Each department of state government is assigned a title. Each agency or division in the department is assigned a division number. The agency then groups its rules into general subject matter areas called chapters and specific areas called rules. Within a rule, the first breakdown is called a section and is designated as (1). Subsection is (A) with further breakdown into paragraphs 1., subparagraphs A., parts (I), subparts (a), items I. and subitems a.

The rule is properly cited by using the full citation, for example, 3 CSR 10-4.115 NOT Rule 10-4.115.

Citations of RSMo are to the *Missouri Revised Statutes* as of the date indicated.

Code and Register on the Internet

The *Code of State Regulations* and *Missouri Register* are available on the Internet.

These websites contain rulemakings and regulations as they appear in the *Code* and *Registers*.

Under this heading will appear the text of proposed rules and changes. The notice of proposed rulemaking is required to contain an explanation of any new rule or any change in an existing rule and the reasons therefor. This is set out in the Purpose section with each rule. Also required is a citation to the legal authority to make rules. This appears following the text of the rule, after the word "Authority."

Entirely new rules are printed without any special symbolology under the heading of proposed rule. If an existing rule is to be amended or rescinded, it will have a heading of proposed amendment or proposed rescission. Rules which are proposed to be amended will have new matter printed in boldface type and matter to be deleted placed in brackets.

An important function of the *Missouri Register* is to solicit and encourage public participation in the rulemaking process. The law provides that for every proposed rule, amendment, or rescission there must be a notice that anyone may comment on the proposed action. This comment may take different forms.

If an agency is required by statute to hold a public hearing before making any new rules, then a Notice of Public Hearing will appear following the text of the rule. Hearing dates must be at least thirty (30) days after publication of the notice in the *Missouri Register*. If no hearing is planned or required, the agency must give a Notice to Submit Comments. This allows anyone to file statements in support of or in opposition to the proposed action with the agency within a specified time, no less than thirty (30) days after publication of the notice in the *Missouri Register*.

An agency may hold a public hearing on a rule even though not required by law to hold one. If an agency allows comments to be received following the hearing date, the close of comments date will be used as the beginning day in the ninety- (90-) day-count necessary for the filing of the order of rulemaking.

If an agency decides to hold a public hearing after planning not to, it must withdraw the earlier notice and file a new notice of proposed rulemaking and schedule a hearing for a date not less than thirty (30) days from the date of publication of the new notice.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

8 CSR 20-2.010 Governing Rules. The Labor and Industrial Relations Commission (LIRC) is amending sections (1), (2), (3), (4), and (5).

PURPOSE: This amendment corrects inaccurate statements of the law with regard to timely filing, eases filing burdens for parties by removing the requirement to file three (3) copies, and clarifies a litigant's obligation to serve other parties when filing with the LIRC via facsimile.

(1) The following rules *[shall]* govern practice and procedures in any

proceeding before the commission.

(2) These rules are subject to amendment at any time *[and shall become effective under]* pursuant to the terms and provisions of Chapter 536, RSMo.

(3) The commission will transact business at its office at 3315 West Truman Boulevard, Jefferson City, Missouri (mailing address: PO Box 599, Jefferson City, MO 65102) every day of the year except Saturdays, Sundays, and legal holidays. The commission, at its discretion, from time-to-time may hold public sessions at any time or place within Missouri *[as may be required]*.

(4) Any notice of appeal, application, or other paper required under the law to be filed with the commission, when mailed and received by the commission, shall be filed as of the date endorsed by the United States Post Office on the envelope or container in which the paper is received, or the date received, if filed by facsimile. *[In instances where the last day for the filing of any such paper falls on a Saturday, Sunday or legal holiday, the filing shall be deemed timely if accomplished on the next day which is not a Saturday, a Sunday or legal holiday.]*

(5) Any notice of appeal, Application for Review filed in a workers' compensation claim or other paper required by law to be filed with the commission may be filed by facsimile, provided the pages do not exceed five (5) pages including any supporting documents, **and provided a copy of the filing is also concurrently sent to the opposing parties via facsimile transmission, such service to be certified in the filing sent to the commission.** The parties shall send by United States mail the original *[and two (2) copies]* to the commission and one (1) copy to the opposing parties on the same day as the facsimile transmission. *[Only one (1) copy shall be transmitted by facsimile.]* Date and time of receipt will be determined by the commission's facsimile machine. Persons filing by facsimile must retain their receipt with the original copy for reference by the commission if requested. Applications for Review filed in employment security claims are governed by 8 CSR 20-4.010.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

8 CSR 20-3.010 Jurisdiction. The Labor and Industrial Relations Commission (LIRC) is amending subsections (A) and (C) of section (3); amending section (4); amending subsections (B), (C), (D), (E), (F), (G) and (H) of section (5); adding a new subsection (I) to section (5); and adding a new section (6).

PURPOSE: This amendment clarifies the procedure for seeking commission approval of a lump sum settlement or commutation, provides guidance to parties seeking modification of final awards, and establishes new procedures for disputes pertaining to future medical treatment.

(3) Original Hearings—Compromise Settlements.

(A) No original hearings in contested cases shall be heard by the commission or any member of the commission. No compromise settlement of a workers' compensation claim shall *[be submitted to]* be accepted for consideration by the commission or any of its members for approval if the claim is pending in the division.

(C) All compromise settlements of workers' compensation claims pending in the circuit or appellate courts shall be submitted to the commission for approval. *[The appeal shall first be dismissed or withdrawn from the circuit or appellate court and jurisdiction restored to the commission before the commission may approve the compromise settlement.]* Before filing the settlement for consideration by the commission, the parties seeking to settle the claim shall first petition the court for an appropriate order remanding the matter or otherwise restoring jurisdiction to the commission for consideration of the settlement. The commission cannot act on any request to consider a settlement until the court so disposes of the matter.

(4) Modifying *[Death]* Benefit Awards. The commission shall have sole authority to modify final awards allowing *[death]* benefits to employees or dependents. The commission may modify *[death]* benefit awards from time-to-time *[upon its own motion or]* upon motion by an interested party. All motions for modification of final awards shall be made to the commission and the movant shall have the burden to submit proof of the change *[or]* of condition or status of the parties receiving the benefits*[,]*, and will also be responsible for providing to the commission, with the motion, contact information for the employee and/or each dependent affected by the motion, including current addresses. Moving parties are advised that if the commission is unable to provide due notice of the sought modification to each interested party, the commission will not take any action to modify the award. Proof of the remarriage of the dependent surviving spouse shall be made by filing a copy of the marriage license of the remarried dependent surviving spouse or affidavit of the surviving spouse admitting remarriage. Proof of the death of the employee or any dependent shall be made by filing a copy of the death certificate of the employee or dependent. Evidence of the remarriage of the dependent surviving spouse or the death of the employee or dependents may be made by deposition or other evidence as the commission may specify.

(5) Lump Sum Payment of Compensation (Motion for Commutation).

(B) *[A motion for commutation shall be filed with t]*The commission has jurisdiction over any motion for commutation in all cases in which the award *[of the administrative law judge]* has become final.

(C) *[Three (3) copies of the motion for commutation shall be filed by the moving party. A copy of the motion shall be sent by the division or the commission to all interested parties.]* Where the motion for commutation is not jointly agreed by the parties, the moving party has the burden to: (1) file a copy of the motion for commutation with the commission; and (2) serve a copy of the motion to all interested parties.

(D) When interested parties are notified of the motion, they may file a response with *[the division or]* the commission *[, depending*

upon where the motion is pending,] within twenty (20) days of notification. If no objection is filed, the commission will review the motion *[shall be reviewed]* upon the facts and evidence submitted by the movant and make a decision *[made]* without ordering a formal hearing.

(E) If objections to the commutation are filed, the commission *[or the division, depending upon where the motion is pending, shall hold]* may remand the matter to the division for a hearing. Upon return of the file, the commission *[or division]* shall review the evidence and render its decision.

(F) The commission shall send *[A]*an order allowing or denying the motion *[shall be sent]* by United States mail to all interested parties.

(G) A commutation of compensation due a minor dependent shall not be approved or ordered until a legal guardian for the dependent has been appointed by the probate court of the county in which the dependent resides and proof of the appointment of a guardian and a certificate of the probate court certifying that the guardian has qualified shall be filed with the *[motion for commutation]* commission.

(H) *[No party shall settle an award for compensation due upon the basis of its commutable value without submitting a motion for approval to the commission or the division.]* In cases where there is a prior award of benefits or a duly approved settlement that has finally resolved the parties' respective rights and duties with regard to periodic benefits payable in the claim, the commission cannot consider a joint motion for payment of a lump sum as a compromise settlement under section 287.390, RSMo, unless the parties are able to identify, in their motion, a legitimate, presently justiciable dispute, over which the commission would have jurisdiction. In the absence of such dispute, and where the parties desire merely to close out or redeem the remaining obligations under the award or settlement via payment of a lump sum, the commission will treat the motion as one for commutation pursuant to section 287.530, RSMo.

