Each department of state government is assigned a title. Each agency or division in the department is assigned a division number. The agency then groups its rules into general subject matter areas called chapters and specific areas called rules. Within a rule, the first breakdown is called a section and is designated as (1). Subsection is (A) with further breakdown into paragraphs 1., subparagraphs A., parts (I), subparts (a), items I. and subitems a.

The rule is properly cited by using the full citation; for example, 3 CSR 10-4.115, NOT Rule 10-4.115.

Citations of RSMo are to the *Missouri Revised Statutes* as of the date indicated.

Rules appearing under this heading are filed under the authority granted by section 536.025, RSMo. An emergency rule may be adopted by an agency if the agency finds that an immediate danger to the public health, safety, or welfare, or a compelling governmental interest requires emergency action; follows procedures best calculated to assure fairness to all interested persons and parties under the circumstances; follows procedures which comply with the protections extended by the *Missouri* and the *United States Constitutions*; limits the scope of such rule to the circumstances creating an emergency and requiring emergency procedure, and at the time of or prior to the adoption of such rule files with the secretary of state the text of the rule together with the specific facts, reasons, and findings which support its conclusion that there is an immediate danger to the public health, safety, or welfare which can be met only through the adoption of such rule and its reasons for concluding that the procedure employed is fair to all interested persons and parties under the circumstances.

Rules filed as emergency rules may be effective not less than ten (10) business days after filing or at such later date as may be specified in the rule and may be terminated at any time by the state agency by filing an order with the secretary of state fixing the date of such termination, which order shall be published by the secretary of state in the *Missouri Register* as soon as practicable.

All emergency rules must state the period during which they are in effect, and in no case can they be in effect more than one hundred eighty (180) calendar days or thirty (30) legislative days, whichever period is longer. Emergency rules are not renewable, although an agency may at any time adopt an identical rule under the normal rulemaking procedures.

ORDER TERMINATING EMERGENCY AMENDMENT

By the authority vested in the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services under section 192.020, RSMo 2016, the department hereby terminates an emergency amendment effective April 1, 2022, as follows:

19 CSR 20-20.020 Reporting Infectious, Contagious, Communicable, or Dangerous Diseases is **terminated**.

Division 2150—State Board of Registration for the Healing Arts Chapter 5—General Rules

EMERGENCY AMENDMENT

20 CSR 2150-5.100 Collaborative Practice Arrangement with

Nurses. The board is amending subsection (2)(B).

PURPOSE: The amendment changes the mileage limitation for services provided in any Missouri correction center.

EMERGENCY STATEMENT: The Missouri State Board of Registration for the Healing Arts and the Missouri State Board of Nursing (boards) find that an immediate danger to the public health, safety or welfare, particularly to the health, safety, and welfare of Missouri's incarcerated population, requires emergency action by increasing the mileage restrictions to two hundred (200) miles for service received in a Missouri correctional center. The mileage restriction directly impacts access to healthcare providers, which can lead to rescheduled or missed appointments, delayed care, and missed or delayed medication use. These consequences lead to poorer management of chronic illness and thus poorer health outcomes.

Additionally, this emergency amendment is necessary to preserve a compelling governmental interest that requires an early effective date by addressing the access of Missouri's incarcerated population to healthcare to improve health outcomes, reduce health disparities, and lower healthcare expenditures. The boards believe that procedures best calculated to assure fairness to all interested persons and parties in that the mileage restrictions have been discussed at the Missouri State Board of Registration for the Healing Arts board meeting on March 21, 2022 and the Missouri State Board of Nursing's March 22, 2022 mail ballot board meeting which provided adequate public notice for the proposed amendment. This emergency amendment limits its scope to the circumstances creating the emergency and complies with the protections extended by the *Missouri* and *United States Constitutions*. The board believes this emergency amendment to be fair to all interested persons and parties under the circumstances. This emergency amendment was filed March 28, 2022, becomes effective April 11, 2022, and expires October 7, 2022.

(2) Geographic Areas.

(B) The following shall apply in the use of a collaborative practice arrangement by an APRN who provides health care services that include the diagnosis and initiation of treatment for acutely or chronically ill or injured persons:

1. If the APRN is providing services pursuant to section 335.175, RSMo, no mileage limitation shall apply;

2. If the APRN is not providing services pursuant to section 335.175, RSMo, the collaborating physician and collaborating APRN shall practice within seventy-five (75) miles by road of one another; *and*

3. If the APRN is providing services in any Missouri correctional center, as defined in section 217.010, RSMo, the collaborating physician and collaborating APRN shall practice within two hundred (200) miles by road of one another; *and*

[3.]4. Pursuant to section 630.875, RSMo, an APRN collaborating with a physician who is waiver-certified for the use of buprenorphine, may participate in the "Improved Access to Treatment for Opioid Addictions Program" (IATOAP) in any area of the state and provide all services and functions of an APRN. A remote collaborating physician working with an on-site APRN shall be considered to be on-site for the purposes of IATOAP.

EMERGENCY AMENDMENT**

20 CSR 2200-4.200 Collaborative Practice. The board is amending section (2).

PURPOSE: The amendment changes the mileage limitation for services provided in any Missouri correction center.

EMERGENCY STATEMENT: The Missouri State Board of Registration for the Healing Arts and the Missouri State Board of Nursing (boards) find that an immediate danger to the public health, safety or welfare requires emergency action by increasing the mileage restrictions to two hundred (200) miles for service received in a Missouri correctional center. The mileage restriction directly impacts access to healthcare providers which can lead to rescheduled or missed appointments, delayed care, and missed or delayed medication use. These consequences lead to poorer management of chronic illness and thus poorer health outcomes.

Additionally, this emergency amendment is necessary to preserve a compelling governmental interest that requires an early effective date by addressing the public's access to healthcare to improve health outcomes, reduced health disparities, and lower healthcare expenditures. When Missourians have access to primary healthcare services and resources, their health problems are detected and treated earlier. The boards believe that procedures best calculated to assure fairness to all interested persons and parties in that the mileage restrictions have been discussed at the Missouri State Board of Registration for the Healing Arts board meeting on March 21, 2022 and the Missouri State Board of Nursing's March 22, 2022 mail ballot board meeting which provided adequate public notice for the proposed amendment. This emergency amendment limits its scope to the circumstances creating the emergency and complies with the protections extended by the Missouri and United States Constitutions. The board believes this emergency amendment to be fair to all interested persons and parties under the circumstances. This emergency amendment was filed March 28, 2022, becomes effective April 11, 2022, and expires October 7, 2022.

Under this heading will appear the text of proposed rules and changes. The notice of proposed rulemaking is required to contain an explanation of any new rule or any change in an existing rule and the reasons therefor. This is set out in the Purpose section with each rule. Also required is a citation to the legal authority to make rules. This appears following the text of the rule, after the word "Authority."

Entirely new rules are printed without any special symbology under the heading of proposed rule. If an existing rule is to be amended or rescinded, it will have a heading of proposed amendment or proposed rescission. Rules which are proposed to be amended will have new matter printed in boldface type and matter to be deleted placed in brackets.

An important function of the *Missouri Register* is to solicit and encourage public participation in the rulemaking process. The law provides that for every proposed rule, amendment, or rescission there must be a notice that anyone may comment on the proposed action. This comment may take different forms.

If an agency is required by statute to hold a public hearing before making any new rules, then a Notice of Public Hearing will appear following the text of the rule. Hearing dates must be at least thirty (30) days after publication of the notice in the *Missouri Register*. If no hearing is planned or required, the agency must give a Notice to Submit Comments. This allows anyone to file statements in support of or in opposition to the proposed action with the agency within a specified time, no less than thirty (30) days after publication of the notice in the *Missouri Register*.

An agency may hold a public hearing on a rule even though not required by law to hold one. If an agency allows comments to be received following the hearing date, the close of comments date will be used as the beginning day in the ninety- (90-) day-count necessary for the filing of the order of rulemaking.

If an agency decides to hold a public hearing after planning not to, it must withdraw the earlier notice and file a new notice of proposed rulemaking and schedule a hearing for a date not less than thirty (30) days from the date of publication of the new notice.

Division 10—Commissioner of Higher Education
Chapter 12—Interstate Reciprocity**

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

6 CSR 10-12.010 State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement.
The division is amending sections (1)-(4).

PURPOSE: This amendment updates the rule to correspond to the new procedures required by the State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement.

(1) Definitions.

(A) "Accredited" means holding institutional accreditation by name as a U.S.-based institution from an accreditor recognized by the U.S. Department of Education and whose scope of recognition includes distance education.

