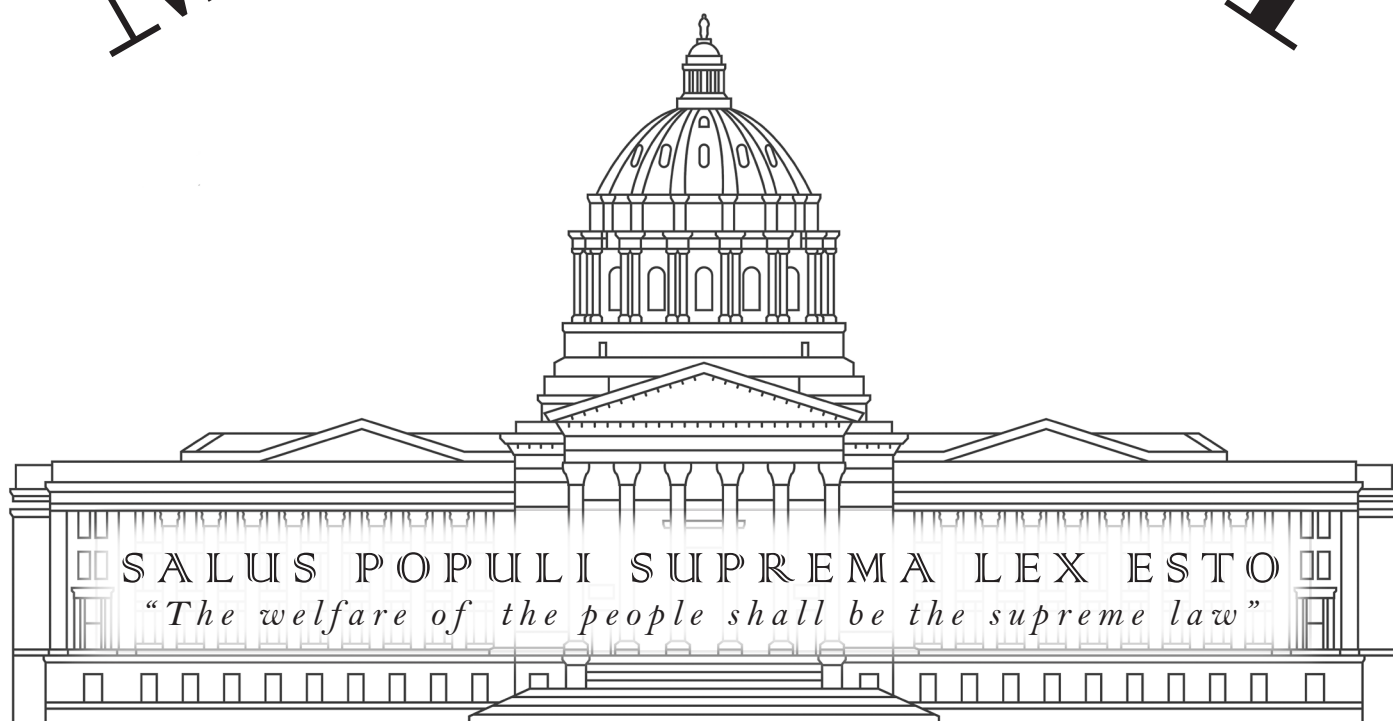

The rules are codified in the *Code of State Regulations* in this system–

and should be cited in this manner: 3 CSR 10-4.115.

Each department of state government is assigned a title. Each agency or division in the department is assigned a division number. The agency then groups its rules into general subject matter areas called chapters and specific areas called rules. Within a rule, the first breakdown is called a section and is designated as (1). Subsection is (A) with further breakdown into paragraphs 1., subparagraphs A., parts (I), subparts (a), items I. and subitems a.

The rule is properly cited by using the full citation; for example, 3 CSR 10-4.115, NOT Rule 10-4.115.

Citations of RSMo are to the *Missouri Revised Statutes* as of the date indicated.

Rules appearing under this heading are filed under the authority granted by section 536.025, RSMo. An emergency rule may be adopted by an agency if the agency finds that an immediate danger to the public health, safety, or welfare, or a compelling governmental interest requires emergency action; follows procedures best calculated to assure fairness to all interested persons and parties under the circumstances; follows procedures which comply with the protections extended by the Missouri and the United States Constitutions; limits the scope of such rule to the circumstances creating an emergency and requiring emergency procedure, and at the time of or prior to the adoption of such rule files with the secretary of state the text of the rule together with the specific facts, reasons, and findings which support its conclusion that there is an immediate danger to the public health, safety, or welfare which can be met only through the adoption of such rule and its reasons for concluding that the procedure employed is fair to all interested persons and parties under the circumstances.

Rules filed as emergency rules may be effective not less than ten (10) business days after filing or at such later date as may be specified in the rule and may be terminated at any time by the state agency by filing an order with the secretary of state fixing the date of such termination, which order shall be published by the secretary of state in the Missouri Register as soon as practicable.

All emergency rules must state the period during which they are in effect, and in no case can they be in effect more than one hundred eighty (180) calendar days or thirty (30) legislative days, whichever period is longer. Emergency rules are not renewable, although an agency may at any time adopt an identical rule under the normal rulemaking procedures.

Missouri Register. The scope of this emergency amendment is limited to the circumstances creating the emergency and complies with the protections extended by the **Missouri and United States Constitutions**. The MHD believes this emergency amendment to be fair to all interested parties under the circumstances. The emergency amendment was filed June 16, 2026, becomes effective July 1, 2026, and expires Feb. 25, 2027.

EMERGENCY AMENDMENT

13 CSR 70-94.020 Provider-Based Rural Health Clinic The division is amending section (2).

PURPOSE: This amendment adds the Medicare Economic Index (MEI) for state fiscal year (SFY) 2027 that is used to trend the reimbursement rate.

EMERGENCY STATEMENT: The Department of Social Services (DSS), MO HealthNet Division (MHD) finds that this emergency amendment is necessary to preserve a compelling governmental interest to allow the State Medicaid Agency to continue to pay Provider Based Rural Health Clinics (PBRHC) under a financially sustainable payment methodology. The payment methodology requires the most recent calendar year Medicare Economic Index (MEI) published by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) to be applied to the reimbursement rate. Since the MEI is not available until the beginning of the calendar year, an emergency amendment is necessary to update the reimbursement rate effective July 1st of each year. As a result, the MHD finds a compelling governmental interest, which requires this emergency action. A proposed amendment, which covers the same material, will be published in an upcoming issue of the

MHD used the number of visits from claims for calendar year 2025 times the SFY 2026 rate to estimate the payments for SFY 2026. This amount was then compared to the SFY 2027 rate times the visits from calendar year 2025 to determine the fiscal impact.

If an existing rule is to be amended or rescinded, it will have a heading of proposed amendment or proposed rescission. Rules that are proposed to be amended will have new matter printed in boldface type and matter to be deleted placed in brackets.

An important function of the *Missouri Register* is to solicit and encourage public participation in the rulemaking process. The law provides that for every proposed rule, amendment, or rescission there must be a notice that anyone may comment on the proposed action. This comment may take different forms.

If an agency is required by statute to hold a public hearing before making any new rules, then a Notice of Public Hearing will appear following the text of the rule. Hearing dates must be at least thirty (30) days after publication of the notice in the *Missouri Register*. If no hearing is planned or required, the agency must give a Notice to Submit Comments. This allows anyone to file statements in support of or in opposition to the proposed action with the agency within a specified time, no less than thirty (30) days after publication of the notice in the *Missouri Register*.