(I) Where a motion for commutation is jointly agreed by the parties, the commission will consider the motion provided it includes the following:

1. For motions to commute permanent total disability or death benefits:

A. The employee or dependent's date of birth and presumed life expectancy, including, in the event the parties are requesting that the commission presume a life expectancy that substantially differs from that indicated in the most recent edition of the *National Vital Statistics Reports* published by the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services, a written opinion from a medical professional explaining why the life expectancy so differs;

B. The discount rate and actuarial assumptions utilized by the parties in calculating the present-day or commutable value of the future installments that may be expected under the award or settlement;

C. The specific facts and circumstances that would support a determination by the commission that commutation will be in the best interests of the employee or dependents; or will avoid undue expense or undue hardship to either party; or that the employee or dependent has removed or is about to remove from the United States; or that the employer has sold or otherwise disposed of the greater part of its business or assets; and

D. In the event the parties are seeking commutation on the basis that such will be in the best interests of the employee or dependents, or will avoid undue expense or undue hardship to either party, the specific facts and circumstances that would support a determination by the commission that unusual circumstances exist in the case that warrant a departure from the normal method of payment; and

2. For motions to commute open future medical benefits where the underlying award or settlement does not expressly

preserve to the employer/insurer the discretionary right to close future medical benefits by funding an annuity or Medicare Set-Aside trust account—

A. The employee's date of birth and presumed life expectancy, including, in the event the parties are requesting that the commission presume a life expectancy that substantially differs from that indicated in the most recent edition of the *National Vital Statistics Reports* published by the U.S. Department of Health & Human Services, a written opinion from a medical professional explaining why the life expectancy so differs;

B. The medical expenses incurred by the employee in connection with the claim for at least the last five (5) years, if any, listed by date, provider, treatment, and amount;

C. The discount rate and actuarial assumptions utilized by the parties in calculating the commutable value of the future installments of medical expenses that may be expected under the award or settlement;

D. Whether the employee is currently, or reasonably anticipated to become, within the next thirty (30) months, a Medicare beneficiary, and if so, whether Medicare has made any conditional payments for medical treatment related to the work injury;

E. If a Medicare Set-Aside trust account is proposed to commute the future installments of medical care, whether all reasonably anticipated future medical expenses are of the type that will be covered by Medicare upon exhaustion of the commutation funds, or, in the alternative, an identification of what additional sums are being paid to cover expenses not covered by Medicare, including any evidence, attestation, or other information that would support a finding by the commission as to the sufficiency of such additional sums;

F. A signed statement from the employee memorializing his or her understanding and agreement that the funds from the proposed commutation should be used exclusively for the purpose of paying for medical treatment related to the work injury, and that failure to expend the commutation funds for such purpose may jeopardize the employee's later ability to obtain any financial assistance (via Medicare, private insurance, or otherwise) for future medical expenses related to the work injury; and

G. The specific facts and circumstances that would support a determination by the commission that commutation will be in the best interests of the employee or dependents; or will avoid undue expense or undue hardship to either party; or that the employee or dependent has removed or is about to remove from the United States; or that the employer has sold or otherwise disposed of the greater part of its business or assets.

(6) The commission retains jurisdiction over disputes pertaining to the parties' respective rights and obligations with regard to future medical treatment whenever a final award or settlement in the case leaves the issue of future medical treatment "open" or otherwise indeterminate. See *State ex rel. ISP Minerals, Inc. v. Labor & Indus. Rels. Comm'n*, 465 S.W.3d 471 (Mo. 2015). The commission will only consider issues falling within its statutory authority, such as whether a disputed treatment is reasonably required to cure and relieve the effects of the work injury for purposes of section 287.140, RSMo, and will not entertain requests to "compel" or "enforce" any award or settlement, because such powers are reserved to the judiciary.

(A) Upon receipt of a motion identifying a dispute pertaining to future medical treatment, the commission will allow opposing parties to respond within twenty (20) days from the date of the commission's correspondence acknowledging the motion; provided, however, that the commission, in its discretion, may extend or accelerate the period for filing such a response. If the commission determines that there is a presently justiciable dispute between the parties over which the commission would have jurisdiction, and that the movant has alleged a *prima facie* claim for relief of

a type that the commission would be authorized to provide, the commission will remand the matter to the division of workers' compensation for a hearing to take evidence on the parties' allegations set forth in the motion and responsive pleadings, if any. Otherwise, the commission may dismiss the motion.

(B) Parties will be entitled to reasonable discovery in advance of the hearing. Any disputes pertaining to discovery should be brought to the commission's attention for a ruling. The administrative law judge will hold in abeyance any action in connection with the commission's order of remand until the discovery dispute is resolved. The administrative law judge will hear and rule upon all evidentiary objections made at the hearing, and will allow the proponent to make an offer of proof where evidence is ruled inadmissible. At the close of the hearing, the division will return the file to the commission for a determination of the disputed issues.

(C) Mediation may be pursued at the discretion of the administrative law judge assigned to the matter. If such mediation is successful, the administrative law judge may sign, if the parties so request, an informal memorandum of understanding outlining and memorializing the parties' agreement, which should be executed by all parties and/or their attorneys; provided, however, if the parties desire approval of a formal settlement agreement resolving the disputed issue of future medical treatment, such should be forwarded to the commission for approval pursuant to section 287.390, RSMo. Any formal settlement agreement should be submitted to the commission in accordance with the guidelines for compromise settlements set forth in these rules.

(D) If, at any time, the dispute becomes moot, the parties are directed to advise the commission, and also the division in the event proceedings are pending in connection with an order of remand from the commission, that no further action is necessary in connection with the motion, whereupon the commission will dismiss the motion.

(E) Where the parties' dispute pertains to future medical treatment which is alleged to be imminently necessary to prevent harm to the health or well-being of the employee, the commission will entertain a request to hear the dispute on an expedited or hardship basis. Such request should include a written opinion from a medical professional explaining why the requested medical treatment is imminently necessary to prevent harm. Where the commission grants such expedited review, the commission may issue an order resolving the dispute based on its own review of the documentary evidence submitted by the parties, without the formality of ordering an evidentiary proceeding before the division. To be considered, such documentary evidence should be certified or otherwise sworn to be authentic via affidavit.

(F) All parties to awards or settlements are hereby advised that the commission generally disfavors the practice of ordering further proceedings in open future medical cases except where strictly necessary; and that the process set forth in this rule does not constitute an invitation or opportunity to relitigate issues in the case that were previously adjudicated or stipulated. Accordingly, if the record before the commission reveals that any party has failed, without reasonable ground, to fully and faithfully comply with its obligations under the law pursuant to an award or settlement previously entered in the case, the commission may assess an award of costs and attorney's fees against said party, pursuant to section 287.560, RSMo. All parties are thus strongly encouraged to resolve their disputes without recourse to the commission except in those extraordinary cases where intervention by an impartial, fact-finding tribunal is necessary.

Chapter 3—Rules Relating to Division of Workers' Compensation

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

8 CSR 20-3.030 Review of Awards or Orders Issued by Administrative Law Judges. The Labor and Industrial Relations Commission (LIRC) is amending section (1); amending subsections (A) and (B) of section (3); adding new subsections (C) and (D) to section (3); amending subsections (A) and (B) of section (4); amending section (5); and amending subsections (B) and (C) of section (5).

PURPOSE: This amendment clarifies procedures for filing briefs with the LIRC in workers' compensation appeals, and removes the requirement to file three (3) copies.

(1) Review—Appeal. Any interested party in a contested case may appeal from a final award, order, or decision made by an administrative law judge of the Division of Workers' Compensation by making an application for review within twenty (20) days from the date of the award, order, or decision with the commission as provided by section 287.480, RSMo. A form to be used in making an application for review has been promulgated by the commission and is available upon request. The applicant for review *[is]* need not *[required to]* use the promulgated form; provided, the application sets forth information in regard to the case and award which is sought to be reviewed and the reasons for making the application for a review of the evidence. An application for review shall be signed by the applicant or the applicant's attorney. An application filed on behalf of a corporation shall be signed by an attorney licensed in Missouri.

(3) Applications and Briefs.

(A) An applicant for review of any final award, order, or decision of the administrative law judge shall state specifically in the application the reason the applicant believes the findings and conclusions of the administrative law judge on the controlling issues are not properly supported. It shall not be sufficient merely to state that the decision of the administrative law judge on any particular issue is not supported by competent and substantial evidence. **The allegations of error in an application for review are not an opportunity for early briefing, but rather serve to notify the commission and opposing parties of the nature of the issues that will be addressed on appeal. Accordingly, the application for review should not extend beyond a maximum of five (5) pages. The commission may decline to consider any portion of an application for review that extends beyond this page limitation.**

(B) If the applicant for review (known as the petitioner) desires to file a brief or memorandum of law in support of the application, it

shall be indicated in the application. *[The petitioner's brief or memorandum of law shall be filed within thirty (30) days after the transmittal of the transcript of record. Parties to a claim who do not file an application for review may file reply]* When briefing is requested, the commission secretary will provide, via written correspondence to all parties, a briefing schedule after the transcript is prepared by the division of workers' compensation. Unless a modified briefing schedule is ordered by the commission, the petitioner's brief will be due thirty (30) days from the date of the commission secretary's correspondence establishing the briefing schedule, and respondent briefs or memoranda of law will be due within fifteen (15) days after the date of the commission secretary's letter acknowledging the commission's receipt of the *[applicant's]* petitioner's brief or memorandum of law. The commission shall have discretion, after notice to the parties, to extend or accelerate the briefing schedule.

(C) Parties requesting an extension of time to file a brief, an extension of page length, or any other extraordinary request pertaining to briefing, may make such request to the commission, in writing, prior to the last date for filing their brief, such request to include the following:

1. The number of additional days, pages, or other specific relief requested;
2. A certification that a copy of the request has been served to all opposing parties upon the same date and time, and via the same means, that such request is sent to the commission;
3. An indication whether the requesting party has conferred with opposing parties regarding the request, and if not, why;
4. An indication whether opposing parties have registered any objection to the request; and
5. The specific facts or circumstances motivating the request.

(D) The commission may decline to consider a party's request where it fails to comply with the foregoing, and may decline to consider a party's brief where it appears the party has engaged in any dilatory practice, or other conduct prejudicial to the efficient and timely adjudication of the appeal.

(4) Answers and Briefs.

(A) An opposing party (known as the respondent) may file an answer to the petitioner's application for review, concisely addressing each of the contentions set forth in the application. The answer(s) shall be filed within ten (10) days *[after the]* from the date of the commission secretary's correspondence acknowledging the filing of the application for review. The commission shall have discretion to extend the time for filing an answer.

(B) If the petitioner does not include a request for a briefing schedule in the application for review and the respondent desires to file a brief or memorandum of law, that request shall be included in the answer. If the petitioner has requested a briefing schedule, but fails to file a timely brief after that, the respondent may file a brief or memorandum of law *[only if the respondent included a request to file a brief or memorandum of law in the answer]* within fifteen (15) days from the date the petitioner's brief was due.