(C) "Authorized" means holding a current valid charter, license, or other written document issued by a state, the federal government, or a recognized Indian tribe, granting the named entity the authority to issue degrees and operate within a state or jurisdiction as a **post-secondary institution**.

(J) "Distance education" means instruction offered by any means where the student and faculty member are in separate physical locations. It includes, but is not limited to, online, interactive video, or correspondence courses or programs. **To be eligible for delivery under SARA policies, distance education must be offered under the oversight and authority of a SARA member state from a facility location in a SARA member state.**

(L) "Home state" means a **SARA-member state** where the institution holds its legal domicile *[for purposes of]*, **state authorization, and accreditation**. To operate under SARA an institution must have a single home state.

(M) "Host state" means a member state in which an institution operates under the terms of *[this agreement]* **SARA**, other than the home state.

(R) "NC-SARA" is the National Council for State Authorization Reciprocity Agreements, which exists to coordinate the SARA work of the regional compacts, member states, and participating institutions to maximize the efficiency of the SARA initiative.

[(R)](S) "Non-degree award" means a formal postsecondary award that does not carry the designation of *[A]* **associate degree or higher**.

[(S)](T) "Operate" means activities conducted by an institution in support of offering distance education degree or non-degree courses or programs in a state, including, but not limited to, instruction, marketing, recruiting, tutoring, field experiences, and other student support services.

[(T)](U) "Physical presence" means a measure by which a state defines the status of an educational institution's presence within the state. *[An institution or an] A SARA-participating institution's* program meeting one (1) or more of the criteria for physical presence must meet the non-SARA requirements to operate legally in the state of Missouri.

1. Physical presence includes—

A. A physical location for groups of *[five (5) or]* **more than ten (10)** students to receive synchronous or asynchronous instruction;

B. A requirement for students to meet in a location for instructional purposes more than twice per quarter or semester for a total of more than six (6) contact or clock hours;

C. Administrative office spaces for instructional and non-instructional staff;

D. A physical site on behalf of an institution from which prospective students may receive information regarding enrollment or students may receive support services;

E. Short courses or seminars that require more than twenty (20) contact hours **in a six-month period**; or

F. A mailing address or phone exchange within the state.

2. An institution is not considered to have a physical presence and therefore eligible for purposes of participation in SARA if it only—

A. Advertises via print, billboard, mail, or electronic media;

B. Offers courses of programs on military bases and enrollment is restricted to federal employees and their family members;

C. Maintains a server, router, or similar device in a facility that otherwise would not constitute a physical presence;

D. Employs faculty or other academic personnel who reside in the state;

E. Holds proctored exams at a Missouri location on behalf of the institution;

F. Recruits for a distance education program;

G. Participates in a consortia agreement to offer academic programs among SARA institutions and approved by each participating

institution;

H. Has a contractual arrangement with the home or host state; or

I. Offers students educational field experiences or limited supervised field experiences in Missouri. Field experiences originating from campus-based programs are considered distance education for the purposes of participation in SARA if they place *[fewer]* **no more** than ten (10) students *[per program cohort and do not involve multi-year contracts between the institution and a location within the host state]* **from an academic program simultaneously at one (1) clinical or practicum site.**

[(U)](V) “Portal agency” or “portal entity” means the single agency designated by each SARA member state to serve as the interstate point of contact for SARA questions, complaints, and other communications. The Missouri Department of Higher Education and Workforce Development is the portal agency for the state of Missouri.

[(V)](W) “Regional compact” means the New England Board of Higher Education, Midwestern Higher Education Compact, Southern Regional Education Board, or Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education. The Midwestern Higher Education Compact is the regional compact to which Missouri is a signatory.

[(W)](X) “SARA” means the State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement, which is an agreement among member states, districts, and territories that establishes comparable national standards for interstate offering of postsecondary distance education courses and programs.

[(X)](Y) “State” means any state, commonwealth, district, or organized territory of the United States.

[(Y)](Z) “Supervised field experience” means a student learning experience under the oversight of a supervisor, mentor, faculty member, or other qualified professional, located in the host state, who has a direct or indirect reporting responsibility to the institution where the student is enrolled, whether or not credit is granted. Examples include practica, student teaching, or internships. Independent off-campus study by individual students not engaged in a supervised field experience does not constitute a physical presence of a postsecondary institution in a SARA member state.

(AA) “Unified Agreement” or “Unified State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement” means the document adopted by the four regional compacts and affirmed by NC-SARA on December 1, 2015. The Unified Agreement is the foundational basis for the operation of SARA.

(2) Responsibilities of the Missouri Department of Higher Education *[(MDHE)]* and Workforce Development (DHEWD).

(A) Consistent with Midwest State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (M-SARA) requirements, *[(MDHE)]* DHEWD shall—

1. Serve as the primary point of contact for Missouri institutions participating in SARA for any issues that may arise between the institution and other SARA member states **or SARA participating schools;**

2. Serve as the point of contact for all other SARA member states and their agencies for questions about SARA within Missouri;

3. Determine whether a Missouri institution is eligible for participation in SARA, and lead any investigations regarding whether an institution is in compliance with SARA *[rules and]* policies; and

4. Serve as the contact point for complaints about any institutions in the state that are operating under SARA.

(B) *[(MDHE)]* DHEWD will require each Missouri applicant institution to apply for state approval *[using the standard SARA institutional application including the agreement to operate under the C-RAC guidelines].*

(C) *[(MDHE)]* DHEWD will review applications for renewal of approval to participate in SARA *[on an annual basis]* **prior to expiration of current approval.**

(D) *[(MDHE will)]* DHEWD may recommend, and the Coordinating

Board for Higher Education (CBHE) *[will]* **may** approve, an annual fee schedule that provides sufficient funds to cover the administrative costs for oversight of SARA.

(E) *[(MDHE)]* DHEWD will verify institutional accreditation by an accrediting body recognized by the U.S. Department of Education. Such accreditation is considered by *[(MDHE)]* DHEWD to be sufficient initial evidence of academic quality for approving institutions for participation in SARA.

(F) *[(MDHE)]* DHEWD will accept applications from accredited degree-granting institutions of all sectors. *[Applications are approved based on the same criteria regardless of sector]* **DHEWD will not accept institutions for participation that are pre-accredited or in a candidacy status.**

(G) For non-public institutions **participating in Title IV**, *[(MDHE)]* DHEWD will accept *[an]* a USDE-calculated institutional federal financial responsibility rating of 1.5 or above as sufficient evidence of financial stability to qualify for participation in SARA.

(H) In the event an institution does not participate in federal Title IV financial aid, and therefore has no federal financial responsibility rating, *[(MDHE)]* DHEWD will *[calculate]* **accept a calculation of this rating *[before allowing an]* from the institution’s most recently completed financial statements by a certified, independent accountant in order to evaluate the institution to participate in SARA.**

1. For an institution with a financial responsibility rating of 1.0 to 1.4, *[(MDHE)]* **but meeting all other criteria**, DHEWD will consider the institution for participation in SARA if the institution provides one (1) of the following:

A. A performance bond or irrevocable letter of credit in an amount equivalent to the unearned tuition of SARA students; or

B. Evidence and commitment of sufficient financial resources available to the institution to meet the above requirement.

2. *[(MDHE)]* DHEWD will not consider an initial or renewal application for participation in SARA from an institution with a financial responsibility rating less than 1.0.

(I) In the event of an unanticipated closure or natural disaster impacting a campus, *[(MDHE)]* DHEWD will work with the institution to develop and approve a plan for the protection of student records. All Missouri institutions participating in SARA must agree to provide a comprehensive plan for providing students with opportunities to complete their education program and for preservation of student records upon request from the *[(MDHE)]* DHEWD.

(J) Institutions denied initial or renewal participation in SARA shall have thirty (30) days after receipt of the denial to send a written appeal to the Commissioner of Higher Education identifying the areas on non-compliance by the department with Missouri regulations and/or SARA policies. In the event the denial is upheld, the institution may appeal the denial within thirty (30) calendar days to the Midwestern Higher Education Compact SARA Regional Steering Committee. The decision of the Steering Committee will be final.

(3) Institutional Responsibilities.