An agency may hold a public hearing on a rule even though not required by law to hold one. If an agency allows comments to be received following the hearing date, the close-of-comments date will be used as the beginning day in the ninety- (90-) day count necessary for the filing of the order of rulemaking.

If an agency decides to hold a public hearing after planning not to, it must withdraw the earlier notice, file a new notice of proposed rulemaking, and schedule a hearing for a date not less than thirty (30) days from the date of publication of the new notice.

PROPOSED RESCISSION

5 CSR 20-400.210 Application for Certificates of License to Teach on the Basis of Certification by the American Board for Certification of Teacher Excellence (ABCTE). This rule outlined the procedures for applicants to acquire certification through the American Board for Certification of Teacher Excellence (ABCTE).

PURPOSE This rule is being rescinded and the language of this rule is being moved to 5 CSR 20-400.500 because all other routes to certification are described in that rule.

AUTHORITY: section 161.092, RSMo 2016. This rule previously filed as 5 CSR 80-800.285. Original rule filed April 9, 2008, effective Oct. 30, 2008. Moved to 5 CSR 20-400.210, effective Aug. 16, 2011. Amended: Filed Sept. 22, 2021, effective May 30, 2022. Rescinded: Filed June 23, 2026.

PUBLIC COST: This proposed rescission will not cost state agencies or political subdivisions more than five hundred dollars (\$500) in the aggregate.

PRIVATE COST: This proposed rescission will not cost private entities more than five hundred dollars (\$500) in the aggregate.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

5 CSR 20-400.380 Mentoring Program Standards. The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (the department) is amending the rule in its entirety.

PURPOSE: This amendment provides clarity to school districts and charter schools regarding requirements for the mentoring program standards.

PURPOSE: [This rule clarifies the standards for school districts and charter schools mentoring programs.] Sections 160.720, 161.375, and 161.092, RSMo, establish the completion of a Mentoring Program as a requirement of certification. This rule identifies minimum requirements for implementation of an effective mentoring program for beginning teachers as mentees and clarifies the role of mentor teachers for school districts and charter schools in the state of Missouri.

(1) A successful school district and charter school mentoring program shall include[,] but may not be limited to[,]
the standards listed below:

(A) An introduction to the cultural environment of the community, school district and charter school, school building, and classroom that –

1. Introduces school district and charter school policies, procedures, and mission (educator and student handbooks, Comprehensive School Improvement Plan (CSIP), goals, etc.);

2. Introduces community characteristics/norms/local expectations [(community tour, housing, medical facilities, faith community, etc.)]

3. Encourages membership and participation in professional organizations at school district and charter school levels and state/national levels;

4. Addresses issues of diversity and equity;

5. Provides a systematic and ongoing process of introduction to data analysis, assessment practice and process, etc. (not a

one- (1-) day workshop)];

[6.]3. Includes school district and charter school initiatives and parental feedback; and

[7.]4. Defines the following professional, educational, and school district and charter school [acronyms:] terms:

A. **Beginning Teacher Assistance Program (BTAP):** A well designed and implemented program with ongoing support that will improve practice, helping new educators have the skills and knowledge to positively impact student achievement (Section 168.400, RSMo). For an educator to upgrade to a Career Continuous Professional Certificate they must complete two (2) years of BTAP in addition to the mentoring requirement;

B. **Contact Hours:** The documented time during which a mentor and mentee engage in structured, purposeful activities aligned with Missouri's mentoring standards. These activities may include observation and feedback, co-planning lessons, professional conversations, goal setting, reflection, etc. Contact hours are intended to support the mentee's instructional effectiveness and professional growth;

C. **District Teacher Evaluation Standards/Missouri Model Teaching Standards and Indicators:** Materials mentors should use as discussion starters with beginning teachers to describe student and teacher behavior;

D. **Mentee:** A beginning teacher who is receiving support and guidance from a mentor teacher. A beginning teacher is defined as a teacher who does not hold certification beyond an Initial Professional Certificate;

E. **Mentor:** A certified (current or retired) experienced teacher who provides guidance, support, and professional feedback to a mentee teacher. Best practice indicates that an experienced teacher is defined as one that holds certification beyond an Initial Professional Certificate;

F. **Mentoring Toolbox:** A curated collection of sample documents and activity ideas designed to help districts to create, strengthen, and improve their mentoring programs;

G. **Ongoing:** A minimum of ten (10) contact hours through the duration of the first semester and ten (10) contact hours through the duration of the second semester;

H. **Professional Development Committee (PDC):** The Outstanding Schools Act of 1993 requires districts to support professional development by establishing a PDC to work with beginning and experienced teachers (Section 160.530, RSMo);

(B) A systemic and ongoing program review/evaluation by all stakeholders –

1. [Identifies all stakeholders] Involved stakeholders should participate in a formal evaluation of the mentoring process;

2. Identifies mentoring characteristics, outcomes, assessment tools, and timelines;

3. Gathers regular systematic, qualitative, and quantitative feedback from mentor, mentee, and administrators to determine if mentoring is working; and

[4. Is based on a foundation of best practices;

5. Requires independent/anonymous exit interviews of staff (may be connected to beginning educators' survey at state level) so clear reasons for staff departures can be determined;

6. Is supported by central office and school board—as evidenced by trend data; and]

[7.]4. Is included in broader Professional Development program evaluation (locally and on Missouri School Improvement Program (MSIP) reviews);

(C) An individualized plan for beginning educators that aligns with the school district's and charter school's expectations, policies, and goals [and needs] that –

1. Is aligned with a school district and charter school evaluation tool [that is aligned with the Essential Principles of Effective Evaluation as evidenced by Screen 18a of the Core Data System];

[2. Is a systematic and specific two- (2-) year mentoring and professional growth plan that identifies priority indicators for beginning educators;]

[3.]2. Aligns with a school district and charter school CSIP and certification requirements;

[4. Establishes outcomes for new educators;

5. Is an extension or part of a professional development plan that may have begun during student teaching/internship or culminating project in college;]

[6.]3. Establishes non-evaluative mentor observations that are guided by needs identified by mentor and mentee. Observations should include pre- and post- observation conferences, including reflective questions; and

[7.]4. Encourages structured experiences and expectations for all new educators (planning time, meeting time, time management, etc.);

[8. Establishes opportunities for mentees to observe master educators; and

9. Plans for completion of a required Beginning Teacher Assistance Program (BTA) aligned with the BTA guidelines;]

(D) Collaborative selection of and support for mentors.