(5) Briefs~~/,~~—Typewritten. Briefs filed in any case pending before the commission shall be typewritten. The original *[and two (2) copies]* shall be filed with the commission and a copy served upon the opposing party(ies).

(B) The brief of the petitioner shall not exceed thirty (30) pages. A respondent's brief shall not exceed twenty-five (25) pages. A reply brief is not required or suggested but if the petitioner believes it is necessary to file a reply, it shall not exceed eight (8) pages. A reply brief must be filed within ten (10) days of receipt of the respondent's brief. A cover sheet or index to the brief need not be counted in the page limitation, but any attachments, exhibits, or appendices to the brief will be considered as pages of the brief and subject to the page limitation for the entire brief. (Parties should note that the commission file

contains the award and decision of the administrative law judge along with a complete transcript of the record. It is unnecessary to attach any of these materials to the brief. Any other attachment would not be of record and not subject to consideration, which is limited to the record or transcript of the hearing.) *[Any brief submitted which is not in compliance with the above may not be considered.]*

(C) The **petitioner's** brief *[of the party requesting the application for review]* shall contain a fair and concise statement of facts without argument, **with citations to the pertinent pages of the transcript supporting each factual assertion.** The respondent's brief may supplement the statement of facts if necessary. No jurisdictional statement is necessary unless jurisdiction is at issue. (Parties are advised that recitations of basic legal principles of workers' compensation law are not necessary and are discouraged. *[The commission is aware of principles such as that the burden of proof is on the employee, the law is to be liberally interpreted in favor of the employee, and that the commission may make its own determination of the facts, and credibility of the witnesses including experts.]*) The briefs shall identify the issues in dispute and address those issues only. *The briefs should*, state concisely the factual or legal support for the party's positions. *Lengthy recitation of facts or cases without identifying how they relate to the party's position will not be considered. Briefs of all parties should clearly outline and explain the issues in dispute*, and contain a conclusion in detail as to the decision, award, or action requested from the Labor and Industrial Relations Commission. **Upon its own motion, or upon motion by any interested party, the commission may, in its discretion, decline to consider any brief or any portion of a brief that is not filed in accordance with these rules.**

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

8 CSR 20-3.060 Policy of the Commission. The Labor and Industrial Relations Commission (LIRC) is amending section (1); amending subsection (B) of section (2); amending section (3); amending section (4); and amending subsections (C), (E), (F), and (G) of section (4).

PURPOSE: This amendment updates the LIRC's policy in connection with continuances, clarifies language with regard to attorney fees

where multiple attorneys may have worked on a case, and removes outdated language relating to compromise settlements that does not reflect the statutory requirements or modern practice.

(1) Continuance. Continuances or further hearings are not favored by the commission. The parties are expected to submit all matters in controversy for decision at a single hearing *[before the commission]*. The parties cannot agree to a continuance of any case set for hearing *[before the commission]* without the consent of the *[commission] division of workers' compensation, consistent with the division's rules and procedures.* The purpose of the Workers' Compensation Law is to give a speedy determination of the rights of the employee.

(2) Attorney Fees.

(B) The limitation as to fees shall apply to the combined charges of attorneys who *[knowingly]* combine their efforts towards the enforcement or collection of any compensation claim.

(3) Compromise Settlements. All agreements or contracts for settlement that provide for the payment of less than the full amount of compensation due or to become due, and which undertake to release the employer from all further liability, will be approved by the commission only where it appears that a reasonable doubt exists as to liability and as to the rights of parties, *[and that approval would be for the best interest of the parties. All compromise and contracts for settlement must conform strictly to]* **and where the terms of the agreement are consistent with** the requirements of section 287.390, RSMo.

(4) Every compromise agreement or contract for settlement, *[in addition to the requirements of section 287.390, RSMo, shall]* **submitted to the commission should** be accompanied by—

(C) The latest medical records or reports in the possession of the parties bearing on the case;

(E) A separate statement signed by the employee, or dependents in death cases, in which the employee would state under oath that s/he understands that by agreeing to the settlement that *[s/he is forever closing out this present claim under the Missouri Workers' Compensation Law; that s/he will receive no further compensation or medical aid by reason of this accident; that]* s/he understands that s/he has a right to prosecute his/her claim before the commission to a final determination; and that the award of the commission might allow him/her more or less money than is provided by the proposed settlement and that s/he requests the commission to approve the settlement;

(F) *[Inclusion in the stipulation or agreement of]* **An identification of** the amount of compensation previously paid, weekly rate of compensation, and the amount of medical aid that has been provided *[and it may include the following statement: "It is agreed by all parties hereto that the filing of its document is the filing of an application for adjustment of claim on behalf of the employee, and that the commission, in its discretion, may set the matter for hearing as a regular application, reserving to the parties the right to put in issue any of the facts admitted herein; and that if hearing is held with this document used as an application, the employer-insurer shall have available to them all defenses that were available as of date of filing of this document; and that the commission may thereafter either approve the compromise agreement and settlement or disapprove same and issue findings and award after review of the evidence has been made and the matter regularly submitted for decision"]*; and

(G) *[A signature of the stipulation or contract by the employee, or dependent in death cases, by his/her attorney or the representative of the claimant, if any, together with a statement over their signatures as to the agreement between them as to the attorney fee they request the commission to*

allow the attorney for the employee and be signed by a minor claimant, the minor claimant's parents or legal guardian and be signed by the employer-insurer or their attorney.] Signatures by the parties and their attorneys, or, in the case of a minor claimant, signature(s) from the minor's parent(s) or legal guardian(s), together with a statement as to the agreed-upon attorney fee, if any, that is requested in favor of the attorney for the employee, claimant, or dependent.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

8 CSR 20-4.010 Review—Applications. The Labor and Industrial Relations Commission (LIRC) is amending section (2); amending and adding new subsections (A), (B), (C), and (D) to section (4); amending subsections (A) and (B) of section (5); deleting subsection (C) of section (5); deleting sections (6), (7), (8), (9), and (10) and renumbering as needed; and amending previous section (11).

PURPOSE: This amendment creates a procedure for requesting briefing and/or oral argument in employment security matters, updates the provisions pertaining to requests to submit additional evidence to reflect current practice, deletes provisions pertaining to hearings before the LIRC that do not reflect current practice, and provides guidelines for what the LIRC may do upon receipt of an untimely application for review.

(2) Upon receipt of the application, [the commission shall mail] **an acknowledgment of receipt and** a copy of the application [or notice of the issues raised by it] **will be sent** to the last known address of each interested party to the decision.

(4) [Oral argument by counsel for the parties at issue may be granted by the commission; provided the request to present oral argument is made within ten (10) days of the filing of the application for review. A claimant may present oral argument on his/her own behalf. A brief shall be filed before oral argument shall be allowed, unless this requirement is waived by the commission. All briefs shall contain a certificate of service verifying that a copy has been sent to the opposing party.] **Briefs and Oral Argument.** The party filing an application for review (or "petitioner") may request, in the application,

to file a brief. The commission may, in its discretion, allow or deny briefing in the case. If briefing is allowed, the commission secretary will provide, via written correspondence to all parties, a briefing schedule. Unless a modified briefing schedule is ordered by the commission, the petitioner's brief will be due fifteen (15) days from the date of the commission secretary's correspondence establishing the briefing schedule. Respondent briefs or memoranda of law will be due within ten (10) days after the date of the commission secretary's correspondence acknowledging the commission's receipt of the petitioner's brief or memorandum of law. Because of the federal regulations requiring prompt decision-making by the commission, requests to extend the briefing schedule in employment security matters are generally disfavored, and will only be granted in extraordinary circumstances.

(A) All briefs are subject to the following requirements:

1. Be on paper of size eight and one-half inches by eleven inches (8 1/2" x 11");
2. Be typed on one (1) side of the paper;
3. Have a left, right, bottom, and top margin of not less than one inch (1"). Page numbers may appear in the bottom margin, but no other text may appear in the margins;
4. Have all pages consecutively numbered;
5. Use characters throughout the briefs, including footnotes that are not smaller than thirteen- (13-) point font, Times New Roman;
6. Be double-spaced; provided, however, that the cover, if any, certificate of service, and signature block may all be single-spaced; and
7. Contain a certificate of service verifying that a copy has been sent to the opposing party.

(B) The petitioner's brief shall not exceed thirty (30) pages. A respondent's brief shall not exceed twenty-five (25) pages. Upon its own motion, or upon motion by any interested party, the commission may, in its discretion, strike any brief or portion of a brief that is not filed in accordance with these rules.

(C) The brief of the petitioner should contain a fair and concise statement of facts without argument. The respondent's brief may supplement the statement of facts if necessary. The briefs should identify the issues in dispute and address those issues only, state concisely the factual or legal support for the party's positions, and contain a conclusion in detail as to the decision, award, or action requested from the commission.

(D) Oral argument may be ordered by the commission upon its own motion or upon a request set forth in an application for review or response, if any. Untimely requests for leave to present oral argument will not be entertained, nor will any request to present oral argument in lieu of a brief be allowed.

(5) Additional Evidence.

(A) After an application for review has been filed with the commission, any interested party may [file an application with the commission for] **request** permission to submit additional evidence [at a hearing before the full commission or its duly authorized representative]. The commission will not consider [hearing of] additional evidence [by the commission will not be granted except upon the ground of] **unless the evidence is newly discovered [evidence which], or the need for the evidence could not have been reasonably anticipated before the hearing, or the evidence could not with reasonable diligence have been produced at the hearing before the appeals tribunal.** The [petition for authority] **request** to submit additional evidence [must] **should** set out specifically and in detail—

1. The nature and substance of the newly discovered evidence;
2. Names of witnesses to be produced; and
3. Nature of the exhibits to be introduced.