(A) Missouri institutions seeking participation in SARA must hold proper authorization from Missouri to offer postsecondary education, hold **institutional** accreditation from an accrediting association recognized by the U.S. Department of Education, and maintain minimally accepted financial responsibility scores. *[(See Responsibilities of MDHE)]*

(B) Any Missouri institution operating under SARA that offers courses or programs potentially leading to professional licensure must *[keep]* **satisfy all SARA policies and all federal requirements for disclosures. Missouri institutions must inform** all students and potential students *[informed]* **enrolled or seeking enrollment in such programs** as to whether such offerings actually meet *[state]* licensing requirements **in the state in which the student is located. A[n] dated e[-]mail** dedicated solely to this purpose and sent to the student’s best known e[-]mail address meets *[this]* **the**

state requirement. The institution should use other means to notify the student if needed. **DHEWD may require institutions to provide documentation of such notification. Loss of SARA eligibility of the course or program offered will result for failure to provide proper notice in one (1) of the two (2) ways listed below:**

1. The institution will notify the applicant or student in writing that the institution has determined the course or program meets the requirements for professional licensure in the state where the applicant or student *[resides]* is located; or

2. The institution will notify the applicant or student in writing that the institution cannot confirm the course or program meets requirements for professional licensure in the *[student's]* state in which the student is located. The institution must provide the student with current contact information for any applicable licensing boards and advise the student to determine whether the program meets requirements for licensure in the state where the student *[resides]* is located. Such contact information may include, but is not limited to, the current, active website of the applicable licensing board.

(C) In order to maintain approval, an institution must agree to—

1. Abide by the *[Interregional Guidelines for the Evaluation of Distance Education adopted by the Council of Regional Accrediting Commissions, as summarized below:*

A. *Online learning is appropriate to the institution's mission and purposes;*

B. *The institution's plans for developing, sustaining, and, if appropriate, expanding online learning offerings are integrated into its regular planning and evaluation processes;*

C. *Online learning is incorporated into the institution's systems of governance and academic oversight;*

D. *Curricula for the institution's online learning offerings are coherent, cohesive, and comparable in academic rigor to programs offered in traditional instructional formats;*

E. *The institution evaluates the effectiveness of its online learning offerings, including the extent to which the online learning goals are achieved, and uses the results of its evaluations to enhance the attainment of the goals;*

F. *Faculty responsible for delivering the online learning curricula and evaluating students' success in achieving the online learning goals are appropriately qualified and effectively supported;*

G. *The institution provides effective student and academic services to support students enrolled in online learning offerings;*

H. *The institution provides sufficient resources to support and, if appropriate, expand its online learning offerings; and*

I. *The institution assures the integrity of its online offerings]* **C-RAC Guidelines;**

2. Be responsible for the actions of any third-party providers used by the institution to engage in operations under SARA;

3. Notify *[MDHE] DHEWD* of any negative changes to its accreditation status or financial stability;

4. Provide data necessary to monitor SARA activities, as determined by *[MDHE] DHEWD*;

5. Submit annual participation fees as appropriate to National Council for State Authorization Reciprocity Agreements (NC-SARA) and *[MDHE] DHEWD*;

6. Make the institution and *[MDHE's]* the department's complaint resolution policies readily available to applicants and students for coursework under SARA provisions. Readily available in this context means published as part of the institution's catalog or student handbook and/or published on the institution's website;

7. Work with *[MDHE] DHEWD* to resolve any complaints arising from its students in SARA states and to abide by decisions of *[MDHE] DHEWD*. Complaints must follow the institution's customary resolution procedure prior to being referred to *[MDHE under SARA procedures] DHEWD*. Under SARA, *[MDHE] DHEWD*

will not accept complaints more than two (2) years after the incident, complaints regarding grade appeals, or appeals related to student conduct violations. Complaints concerning criminal misconduct should be filed directly with local law enforcement authorities. Complaints relating to violations of federal law should be filed directly with the federal agency having jurisdiction over the matter in question (e.g., complaints regarding federal financial aid should be filed with the U.S. Department of Education); and

8. Agree, in cases where the institution cannot fully deliver the instruction for which a student has contracted, to provide a reasonable alternative, as determined by *[MDHE] DHEWD*, for delivering the instruction or reasonable financial compensation, as determined by *[MDHE] DHEWD*, for the education the student did not receive.

(4) **Complaint Process.**

(A) If *[MDHE] DHEWD* receives a complaint about a Missouri institution relating to SARA, the complainant will be contacted by *[MDHE staff (Academic Affairs or Proprietary School Certification, as appropriate)] DHEWD* to determine if the complainant has exhausted the grievance process at the institution.

(B) If the institutional grievance process has been completed, *[MDHE] DHEWD* will *[provide appropriate forms to file a formal]* notify the complainant to submit a formal written complaint against the institution. If the complainant has not utilized the institutional remedies available, the individual will be directed to contact the institution to seek resolution.

(C) The formal complaint *[must be submitted in writing using the form provided by MDHE. The complaint]* may be mailed or *[faxed]* submitted electronically and must include supporting materials as well as documentation verifying institutional remedies have been exhausted. *[MDHE staff will acknowledge receipt of the formal complaint in writing.]*

(D) *[SARA-related complaints that fall within the jurisdiction of the department will be investigated and resolved as appropriate by the relevant unit of MDHE. SARA applies solely to those complaints resulting from distance education courses offered by participating institutions to students in other SARA states. It does not apply to distance education activity inside Missouri or to on-ground campuses] DHEWD will investigate formal complaints of dishonest or fraudulent activity by the state's SARA-participating institutions regarding violations of state regulations, SARA policies, or any general purpose consumer protection laws in the state.* Complaints concerning criminal misconduct will be referred to local law enforcement authorities. Complaints relating to violations of federal law will be referred to the federal agency having jurisdiction over the matter in question.

(E) Institutions will provide a response to the complaint within ten (10) working days of official notification by *[MDHE] DHEWD*.

(F) All parties to the complaint will be notified of its resolution by mail. **The decision of the DHEWD is final.**

(G) *[MDHE] DHEWD* will keep a log of all formal complaints, record the date received, the name of the complainant, the institution against which the complaint is made, a brief description of the complaint, and the date and nature of its disposition.

Training or Service**

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

6 CSR 10-13.010 Educational Credit for Military Training or Service. The division is amending sections (1) and (3).

PURPOSE: This amendment updates rule references to the American Council on Education Military Guide, corrects the department name, and updates the procedures for how credit for military training or service will be treated according to the department's transfer and articulation rule.

(1) Definitions.

(B) The term "educational credit" or "credit" shall refer to those credits *[that are]* awarded to students for prior military service or training, and *[can be applied]* which may apply toward the requirements of a certificate, licensure, diploma, or degree at a public institution.

(C) The term "prior military training or service" shall refer to any prior service or training that may be eligible for educational credit as determined by the public institution. These include, but are not limited to:

1. University coursework completed during military service;
2. Examinations, such as the College Level Examination Program (CLEP), and the CLEP portion of the **Defense Activity for Non-Traditional Education Support (DANTES)** Language School; and
3. Military courses *[that have been]* developed and taught by military personnel.

[(D) The term "American Council on Education (ACE)" refers to the coordinating body for the nation's institutions of higher education. They provide institutions with recommendations on evaluating and awarding educational credits for college or university-level learning earned through prior military service or training.]

(3) Guidelines for Awarding Educational Credit for Military Service or Training.

(A) Prior military service or training takes many forms, therefore all public institutions of higher education in the state shall refer to the recommendations provided by the American Council on Education (ACE) *[Guide to the Evaluation of Educational Experiences in the Armed Services]* **Military Guide**, or its successor document, when evaluating and awarding educational credits for prior military service or training.

(B) While public institutions should evaluate veterans' military transcripts to determine whether prior military service or training meets educational requirements, they should also provide opportunities whereby such students may be evaluated for educational credits. These include, but are not limited to, nationally recognized examinations, course-specific examinations designed by college or university faculty, and/or portfolio or other means of competence demonstration. Public institutions should also document *[which]* the **earning of credits** *[may be earned through which evaluation method]* through the institutional evaluation.

(C) Public institutions should work to award students~~[,]~~ who are also veterans~~[,]~~ with credits that fulfill major degree requirements whenever possible, if *[such courses are equivalent to]* that student's prior military service or training **is equivalent in content or experience to courses at the institution**. Otherwise, **the institution should give** appropriate credit *[should be given]* to fulfill a general education requirement or other elective course.

(D) Any credits awarded to a student whose prior military service or training has been deemed equivalent for such credits shall *[be transferable among all public institutions of higher education according to]* be treated in the same manner as they would for **native students in accordance with** the Department of Higher Education and Workforce Development's transfer and articulation rule at 6 CSR 10-3.020.

(E) Students who are also veterans should consult with registrars and/or academic advisors in an effort to determine whether their prior military service or training fulfills any certificate, course, or major requirements. These students should also provide any necessary supporting documentation *[to be used]* for use in the evaluation of prior experience by the college or university he or she attends.

(F) Public institutions should disseminate information regarding the awarding of educational credits for prior military service or training, which includes information on course equivalencies, the number of credits awarded, and **education opportunities** *[to be evaluated]* for such credit. This information should be easily accessible and made available to all current and prospective students.