1. Current or retired educators selected to be mentors should –

A. [Have a minimum of four (4) years of experience] Be able to provide non-evaluative, constructive feedback to help support the mentee teachers;

B. [Exhibit enthusiasm and commitment to the profession, maintain confidentiality, and be respected by their colleagues] Be experienced teachers who have demonstrated success in the classroom and have a positive attitude toward mentoring;

C. [Be committed to continuous learning, reflection, and mentoring] Have certification/experience in the same content or grade as the beginning teacher[.];

(I) Neighboring buildings/districts may consider cooperating to arrange beneficial content area;

D. [Hold or have held a same or similar position/job or grade/subject area (in- or out-of-building/school district and charter school)] Help beginning teachers establish trust and respect for colleagues and other professionals;

E. Be willing to participate in ongoing professional development;

F. Be willing to participate in mentor training;

[E.]G. Understand broad educational issues as well as specific teaching/education issues; and

[F.]H. Have a strong understanding of pedagogy and instructional expertise in content area(s)[.];

2. School districts and charter schools shall –

A. [Create mentor and mentee collaboration time (release time, common planning time, fewer additional assignments)] Ensure mentors and mentees meet regularly with sufficient time provided to discuss the mentee's progress, provide feedback, and for the mentee to observe other educators;

B. [Require mentor and mentee pairs to be collaboratively assigned by administrator(s) and local professional development committee member(s) with input from grade-level or department chair; and] Ensure mentors attend comprehensive mentor training;

C. Require the collaboration between building level

and/or district level administrators, the PDC, and input from grade level or department chair in making mentor assignments, implementing, and evaluating the mentor program;

[C.]D. Support the mentoring process in time/effort by administration and school board;

E. Encourage all staff to offer informal support to beginning teachers; and

F. Utilize state and local professional development funds or stipends to support mentors' additional duties;

(E) Comprehensive mentor training and support that –

1. [Recognizes mentoring is NOT evaluation; confidentiality is required between mentor and mentee (except in situations of child endangerment)] Recognizes all information shared between mentors and mentees is confidential except in situations of classroom/individual safety and child endangerment;

2. Recognizes all information and constructive feedback should not be evaluative;

[2.]3. Includes cognitive coaching skills along with collaborative training;

[3.]4. Includes observation and feedback training/skills;

[4. Provides an awareness of phases of first-year educators (stress, depression, etc.);]

5. Provides training on mentoring standards, performance-based evaluation requirements, certification requirements, and local expectations;

[6. Includes a catalogue of resources available for beginning educators;]

[7.]6. Recognizes the need for knowledge and strategies on classroom management;

[8. Encourages school districts and charter schools to form mentoring consortia (may use existing structures to form consortia (e.g., conference schools));

9. Focuses on exemplary teaching and assessment practices;]

[10.]7. Builds working strategies that encourage problem solving and independent thinking;

[11.]8. Provides understanding of student assessments and how educators can utilize them to guide instruction; and

[12.]9. Includes self-assessment and reflection that identifies whether mentoring is meeting both the mentor's and mentee's expectations; [and]

[13. Describes and provides a template for the mentor's log – a written record of observations/meetings that includes dates and times signed by both the mentor and mentee;]

(F) A complete list of responsibilities for the mentor, beginning educator, and administrator(s) is addressed in Appendix A; and

(G) Sufficient time for mentors to observe beginning educators, and for the beginning educators to observe [master] other educators by –

1. Aligning class schedules and planning periods to complement mentoring duties;

[2. Utilizing state and local professional development funds or stipends to support mentors' additional duties;]

[3.]2. Providing a minimum of four (4) class periods each year for mentor release time to coach, observe, and meet;

[4.]3. Providing a minimum of four (4) opportunities for mentees to observe [master] other educators each year; and].

A. While not required, a quality mentoring program recommends that mentors and mentees should meet a minimum of twenty (20) hours ongoing throughout both year 1 and year 2 of the mentoring program, consisting of ten (10) hours being face-to-face. Internal district professional development that is attended by both the

mentor and mentee can be included in the recommended minimum of twenty (20) contact hours.

[5.]4. Providing release time to attend professional conferences, trainings, and meetings.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

5 CSR 20-400.500 Application for Certificate of License to Teach. The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (the department) is amending this purpose and sections (1)-(5) and (8) and adding sections (6) and (7).

PURPOSE: The purpose of this admendment is to increase clarity of the rule that describes various paths to certification.

(1) General Requirements.

[1](A) An applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach who possesses good moral character and has successfully [completed an educator preparation program approved by the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (department) or earned a doctoral degree] met the requirements listed in one (1) of the routes to certification described in sections (2)-(7) of this rule may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach in their major area of study, subject to the specific content area certification requirements established by the State Board of Education (board), which can be found in 5 CSR 20-400.500–5 CSR 20-400.700.

(B) An applicant must achieve a score equal to or in excess of the qualifying score on exit assessment(s) mandated by the board. The official score(s) shall be submitted to the department. Individuals applying for certification through reciprocity (see section (8) below) may be excepted from this requirement.

[(2)](C) Applications for a Missouri certificate of license to teach shall be submitted on the forms provided by the department, accompanied by the appropriate fee, and may be

obtained by writing the Educator Certification Section of the department at PO Box 480, Jefferson City, MO 65102-0480 or downloading from the Internet.

[(3)](D) *[An application is not considered officially filed with the board until it has been determined by the board or the department staff to be complete and the application is submitted on the forms provided by the department, signed, and accompanied by two (2) full sets of fingerprints with the appropriate fee as set by the Missouri State Highway Patrol (Highway Patrol) and/or the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and any other applicable forms and/or fees. All information should be received by the department within ninety (90) days of the date of the application.]*

(A) *The applicant is responsible for submitting the fingerprints in the manner acceptable to the Highway Patrol and/or FBI and the payment of any fees required by the Highway Patrol and/or FBI.]* An application is not considered officially filed with the board until it has been determined by the board or the department staff to be complete. The application must be submitted on the electronic form provided by the department. In addition, the applicant must complete a fingerprint-based background check (using an appropriate registration code) via the Missouri State Highway Patrol (Highway Patrol) and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI). Applicants must also provide all requested supporting documentation before an application may be considered complete. All information should be received by the department within one hundred twenty (120) days of the date of the application. The applicant is responsible for initiating the fingerprint-based background check in the manner determined by the Highway Patrol and FBI. The payment of any process-related fees required by the Highway Patrol and FBI is the responsibility of the applicant.

[(4)](E) The applicant shall submit verification of certification or licensure directly to the department, including information regarding any disciplinary action from each state or United States' territory regulatory entity in which a professional license, including a certificate of license to teach, is held or has been held.

(F) Following review by the department the applicant shall be informed of the decision regarding the application for certificate of license to teach.

(G) The holder of a certificate of license to teach shall ensure that the department has their current legal name and address.

1. A holder of a certificate of license to teach whose name is changed shall notify the department within ninety (90) days of the name change and provide a copy of the appropriate documents verifying the name change.

2. A holder of a certificate of license to teach whose address has changed shall inform the department of the change within ninety (90) days of the effective date of the change.

[(5)](2) An applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach who has successfully completed an educator preparation program approved by the [department] board must comply with the following [additional] criteria in addition to any requirements specific to the grade level and content area for which the applicant seeks certification, as noted in 5 CSR 20-400.510–5 CSR 20-400.600:

(A) The applicant must possess a baccalaureate degree from a [regionally accredited college or university] college or university that has been accredited by an accrediting agency recognized by the U.S. Department of Education;

[(C)](B) *[The applicant must possess a grade point average of 3.00 or higher in professional education;]* The applicant must request and obtain the recommendation of the designated certification official from [a baccalaureate or higher-level educator preparation program] an educator preparation provider approved by the [department] board; and

[(D) The applicant must achieve a score equal to or in excess of the qualifying score on the required exit assessment(s) as defined in 5 CSR 20-400.310 and 5 CSR 20-400.440. The official score shall be submitted to the department.]

[(6)](3) An applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach who possesses a valid certificate of license to teach from another state and who possesses good moral character may be granted a Missouri certificate of license to teach.

[(7) An applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach who has successfully obtained certification by the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards (NBPTS), or for school psychologists, the certificate of nationally certified school psychologists issued by the National Association of School Psychologists (NASP), and possesses good moral character may be granted a Missouri certificate of license to teach in their area of NBPTS or NASP certification most closely aligned with the current areas of certification approved by the board. The certificate of license to teach will be an initial student services classification or a career continuous student services classification if the applicant possesses four (4) years of student services experience.]