(B) [The commission will consider the application to submit additional evidence and answer, if any, of opposing

parties, without oral argument of the parties and enter an order either granting or denying the application. If the application is granted, the opposing party(ies) will be permitted to present rebuttal testimony.] Before accepting additional evidence into the record, the commission will send written notice to all interested parties advising them of the request and allowing an opportunity to submit to the commission, within fifteen (15) days, written objection to the request to submit additional evidence. If a timely objection is received, the commission may issue an order allowing or denying the request to submit additional evidence, or may order that the appeals tribunal hold a hearing to permit all interested parties an opportunity for cross-examination and/or the presentation of rebuttal evidence. If no objections are received within fifteen (15) days of the commission's notice of the request to submit additional evidence, the commission may accept the additional evidence into the record without further notice to the parties. The commission is opposed, as a matter of policy, to the introduction of additional evidence except when it considers this action necessary for the furtherance of justice. Therefore, all available evidence should be introduced at the hearing before the appeals tribunal.

[(C) If the commission decides to take additional evidence in any matter before it for review, notice of the hearing to secure the evidence shall be mailed to the last known address of each interested party at least seven (7) days before the date of hearing; provided, however, that a shorter period of notice may be given if the shorter period is not prejudicial to the parties. The notice shall specify the place, date and time of hearing.

(6) The hearing shall be held either by the commission or its duly authorized representative at a place selected by the commission or by the representative. Any hearing may be adjourned, postponed or continued from time-to-time or place-to-place at the discretion of the commission or the discretion of the representative.

(7) All hearings shall be conducted in an informal but orderly manner. The commission and its representative shall follow in each case that procedure which it believes will best develop all of the pertinent facts with respect to the issues without regard to common law or statutory rules of evidence and other technical rules of procedure. The commission or its representative may examine all parties and witnesses and shall determine the order or procedure for each hearing.

(8) Any individual may appear for him/herself in any hearing. Any partnership may appear by any of its members. An officer of a corporation or association or any other duly authorized person may attend a hearing on an application to which the corporation or association is an interested party and may be a witness in the hearing. Any party may be represented by an attorney-at-law and no one who is not an attorney may appear in a representative capacity. Persons whose presence would be detrimental to the proper conduct of the hearing may be excluded from the hearing room by the commission or its duly authorized representative.

(9) Subpoenas to compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of records at a hearing may be issued by the commission or its representative upon a statement of the necessity therefore made by the party requesting the issuance of the subpoena.

(10) Witnesses subpoenaed for the hearing before the commission or its representative shall be allowed mileage and per diem at a rate fixed by the division. These witness fees and mileage shall be claimed at the time of hearing and shall be

certified to by the witness. Approved payment shall be made out of the Unemployment Compensation Fund. Under no circumstances shall parties to the case be granted witness fees or mileage.]

[[11]](6) An application for review filed more than thirty (30) days from the date of notification or mailing by the division is untimely. [Untimely applications may be summarily denied by the commission without consideration of the merits.] The commission does not have statutory authority to accept untimely applications for review. However, if the application for review alleges either that the party filed an earlier, timely application for review that was not properly acknowledged, or that the party was deprived due notice of the decision of the appeals tribunal, the commission may remand the matter for a hearing before the appeals tribunal for the purpose of taking evidence to determine whether the commission may take jurisdiction of the appeal.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

8 CSR 20-8.010 Review of Decisions Issued by the Division of Workers' Compensation in Tort Victims' Compensation Cases. The Labor and Industrial Relations Commission (LIRC) is amending section (1); amending subsection (B) of section (3); amending subsections (A) and (B) of section (4); amending section (5); and amending section (6).

PURPOSE: This amendment clarifies the procedures for briefing and oral argument in Tort Victims' Compensation Cases, and removes the requirement to file three (3) copies.

(1) Review—Appeal. Any party to a case involving tort victims' compensation may appeal the decision of the Division of Workers' Compensation by filing a petition with the commission within thirty (30) days following the date of notification or mailing of the decision, as provided by section 537.690, RSMo. A form to be used in making the petition has been promulgated by the commission and is available upon request. The petitioner *[is]* need not *[required to]* use the promulgated form provided the petition sets forth information in regard to the case, and the decision which is sought to be reviewed and the

reason for making the petition. The petition shall be signed by the petitioner or the petitioner's attorney.

(3) Petitions and Briefs.

(B) If the petitioner desires to file a brief in support of the petition, the request to file a brief shall be stated in the petition. *[The petitioner's brief shall be filed within thirty (30) days after the transmittal of the transcript of record. The opposing party may file a responsive brief within fifteen (15) days after the receipt of the petitioner's brief.]* When briefing is requested, the commission secretary will provide, via written correspondence to all parties, a briefing schedule after the transcript is prepared by the Division of Workers' Compensation. Unless a modified briefing schedule is ordered by the commission, the petitioner's brief will be due thirty (30) days from the date of the commission secretary's correspondence, and respondent briefs will be due fifteen (15) days from the date of the commission secretary's letter acknowledging the commission's receipt of the petitioner's brief. The commission shall have discretion, after notice to the parties, to extend or accelerate the briefing schedule.

(4) Answers and Briefs.

(A) The opposing party (known as the respondent) may file an answer to the petition concisely addressing each of the contentions set forth in the petition. The answer shall be filed within ten (10) days *[after]* from the date of the commission's correspondence acknowledging the filing of the petition. The commission shall have discretion to extend the time for filing an answer.

(B) If the petitioner does not include a request to file briefs in the petition and the respondent desires to file a brief, that request shall be included in the answer. If the petitioner requested a briefing schedule, but failed to timely file a brief, the respondent may file a brief *[only if the respondent included a request to file a brief in the answer]* within fifteen (15) days after the date that the petitioner's brief was due.

(5) Briefs~~[,]~~—Typewritten. Briefs filed in any case pending before the commission shall be typewritten. The original *[and two (2) copies]* shall be filed with the commission and a copy served upon the opposing party.

(6) Oral Argument. Oral argument may be *[granted]* ordered by the commission. *Any request to present oral argument shall be included in the petition or in the answer and shall include detailed and specific reasons the argument cannot be made adequately by brief]* upon its own motion or upon a request set forth in a petition for review or answer. Untimely requests for leave to present oral argument shall not be entertained nor will any request to present oral argument in lieu of a brief be allowed.

Chapter 110—Fees**

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

13 CSR 40-110.030 Annual [Twenty-Five] Thirty-Five Dollar (\$25/35) Fee. The Department of Social Services is amending the purpose, sections (1) and (2), and adding sections (3) and (4).

PURPOSE: This amendment will bring the Department of Social Services into compliance with the Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018, Pub. L. 115-123 that requires updating the amount of the annual fee assessed in a IV-D, never-assistance case in which the division has disbursed to the obligee or payee at least five hundred fifty dollars (\$550) of support in the federal fiscal year from twenty-five dollars (\$25) to thirty-five dollars (\$35). The act also requires updating the amount the state must collect and disburse to the family before assessing the annual fee from five hundred dollars (\$500) to five hundred fifty dollars (\$550). The Family Support Division (FSD) is also amending this regulation to collect seventeen dollars and fifty cents (\$17.50) of the fee from obligee or payee and seventeen dollars and fifty cents (\$17.50) of the fee from obligors.

PURPOSE: This rule defines how the Family Support Division will assess and collect an annual [twenty-five] thirty-five dollar (\$25/35) fee as required by section 454(6)(B)(ii) of Title IV-D of the Social Security Act as amended by the [Deficit Reduction Act of 2005, Pub. L. 109-171]Bipartisan Budget Act of 2018, Pub. L. 115-123.

(1) Definitions.

(A) *[Division means the Family Support Division]* “Case” means an official record comprised of an obligee or payee and dependent child(ren), associated with a particular obligor.

(B) *[Support means any financial product collected for the support or maintenance of a child or the custodian of a child or a spouse or ex-spouse]* “Obligee or Payee” means an individual to whom a duty of support is owed.

(C) *[Custodian means an individual to whom a duty of support is owed]* “Division” means the Family Support Division.

(D) *[Obligor means an individual owing a duty of support]* “Federal fiscal year” means the period from October 1 to September 30.

(E) “IV-D” means part IV-D of the Social Security Act.

(F) *[Case means an official record comprised of a custodian and dependent child(ren), associated with a particular obligor]* “IV-D, Never-Assistance Case” means a case in which the obligee or payee is receiving services pursuant to section 454.400, RSMo, but has never received Aid to Families with Dependent Children or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families benefits on behalf of the child(ren) associated with the case.

(G) *[IV-D, never-assistance case means a case in which the custodian is receiving services pursuant to section 454.400, RSMo, but has never received Aid to Families with Dependent Children or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families benefits on behalf of the child(ren) associated with the case]* “Obligor” means a person who owes a duty of support as determined by a court or administrative agency of competent jurisdiction.

(H) *[Federal fiscal year means the period from October 1 to September 30]* “Support” means any financial support collected for the support or maintenance of a child or the obligee or payee of a child or a spouse or ex-spouse based upon a judicial or administrative order.

(2) Assessing an Annual [Twenty-Five Dollar (\$25)] Thirty-Five

Dollar (\$35) Fee. In a IV-D, never-assistance case in which the division has disbursed to the obligee or payee at least five hundred **fifty** dollars (\$/500/550) of support in the federal fiscal year, the division shall assess an annual fee of [twenty-five/thirty-five] dollars (\$/25/35). [The fee shall be assessed to the obligor.]

(A) If an **obligee or payee** or an obligor is associated to more than one (1) IV-D, never-assistance case, the division shall assess the fee on each case in which at least five hundred **fifty** dollars (\$/500/550) of support has been disbursed to the obligee or payee in the federal fiscal year.

(B) The division shall assess the fee in each federal fiscal year after the first five hundred **fifty** dollars (\$/500/550) of support has been disbursed to the obligee or payee.

[(C) After the fee is assessed, the division shall provide notice of the fee to the obligor. The notice shall provide instructions to the obligor for satisfying the fee.

(D) If the obligor does not satisfy the fee by the end of the federal fiscal year in which it is assessed, the balance remains due.]

[(E)](C) The division shall not assess a fee in cases excluded by federal law or regulation.