(G) All credit *[that is]* deemed acceptable must meet the scope and mission of the awarding public institution.

(2) An inspector/mechanic must have at least one (1) year~~['s]~~ of practical experience as an automotive mechanic or must have completed a course of vocational instruction in automotive mechanics from a generally recognized educational institution, either public or private, **or must have successfully completed the Motor Vehicle**

Inspection Field Training Program of the Missouri State Highway Patrol. All inspector/mechanics must be at least seventeen (17) years of age and able to read the written instructions.

11 CSR 50-2.150 Brake Performance. The division is amending subsection (1)(B) of the rule.

PURPOSE: This amendment updates instructions for the performance of the stop and drive test on commercial vehicles.

(1) A brake performance test shall be performed by an inspector/mechanic on all single unit motor vehicles equipped with mechanical, hydraulic, or power assisted hydraulic service brakes. The brake performance test may be conducted by using any one (1) of the following procedures: a decelerometer test, a drive and stop test, a brake testing machine, or a dynamometer test. The selected test shall be conducted on the inspection station premises.

(B) Drive and Stop Test. The inspector/mechanic shall operate the vehicle at a speed of five to twenty (5–/–20) mph and apply the service brakes firmly. **In lieu of operating a commercial vehicle presented for inspection, the inspector/mechanic may observe the drive and stop test as it is performed by the presenter.**

1. Reject vehicle if:—

A. The vehicle's brakes fail to function or if the vehicle pulls significantly to either side.

11 CSR 50-2.170 Air and Vacuum Brake Systems. The division is amending subsection (2)(A) of the rule and is restructuring the rule into paragraphs (2)(A)1.-11., providing inspection procedures, and (2)(B)1.-13., providing rejection criteria.

PURPOSE: This amendment updates inspection procedures for air brakes to conform with inspection procedures used by the Missouri State Highway Patrol Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Division.

(2) Vehicles With an Air Brake System.

(A) The following [will] **inspection procedures** apply to all motor vehicles equipped by the manufacturer with an air brake system.[:
[Open all drain cocks in system until pressure gauge reads zero (0). Close drain cocks and run engine at fast idle. Record time to raise air pressure from fifty to ninety pounds per square inch (50–90 psi) on gauge. Observe gauge pressure at which light or buzzer on low pressure indicator goes out or off. Continue running engine and observe gauge pressure when governor cuts out. With engine idling, make a series of brake applications and observe gauge pressure when governor cuts in. With fully charged system, stop engine and record pressure drop in psi per minute with brakes fully applied. With fully charged system, stop engine and record pressure drop in psi per minute with brakes released. Make a series of brake applications until low pressure warning signal operates. Stop engine and make one (1) full brake application. With fully charged system, stop engine and make one (1) full brake application. Measure drop in reservoir pressure. Inspect all air hoses and connections. Inspect lines for contact with frame, axles or exhaust system. Inspect for leaks that may be heard from valves, diaphragms and piston cups. Inspect air safety valve. Inspect condition of compressor drive belts.]

1. With the engine running, ensure the brake system's air pressure is ninety to one hundred pounds per square inch (90–100 psi);

2. Shut the engine off and place the key in the auxiliary position;

3. Make one (1) brake and hold application to observe whether air pressure is maintained;

4. Complete a series of brake applications until the low-pressure warning light and/or buzzer operates. Continue brake applications until reaching fifty pounds per square inch (50 psi);

5. Start the engine and observe if the time to build air pressure from fifty to ninety pounds per square inch (50 to 90 psi) exceeds five (5) minutes;

6. Ensure the brake system reaches a full charge without exceeding one hundred twenty-five pounds per square inch (125 psi);

7. Inspect all air hoses and connections;

8. Inspect lines for contact with frame, axles, or exhaust system;

9. Inspect for leaks that may be heard from valves, diaphragms, and piston cups;

10. Inspect air safety valve; and

11. Inspect condition of compressor drive belts.

[1.](B) Reject vehicle if:—

[A.]1. Time required to build pressure from fifty to ninety (50–90) psi [at fast idle is more than] exceeds five (5) minutes;

[B.]2. Low pressure warning light and/or buzzer fails to function when pressure is lowered to between fifty to seventy (50–70) psi;

[C.]3. Governor cut-out pressure [is higher than] exceeds one hundred twenty-five (125) psi;

[D.]4. Governor cut-in pressure is lower than eighty (80) psi;

[E.]5. Leakage in psi per minute exceeds three (3) psi for single vehicles and four (4) psi for combination of two (2) vehicles with brakes applied;

[F.]6. Leakage in psi per minute exceeds two (2) psi for single vehicles and three (3) psi for combination of two (2) vehicles with brakes released;

[G.]7. Air reserve is not sufficient to permit one (1) full brake application after engine is stopped;

[H.]8. Reservoir pressure is lowered more than twenty percent (20%) of first reading;

[I.]9. Leaks, breaks, crimps, or cracks in the air hoses, tubes, or connections are present;

[J.]10. Lines are being rubbed by moving parts or are touching the exhaust system;

[K.]11. Leaks in valves, diaphragms, or piston cups can be heard;

[L.]12. Air safety valve does not operate; or

[M.]13. Compressor drive belts are badly worn or loose.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

11 CSR 50-2.320 School Bus Inspection. The division is amending sections (1)–(3), (5), (7), (10), (11), (16), (19), and (20)–(23).

PURPOSE: This amendment updates inspection procedures, rejection criteria, and out of service criteria for the inspection of school buses, adds inspection criteria specific to Head Start school buses to align the rule with recent updates to Missouri Revised Statutes, addresses the inspection of exhaust and fuel systems on all-electric and alternative fuel vehicles, and corrects spelling and grammar errors and verbiage conflicts throughout the rule.

(1) The standards and procedures prescribed for the inspection of a motor vehicle as set out in [the] **Motor Vehicle Inspection** rules [of the **Motor Vehicle Inspection Division**,] shall apply to [T]ypes A–D school buses. In addition, the items listed in this rule will be

inspected on all school buses.

(2) Lighting Equipment and [Signalling] **Signaling** Devices.

(B) Identification Lamps. School buses shall be equipped with identification lamps, except school buses less than eighty inches (80") in width. Three (3) red lamps shall be mounted in the center rear body and three (3) amber lamps in the center front [of] body. Lamps shall be mounted on the roof and centered in a cluster. Lamps may be connected to headlamp switch.

(C) Intermediate Side Marker Lamps. School buses manufactured after July 1972[,] and over thirty feet (30') in length shall be equipped with an intermediate side marker lamp. One (1) amber side marker lamp shall be located on each side between the front and rear marker lamps. Lamps may be connected to the headlamp switch.

(F) Front and Rear Red Warning Flashers. School buses shall be equipped with two (2) [seal-beam] alternately flashing red lights and two (2) [seal-beam] alternately flashing amber lights on the front and rear of the vehicle. This eight- (8-)[-] lamp system shall be controlled by a manually operated switch. Under no circumstances are these lamps to be connected with the braking system. Lamps must flash at a rate of sixty to one hundred twenty (60–120) cycles per minute. The "on" cycle shall be long enough to permit the filament to come up to full brightness. The lens of each alternately flashing signal[ing] lamp shall be at least five inches (5") in diameter. The area extending outward approximately three inches (3") from each lens shall be painted black.

(H) Reflectors. School buses shall be equipped with two (2) red reflectors on the rear as far apart as possible[.]—One (1) red reflector on each side as far to the rear as possible and one (1) amber reflector on each side as far forward as possible. School buses over thirty feet (30') in length shall have one (1) additional amber reflector on each side midway between the front and rear side reflector.

(I) Observe Function of Lights and [Signalling] **Signaling** Devices.

1. Reject vehicle if:[-]

A. Not equipped with required lights, reflectors, and [sig-nalling] **signaling** devices;

B. Any lighting device or reflector is obstructed;

C. Any required light, reflector, or [signalling] **signaling** device fails to function properly;

D. Any light, reflector, or [signalling] **signaling** device is not securely mounted;

E. Any light, reflector, or [signalling] **signaling** device shows a color contrary to these regulations;

F. A lens or reflector is badly broken or if any part is missing or [is] incorrectly installed;

G. The rear stop signal arm contains any words or images on the forward-facing side.

(3) Lettering and Signs.