[(8)](4) An applicant for an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach who has earned a doctoral degree from an institution of higher education accredited by a regional accreditation agency including[,] but not limited to[,] the Higher Learning Commission of the North Central Association of Colleges and Schools (NCA) must comply with the following additional criteria:

(A) The applicant must have completed and provide documentation of a doctoral degree earned in an area of study for which an initial professional certificate (IPC) of license to teach may be issued;

(B) The applicant must achieve a score equal to or in excess of the qualifying score on the pedagogy assessment approved by the [department] board for the specific grade levels as defined in the rules promulgated by the board. The official score report shall be submitted to the department; and

(C) The applicant may only be granted an IPC level certificate of license to teach in their major area of study pursuant to the rules promulgated by the board. A career continuous professional level certificate of license to teach will not be issued.

[(9)](5) An applicant for an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach in the area of personal finance, banking, or financial responsibility who has earned a bachelor's degree, or higher degree, from an institution of higher education accredited by a regional accreditation agency including[,] but not limited to[,] the Higher Learning Commission of the NCA must comply with the following additional criteria:

(A) The applicant must provide documentation of a valid degree being conferred and achieve a score equal to or in excess of the qualifying score on the assessment designated by the board. The official score report shall be submitted to the department;

(B) Comply with the professional experience requirements specific to the particular content area for which certification is

sought as set forth in rules 5 CSR 20-400.500–5 CSR 20-400.700; and

(C) The applicant may only be granted an initial career education level of certificate of license to teach in the field of personal finance.

(6) In addition to all the criteria for application provided under 5 CSR 20-400.500, an initial four- (4-) year certificate shall be issued to an applicant who has successfully completed an approved preparation program through the American Board for Certification of Teacher Excellence (ABCTE) or Teachers of Tomorrow, within the following guidelines:

(A) Applicant must submit verification by the designated district official at a public school or accredited non-public school of sixty (60) contact hours in any one (1) of the following contexts:

1. Sixty (60) contact hours in a public school or accredited nonpublic school classroom, of which at least forty-five (45) must be teaching;

2. Sixty (60) contact hours as a substitute teacher in a public school or accredited nonpublic school, with at least thirty (30) consecutive hours in the same classroom; or

3. Sixty (60) contact hours of teaching as a paraprofessional; and

(B) Certification authorized under this rule shall not be granted for the areas of early childhood education or special education.

(7) An applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach who possesses a valid teaching certificate from another state may be issued a professional certificate classification in the area(s) most closely aligned with the applicant's current areas of certification.

(A) By default, a qualified applicant will be issued an Initial Professional Certificate (IPC).

(B) An applicant will be issued a Career Continuous Professional Classification upon submitting documentation of meeting the requirements for that certificate defined in 5 CSR 20-400.260.

(C) This reciprocal route to certification is not immediately available to individuals who possess a valid teaching certificate from another state in an area in which Missouri does not offer an IPC. An individual in this situation must first demonstrate eligibility for certification in an area in which Missouri offers an IPC. After being issued an IPC, the individual may apply for an additional certification using a valid certification from another state.

(8) An individual possessing a valid certificate of license to teach in Missouri may be granted initial professional certificates of license to teach according to the following guidelines:

(A) The applicant must submit one (1) of the following:

1. Evidence of a qualifying score on the appropriate certification exam, as determined by the department; or

2. Evidence of having met the specific content area certification requirements found in 5 CSR 20-400.500 to 5 CSR 20-400.700. This option must be used if no approved certification exam exists;

(B) Applicants seeking to add a Library Media Specialist K-12 certificate must submit evidence of a qualifying score on the approved certification exam and successfully complete twelve (12) semester hours in the following areas:

1. Foundations of Librarianship (three (3) semester hours);

2. Library Media Administration (three (3) semester hours);

3. Developing and Managing Collections (three (3) semester hours); and

4. Organizing Information (three (3) semester hours); and

(C) Only certificates of license to teach in initial areas of certification may be obtained by this route. Advanced teaching certificates (e.g., English Language Development and Gifted Education) cannot be earned through this method.

[(10) The board may grant additional professional certificates of license to teach to a certificate holder as follows:

(A) The applicant may take the appropriate content knowledge or specialty area exit assessment(s) for certification and must achieve a score equal to or in excess of the qualifying score on the content knowledge or specialty area exit assessment(s) as defined in 5 CSR 20-400.440 and 5 CSR 20-400.500 to 5 CSR 20-400.700;

(B) If the board has not designated a content knowledge or specialty area exit assessment(s) for a particular certification area or grade level or the applicant chooses not to take the appropriate content knowledge or specialty area exit assessment(s), the applicant must meet the specific content area certification requirements found in 5 CSR 20-400.500 to 5 CSR 20-400.700; or

(C) Applicants who seek to add a Library Media Specialist K-12 certificate must meet the requirements of (10)(A), above, and must also complete a three- (3-) semester hour course in each of the following areas:

1. Foundations of Librarianship;

2. Library Media Administration;

3. Developing and Managing Collections; and

4. Organizing Information.

(11) Following review by the department the applicant shall be informed of the decision regarding the application for certificate of license to teach.

(12) The holder of a certificate of license to teach shall ensure that the department has their current legal name and address.

(A) A holder of a certificate of license to teach whose name is changed shall notify the department within ninety (90) days of the name change and provide a copy of the appropriate documents verifying the name change.

(B) A holder of a certificate of license to teach whose address has changed shall inform the department of the change within ninety (90) days of the effective date of the change.

(13) Regardless of the certification pathway, any applicant for an initial certification to teach in Elementary Education must demonstrate proficiency in the teaching of reading by passing the State Board of Education-approved Elementary reading exam.]

5 CSR 20-400.530 Certification Requirements for a Teacher of Middle School Education (Grades 5-9). The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (the department) is amending this rule in its entirety.

PURPOSE: This amendment standardizes and clarifies the requirements for certification in Middle School Education in order to make the path to certification more accessible and, in turn, increase the number of well-prepared teachers available to Missouri's grades 5-9 students.

[(1) An applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Middle School Education who possesses good moral character may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Middle School Education subject to the certification requirements found in 5 CSR 20-400.500 and the following additional certification requirements specific to Middle School Education:

(A) General Requirements. An applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach who has successfully completed an educator preparation program approved by the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (department) must comply with the following additional criteria:

1. The applicant must possess a baccalaureate degree from a regionally accredited college or university;
2. The applicant must have a recommendation from the designated official at a baccalaureate or higher-level educator preparation program approved by the department;
3. The applicant must possess a grade point average of 2.5 or higher in the specific content area for which certification is sought;
4. The applicant must achieve a score equal to or in excess of the qualifying score on the required exit assessment(s) as defined in 5 CSR 20-400.440. The official score shall be submitted to the department;
5. The applicant must complete the professional requirements as determined by the recommending educator preparation program, which may exceed these minimum requirements; and
6. Individuals who completed an educator preparation program outside of the United States shall provide documentation of completion of coursework in the following:
 - A. English Composition, two (2) courses, each a minimum of two (2) semester hours;
 - B. U.S. History, three (3) semester hours; and
 - C. U.S. Government, three (3) semester hours;

(B) Professional Requirements Effective until August 1, 2025. A minimum of forty-five (45) semester hours in professional education. Competency must be demonstrated in the following areas listed to the satisfaction of the educator preparation provider:

1. Content Planning and Delivery. Candidates are prepared with a deep knowledge of and understand the relationship among curriculum, instruction, and assessment—
 - A. Curriculum and Instructional Planning;
 - B. Instructional Strategies and Techniques in Content Area Specialty;
 - C. Assessment, Student Data, and Data-Based Decision-Making;
 - D. Strategies for Content Literacy;
 - E. Critical Thinking and Problem Solving; and
 - F. English Language Learning;
2. Individual Student Needs. Candidates build a robust knowledge of learners and the learning environment—
 - A. Psychological Development of the Child and Adolescent;
 - B. Psychology/Education of the Exceptional Child;
 - C. Differentiated Learning;
 - D. Classroom Management;
 - E. Cultural Diversity; and
 - F. Educational Psychology;
3. Schools and the Teaching Profession. Candidates fully understand the role of schools and schooling as well as the professional responsibilities of teachers, including a means of professional growth—
 - A. Consultation and Collaboration;
 - B. Legal/Ethical Aspects of Teaching; and
 - C. Middle School Philosophy and Organization;
4. Middle School Literacy (minimum of six (6) semester hours), to include coursework in methods of teaching reading and writing in the content area, and to include instructional interventions for students with reading deficits; and
5. Content Knowledge for Teaching (minimum requirement of twenty-four (24) semester hours). Subject area certification in grades five through nine (5-9) will be granted upon the basis of a minimum of twenty-four (24) semester hours with appropriate distribution as determined by the educator preparation program and/or the department, in one (1) of the following areas:
 - A. Agricultural Education (5-9);
 - B. Business Education (5-9);
 - C. Technology and Engineering (5-9);
 - D. Language Arts (5-9);
 - E. Mathematics (5-9);
 - F. Science (5-9);
 - G. Social Science (5-9);
 - H. Speech/Theatre (5-9); and
 - I. Computer Science (5-9), to include the following competencies:
 - (I) Apply computer science and computational thinking skills in adaptable and effective ways;
 - (II) Examine and use different computing devices by understanding their hardware and software, and how simplified models (abstractions) affect their use. Explore how these devices use logic to input, process, store, and output data, and apply problem-solving methods to fix system issues;
 - (III) Show how computing devices share and organize data through networks and the internet and examine security measures and protocols while considering the balance between safety and ease of use;
 - (IV) Gather and organize digital data in the right formats, use tools to visualize and process it, create models to identify patterns, understand real-world situations, and make

predictions based on improved ideas;

(V) Create, test, and improve programs by developing step-by-step solutions, using variables and control structures, writing reusable code, following organized development practices, and using appropriate programming languages and tools to write, debug, and refine programs; and

(VI) Examine how computing systems affect human behavior, culture, fairness, and social interactions, and evaluate the positive and negative impacts of technology on society, considering safety, laws, and ethical issues.

B. Oral and written language development;

F. The translation of assessment results into effective practice in the classroom specific to the needs of students; and

The candidate may work with students individually and/or in small groups as requested and under the supervision of the classroom teacher.

2. Mid-Level Field Experiences (one (1) semester hour with a minimum of forty-five (45) clock hours). The mid-level experience occurs between the initial placement and the culminating clinical experiences. At the mid-level, candidates continue to observe; respond to specific class assignments; and work with students individually, in small groups, and in whole class settings as requested and under the supervision of the classroom teacher.

3. Culminating Clinical Experiences (eight (8) semester hours with a minimum of twelve (12) weeks in one (1) placement). The culminating experience refers to placements typically in the final sequence leading up to and including student teaching. Candidates actively participate and complete required assignments, work with students as requested and under the supervision of the classroom teacher, and have the opportunity and responsibility to lead the class over an extended period of time.

E. The administration and interpretation of assessments;

F. The translation of assessment results into effective practice in the classroom specific to the needs of students; and

G. Methods of teaching reading and writing in the content area; and

(D) Field and Clinical Experiences (ten (10) semester hours). Field and clinical experiences should be appropriate to the progress of the student through the program and should be supervised through a close partnership of highly qualified professionals in appropriate school settings.

1. Early Field Experiences (one (1) semester hour with a minimum of thirty (30) clock hours). The early field experience includes placements in which candidates observe students, support teachers, and respond to specific class assignments. The candidate may work with students individually and/or in small groups as requested and under the supervision of the classroom teacher.

2. Mid-Level Field Experiences (one (1) semester hour with a minimum of forty-five (45) clock hours). The mid-level experience occurs between the initial placement and the culminating clinical experiences. At the mid-level, candidates continue to observe; respond to specific class assignments; and work with students individually, in small groups, and in whole

class settings as requested and under the supervision of the classroom teacher.

3. *Culminating Clinical Experiences* (eight (8) semester hours with a minimum of twelve (12) weeks in one (1) placement). The culminating experience refers to placements typically in the final sequence leading up to and including student teaching. Candidates actively participate and complete required assignments, work with students as requested and under the supervision of the classroom teacher, and have the opportunity and responsibility to lead the class over an extended period of time.

(2) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Agriculture may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Agriculture subject to completion of at least fifty-three (53) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

(A) A minimum of forty-five (45) semester hours shall be completed from paragraphs (2)(A)1.-7.—

1. *Animal Science*, minimum of three (3) semester hours;
2. *Agronomy*, minimum of three (3) semester hours;
3. *Agricultural Business*, minimum of three (3) semester hours;
4. *Agricultural Economics*, minimum of three (3) semester hours;
5. *Agricultural Mechanics*, minimum of three (3) semester hours;
6. *Horticulture*, minimum of three (3) semester hours; and
7. *Electives* (27 semester hours) Must include twelve (12) semester hours from sections 1.-6. and fifteen (15) semester hours of other agriculture-related coursework; and

(B) A minimum of eight (8) semester hours shall be completed from paragraphs (2)(B)1.-7.—

1. *Methods of Teaching Vocational Agriculture*;
2. *Program Planning*;
3. *Developing and Supervising Occupational Experience Programs*—
 - A. *Ownership (Entrepreneurship)*; and
 - B. *Placement*;
4. *Developing and Using Instruction Materials and Teaching Aids*;
5. *Supervising Student Organizations*;
6. *Teaching Agriculture Mechanics*; and
7. *Planning and Conducting Adult Programs for Young and Adult Farmers*.

(3) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Business may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Business subject to completion of at least thirty-nine (39) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

- (A) *Accounting*, six (6) semester hours;
- (B) *Economics*, six (6) semester hours;
- (C) *Business/Consumer Related Law*, three (3) semester hours;
- (D) *Business Communications*, three (3) semester hours;
- (E) *Management*, three (3) semester hours;
- (F) *Marketing*, three (3) semester hours;
- (G) *Computer/Emerging Technology*, six (6) semester hours;
- (H) *Electives*, three (3) semester hours; and
- (I) *Administration of Business and Marketing Education Programs*, three (3) semester hours.

(4) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Driver Education who is certified in another elementary, middle school, or secondary teaching field may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Driver Education subject to completion of at least twelve (12) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

- (A) *Introduction to Safety Education*, three (3) semester hours;
- (B) *Driver Task Analysis*, three (3) semester hours;
- (C) *Developing Vehicle Operation Skills and Competencies*, three (3) semester hours; and
- (D) *Developing Classroom Knowledge*, three (3) semester hours.

(5) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach English may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach English subject to completion of at least thirty-three (33) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

- (A) *Composition and Rhetoric* (to include a course in the teaching of writing), twelve (12) semester hours;
- (B) *Study of the English Language* (to include modern grammar, history of the language, and/or dialects), six (6) semester hours;
- (C) *American Literature* (to include at least one (1) major unit or module in literature for adolescents and one (1) in literature of ethnic groups), six (6) semester hours;
- (D) *English and/or World Literature*, six (6) semester hours; and
- (E) *Elective English Credits*, three (3) semester hours.