(3) Collecting the Annual Thirty-Five Dollar (\$35) Fee. The division will collect seventeen dollars and fifty cents (\$17.50) of the thirty-five dollar (\$35) assessed fee from the obligee or payee and collect seventeen dollars and fifty cents (\$17.50) of the thirty-five dollar (\$35) assessed fee from the obligor on each assessed case.

(A) The division shall deduct the obligee's or payee's seventeen dollars and fifty cents (\$17.50) fee from support payments collected on behalf of the obligee or payee, in excess of the five hundred fifty dollar (\$550) threshold, prior to disbursing payments to the obligee or payee. The obligor shall receive credit toward his or her obligation for the entire support payment. The division will notify obligees or payees of the state's annual fee for IV-D services.

(B) If the obligee or payee does not satisfy the seventeen dollar and fifty cent (\$17.50) fee by the end of the federal fiscal year in which the division assessed the thirty-five dollar (\$35) fee, the balance remains due, and the division will deduct the unpaid fee from any future support payments received for the obligee or payee until the entire fee is satisfied.

(C) The division shall provide notice to the obligor of his/her seventeen dollar and fifty cent (\$17.50) fee. The notice shall provide instructions to the obligor for satisfying the fee. The division may collect the fee from the obligor utilizing enforcement mechanisms provided by law.

(D) If the obligor does not satisfy the fee by the end of the federal fiscal year in which it is assessed, the balance remains due.

(E) Any fee assessed to the obligor under this regulation that is not satisfied prior to the amendment remains due.

Chapter 2—General Rules**

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

20 CSR 2220-2.120 Transfer of Prescription or Medication Order Information [for the Purpose of Refill]. The board is amending the title, purpose, and updating all sections.

PURPOSE: The title of this rule and sections (1)–(3) are being amended to remove unnecessary/duplicate rule language pursuant to Executive Order 17-03 and to clarify the requirements for transfers of original and refill prescriptions.

PURPOSE: This rule defines record-keeping required for transfer of prescription or medication order information [for the purpose of refill].

[(1) Prescription information shall be transferred for the purposes of refill between licensed pharmacies, provided the prescription information to be transferred meets all of the following criteria:

(A) The prescription information indicates authorization by the prescriber for refilling;

(B) The drug on the prescription information is not a Schedule II controlled substance;

(C) The number of lawfully allowable refills has not been exceeded or the maximum allowable time limit has not been exceeded;]

(1) A valid new or refill prescription or medication order may be transferred to another pharmacy if—

(A) The prescription, medication order, and/or refills were authorized by the prescriber;

(B) The prescription or medication order and/or refills have not exceeded the maximum allowable time limit;

(C) If refills are involved, the number of lawfully allowable refills has not been exceeded;

(D) If the transfer involves a controlled substance, all information must be transferred directly between two (2) licensed pharmacists and comply with all state and federal controlled substance laws and regulations; and

(E) The transfer of [original prescription] information for a controlled substance [listed in Schedules III, IV or V for the purpose of refill dispensing] is permissible between pharmacies on a one- (1-)/[-] time basis only. However, pharmacies electronically sharing a real-time, online database may transfer up to the maximum refills permitted by law and the prescriber's authorization.

(2) [When a prescription on record is transferred, t]The following record-keeping is required when a prescription, medication order, or refill is transferred:

(A) The prescription record at the transferring pharmacy [shall show all of the following] must show:

1. The word void must appear on the face of the invalidated prescription [or be immediately voided within the electronic system when the prescription is transferred] for pharmacies using a manual record-keeping system. For pharmacies using an electronic data processing system, the prescription or medication order must be promptly voided within the system;

2. The [prescription record shall provide the] name and location of the pharmacy to which it was transferred, the date of transfer, and the identity of the persons transferring [pharmacist] and receiving information; and

3. If the transfer involves a controlled substance, the receiving

pharmacy's address and Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) registration number [of the pharmacy to which it was transferred] and the full name of the pharmacist(s) transferring and receiving the prescription information [must be recorded];

(B) The [prescription] record at the receiving pharmacy shall show all of the following, in addition to all other lawfully required information [of an original prescription]:

1. [The prescription record is a transferred prescription record from another licensed location] An indication that the prescription or medication order is a transfer;

2. Date of [original] issuance;

3. Date of [original filling, if different from original issuance date] first dispensing;

4. [Original number of refills authorized on the original prescription] Number of refills originally authorized and the number of remaining [authorized] refills;

5. Date of last refill;

6. Prescription [label] number or other unique identifier;

7. [Identity of licensed pharmacy from which the record was transferred] The name and location of the pharmacy that transferred the prescription or medication order;

8. [The identity of the transferring pharmacist provided that pharmacies that share the same database and are under the same ownership may, instead of transferring prescriptions directly between two (2) pharmacists, transfer a prescription electronically by generating a computer-based report at the transferring pharmacy of any prescriptions that have been transferred out. This record shall be readily retrievable to the transferring pharmacy and board representatives and comply with all of the requirements of this rule, except that the requirement to document pharmacist identity shall not be required unless otherwise required by federal law] The identity of the individuals transferring and receiving the information;

9. If the transfer involves a controlled substance, the transferring pharmacy's address and DEA registration number [from the transferring pharmacy must be recorded] and the full names of the pharmacists transferring and receiving the prescription or medication order information; and

10. [Any electronic transfer must maintain patient confidentiality in accordance with 20 CSR 2220-2.300; and] If the transfer involves information for a prescription or medication order that has never been dispensed, the date of first dispensing, the date of last refill, and the prescription number/unique identifier are not required.

[(C) A computerized transfer of prescription information between licensed pharmacies for the purpose of refill shall meet all the requirements stated in sections (1) and (2) of this rule.]

(3) An electronic transfer of prescription or medication order between licensed pharmacies must meet all of the requirements of this rule. However, licensed pharmacies that share the same electronic database and are under the same ownership are not required to record the identities of the persons receiving and transferring non-controlled information.

(4) A Class-C Long Term Care pharmacy may transfer a non-controlled prescription or medication order to a second pharmacy for the purpose of the initial dispensing of up to a seventy-two (72-) hour medication supply to a long-term care facility patient without voiding the remaining prescription. The transferring pharmacy must deduct this amount from the remaining prescription or medication order but is not required to void it.

[(3)](5) A pharmacy [shall] receiving a transfer request from a patient or another pharmacy must complete the transfer within one (1) business day of receiving the request.

**Division 2220—State Board of Pharmacy
Chapter 3—Negative Generic Drug Formulary**

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

20 CSR 2220-3.011 Generic Drug [Formulary] Substitution. The board is amending the title and purpose, deleting sections (1) and (4) and renumbering as necessary.

PURPOSE: This rule is being amended pursuant to Executive Order 17-03 to remove unnecessary/duplicate rule language.

PURPOSE: The purpose of this rule is to [comply with the section 338.057, RSMo (1986), which directs the Department of Economic Development to publish a list of drug products for which substitution, by a pharmacist shall not be permitted. Noting that there are a number of drug products within a specific drug product category that have been proven bio-equivalent and bioavailable to the Federal Food and Drug Administration, the Department of Economic Development has delineated within a particular drug product category those drugs that may be substituted. The list is dual in nature. There are certain drugs where substitution will not be permitted and there are certain drug products where qualified substitution will be allowed, again only if the drug and manufacturer is specifically designated in the list] establish requirements for generic drug substitution.

[(1) If a written prescription is involved, the prescription form used shall have two (2) signature lines at opposite ends at the bottom of the form. Under the line at the right side shall be clearly printed the words: "Dispense as Written." Under the line at the left side shall be clearly printed the words "Substitution Permitted." The prescriber shall communicate the instructions to the pharmacist by signing the appropriate line. No prescription shall be valid without the signature of the prescriber on one (1) of these lines.]

[(2)](1) All pharmacists and dispensing physicians should be warned that any drug product not holding an approved New Drug Application or Abbreviated New Drug Application may not be used as a substitute in the state of Missouri without the dispenser assuming some personal liability.

[(3)](2) A pharmacist shall not substitute drug products that are rated as therapeutically inequivalent to other pharmaceutically equivalent products as listed in the latest edition or cumulative supplement of The Approved Drug Products with Therapeutic Equivalence Evaluations published by the United States Government, Department of Health and Human Services.

[(4) Any drug that is manufactured by an innovator company under a supplement to their New Drug Application (NDA) for that specific drug may apply to the Missouri Board of Pharmacy for consideration as a drug that is generically equivalent to the innovator product. A written request for such consideration must be accompanied by an affidavit or other acceptable documentation from the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) attesting to the equivalency of the generic product to the innovator product. Once the Missouri Board of Pharmacy determines that the two (2) products are considered generically equivalent under state law, an appropriate notation will be made in the next revision of the Generic Drug Formulary.]

The effective date of the rule shall be not less than thirty (30) days after the date of publication of the revision to the *Code of State Regulations*.

The agency is also required to make a brief summary of the general nature and extent of comments submitted in support of or opposition to the proposed rule and a concise summary of the testimony presented at the hearing, if any, held in connection with the rulemaking, together with a concise summary of the agency's findings with respect to the merits of any such testimony or comments which are opposed in whole or in part to the proposed rule. The ninety-(90-) day period during which an agency shall file its order of rulemaking for publication in the *Missouri Register* begins either: 1) after the hearing on the proposed rulemaking is held; or 2) at the end of the time for submission of comments to the agency. During this period, the agency shall file with the secretary of state the order of rulemaking, either putting the proposed rule into effect, with or without further changes, or withdrawing the proposed rule.

**Title 3—DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION
Division 10—Conservation Commission
Chapter 7—Wildlife Code: Hunting: Seasons,
Methods, Limits**

ORDER OF RULEMAKING

By the authority vested in the Conservation Commission under sections 40 and 45 of Art. IV, Mo. Const., the commission amends a rule as follows:

3 CSR 10-7.440 is amended.

This rule establishes hunting seasons and limits and is exempted by section 536.021, RSMo 2016, from the requirement for filing as a proposed amendment.