(A) School buses shall have on the front and rear or on signs attached to them the words SCHOOL BUS plainly visible in black letters at least eight inches (8") in height. **Head Start school buses may, instead, be identified with the words HEAD START.** School buses shall have displayed on the rear in plain and distinct black letters the following: STATE LAW: STOP WHILE BUS IS LOADING AND UNLOADING. The letters in the words STATE LAW: STOP shall be at least five inches (5") and the letters in the other words at least three inches (3") in height. District-owned school buses shall display on each side the name and number of the school district in black letters at least three inches (3") in height. **Buses owned by Head Start agencies shall display the agency name in black letters at least three inches (3") in height.** Buses manufactured prior to October 1, 1981, may display the school district name and number with national school bus yellow lettering. Privately[-] owned school buses and privately owned **Head Start school buses** shall display on each side, in a conspicuous location, the name and address of the owner in black letters at least two inches (2") in height with a stroke

of not less than one-quarter of an inch (1/4") wide. Signs or stickers on the rear of the bus not relating to school bus flashing signal lamps, railroad stop procedures, or other similar safety messages are prohibited.

(5) Exhaust System. **All-electric school buses or those with alternative fuel types manufactured absent of exhaust components shall not be rejected due to the absence of such components.**

(7) Bumper.

(D) Reject vehicle if [:-]—

1. Not equipped with proper bumpers;
2. A bumper is loosely attached *[or if a broken or torn portion is protruding, creating a hazard; or if the improper attachment permits the hitching of rides; or]*, is improperly mounted or constructed, or exceeds the allowable height limit;
3. A broken or torn portion is protruding, creating a hazard;
4. **Improper attachment permits the hitching of rides; or**
[3./5. The bus is equipped with a trailer hitch or similar device which *[will permit]* permits the hitching of rides.

(10) Seat Belts.

(B) Reject vehicle if *[not equipped with:]*

1. *Operative seat belt; or*
 2. *Proper retractor.]—*
1. **Not equipped with an operable seat belt in the driver's seating position;**
 2. **A properly functioning retractor is not present;**
 3. **The driver's seat is not securely attached to the vehicle;**
- or
4. **The driver's seat cannot maintain a stable position.**

(11) Emergency Equipment.

(C) Reject vehicle if *[not equipped with:]—*

1. *[A]* **Not equipped with a proper fire extinguisher which is easily removable and properly charged or if the fire extinguisher is not mounted in the driver's compartment;**
2. *[A]* **Not equipped with a proper first-aid kit or if the first aid kit is not mounted in the driver's compartment; or**
3. The proper emergency warning devices are not present.

(16) Fuel Systems. **All-electric school buses or those with alternative fuel types manufactured absent of fuel system components will not be rejected due to absence of such components.**

(19) Glazing. **In addition to the inspection of glazing pursuant to 11 CSR 50-2.270, all side and rear windows as well as service door glazing will be inspected on school buses.**

(B) Reject *[any school bus that has]* if there is outright breakage *[of glass]* at any location.

(20) Crossing Control Arm.

(A) After August 1, 1998, every school bus operated to transport students in the public school system, which has a gross vehicle weight rating (GVWR) of more than ten thousand (10,000) pounds, the engine mounted entirely in front of the windshield, and the entrance door behind the front wheels, shall be equipped with a crossing control arm. The arm shall be constructed of noncorrosive and nonferrous material, mounted on the right side of the front bumper of the bus, extending a minimum sixty-six inches (66") when extended, and activated by the same controls which activate the mechanical and electrical *[signalling]* signaling devices.

(B) Inspect the crossing control arm.

(C) Reject *[the]* vehicle if [:-]—

1. Bus is not equipped as required;
2. Arm is not constructed of a noncorrosive or nonferrous material;

3. Arm is not mounted in the proper location;
4. Arm does not extend as close to perpendicular to the bumper as possible when opened;
5. Arm has sharp edges or projections that could cause hazard or injury to students;
6. Arm does not extend a minimum of sixty-six inches (66") when fully extended;
7. Arm does not operate properly when the stop signal arm and overhead warning flashers are activated; or
8. The manual bypass switch allows for more than one override of the system's functions.

(21) Frame.

(B) Reject *[any school bus if there are any unrepaired visible cracks.] if—*

1. **There are any unrepaired visible cracks; or**
2. **Any bolt or screw designed to secure the bus body to the frame is missing or is loose to hand pressure.**

(22) Compartment Condition.

(C) Reject vehicle if *[compartment]—*

1. **Compartment** contains any sharp-edged tears or holes in the compartment walls, floors, doors, or ceiling[.]; or
2. **Any area within the compartment is not in good repair.**

(23) Out-of-Service Criteria. The following *[items]* defects will result in buses being *[put]* placed out[-] of[-] service by Missouri State Highway Patrol personnel until needed repairs are made. *[These] Out-of-service criteria [will be used only by Missouri State Highway Patrol personnel and]* are not applicable at official inspection stations:

- (A) *[If there is a]*Any major exhaust leak in the exhaust system *[which]* that dumps exhaust in front of the rear axle;
- (B) *[If there are m]*Major steering or suspension defects;
- (C) *[If there are m]*Major brake defects;
- (D) *[If the stop signal arm is inoperative]* **Inoperative stop signal arm;**
- (E) *[If the f]*Front or rear tires *[have]* with knots or exposed cord, or *[the]* tread depth *[is]* less than four-thirty-seconds inch (4/32") on *[the]* a front tire[s] or less than two-thirty-seconds inch (2/32") on *[the]* a rear tire[s], when measured at any point on a major tread groove;
- (F) *[If a]*Any tire is flat or has a noticeable leak (e.g., can be heard or felt);
- (G) *[If a]*Any emergency door is inoperable from either the inside or outside or any other emergency exit fails to open;
- (H) *[If the r]*Red overhead warning flashers are inoperative;
- (I) *[If t]*The one-half inch (1/2") hex nut attached to one (1) end of a one-eighth inch (1/8") drawstring catches on the handrail and lodges between the handrail mounting bracket and the sheet metal body of the bus or the drawstring catches during the handrail drawstring test;
- (J) *[If]***The bus is not equipped with crossing control arm, [as] when required, or [if] the crossing control arm does not operate when the stop signal arm and overhead warning flashers are activated;**
- (K) **The engine starts with any emergency door or exit locked;**
- (L) **All stoplights fail to function;**
- [(K)](M)* *[If fuel is leaking]* **Fuel leaks** from any part of the fuel system; or
- [(L)](N)* *[If t]*The frame has any unrepaired visible cracks.

Division 2250—Missouri Real Estate Commission
Chapter 8—Business Conduct and Practice**

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

20 CSR 2250-8.070 Advertising. The commissions is adding new section (5) and renumbering as necessary.

PURPOSE: This amendment enacts legislative changes effective August 28, 2021 that restricts real estate advertisement by unlicensed entities and use of certain terms that leads the general public to believe the unlicensed entity is a licensed real estate firm.

(5) No licensee or group of licensees shall advertise as a real estate company in any manner, or use any name, team name, or other term that could be construed by members of the public as the advertiser being a real estate partnership, company, brokerage, or business entity, unless the advertiser holds a valid appropriate entity license.

(A) Such terms include use of the words realty, brokerage, company, or other terms that may be construed as a real estate entity.

(B) The context of the advertisement or solicitation may be considered by the commission when determining whether a licensee has committed a violation. When the licensee's or group of licensee's name includes or incorporates the name of the broker/brokerage with whom the licensee or group of licensee's is currently affiliated, the use of the words realty, brokerage, or company in the licensee's fictitious name shall not constitute a violation of subsection (5)(A) above when these words are used to refer to or identify the licensee's affiliation with the broker/brokerage.

(C) A licensee or group of licensees that are not entities under Chapter 339, RSMo, who want to advertise with the licensee's or group's fictitious name, should file with the secretary of state a registered fictitious name that is owned by the broker/brokerage in which the licensee or group of licensees are affiliated. The registration of a fictitious name with the Missouri Secretary of State's Office does not exempt a licensee or group of licensees from the requirements of 20 CSR 2250-8.070(3) or subsection (5)(A) above.

[(5)](6) Guaranteed Sales.

(A) As used in this rule, the term guaranteed sales plan includes, but is not limited to:

[i)]1. [a]Any plan in which a seller's real estate is guaranteed to be sold,; or

[ii)]2. [a]Any plan where a licensee or anyone affiliated with a licensee will purchase a seller's real estate if it is not purchased by a third party in the specified period of a listing or within some other specified period of time.

(B) Any written advertisement by a licensee of a guaranteed sales plan shall include a statement advising the seller that if the seller is eligible, costs and conditions may apply and advising the seller to inquire of the licensee as to the terms of the guaranteed sales agreement. This information shall be set forth in print at least one-fourth (1/4) as large as the largest print in the advertisement.

(C) Any radio or television advertisement by a licensee of a guaranteed sales plan shall include a conspicuous statement advising if any conditions and limitations apply.

