mitchell) that her brother Thomas McKeehan was out in the brush with the bushwhackers and that she fed them and aided them with medicine and information and asked the Dr. for a bottle of medicine for her brother who was then sick. All this on the morning of the ninth of August A.D. 1863 on the west side of Clearfork or what is known as Brittle Ridge (this is a local name) in the east portion of Johnson Co. Mo.

Note - William Dillingham a union citizen of Johnson Co. was killed on the ninth morning of August A.D. 1863 at his home and his body was found shot into holes about 30 yards from his house.

Note - Miss Mariah McKeehan was not at home at her father's house but on this ninth morning of August 1863 was then at the house of her sisters Mrs. Catharine Hardt's situated on Brittle Ridge 6 miles south west from Knob Noster Johnson Co. Mo.

Note - There was a family living at Mrs. Catharine Hardt's by the name of Jones who then had a sick child and had called Dr. James M. Mitchell in to see it and soon after the Dr. reached Mrs. Hardt's house a number of men came there (prison men) and were telling Jones' family at the yard fence and while Jones' family were out hearing the men tell about Dillingham being found dead there at ^{the} opportunity Miss Mariah told the Dr. the first statement and charge.

Note - Miss Mariah McKeehan told the Dr. that she heard Sam Whitley say that he (Whitley) would kill Dr. Mitchell and she told the Dr. which road to travel in going back home (the Dr. lived at Knob Noster) so as to avoid the bushwhackers.

Note - Why Miss Mariah McKeehan told the Dr. what she knew about the bushwhackers is understood from this fact. The Dr. had been kind to her aged and infirm father and had been the family Dr. and she and her father's family and the Dr. were all secret.

Note - Dr. James M. Mitchell is truthful man and will and has exposed the secret.

Note - Why the bushwhackers would kill the Dr. was this, he would not go into the bush and Dr. them.

Dr. James M. Mitchell lives in Knob Noster, Johnson Co. Mo.

they said they had left their horses in the

miles - They took us near a little Creek
when they halted and then asked us if
we would join the Southern Army? We told
them they already knew our answer and
'that we would not'. They then went off
about two rods and had a private con-
versation we could not hear what they
said - one James Cooper who pretended
to be a Lieut. and was the leader of
that band of Scouts went off about
five rods, the other two men then told us
to turn our backs toward them. We
hesitated at first when one of them said

If you don't turn around we will
blow your "damned" brains out. He then
turned around - Cooper had a "Revolver"
and the other two each had a Double
barrelled shot gun - As soon as we
turned around they fired and killed
my brother & left our for dead also -

I lay on the ground insensible how
long I can not tell - When I came
to" my brother was lying close to our
dad. After I became conscious I started
for Mr Leroy house some 4 miles distant

I was half a day in getting there I
stayed there between three and four weeks

I then left there and came to Joseph
Warren's some 6 miles distant, where I re-
mained there between 3 & 4 weeks I then
left there and came to "Jesse Satterness"
a distance of three miles which place
I left this morning and came here -

Dear Sir:

Permit a strange friend to drop you a few lines. I learn that you are a Christian gentleman, & therefore address you more freely. I am but an humble citizen but hope that I have the good of my State & Country at heart, & hope that you are actuated by the same feelings. I write to let you know that bushwhackers are right in our midst & robbing Union men nearly every night of horses, guns, saddles & money &c. I believe they are here, & recruiting for the Southern side. Dr. Sherman of Jipton ^{by Gen. J. Crawford of Jefferson City} was informed some weeks ago that if he would make up a company of good Union men that they would be received into a Regt. of provisional troops for the defense of the State, & he did get up a company of good Union men & went down to General Crawford but was told that they would have to serve under a Captain who would be appointed over them. This the Dr. our the company would not submit to, & I do not blame them for it. This is a Republican form of Government & the people want to choose their own officers, both civil & military.

Now why is it that Loyal Men cannot elect
their own officers & get to work to rid our country
of these Midnight Murderers & Robbers? I am one of
those that stood firm, when it tried Men's souls
to be a Union man, & a mid all our troubles
God has protected my life & family. & I still
have faith in him that he will over rule all
these troubles for good. I learned my politics
from Clay, Webster, & Benton, & gave my vote for
Bell & Everett & Orr. but Mr Lincoln was elected

of his horse & gun &c. Last night Peter Smith living
one mile north of Dipton was robbed of 200 dollars worth
of property. He is also a union man. Something must
be done or the people will rise up & go to murdering
each other. These deeds have all been done by rebel
bushwhackers. & you may depend that what I tell
you are all facts.

I have the honor to report the capture of a boat, with the following named persons crossing to Virginia, Mr George D. Ashton, wife and child, Miss A. Ashton, Mr Robert Kendall also one colored man. I received information on shore that this same party landed on the Maryland shore last Friday the 24th with the intentions of seeing some of their friends, also of taking some goods back with them on their return, I also understand from some negroes on shore that the goods were intended for Doctor Todd, but he did not succeed in getting them in time for shipment, they have some sundry small articles such as Calicoes Soda Bays &c the boat I left at Blackstones Island.

I reside in Orange Co. Va.
I accompanied Mr. Ashton's party as they wished to
visit friends and purchase supplies. I did not pur-
chase any myself, as the merchants would sell none.

I knew that we were violating the blockade
by crossing. I owe allegiance to the Confederate
Government. I carried no information. I was
a private in the 13th Va. Infy (regt) and discharged
on account of expiration of term of service (12 months).
I will be 43 years old in November, and am a sub-
ject of the conscription.

I am not willing to take the oath of alle-
giance to the U. S. Govt.

Statement of
Geo. D. Shelton

I reside in King George Co. Va. I left there yesterday a week (entirely) with my wife, child, sister and Robt Kendall left with me. I crossed the river for the purpose of accompanying my wife and sister and from no other motive. They wished to obtain family supplies. We crossed at Cedar Point. I was returning from Maryland on Monday evening, when captured.

I do not know where the supplies were purchased. I knew that if I was caught going backwards and forwards that I would be taken to Washington.

I am a citizen of Virginia and do not feel willing to take the Oath of Allegiance.

I decline answering to whom I would sooner give information - the Federal or Confederate Govt. I acknowledge the so-called Confederacy and as I live within their lines - owe that Govt allegiance.

Mr Kendall is a resident of Orange Co. Va and a relative of my wife. I have been in the Confederate service, as Lieut in G. Va Cavalry.