The Department of Conservation amended 3 CSR 10-7.440 by establishing seasons and limits for hunting migratory game birds and waterfowl during the 2019–2020 seasons.

3 CSR 10-7.440 Migratory Game Birds and Waterfowl: Seasons, Limits

(3) Seasons and limits are as follows:

(A) Mourning doves, Eurasian collared-doves, and white-winged doves may be taken from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset from September 1 through November 29. Limits: fifteen (15) doves daily in the aggregate; forty-five (45) in possession;

(B) Sora and Virginia rails may be taken from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset from September 1 through November 9. Limits: twenty-five (25) rails daily in the aggregate; seventy-five (75)

in possession;

(C) Woodcock may be taken from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset from October 15 through November 28. Limits: three (3) woodcock daily; nine (9) in possession;

(D) Wilson's snipe may be taken from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset from September 1 through December 16. Limits: eight (8) snipe daily; twenty-four (24) in possession;

(E) Blue-winged, green-winged, and cinnamon teal may be taken from sunrise to sunset from September 7 through September 22. Limits: six (6) teal daily in the aggregate; eighteen (18) in possession.

(F) Waterfowl Zones: The North Zone shall be that portion of Missouri north of a line running west from the Illinois border at Lock and Dam 25; west on Lincoln County Hwy. N to Mo. Hwy. 79; south on Mo. Hwy. 79 to Mo. Hwy. 47; west on Mo. Hwy. 47 to I-70; west on I-70 to U.S. Hwy. 63; north on U.S. Hwy. 63 to U.S. Hwy. 24, west on U.S. Hwy. 24 to Mo. Hwy. 10, west on Mo. Hwy. 10 to U.S. Hwy. 69, north on U.S. Hwy. 69 to Mo. Hwy. 116, west on Mo. Hwy. 116 to U.S. Hwy. 59, south on U.S. Hwy. 59 to the Kansas border. The South Zone shall be that portion of Missouri south of a line running west from the Illinois border on Mo. Hwy. 74 to Mo. Hwy. 25; south on Mo. Hwy. 25 to U.S. Hwy. 62; west on U.S. Hwy. 62 to Mo. Hwy. 53; north on Mo. Hwy. 53 to Mo. Hwy. 51; north on Mo. Hwy. 51 to U.S. Hwy. 60; west on U.S. Hwy. 60 to Mo. Hwy. 21; north on Mo. Hwy. 21 to Mo. Hwy. 72; west on Mo. Hwy. 72 to Mo. Hwy. 32; west on Mo. Hwy. 32 to U.S. Hwy. 65; north on U.S. Hwy. 65 to U.S. Hwy. 54; west on U.S. Hwy. 54 to the Kansas border. The Middle Zone shall be the remainder of Missouri not included in other zones.

(G) During years when the federal framework prescribes a sixty-(60-) day duck season, the North Zone season will open on the first Saturday in November, the Middle Zone season will open on the Saturday nearest November 6 for seven (7) days, close for five (5) days, and then re-open for fifty-three (53) days, the South Zone season will open on Thanksgiving Day for four (4) days, close as long as necessary for the second segment to remain open through January 31 (as late as the federal framework allows). During years when the federal framework prescribes a forty-five- (45-) day duck season, the North Zone season will open on the second Saturday in November, the Middle Zone season will open on the Saturday nearest November 15, and the South Zone season will open on the Saturday nearest December 10, close December 20-25, and then re-open on December 26 through the last Sunday in January. During years when the federal framework prescribes a thirty- (30-) day duck season, the North Zone season will open on the Saturday nearest November 14, the Middle Zone season will open on the Saturday nearest November 19, and the South Zone season will open on the Saturday nearest December 15, close December 19-25, and then re-open on December 26 through the Sunday nearest January 20. A person possessing the appropriate state and federal permits may take ducks in accordance to the season lengths, bag limits, and species-specific opening and closing dates established annually by the Conservation Commission.

(H) Ducks and coots may be taken from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset as follows:

1. Ducks and coots may be taken from November 2 through December 31 in the North Zone; from November 9 through November 15 and November 21 through January 12 in the Middle Zone; and from November 28 through December 1 and December 7 through January 31 in the South Zone; and

2. Duck and coot limits are as follows: The daily bag limit of ducks is six (6) and may include no more than four (4) mallards (no more than two (2) of which may be female), three (3) wood ducks, two (2) redheads, two (2) hooded mergansers, three (3) scaup, one (1) pintail, one (1) mottled duck, two (2) canvasback, and two (2) black ducks. The possession limit is eighteen (18), including no more than twelve (12) mallards (no more than six (6) of which may be

female), nine (9) wood ducks, six (6) redheads, six (6) hooded mergansers, nine (9) scaup, three (3) pintails, three (3) mottled ducks, six (6) canvasbacks, and six (6) black ducks. The daily limit of coots is fifteen (15) and the possession limit for coots is forty-five (45).

(I) Geese may be taken from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset as follows:

1. Blue, snow, and Ross's geese may be taken from November 11 through February 6 statewide;

2. White-fronted geese may be taken from November 11 through February 6 statewide;

3. Canada geese and brant may be taken from October 5 through October 13 and from November 11 through February 6 statewide; and

4. Goose limits are as follows: The daily bag limit is three (3) Canada geese and brant in aggregate, twenty (20) blue, snow, or Ross's geese, and two (2) white-fronted geese statewide. The possession limit is nine (9) Canada geese and brant in aggregate and six (6) white-fronted geese. There is no possession limit for blue, snow, and Ross's geese;

(J) Ducks, geese, brant, and coots may be taken by youth hunters fifteen (15) years of age or younger from October 26 through October 27 in the North Zone; from October 26 through October 27 in the Middle Zone; and from November 23 through November 24 in the South Zone. The daily and possession limits for ducks, geese, and coots are the same as during the regular duck, goose, and coot hunting seasons. Any person fifteen (15) years or younger may participate in the youth waterfowl hunting days without permit provided they are in the immediate presence of an adult eighteen (18) years of age or older. If the youth hunter does not possess a hunter education certificate card, the adult must be properly licensed (i.e., must meet any permit requirements that allow small game hunting) and have in his/her possession a valid hunter education certificate card unless they were born before January 1, 1967. The adult may not hunt ducks but may participate in other seasons that are open on the special youth days;

(K) Shells possessed or used while hunting waterfowl and coots statewide, and for other wildlife as designated by posting on public areas, must be loaded with material approved as nontoxic by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

(L) Persons who possess a valid Conservation Order permit may chase, pursue, and take blue, snow, and Ross's geese from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to one-half (1/2) hour after sunset from February 7 through April 30. Any other regulation notwithstanding, methods for the taking of blue, snow, and Ross's geese include using shotguns capable of holding more than three (3) shells, and with the use or aid of recorded or electrically amplified bird calls or sounds, or recorded or electrically amplified imitations of bird calls or sounds. An exception to the above permit requirement includes any person fifteen (15) years of age or younger, provided either 1) s/he is in the immediate presence of a properly licensed adult (must possess a Conservation Order permit) who is eighteen (18) years of age or older and has in his/her possession a valid hunter education certificate card, or was born before January 1, 1967, or 2) s/he possesses a valid hunter education certificate card. A daily bag limit will not be in effect February 7 through April 30 (See 3 CSR 10-5.436 and 3 CSR 10-5.567 for Conservation Order Permit requirements); and

(M) Migratory game birds, to include only doves, ducks, mergansers, and coots, may be taken by hunters with birds of prey as follows (See 3 CSR 10-9.442 for additional provisions about falconry including season lengths and limits for wildlife other than migratory game birds. See 3 CSR 10-9.440 for falconry permit requirements):

1. Doves may be taken from September 1 through December 16 from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset. Daily limit: three (3) doves; possession limit: nine (9) doves, except that any waterfowl taken by falconers must be included within these limits; and

2. Ducks, mergansers, and coots may be taken from sunrise to sunset from September 7 through September 22 statewide, and from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset as follows: in the North Zone, October 26 through October 27, November 2 through

December 31, and February 11 through March 10; in the Middle Zone, October 26 through October 27, November 9 through November 15, November 21 through January 12, and February 11 through March 10; and, in the South Zone, November 23 through November 24, November 28 through December 1, December 7 through January 31, and February 11 through March 10. Daily limit: three (3) birds singly or in the aggregate, including doves; possession limit: nine (9) birds singly or in the aggregate, including doves.

SUMMARY OF PUBLIC COMMENTS: Seasons and limits are exempted from the requirement of filing as a proposed amendment under section 536.021, RSMo 2016.

This amendment was filed April 12, 2019, becomes effective **May 15, 2019**.

Title 3—DEPARTMENT OF CONSERVATION
Division 10—Conservation Commission
Chapter 9—Wildlife Code: Confined Wildlife: Privileges, Permits, Standards

ORDER OF RULEMAKING

By the authority vested in the Conservation Commission under sections 40 and 45 of Art. IV, Mo. Const., the commission amends a rule as follows:

3 CSR 10-9.220 is amended.

A notice of proposed rulemaking containing the text of the proposed amendment was published in the *Missouri Register* on January 15, 2019 (44 MoReg 273–274). Those sections with changes are reprinted here. This proposed amendment becomes effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Code of State Regulations*.

SUMMARY OF COMMENTS: One (1) staff comment was received.

COMMENT: Missouri Department of Conservation staff noted a date listed in paragraph (3)(B)1. in the proposed amendment to this rule was inaccurate. The correct date is the anticipated effective date of the rule, June 30, 2019.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The department is correcting a date in the *Code*.

3 CSR 10-9.220 Wildlife Confinement Standards

(3) Cages, pens, or other enclosures of individuals permitted to hold cervids shall meet the standards and requirements provided in this section:

(B) Right-of-way.

1. The fence right-of-way shall be cleared of woody vegetation less than six inch (6") diameter at breast height for a minimum distance of six feet (6') on the outside of the fence on land(s) under his/her control and six feet (6') on the inside of the fencing. For enclosures and additions constructed after June 30, 2019, the fence right-of-way shall be cleared of all woody vegetation for a minimum distance of six feet (6') on the outside and the inside of the fencing.