- (F) *Electives*—Photography, Graphics, Advertising, Broadcasting, History of Journalism, Mass Media and Society, News Media Experience, and other related areas, fifteen (15) semester hours—

1. News media experience (e.g., professional news media, college publications, etc.) must be included in the program on a credit or noncredit basis.

(7) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Marketing may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Marketing subject to completion of at least thirty-six (36) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

- (A) *Management or Business Administration*, three (3) semester hours;
- (B) *Economics*, six (6) semester hours;

(C) Electives from Business, Management, or Entrepreneurship, nine (9) semester hours;

(D) Marketing (suggested areas: Distribution, Financing, Marketing-Information Management, Promotion, Selling, Product/Service Management, International Marketing, and E-commerce Marketing), fifteen (15) semester hours; and

(E) Coordination of Cooperative Education, three (3) semester hours.

(8) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Mathematics must also—

(A) Be in possession of a baccalaureate or higher degree, from a regionally accredited college or university, in Mathematics; or

(B) Have completed at least thirty-three (33) semester hours in mathematics-related coursework, with at least twenty-four (24) hours addressing all of the following six (6) areas, with demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

1. Algebra;
2. Geometry;
3. Trigonometry;
4. Pre-Calculus;
5. Calculus; and
6. Statistics.

(9) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Biology may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Biology subject to completion of at least thirty-five (35) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

(A) History/Philosophy of Science and Technology, three (3) semester hours;

(B) A minimum of twenty (20) hours in Biology, which must include:

1. Cell Biology;
2. Plant Form and Function;
3. Animal Form and Function;
4. Genetics;
5. Evolution; and
6. Biology Electives; and

(C) A minimum of twelve (12) additional hours in Science, which includes—

1. Chemistry;
2. Physics;
3. Earth Science; and
4. Environmental Science.

(10) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Chemistry may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Chemistry subject to completion of at least thirty-five (35) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

(A) History/Philosophy of Science and Technology, three (3) semester hours;

(B) A minimum of twenty (20) hours in Chemistry, which must include—

1. Inorganic Chemistry;
2. Analytical Chemistry;
3. Organic Chemistry;
4. Physical Chemistry;
5. Biochemistry; and

6. Chemistry Electives; and

(C) A minimum of twelve (12) additional hours in Science, which includes—

1. Biology;
2. Physics;
3. Earth Science; and
4. Environmental Science.

(11) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Earth Science may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Earth Science subject to completion of at least thirty-five (35) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

(A) History/Philosophy of Science and Technology, three (3) semester hours;

(B) A minimum of twenty (20) hours in Earth Science, which must include—

1. Astronomy;
2. Meteorology;
3. Geology/Physical Geography; and
4. Earth Science Electives; and

(C) A minimum of twelve (12) additional hours in Science, which includes—

1. Chemistry;
2. Biology;
3. Physics; and
4. Environmental Science.

(12) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Physics may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Physics subject to completion of at least thirty-five (35) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

(A) History/Philosophy of Science and Technology, three (3) semester hours;

(B) A minimum of twenty (20) hours in Physics, which must include—

1. Mechanics;
2. Electricity and Magnetism;
3. Heat, Sound, and Light;
4. Atomic or Modern Physics; and
5. Physics Electives; and

(C) A minimum of twelve (12) additional hours in Science, which includes—

1. Chemistry;
2. Biology;
3. Earth Science; and
4. Environmental Science.

(13) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Social Science may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Social Science subject to completion of at least thirty-nine (39) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

(A) U.S. History, twelve (12) semester hours;

(B) World History, nine (9) semester hours;

(C) Political Science (State and U.S. Government), six (6) semester hours;

- (D) Economics, three (3) semester hours;
- (E) Geography, three (3) semester hours; and
- (F) Behavioral Science (Sociology, Anthropology, or Psychology), six (6) semester hours.

(14) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Speech and Theatre may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Speech and Theatre subject to completion of at least thirty (30) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

- (A) Speech, twelve (12) semester hours (must include three (3) semester hours of debate);
- (B) Theatre, twelve (12) semester hours; and
- (C) Electives (from Speech, Theatre, and/or Mass Communications), six (6) semester hours.

(15) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Technology and Engineering may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Technology and Engineering subject to completion of at least thirty-six (36) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

- (A) Communication Technology, six (6) semester hours;
- (B) Energy and Power, six (6) semester hours;
- (C) Materials and Processes Technology, six (6) semester hours;
- (D) Organization and Administration, six (6) semester hours; and
- (E) Electives, twelve (12) semester hours.

(16) As of July 1, 2025, in addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach General Science may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach General Science subject to completion of at least thirty-five (35) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation provider:

- (A) History/Philosophy of Science and Technology, three (3) semester hours; and
- (B) A minimum of thirty-two (32) hours in General Science, which must include—
 1. Chemistry;
 2. Biology;
 3. Physics;
 4. Earth Science;
 5. Astronomy; and
 6. Environmental Science.

(17) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Computer Science (Grades 9-12) must either 1) have been awarded a baccalaureate or higher degree in Computer Science (or a closely related field) by a college or university that has been accredited by a U.S. Department of Education recognized accrediting agency, or 2) have completed at least thirty (30) hours in coursework in Computer Science and demonstrated, to the satisfaction of the educator preparation provider, mastery of the following competencies:

- (A) Take actions to foster an inclusive computing culture;
- (B) Collaborate with others around computing tasks;

(C) Communicate effectively and appropriately around computing;

- (D) Recognize and define computational problems;
- (E) Develop and use abstractions to address computing challenges;

(F) Create, test, and refine computational artifacts;

(G) Demonstrate an understanding of the function of various hardware and software components;

(H) Explain how abstractions impact implementation and use of hardware and software components;

- C. Business;
- D. Chemistry;
- E. Computer Science;
- F. Driver Education;
- G. Earth Science;
- H. English;
- I. General Science;
- J. Journalism;
- K. Marketing;

- L. Mathematics;
- M. Physics;
- N. Social Studies;
- O. Speech and Theatre; and
- P. Technology & Engineering.

4. Individuals who completed an educator preparation program outside of the United States shall provide documentation of completion of coursework in the following:

A. English Composition, three (3) semester hours, or demonstrated proficiency in English using a department-approved assessment;

B. U.S. History, three (3) semester hours; and

C. U.S. Government, three (3) semester hours;

(B) Pedagogical Requirements. Applicant must have successfully completed a minimum of twenty-four (24) semester hours in coursework related to general teaching. Coursework must meet the following criteria to the satisfaction of the educator preparation program:

1. Competency must be demonstrated in the following topics:

A. Content planning and delivery. Candidates are prepared with a deep knowledge of and understand the relationship among curriculum, instruction, and assessment –

(I) Curriculum and Instructional Planning;

(II) Instructional Strategies and Techniques in Content Area Specialty;

(III) Assessment, Student Data, and Data-Based Decision-Making;

(IV) Strategies for Content Literacy;

(V) Critical Thinking and Problem Solving; and

(VI) English Language Learning;

B. Individual student needs. Candidates build a robust knowledge of learners and the learning environment –

(I) Psychological Development of the Child and Adolescent;

(II) Psychology/Education of the Exceptional Child;

(III) Differentiated Learning;

(IV) Classroom Management;