(D) Every guaranteed sales agreement must be in writing and contain all of the conditions and other terms under which the property is guaranteed to be sold or purchased, including the charges or other costs for the service or plan, the price for which the property will be sold or purchased, and the approximate net proceeds the seller may reasonably expect to receive.

Division 10—Conservation Commission
Chapter 7—Wildlife Code: Hunting: Seasons, Methods,
Limits**

ORDER OF RULEMAKING

By the authority vested in the Conservation Commission under sections 40 and 45 of Art. IV, Mo. Const., the commission amends a rule as follows:

3 CSR 10-7.440 is amended.

This rule establishes hunting seasons and limits and is exempted by section 536.021, RSMo 2016, from the requirement for filing as a proposed amendment.

The Department of Conservation amended 3 CSR 10-7.440 by establishing seasons and limits for hunting migratory game birds and waterfowl during the 2022-2023 seasons.

3 CSR 10-7.440 Migratory Game Birds and Waterfowl: Seasons, Limits

PURPOSE: The Department of Conservation is authorized to select waterfowl hunting season dates and bag limits within frameworks established by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The seasons and limits selected are intended to provide optimum hunting opportunity consistent with the welfare of the species.

(1) Migratory game birds and waterfowl may be taken, possessed, transported, and stored only as provided in federal regulations and

this Code.

(2) The head or one (1) fully feathered wing must remain attached to all waterfowl while being transported from the field to one's home or a commercial preservation facility.

(3) Seasons and limits are as follows:

(A) Mourning doves, Eurasian collared-doves, and white-winged doves may be taken from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset from September 1 through November 29. Limits: fifteen (15) doves daily in the aggregate; forty-five (45) in possession;

(B) Sora and Virginia rails may be taken from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset from September 1 through November 9. Limits: twenty-five (25) rails daily in the aggregate; seventy-five (75) in possession;

(C) Woodcock may be taken from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset from October 15 through November 28. Limits: three (3) woodcock daily; nine (9) in possession;

(D) Wilson's snipe may be taken from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset from September 1 through December 16. Limits: eight (8) snipe daily; twenty-four (24) in possession;

(E) Blue-winged, green-winged, and cinnamon teal may be taken from sunrise to sunset from September 10 through September 25. Limits: six (6) teal daily in the aggregate; eighteen (18) in possession.

(F) Waterfowl Zones: The North Zone shall be that portion of Missouri north of a line running west from the Illinois border on I-70; west on I-70 to U.S. Hwy. 65; north on U.S. Hwy. 65 to Mo. Hwy. 41; north on Mo. Hwy. 41 to U.S. Hwy. 24; west on U.S. Hwy. 24 to Mo. Hwy. 10; west on Mo. Hwy. 10 to U.S. Hwy. 69; north on U.S. Hwy. 69 to Mo. Hwy. 116; west on Mo. Hwy. 116 to U.S. Hwy. 59; south on U.S. Hwy. 59 to the Kansas border. The South Zone shall be that portion of Missouri south of a line running west from the Illinois border on Mo. Hwy. 74 to Mo. Hwy. 25; south on Mo. Hwy. 25 to U.S. Hwy. 62; west on U.S. Hwy. 62 to Mo. Hwy. 53; north on Mo. Hwy. 53 to Mo. Hwy. 51; north on Mo. Hwy. 51 to U.S. Hwy. 60; west on U.S. Hwy. 60 to Mo. Hwy. 21; north on Mo. Hwy. 21 to Mo. Hwy. 72; west on Mo. Hwy. 72 to Mo. Hwy. 32; west on Mo. Hwy. 32 to U.S. Hwy. 65; north on U.S. Hwy. 65 to U.S. Hwy. 54; west on U.S. Hwy. 54 to the Kansas border. The Middle Zone shall be the remainder of Missouri not included in other zones.

(G) During years when the federal framework prescribes a sixty-(60-) day duck season, the North Zone season will open on the Saturday nearest October 31, the Middle Zone season will open on the first Saturday in November for nine (9) days, close for five (5) days, and then re-open for fifty-one (51) days, the South Zone season will open on Thanksgiving Day for four (4) days, close through December 6, and then reopen December 7 through January 31 (as late as the federal framework allows). During years when the federal framework prescribes a forty-five- (45-) day duck season or thirty-(30-) day duck season, no season date formula will be used. A person possessing the appropriate state and federal permits may take ducks in accordance to the season lengths, bag limits, and species-specific opening and closing dates established annually by the Conservation Commission.

(H) Ducks and coots may be taken from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset as follows:

1. Ducks and coots may be taken from October 29 through December 27 in the North Zone; from November 5 through November 13 and November 19 through January 8 in the Middle Zone; and from November 24 through November 27 and December 7 through January 31 in the South Zone; and

2. Duck and coot limits are as follows: The daily bag limit of ducks is six (6) and may include no more than four (4) mallards (no more than two (2) of which may be female), three (3) wood ducks,

two (2) redheads, two (2) hooded mergansers, one (1) pintail, one (1) mottled duck, two (2) canvasback, and two (2) black ducks. The possession limit is eighteen (18), including no more than twelve (12) mallards (no more than six (6) of which may be female), nine (9) wood ducks, six (6) redheads, six (6) hooded mergansers, three (3) pintails, three (3) mottled ducks, six (6) canvasbacks, and six (6) black ducks. The daily limit of scoup is two (2) and a possession limit for scoup is six (6) in the North Zone from October 29 through December 12, in the Middle Zone November 5 through November 13 and November 19 through December 24, and in the South Zone November 24 through November 27 and December 7 through January 16. The daily limit of scoup is one (1) and a possession limit for scoup is three (3) in the North Zone December 13 through December 27, in the Middle Zone December 25 through January 8 and in the South Zone January 17 through January 31. The daily limit of coots is fifteen (15) and the possession limit for coots is forty-five (45).

(I) Geese may be taken from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset as follows:

1. Blue, snow, and Ross's geese may be taken from November 11 through February 6 statewide;

2. White-fronted geese may be taken from November 11 through February 6 statewide;

3. Canada geese and brant may be taken from October 1 through October 9 and from November 11 through February 6 statewide; and

4. Goose limits are as follows: The daily bag limit is three (3) Canada geese and brant in aggregate, twenty (20) blue, snow, or Ross's geese, and two (2) white-fronted geese, statewide. The possession limit is nine (9) Canada geese and brant in aggregate and six (6) white-fronted geese. There is no possession limit for blue, snow, and Ross's geese;

(J) Ducks, geese, brant, and coots may be taken by youth hunters fifteen (15) years of age or younger from October 22 through October 23 in the North Zone; from October 22 through October 23 in the Middle Zone; and from November 19 through November 20 in the South Zone. The daily and possession limits for ducks, geese, and coots are the same as during the regular duck, goose, and coot hunting seasons. Any person fifteen (15) years or younger may participate in the youth waterfowl hunting days without permit provided they are in the immediate presence of an adult eighteen (18) years of age or older. If the youth hunter does not possess a hunter education certificate card, the adult must be properly licensed (i.e., must meet any permit requirements that allow small game hunting) and have in their possession a valid hunter education certificate card unless they were born before January 1, 1967. The adult may not hunt ducks but may participate in other seasons that are open on the special youth days;

(K) Shells possessed or used while hunting waterfowl and coots statewide, and for other wildlife as designated by posting on public areas, must be loaded with material approved as nontoxic by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

(L) Persons who possess a valid Conservation Order permit may chase, pursue, and take blue, snow, and Ross's geese from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to one-half (1/2) hour after sunset from February 7 through April 30. Any other regulation notwithstanding, methods for the taking of blue, snow, and Ross's geese include using shotguns capable of holding more than three (3) shells, and with the use or aid of recorded or electrically amplified bird calls or sounds, or recorded or electrically amplified imitations of bird calls or sounds. An exception to the above permit requirement includes any person fifteen (15) years of age or younger, provided either 1) the person is in the immediate presence of a properly licensed adult (must possess a Conservation Order permit) who is eighteen (18) years of age or older and has in their possession a valid hunter education certificate card, or was born before January 1, 1967, or 2) the person possesses a valid hunter education certificate card. A daily bag limit will not be in effect February 7 through April 30 (See 3 CSR 10-5.436 and 3 CSR 10-5.567 for Conservation Order Permit requirements); and

(M) Migratory game birds, to include only doves, ducks, mergansers, and coots, may be taken by hunters with birds of prey as follows (See 3 CSR 10-9.442 for additional provisions about falconry including season lengths and limits for wildlife other than migratory game birds. See 3 CSR 10-9.440 for falconry permit requirements):

1. Doves may be taken from September 1 through December 16 from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset. Daily limit: three (3) doves; possession limit: nine (9) doves, except that any waterfowl taken by falconers must be included within these limits; and

2. Ducks, mergansers, and coots may be taken from sunrise to sunset from September 10 through September 25 statewide, and from one-half (1/2) hour before sunrise to sunset as follows: in the North Zone, October 22 through October 23, October 29 through December 27, and February 10 through March 10; in the Middle Zone, October 22 through October 23, November 5 through November 13, November 19 through January 8, and February 10 through March 10; and, in the South Zone, November 19 through November 20, November 24 through November 27, December 7 through January 31, and February 10 through March 10. Daily limit: three (3) birds singly or in the aggregate, including doves; possession limit: nine (9) birds singly or in the aggregate, including doves.