2. All dead trees with a height greater than the distance to the fence on land(s) under his/her control shall be felled.

Division 20—Division of Learning Services
Chapter 100—Office of Quality Schools

ORDER OF RULEMAKING

By the authority vested in the State Board of Education (board) under

section 161.092, RSMo 2016, the board amends a rule as follows:

5 CSR 20-100.190 Graduation Requirements for Students in Public High Schools **is amended.**

A notice of proposed rulemaking containing the text of the proposed amendment was published in the *Missouri Register* on December 17, 2018 (43 MoReg 3780). No changes have been made in the text of the proposed amendment, so it is not reprinted here. This proposed amendment becomes effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Code of State Regulations*.

SUMMARY OF COMMENTS: No comments were received.

Division 20—Division of Learning Services
Chapter 100—Office of Quality Schools

ORDER OF RULEMAKING

By the authority vested in the State Board of Education (board) under sections 160.400–160.425, RSMo 2016 and RSMo Supp. 2018, and section 161.092, RSMo 2016, the board amends a rule as follows:

5 CSR 20-100.260 is amended.

A notice of proposed rulemaking containing the text of the proposed amendment was published in the *Missouri Register* on January 2, 2019 (44 MoReg 74–79). Those sections with changes are reprinted here. This proposed amendment becomes effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Code of State Regulations*.

SUMMARY OF COMMENTS: The board received four (4) comments on the proposed amendment.

COMMENT #1: The National Association of Charter School Authorizers suggested that six (6) key terms be defined at their first usage in the text.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (department) amends section (3) to include the definition for charter contract. Of the five (5) additional terms, three (3) are in common usage and require no definition within the rule. The remaining two (2) terms are not definable within the text without editing beyond the scope of this amendment. No other changes have been made to the rule as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #2: The National Association of Charter School Authorizers suggests that language in section (2) implies that sponsors may have the option not to accept charter applications, “To the extent the sponsor is accepting applications,” and further argues that this is in conflict with a plain reading of the charter law.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The department agrees with this comment and will amend section (2) to eliminate the language.

COMMENT #3: The National Association of Charter School Authorizers recommended that if key terms were defined as suggested in comment 1, subsections (2)(C) and (2)(D) should be amended to avoid a second explanation of the term.

RESPONSE: No changes have been made to the rule as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #4: The National Association of Charter School

Authorizers suggested the department review statutory references in paragraph (4)(K)2. and subsection (5)(G). The comment specifically suggests that paragraph (4)(K)2. be amended to reflect the language of the statute, “financial interest statements” rather than “ethics commission paperwork”. Further, the comment encourages the inclusion of the proper statutory references in subsection (5)(G).

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The department agrees with these comments and will amend paragraph (4)(K)2. and subsection (5)(G).

5 CSR 20-100.260 Standards for Charter Sponsorship

(2) Standard 2—Application Process and Decision Making. The sponsor implements a comprehensive application process that includes clear application materials and guidance; follows fair, transparent procedures, timelines, and rigorous evaluation criteria; and approves only those charter applications that demonstrate a strong capacity to establish and operate quality charter schools. The sponsor shall—

(3) Standard 3—Charter Contract. Charter contract is defined as a document, executed by the sponsor and the school, which is separate from the charter application that clearly articulates the rights and responsibilities of each party regarding charter school autonomy, expected outcomes, measures for evaluating success or failure, performance consequences based on the annual performance report, and other material terms. In accordance with section 160.400.11(3), RSMo, the sponsor executes a charter contract with each charter school that articulates the rights and responsibilities of each party regarding: school autonomy, funding, administration and oversight, outcomes, the measures for evaluating success or failure, performance consequences, and other material terms. The sponsor shall—

(4) Standard 4—Ongoing Oversight and Evaluation. The sponsor conducts charter school oversight that evaluates charter school performance; monitors charter school compliance with both federal and state statutes and regulations; ensures charter school autonomy; protects student rights; informs charter school intervention, probation, revocation, and renewal decisions; and provides annual public reports on charter school performance. The sponsor shall—

(K) Monitor the charter school board’s compliance with various governance-related laws, including, but not limited to—

1. Retention of necessary board records as required by the general record retention schedule and the public school record retention schedule as outlined in section 109.255, RSMo;

2. Submission of financial interest statements annually as outlined in sections 105.483, 105.485, and 105.492, RSMo;

3. Maintenance of conflict of interest policies and procedures to address prohibited conflicts as outlined in section 160.400.15, RSMo;

4. Maintenance of a policy to promptly address parent or guardian grievances, as outlined in section 160.405.1(13), RSMo; and

5. Conduct of board and committee business in a manner outlined in the Missouri Sunshine Laws, sections 610.010-610.030, RSMo; and

(5) Standard 5—Fiscal Oversight. The sponsor monitors the charter school’s financial performance and compliance with fiduciary provisions in statute. The sponsor shall—

(G) Ensure that charter schools submit the Annual Secretary of the Board Report (ASBR) and an annual independent financial audit to the department in the timeframe outlined by Missouri statute and verify that no conflict of interest exists between the financial auditor and the person or persons who prepared the ASBR as outlined in 160.417 and 162.821, RSMo.

SUMMARY OF COMMENTS: No comments were received.

By the authority vested in the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services under section 192.006, RSMo 2016, and section 192.380, RSMo Supp. 2017, the department adopts a rule as follows:

19 CSR 20-60.010 is adopted.

A notice of proposed rulemaking containing the text of the proposed rule was published in the *Missouri Register* on February 1, 2019 (44 MoReg 567–571). Changes have been made in the text of the proposed rule, so it is reprinted here. This proposed rule becomes effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Code of State Regulations*.

SUMMARY OF COMMENTS: The Department of Health and Senior Services received three (3) letters with fourteen (14) comments.

COMMENT #1: Matthew Keppler with the March of Dimes requests that the department not list the specific version of LOCATe in rule to allow the department flexibility in using the most updated version of the tool and to avoid having to amend the rule when a new version of the LOCATe tool is available.

RESPONSE: The department incorporated by reference the LOCATe tool in the proposed rule. The department is required by section 536.031.4, RSMo to fully identify the incorporated material by publisher, address and date in order to identify the document referenced in the rule and to specify how a copy of the document may be obtained. The department is required to notify the public of the version that it incorporated by reference. If a new version is published, then the department may amend the rule to reflect this change. No changes were made as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #2: Matthew Keppler with the March of Dimes supports the way the department allowed flexibility in the section of the rule requiring the neonatal level of care designations to be based upon the most current American Academy of Pediatrics standards as well as the maternal level of care to be based upon the most current American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists and Society for Maternal-Fetal Medicine standards.

RESPONSE: No changes were made as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #3: Matthew Keppler with the March of Dimes strongly supports independent verification of the neonatal and maternal levels of care by either the department, the American Academy of Pediatrics, or the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists.

RESPONSE: No changes were made as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #4: Matthew Keppler with the March of Dimes recommends the independent verification in the rule be changed from every three (3) years to annual verification because the level of care is self-reported by each birthing facility through LOCATe.

RESPONSE: The department will monitor the verification process and determine if it is appropriate to decrease the number of years between verification reviews in the future. No changes were made as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #5: Jessica Pabst with SSM Health commented that this is a very broad rule and while SSM Health supports improving care for moms and babies, SSM Health wonders what the next steps are to determine how these levels of care will be used.

RESPONSE: The department created this rule as a result of the enactment of section 192.380, RSMo in 2017. The creation of these levels of care is a place to start and the department will work with the legislature on the next steps to improve maternal and neonatal care in the future. No changes were made as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #6: Jessica Pabst with SSM Health asked in her comment who will be involved with formulating a plan/rules. SSM Health would like to be involved as it has experience in other states and is the perinatal hub for the southern Illinois region.

RESPONSE: The department was given authority in section 192.380, RSMo to promulgate this rule to create levels of maternal and neonatal care. The department held several community meetings and listened to the public, including hospitals, before creating this rule. Even though this rule is in the current process of being promulgated, the department will continue to listen to hospitals as this rule is implemented and determine if any changes need to be made to the rule in the future. No changes were made as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #7: Jessica Pabst with SSM Health asked in her comment letter how this rule will be enforced.

RESPONSE: The department will conduct verification reviews as set forth in this rule to determine if the hospitals have self-reported the correct levels of maternal and neonatal care designations. No changes

were made as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #8: Jessica Pabst with SSM Health asked in her comment letter how the outcomes will be followed.

RESPONSE: This rule creates the levels of designations for maternal and neonatal care. Further, there is a verification piece to this rule to ensure that the hospitals are appropriately determining their levels of maternal and neonatal care designations. Section 192.380, RSMo, which gives the department the statutory authority to create this rule, does not currently contain requirements that will be conducive to measure outcomes. The department will work with the legislature and make changes in the future to this rule if additional requirements are mandated that will allow for outcomes to be analyzed. No changes were made as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #9: Jessica Pabst with SSM Health asked in her comment letter what quality measures/standards of care will be included in the finished rule.

RESPONSE: The rule that was filed is the foundation for the requirements for this rule. There will be no other quality measures/standards of care added at this time. Section 192.380, RSMo, provides the department with the statutory authority of what can be included in this rule. No changes were made as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #10: Sarah Willson with the Missouri Hospital Association commented that the American Academy of Pediatrics is not currently designating hospitals as neonatal centers and does not have plans to do so at this time.

RESPONSE: The department held community meetings throughout Missouri as required by section 192.380, RSMo, and listened to the public, including hospitals, about the requirements of section 192.380, RSMo, and what to include in this rule. The majority of commenters at these meetings wanted there to be a verification process in this rule and for the verification reviews to be conducted by others than just the department. The American Academy of Pediatrics is the only organization that conducts neonatal levels of care reviews at this time. Although the American Academy of Pediatrics is focused currently on states other than Missouri, the department included this option in the rule to allow for hospitals to work with the American Academy of Pediatrics in the future for such reviews. No changes were made as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #11: Sarah Willson with the Missouri Hospital Association commented that the costs for verification reviews to be conducted by the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists is cost prohibitive for most hospitals.