(V) Cultural Diversity; and

(VI) Educational Psychology;

C. Schools and the teaching profession. Candidates fully understand the role of schools and schooling as well as the professional responsibilities of teachers, including a means of professional growth –

(I) Consultation and Collaboration; and

(II) Legal/Ethical Aspects of Teaching;

2. Teaching literacy in secondary school is addressed in a minimum of three (3) semester hours and requires candidates to demonstrate the skills and knowledge necessary to support the development of student literacy. At a minimum, coursework must address the following topics:

A. The core components of reading, including phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, comprehension, morphology, syntax, and vocabulary;

1. Instruction in this area may be integrated into required pedagogy semester hours or required content knowledge hours.

2. Up to six (6) hours of coursework in pedagogical content knowledge may be applied to the minimum hour requirement for Pedagogy Knowledge or Content Knowledge, but a particular course cannot be used to meet the minimum hour requirement in both areas;

(D) Content Knowledge Requirements. Applicant must have successfully completed a minimum of thirty (30) semester hours in coursework directly related to the subject area of the certification. Coursework must be aligned with –

1. The Missouri Learning Standards applicable to the certification area; and

2. The test framework of the approved certification exam in that subject area; and

(E) Field and Clinical Experiences (ten (10) semester hours). Field and clinical experiences should be appropriate to the progress of the student through the program and should be supervised through a close partnership of highly qualified professionals in appropriate school settings.

1. Early Field Experiences (one (1) semester hour with a minimum of thirty (30) clock hours). The early field experience includes placements in which candidates observe students, support teachers, and respond to specific class assignments. The candidate may work with students individually and/or in small groups as requested and under the supervision of the classroom teacher.

2. Mid-Level Field Experiences (one (1) semester hour with a minimum of forty-five (45) clock hours). PROPOSED AMENDMENT

5 CSR 20-400.550 Certification Requirements for Teacher of K-12 Education. The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education is amending this rule in its entirety.

PURPOSE: This amendment standardizes and clarifies the requirements for certification in Secondary Education in order to make the path to certification more accessible and, in turn, increase the number of well-prepared teachers available to Missouri's K-12 students.

[(1) An applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach K-12 Education who possesses good moral character may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach K-12 Education subject to the certification requirements found in 5 CSR 20-400.500 and the following additional certification requirements specific to K-12 Education:

(A) General Requirements—

1. A baccalaureate degree from a college or university having an educator preparation program approved by the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (department) or from a college or university having an educator preparation program approved by the state education agency in states other than Missouri;

2. The applicant must have a recommendation from the designated official at a baccalaureate or higher-level educator preparation program approved by the department;

3. The applicant must possess a grade point average of 2.5 or higher in the specific content area for which certification is sought;

4. The applicant must achieve a score equal to or in excess of the qualifying score on the required exit assessment(s) as defined in 5 CSR 20-400.440. The official score shall be submitted to the department;

5. The applicant must complete the professional requirements as determined by the recommending educator preparation program, which may exceed these minimum requirements; and

6. Individuals who completed an educator preparation program outside of the United States shall provide documentation of completion of coursework in the following:

A. English Composition, two (2) courses, each a minimum of two (2) semester hours;

B. U.S. History, three (3) semester hours; and

C. U.S. Government, three (3) semester hours;

(B) Professional Requirements. A minimum requirement of twenty-six (26) semester hours in professional education. Competency must be demonstrated in the following topics listed to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

1. Content Planning and Delivery. Candidates are prepared with a deep knowledge of and understand the relationship among curriculum, instruction, and assessment—

A. Curriculum and Instructional Planning;

B. Instructional Strategies and Techniques in Content Area Specialty;

C. Assessment, Student Data, and Data-Based Decision-Making;

D. Strategies for Content Literacy;

E. Critical Thinking and Problem Solving; and

F. English Language Learning;

2. Individual Student Needs. Candidates build a robust knowledge of learners and the learning environment—

A. Psychological Development of the Child and Adolescent;

B. Psychology/Education of the Exceptional Child;

C. Differentiated Learning;

D. Classroom Management;

E. Cultural Diversity; and

F. Educational Psychology;

3. Schools and the Teaching Profession. Candidates fully understand the role of schools and schooling as well as the professional responsibilities of teachers, including a means of professional growth—

A. Consultation and Collaboration; and

B. Legal/Ethical Aspects of Teaching; and

4. Literacy (minimum of three (3) semester hours) to include coursework in methods of teaching reading and writing in the content area for which certification is sought.

5. Field and Clinical Experiences (ten (10) semester hours). Field and clinical experiences should be appropriate to the progress of the student through the program and should be supervised through a close partnership of highly qualified professionals in appropriate school settings. Such field and clinical experiences shall include experiences at both the elementary and the secondary level.

A. Early Field Experiences (one (1) semester hour with a minimum of thirty (30) clock hours). The early field experience includes placements in which candidates observe students, support teachers, and respond to specific class assignments. The candidate may work with students individually and/or in small groups as requested and under the supervision of the classroom teacher.

B. Mid-Level Field Experiences (one (1) semester hour with a minimum of forty-five (45) clock hours). The mid-level experience occurs between the initial placement and the culminating clinical experiences. At the mid-level, candidates continue to observe; respond to specific class assignments; and work with students individually, in small groups, and in whole class settings as requested and under the supervision of the classroom teacher.

C. Culminating Clinical Experiences (eight (8) semester hours with a minimum of twelve (12) weeks in one (1) placement). The culminating experience refers to placements typically in the final sequence leading up to and including student teaching. Candidates actively participate and complete required assignments, work with students as requested and under the supervision of the classroom teacher, and have the opportunity and responsibility to lead the class over an extended period of time.

(2) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Art may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Art subject to completion of at least thirty (30) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

- (A) Design—Composition, three (3) semester hours;
- (B) Drawing, three (3) semester hours;
- (C) Painting, three (3) semester hours;
- (D) Graphics (such as Printmaking, Photography, and Serigraphy), three (3) semester hours;
- (E) Ceramics, three (3) semester hours;
- (F) Sculpture, three (3) semester hours;
- (G) Fibers (such as Weaving, Macramé, and Fiber Sculpture), three (3) semester hours;
- (H) History, Theory, Criticism in the Visual Arts, three (3) semester hours;
- (I) Instructional Techniques for Art K-12, three (3) semester hours; and
- (J) Electives, three (3) semester hours.

(3) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Dance may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Dance subject to completion of at least thirty (30) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

- (A) Ballet Technique, six (6) semester hours;
- (B) Contemporary Technique, six (6) semester hours;
- (C) Other Techniques, to include Tap, Jazz, Yoga, Folk, Ballroom, six (6) semester hours;
- (D) Dance Theory, three (3) semester hours;
- (E) Dance Composition, three (3) semester hours; and
- (F) Elective from paragraphs 1.-4. below, six (6) hours:
 - 1. Anatomy and Kinesiology;
 - 2. Ethnology (dance in other cultures);
 - 3. Music for Dance; or
 - 4. Somatics (body-mind techniques).

(4) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Family and Consumer Sciences may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Family and Consumer Sciences subject to completion of at least thirty-three (33) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

- (A) Program Development and Professional Practice, two (2) semester hours;
- (B) Career and Technical Student Organizations, one (1) semester hour;
- (C) Nutrition, Health, and Wellness (including Health Issues and Concepts as well as Scientific Principles Related to Food Preparation), six (6) semester hours;
- (D) Family and Consumer Resource Management, twelve (12) semester hours (including three (3) semester hours each in Personal Finance; Family and Consumer Resource Management; Housing and Environment; and Textiles, Apparel, and Fashion);
- (E) Human Development and Parenting, six (6) semester hours; and
- (F) Family and Interpersonal Relationships, six (6) semester hours.