ORDER OF RULEMAKING

By the authority vested in the Conservation Commission under sections 40 and 45 of Art. IV, Mo. Const., the commission amends a rule as follows:

3 CSR 10-7.450 Furbearers: Hunting Seasons, Methods is amended.

A notice of proposed rulemaking containing the text of the proposed amendment was published in the *Missouri Register* on January 18, 2022 (47 MoReg 67-68). No changes have been made in the text of the proposed amendment, so it is not reprinted here. This proposed amendment becomes effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Code of State Regulations*.

SUMMARY OF COMMENTS: The Conservation Commission received comments from three hundred ninety-two (392) individuals and three (3) organizations on the proposed amendment.

COMMENT #1: The commission received comment from three hundred twelve (312) individuals and one (1) organization who voiced general support for proposed changes to this rule.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who voiced support for the regulation changes.

COMMENT #2: The commission received comment from seventeen (17) individuals who voiced general support for proposed changes to

this rule, and who stated night vision/thermal imagery should be expanded for coyotes year-round and/or extended to other furbearer species such as raccoons, opossums, and skunks.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who voiced support for the regulation. An extension of night vision/thermal imagery was not considered as part of this review. The existing timeframe when night vision/thermal imagery is allowed provides ample opportunity to harvest coyotes at a time when there is less potential for impacts to other species.

COMMENT #3: The commission received comment from forty (40) individuals who voiced general support for proposed changes to this rule, and who offered alternative extended season dates or requested a bounty on various furbearer species.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who voiced support for the regulation. The proposed season date structure was established to provide additional opportunity at other times of year and was designed to lessen potential impacts on dependent young. As with all harvest-related regulations, the department will continue to monitor furbearer populations and public input and would review possible changes to furbearer season timing should a need arise. The department did not consider the implementation of a bounty system as these have been shown to be ineffective, costly, and would likely be less desirable to many constituents.

COMMENT #4: The commission received comment from eleven (11) individuals who voiced general opposition to proposed changes to this rule.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who provided input.

COMMENT #5: The commission received comment from two (2) individuals who voiced opposition to proposed changes to this rule, and who stated night vision/thermal imagery should be expanded for coyotes year-round.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who provided input. An extension of night vision/thermal imagery was not considered as part of this review. The existing timeframe when night vision/thermal imagery is allowed provides ample opportunity to harvest coyotes at a time when there is less potential for impacts to other species.

COMMENT #6: The commission received comment from nine (9) individuals who voiced opposition to proposed changes to this rule, citing concerns of the limited value of furs, unweaned young, and/or wanton waste.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who provided input. The department considered many factors that influence the timing of trapping seasons and proposed to allow opportunity outside of the traditional fur harvest season (the time when furs are of the highest value). The proposed season timing attempts to lessen the impacts to dependent young. Additionally, allowing opportunity outside of the traditional fur harvest will enable individuals more opportunity to actively manage furbearer populations on their property (at a local/small scale) should they so choose. Under the existing Code framework, wanton waste rules only apply to portions of wildlife commonly used as human food and do not apply to furbearer pelts. Thus, there is no change to the wanton waste rules with the proposed amendments to furbearer harvest seasons.

COMMENT #7: The commission received comment from one (1) organization who voiced support for extending the furbearer hunting and trapping season until the end of February for raccoon, striped skunk, badger, opossum, coyote, mink, muskrat, otter, bobcat, and red and grey fox, and who voiced opposition to the proposed March 1 to April 14 and August 1 to October 15 seasons, citing concerns of the limited value of furs harvested during this time and unweaned/dependent young.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who provided input and thanks the organization for their support for a component of the pro-

posed regulation changes. The department considered many factors that influence the timing of trapping seasons and proposed to allow opportunity outside of the traditional fur harvest season (the time when furs are of the highest value). The proposed season timing attempts to lessen the impacts to dependent young. Additionally, allowing opportunity outside of the traditional fur harvest will enable individuals more opportunity to actively manage furbearer populations on their property (at a local/small scale) should they so choose. Furbearers harvested outside of the traditional fur harvest season may be used for meat. Under the existing Code framework, wanton waste rules only apply to portions of wildlife commonly used as human food and do not apply to furbearer pelts. Thus, there is no change to the wanton waste rules with the proposed amendments to furbearer harvest seasons. The department will continue to monitor furbearer populations through various metrics such as Sign Station Surveys and Bow Hunter Observation Surveys to ensure populations remain at sustainable levels. Should a need arise, the department would review furbearer harvest opportunities and make necessary adjustments to ensure harvest is sustainable. The department did not propose a season extension for badger, gray fox, or red fox, given the current population status of these species and would make necessary adjustments should the status of any other furbearer population warrant it. The proposed changes are not intended to have a direct impact on other game species at a large spatial scale but may have an impact at a small/local scale and provides individuals additional opportunity to manage perceived high furbearer populations should they so choose.

COMMENT #8: The commission received comment from one (1) organization who voiced opposition to the proposed changes to this rule based on the assessment methods used and the manner in which population estimates were figured.

RESPONSE: The department has been utilizing Sign Station Surveys and Bow Hunter Observation Surveys to monitor the overall status of furbearer populations for over thirty (30) years and these methods have served as a reliable tool for making adjustments to hunting and trapping seasons during that time period. While Sign Station Surveys and Bow Hunter Observation surveys do not provide a population estimate, both serve as independent indices of the population for which overall trends are consistent. The species for which the proposed season extension is greatest (raccoon, opossum, skunk, and coyote) have all experienced long-term population increases and can sustain additional harvest opportunity when compared to harvest/population levels from decades ago. The department will continue to monitor furbearer populations using Bow Hunter and Sign Station Surveys and will continue to explore additional ways of monitoring furbearer populations. Through this continued monitoring, the department would adjust season timing should a need arise to ensure harvest levels are sustainable. Additionally, the department did not propose any changes to the harvest seasons for badger, gray fox, and red fox due to the population status of these species.

The Department of Conservation amended 3 CSR 10-7.705 by establishing elk season dates.

3 CSR 10-7.705 Elk: Hunting Season

(1) The elk hunting season is comprised of two (2) portions within Carter, Shannon, and Reynolds counties.

(A) Archery portion: October 15 through 23, 2022; use archery methods only to take elk in open counties; firearms may not be possessed except any person may carry concealable firearms, as defined in Chapter 571, RSMo, on or about his/her person while hunting. Firearms possessed under this exception may not be used to take wildlife while archery hunting.

(B) Firearms portion: December 10 through 18, 2022; use any legal elk hunting method to take elk in open counties.

SUMMARY OF PUBLIC COMMENTS: Seasons and limits are exempted from the requirement of filing as a proposed amendment under section 536.021, RSMo 2016.

This amendment was filed March 25, 2022, becomes effective **April 15, 2022**.

3 CSR 10-7.710 Elk: Application and Draw Process

(1) Missouri residents, as defined in 3 CSR 10-5.220, may apply for elk hunting permits.

(A) Quotas for elk hunting permits are established annually by the Conservation Commission. For the 2022 season, five (5) Resident Antlered Elk Hunting Permits will be awarded. At least ten (10) percent of the Resident Antlered Elk Hunting Permit quota will be awarded annually to approved resident landowners, as defined in 3 CSR 10-20.805, whose qualifying property is in Carter, Reynolds, or Shannon Counties. If the number of qualifying landowner applicants is less than the percentage of the permits allocated for landowners, that portion of the quota not issued to a qualifying landowner will be reallocated to other applicants.

(B) To be eligible for the Resident Antlered Elk Hunting Permit(s) awarded to approved resident landowners, an application must have been submitted to and have been approved by the department as described in 3 CSR 10-7.412 prior to applying for a Resident Antlered Elk Hunting Permit.

(C) Permit Draw.