RESPONSE: The department included the option for verification reviews of levels of maternal care to be conducted by the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists because the majority of commenters at the community meetings wanted options other than just the department to conduct the reviews. The department included the average costs in its fiscal note and projected that very few hospitals would select this option due to the cost for such reviews. No changes were made as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #12: Sarah Willson with the Missouri Hospital Association commented that the lack of specificity as to how and who within the department will verify designation raises concerns.

RESPONSE: The rule explains the facility shall have the results of their LOCATe assessment and level of care designations verified by the department, American Academy of Pediatrics, or the American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists once every three (3) years. Thus, the department will review the facility's LOCATe assessment to ensure that it is appropriate to the facility and to the facility's designation self-reported to the department. The review will simply confirm the contents of the LOCATe assessment. This type of verification is not the extensive process that the department typically administers to its licensees and to hospitals it designates under the

Time Critical Diagnosis program that requires details about what to expect during a survey. Further, the department does not typically specify who within the department will conduct the programs as the person and the part of the department conducting the verification process might change due to budgetary changes. No changes were made as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #13: Sarah Willson with the Missouri Hospital Association commented that hospitals expressed concern that the LOCATe tool does not contain a data dictionary. The lack of a data dictionary is concerning because of the subjective nature of answering the questions within the LOCATe tool.

RESPONSE: The LOCATe tool is the only tool currently available that provides the guidance needed to assist the birthing facilities in determining their levels of maternal and neonatal care designations. This tool has been created by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The department has passed this concern on to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and will continue to work with the birthing facilities to answer their questions about the utilization of this tool. No changes were made as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #14: Sarah Willson with the Missouri Hospital Association recommended that the department should change the annual assessment for the birthing centers to become a tri-annual assessment with any changes in care capabilities to be submitted to DHSS.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The department agrees with this comment. The department will amend the rule to allow for submission of LOCATe assessments to be due every three (3) years. The department will require the birthing facility to use LOCATe to reassess its maternal or neonatal designation if it experiences a change in its care capability as determined by LOCATe and to send in a completed LOCATe assessment to the department within thirty (30) days of such change. As a result of this comment, the department amended sections (2) and (4) of this rule to change the annual assessment to a tri-annual assessment with changes to be submitted to the department within thirty (30) days of the change. The department also deleted section (6) as it is no longer needed with the changes made to section (2) and renumbered section (7).

COMMENT #15: Upon its own comment, the department recommends that the Division of Community and Public Health be added to the address where the birthing facilities send the LOCATe assessment. This will ensure that the proper division receives the LOCATe assessments.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: As a result of this comment, the department added the Division of Community and Public Health in section (2) to the address of where the birthing facilities will send the LOCATe assessment.

19 CSR 20-60.010 Levels of Maternal and Neonatal Care Designations

(2) By January 31, 2019, each birthing facility shall complete the CDC Maternal and Neonatal Levels of Care Assessment Tool (LOCATe) based upon the assessment of the facility as of December 31, 2018. Each birthing facility shall use LOCATe to reassess its designation as of December 31st preceding the due date of January 31 every three (3) years. The completed assessment shall be sent to the department at the address listed below by January 31 every three (3) years. If at any time, the birthing facility has any change to its maternal or neonatal care capability that will affect its maternal or neonatal care designation as determined by LOCATe, then the birthing facility shall use LOCATe to reassess its designation and send a completed assessment to the department at the address listed below within thirty (30) days of the change. The LOCATe tool (version 0.8.0) is incorporated by reference in this rule as published by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and available at

www.health.mo.gov. This rule does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions. Completed assessments shall be sent to the Department of Health and Senior Services, Division of Community and Public Health, PO Box 570, Jefferson City, MO 65102-0570.

(4) Each birthing facility shall have the results of their LOCATe assessment and level of care designations verified by the department, AAP, or ACOG once every three (3) years. When submitting the LOCATe assessment every three (3) years, birthing facilities shall notify the department in writing about how they will have their results verified.

(6) The department may initiate a review and monitor compliance with the provisions set forth in this rule at any time. The department will provide written notification to a birthing facility if it finds that verification does not match the self-designated levels of care.

He stated he felt licensing would “weed out” a lot of inexperienced contractors who come from other states and take jobs from Missouri’s workforce.

RESPONSE: The division appreciates this comment. No changes have been made to the rule(s) as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #2: Michael Hurlbert, with the St. Charles County Government, commented that there is no definition for “licensee” or “electrical contracting” - both terms are used throughout the rules. RESPONSE: The division considered the comment and has elected not to make any changes as the statute, 324.900, RSMo, contains definitions for “license holder” and “electrical contracting.”

SUMMARY OF COMMENTS: The division received one (1) comment on the proposed rule from a single individual.

COMMENT #1: Michael Hurlbert, with the St. Charles County Government, commented on subsection (1)(A) stating it is unclear as to whether an entity other than the contractor (i.e. the state of Missouri; political subdivision) should be either an additional insured or certificate holder on the liability insurance coverage required under this subsection. As is, this insurance coverage requirement does not provide the necessary protections to the state or political subdivisions (against cancellations, priority in claims, etc.).
RESPONSE: The proposed regulation mirrors the statutory language

of section 324.920, RSMo and does not give the division authority to alter. No changes have been made to the proposed language text as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #2: Michael Hurlbert, with the St. Charles County Government, commented on subsection (1)(A) stating the second to last sentence in this paragraph seems to be incomplete, ending with “licensed to do business” commonly followed by “in the state of Missouri”, but this is missing.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The division considered this comment and agrees it can be clarified. The phrase “licensed to do business” has been replaced with “authorized to engage in the business of insurance in the state of Missouri.”

COMMENT #3: Michael Hurlbert, with the St. Charles County Government, commented on subsection (1)(B) stating it is unclear as to the type of bond would satisfy this requirement and who the beneficiary would be on the bond. Also unclear as to what it means for the required bonds to “have been posted”. As is, this bond coverage requirement provides no meaningful protection to the state or political subdivisions.

RESPONSE: The proposed regulation mirrors the statutory language of section 324.920, RSMo and does not give the division authority to alter. No changes have been made to the proposed language text as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #4: Michael Hurlbert, with the St. Charles County Government, commented on paragraph (1)(D)5. stating it references “licensing entity” without defining the term.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The division considered by comment and agrees the language could be modified to provide addition clarification. The phrase “licensing entity” has been replaced with “the issuing licensing entity”. Additionally, as a result of the comment, the division is also changing the language in (2)(C), (2)(D), (3)(C), and (3)(D).

(1) To apply for a statewide electrical contractor license, the applicant must submit the division provided application form, pay any applicable fees, and submit proof of the following:

(A) Liability insurance of at least five hundred thousand dollars (\$500,000) in the form of a Certificate of Insurance issued by an insurance company authorized to engage in the business of insurance in the state of Missouri. A Certificate of Insurance issued by an agent is not acceptable;

(D) Having one (1) or more of the following education and/or experience:

1. Twelve thousand (12,000) verifiable practical hours installing equipment and associated wiring;

2. Ten thousand (10,000) verifiable practical hours installing equipment and associated wiring and evidence of receipt of an electrical journeyman certificate from a United States Department of Labor-approved electrical apprenticeship program;

3. Eight thousand (8,000) verifiable practical hours installing equipment and associated wiring and evidence of receipt of an associate’s degree from a state-accredited program;

4. Four thousand (4,000) verifiable practical hours supervising the installation of equipment and associated wiring and evidence of receipt of a qualified four (4) year electrical engineering degree; or

A copy of an electrical contractor or master electrician occupational or business license issued by any Missouri political subdivision that has been current and active for six (6) of the previous eight (8) years. RESPONSE: The division reviewed the comment in relation to the statute. The proposed regulation mirrors the language set out in section 324.920.3, RSMo. It provides that the license holder, the qualifier, can be qualifier for only one (1) company. Nothing in the rules or statutes prohibits an individual electrician from being an employee of more than one (1) company. No changes have been made to the proposed language text as a result of this comment.

This paragraph makes a simple notification procedure the basis for potentially wiping off a licensee’s responsibility for finishing jobs under outstanding permits—all at the detriment of the client for whom the job is being performed through no fault of the client. The section fails to address consequences to the failure to notify and deeming jobs cleared when are still outstanding.

RESPONSE: Section 324.935.3, RSMo sets out the seventy-two-(72-) hour requirement addressed in the comment and as a result the division is not able to modify the timeframe. The division has no authority to determine whether an outstanding permit has been cleared by the local political subdivision. The division will use the information regarding whether a licensee has cleared outstanding permits only for the purpose of determining whether that licensee will be able to register his/her license with a new employer. All control over local permits remains at the local level. If a licensee fails to clear permits before moving to a new employer, that would give the division cause to discipline that licensee per section 324.940, RSMo. No changes have been made to the text of the proposed language as a result of this comment.

suspension of all work by any licensee within a local jurisdiction for any reason. Lastly stated that it does not provide what happens when a political subdivision’s suspension decision is overturned by the state. Presents liability to the political subdivisions for suspension decisions that would not get overturned.

RESPONSE: The division reviewed the comments received. The division’s authority in the statute relates only to licenses issued by the division. The division does not have authority to act upon a matter relating to a suspension taken by a political subdivision against a licensed contractor that is not licensed by the state. As a result the reference in the regulatory language relates to licenses issued by the state. No changes have been made to the proposed language text as a result of this comment.

Regarding the statement relating to suspension, the statute does not give the division the authority to “overturn” a suspension by a local political subdivision. Section 324.925.3 clearly leaves local code enforcement with the local political subdivisions. However, it does allow a political subdivision to suspend a licensee’s right to do work in that political subdivision while the division determines whether there is cause to discipline under section 324.940, RSMo. No changes have been made to the proposed language text as a result of this comment.