1. The application period will be from May 1-31 annually and results will be available by July 1 annually.

2. Application fee for Resident Antlered Elk Hunting Permit: ten dollars (\$10).

3. Only one (1) application is allowed per year.
4. Only one (1) person is allowed per application.
5. Persons drawn for a Resident Antlered Elk Hunting Permit will not be eligible to apply for that permit again for ten (10) years.
6. Permits are nontransferable.

SUMMARY OF PUBLIC COMMENTS: Seasons and limits are exempted from the requirement of filing as a proposed amendment under section 536.021, RSMo 2016.

At least ten (10) percent of the Resident Black Bear Hunting Permit Black Bear Management Zone-specific permit quota will be awarded annually to approved resident landowners, as defined in 3 CSR 10-20.805, whose qualifying property is in the specific Black Bear Management Zone for which they are applying. If the number of qualifying landowner applicants is less than the percentage of the permits allocated for landowners, that portion of the quota not issued to a qualifying landowner will be reallocated to other applicants. Permit quotas for the 2022 black bear season will be set as follows:

1. Bear Management Zone 1: two hundred (200) Resident Black Bear Hunting Permits.
2. Bear Management Zone 2: one hundred fifty (150) Resident Black Bear Hunting Permits.
3. Bear Management Zone 3: fifty (50) Resident Black Bear Hunting Permits.

(B) To be eligible for the Resident Black Bear Hunting Permit(s) awarded to approved resident landowners, an application must have been submitted to and have been approved by the department as described in 3 CSR 10-7.412 prior to applying for a Resident Black Bear Hunting Permit.

(C) Permit Draw.

1. The application period will be from May 1-31 annually and results will be available by July 1 annually.
2. Application fee for Resident Black Bear Hunting Permit: ten dollars (\$10).
3. Only one (1) application is allowed per year.
4. Only one (1) person is allowed per application.
5. Permits are nontransferable.

This proposed amendment becomes effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Code of State Regulations*.

SUMMARY OF COMMENTS: The Conservation Commission

received comments from one hundred nine (109) individuals and one (1) organization on the proposed amendment.

COMMENT #1: The commission received comments from one hundred one (101) individuals and one (1) organization who voiced general support for proposed changes to this rule.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who voiced support for the regulation changes.

COMMENT #2: The commission received comments from two (2) individuals who voiced general support for proposed changes to this rule, and who stated the season should be extended further into a period ranging from March through June.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who voiced support for the regulation. The proposed season date structure was established to provide additional opportunity at other times of year and was designed to lessen potential impacts on dependent young. As with all harvest-related regulations, the department will continue to monitor furbearer populations and public input and would review possible changes to furbearer season timing should a need arise.

COMMENT #3: The commission received comments from two (2) individuals who voiced general support for proposed changes to this rule, and who cited concerns bobcats and foxes may be accidentally trapped as non-target animals.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who voiced support for the regulation. All traps that would be allowed outside of the traditional fur harvest season are live traps from which any incidentally captured bobcat or fox can be released. Additionally, trappers have the ability to create sets (placement of a trap) in ways that limit the capture of non-target animals.

COMMENT #4: The commission received comments from three (3) individuals who voiced general opposition to proposed changes to this rule.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who provided input.

COMMENT #5: The commission received comments from four (4) individuals who voiced opposition to proposed changes to this rule, citing concerns of the limited value of furs, unweaned young, and/or wanton waste.

A notice of proposed rulemaking containing the text of the proposed amendment was published in the *Missouri Register* on February 1, 2022 (47 MoReg 118). No changes have been made in the text of the proposed amendment, so it is not reprinted here. This proposed amendment becomes effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Code of State Regulations*.

SUMMARY OF COMMENTS: The Conservation Commission received comments from two hundred twelve (212) individuals and two (2) organizations on the proposed amendment.

COMMENT #1: The commission received comments from one hundred eighty-two (182) individuals and one (1) organization who voiced general support for proposed changes to this rule.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who voiced support for the regulation changes.

COMMENT #2: The commission received comments from twelve (12) individuals who voiced general support for proposed changes to this rule, and who stated trapping and/or night vision/thermal imagery should be expanded for coyotes year-round and/or extended to other furbearer species; and/or requested a bounty on coyote or other furbearer species.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who provided input. An extension of night vision/thermal imagery was not considered as part of this review. The existing timeframe when night vision/thermal imagery is allowed provides ample opportunity to harvest coyotes at a time when there is less potential for impacts to other species. The department did not consider the implementation of a bounty system as these have been shown to be ineffective, costly, and would likely be less desirable to many constituents.

COMMENT #3: The commission received comments from three (3) individuals who voiced general support for proposed changes to this rule, and who suggested further extending the otter, muskrat, and fox seasons due to concerns of incidental take.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who provided input. All traps that would be allowed outside of the traditional fur harvest season are live traps from which any incidentally captured animals can be released. Further extensions of the otter and muskrat season were not done, and trappers are encouraged to utilize trapping techniques to lessen incidental take of muskrats and otters. Additionally, there was no proposed extension to the fox seasons due to the population status of both red and gray fox.

COMMENT #4: The commission received comment from one (1) individual who voiced general support for proposed changes to this rule, and who suggested youth-only trapping seasons in March and June.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who provided input. The

department considered many factors that influence the timing of trapping seasons and proposed to allow opportunity outside of the traditional fur harvest season (the time when furs are of the highest value). The proposed season timing attempts to lessen the impacts to dependent young.

COMMENT #5: The commission received comments from five (5) individuals who voiced general opposition to proposed changes to this rule.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who provided input.

COMMENT #6: The commission received comments from seven (7) individuals who voiced opposition to proposed changes to this rule, citing concerns of the limited value of furs, unweaned young, and/or wanton waste.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who provided input. The department considered many factors that influence the timing of trapping seasons and proposed to allow opportunity outside of the traditional fur harvest season (the time when furs are of the highest value). The proposed season timing attempts to lessen the impacts to dependent young. Additionally, allowing opportunity outside of the traditional fur harvest will enable individuals more opportunity to actively manage furbearer populations on their property (at a local/small scale) should they so choose. The proposed framework provides substantial increases to the length of furbearer seasons.

COMMENT #8: The commission received comment from one (1) organization who voiced support for extending the furbearer hunting and trapping season until the end of February for raccoon, striped skunk, badger, opossum, coyote, mink, muskrat, otter, bobcat, and red and grey fox, and who voiced opposition to the proposed March 1 to April 14 and August 1 to October 15 seasons, citing concerns of the limited value of furs harvested during this time and unweaned/dependent young.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who provided input. The department considered many factors that influence the timing of trapping seasons and proposed to allow opportunity outside of the traditional fur harvest season (the time when furs are of the highest value). The proposed season timing attempts to lessen the impacts to dependent young. Additionally, allowing opportunity outside of the traditional fur harvest will enable individuals more opportunity to actively manage furbearer populations on their property (at a local/small scale) should they so choose. Furbearers harvested outside of the traditional fur harvest season may be used for meat. Under the existing Code framework, wanton waste rules only apply to portions of wildlife commonly used as human food and do not apply to furbearer pelts. Thus, there is no change to the wanton waste rules with the proposed amendments to furbearer harvest seasons. The department will continue to monitor furbearer populations through

various metrics such as Sign Station Surveys and Bow Hunter Observation Surveys to ensure populations remain at sustainable levels. Should a need arise, the department would review furbearer harvest opportunities and make necessary adjustments to ensure harvest is sustainable. The department did not propose a season extension for badger, gray fox, or red fox, given the current population status of these species and would make necessary adjustments should the status of any other furbearer population warrant it. The proposed changes are not intended to have a direct impact on other game species at a large spatial scale but may have an impact at a small/local scale and provides individuals additional opportunity to manage perceived high furbearer populations should they so choose.

COMMENT #9: The commission received comment from one (1) individual who voiced opposition to the proposed changes to this rule due to the following reasons: Fur prices have a lot of influence on hunter and trapper numbers and fur harvested; weather can have a huge effect on survival rates; the size of animals competing for habitat and food; and the potential effects of other species such as birds of prey and snakes on quail and rabbit populations.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks those who provided input. The department considered many factors that influence the timing of trapping seasons and proposed to allow opportunity outside of the traditional fur harvest season (the time when furs are of the highest value). The proposed season timing attempts to lessen the impacts to dependent young. Additionally, allowing opportunity outside of the traditional fur harvest will enable individuals more opportunity to actively manage furbearer populations on their property (at a local/small scale) should they so choose. Additionally, the proposed changes are not intended to have a direct impact on other game species at a large spatial scale but may have an impact at a small/local scale and provides individuals additional opportunity to manage perceived high furbearer populations should they so choose.