(5) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach World Languages may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach World Languages subject to completion of at least thirty (30) semester hours in the language to be taught, or twenty-seven (27) semester hours plus two (2) or more earned units of high school credit in that language. Additionally, the applicant must complete a minimum of fifteen (15) semester hours in upper-level courses with no more than six (6) of those semester hours in history/culture and demonstrate competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution.

(6) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Health may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Health subject to completion of at least thirty-six (36) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

- (A) Human Anatomy-Physiology, three (3) semester hours;
- (B) Nutrition, three (3) semester hours;
- (C) Drug Education, three (3) semester hours;
- (D) Personal Health, three (3) semester hours;
- (E) Mental Health, three (3) semester hours;
- (F) Family Life/Sex Education, three (3) semester hours;
- (G) Safety and First Aid, three (3) semester hours;
- (H) Community Health, three (3) semester hours;
- (I) Instructional Techniques in Health K-12, three (3) semester hours; and
- (J) Electives in Health, nine (9) semester hours.

(7) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license for Library Media Specialist may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license for Library Media Specialist subject to completion of at least thirty (30) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

- (A) Content Knowledge for Teaching—
 - 1. Foundations of Librarianship, three (3) semester hours;
 - 2. Library Media Administration, three (3) semester hours;
 - 3. Developing and Managing Collections, three (3) semester hours;
 - 4. Organizing Information, three (3) semester hours;
 - 5. Reference Sources and Services, three (3) semester hours;
 - 6. Action Research in School Libraries, three (3) semester hours;
 - 7. Children's, Adolescent, or Young Adult Literature, three (3) semester hours;
 - 8. Library Systems and Information Technologies, three (3) semester hours; and
 - 9. Curriculum and the Media Center, three (3) semester hours;
- (B) Field and Clinical Experiences (three (3) semester hours)—
 - 1. Culminating Clinical Experiences. This librarian internship builds upon the classroom experiences and provides the intern an opportunity to lead and direct specific activities. The intern is an active participant in the daily operations of the library media center including working with students, faculty, staff, and stakeholders while under the supervision of an on-site supervisor. The clinical experience should include collaborating with other educators to support student learning.

(8) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Music may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Music subject to completion of at least forty-five (45) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

(A) For applicants for a Missouri license to teach Vocal Music—

1. Music Theory, History, and Choral Arranging, fifteen (15) semester hours;
2. Piano (or proficiency) and Applied Voice, nine (9) semester hours;
3. Choral Conducting, Techniques, and Literature, twelve (12) semester hours;
4. Choral Ensemble, three (3) semester hours; and
5. Methods/Techniques of Teaching Pre-K/Elementary, and Middle School/Secondary Music, six (6) semester hours;

(B) For applicants for a Missouri license to teach Instrumental Music—

1. Music Theory, History, and Instrumentation/Arranging, fifteen (15) semester hours;
2. Piano (or proficiency) and Applied Major Instrument, nine (9) semester hours;
3. Instrumental Conducting, Techniques, and Literature, twelve (12) semester hours;
4. Instrumental Ensemble, three (3) semester hours; and
5. Methods/Techniques of Teaching Pre-K/Elementary, and Middle School/Secondary Music, six (6) semester hours.

(9) In addition to the requirements specified in subsections (1)(A)-(C) of this rule, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach Physical Education may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach Physical Education subject to completion of at least fifty-one (51) semester hours in the following content knowledge areas and demonstration of competency to the satisfaction of the educator preparation institution:

- (A) History and Philosophy, three (3) semester hours;
- (B) Anatomy-Physiology, three (3) semester hours;
- (C) Kinesiology, three (3) semester hours;
- (D) Physiology of Exercise, three (3) semester hours;
- (E) Assessment in Physical Education, three (3) semester hours;
- (F) Health Related Fitness/Wellness, three (3) semester hours;
- (G) Lifetime Activities and Dance, three (3) semester hours;
- (H) Adapted Physical Education, three (3) semester hours;
- (I) Psychological/Sociological Aspects of Physical Education, three (3) semester hours;
- (J) Motor Development/Motor Learning, three (3) semester hours;
- (K) First Aid, CPR, and Care of Activity/Sport Injuries, six (6) semester hours;
- (L) Movement and Rhythms, three (3) semester hours;
- (M) Team/Individual Sports Instruction, three (3) semester hours;
- (N) Instructional Techniques in Physical Education K-12, six (6) semester hours; and
- (O) Nutrition, three (3) semester hours.]

(1) An applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach K-12 Education who possesses good moral character may be granted an initial certificate of license to teach K-12 Education subject to the certification requirements found in 5 CSR 20-400.500 as well as the following additional

certification requirements specific to Secondary Education:
(A) General Requirements.

1. The applicant must possess a grade point average of 3.00 or higher in pedagogical coursework.

2. The applicant must possess a grade point average of 2.5 or higher in coursework related to the specific content area for which certification is sought.

3. Certification in K-12 Education is available in the following areas:

- A. Art;
- B. Dance;
- C. Family & Consumer Sciences;
- D. Health;
- E. Library Media Specialist;
- F. Music, Instrumental;
- G. Music, Vocal;
- H. Physical Education;
- I. World Languages, Chinese;
- J. World Languages, French;
- K. World Languages, German;
- L. World Languages, Japanese;
- M. World Languages, Latin;
- N. World Languages, Russian; and
- O. World Languages, Spanish.

4. Individuals who completed an educator preparation program outside of the United States shall provide documentation of completion of coursework in the following:

A. English Composition, three (3) semester hours, or demonstrated proficiency in English using a department-approved assessment;

B. U.S. History, three (3) semester hours; and

C. U.S. Government, three (3) semester hours;

(B) Pedagogical Requirements. Applicant must have successfully completed a minimum of twenty-four (24) semester hours in coursework related to general teaching. Coursework must meet the following criteria to the satisfaction of the educator preparation program.

1. Competency must be demonstrated in the following topics:

A. Content planning and delivery. Candidates are prepared with a deep knowledge of and understand the relationship among curriculum, instruction, and assessment –

(I) Curriculum and Instructional Planning;

(II) Instructional Strategies and Techniques in Content Area Specialty;

(III) Assessment, Student Data, and Data-Based Decision-Making;

(IV) Strategies for Content Literacy;

(V) Critical Thinking and Problem Solving; and

(VI) English Language Learning;

B. Individual student needs. Candidates build a robust knowledge of learners and the learning environment –

(I) Psychological Development of the Child and Adolescent;

(II) Psychology/Education of the Exceptional Child;

(III) Differentiated Learning;

(IV) Classroom Management;

(V) Cultural Diversity; and

(VI) Educational Psychology; and

C. Schools and the teaching profession. Candidates fully understand the role of schools and schooling as well as the professional responsibilities of teachers, including a means of professional growth –

(I) Consultation and Collaboration; and

(II) Legal/Ethical Aspects of Teaching.

2. Teaching literacy to K-12 students is addressed in a minimum of three (3) semester hours and requires candidates to demonstrate the skills and knowledge necessary to support the development of student literacy. At a minimum, coursework must address the following topics:

A. The core components of reading, including phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, comprehension, morphology, syntax, and vocabulary;

B. Oral and written language development;

C. Identification of reading deficiencies, dyslexia, and other language difficulties;

D. The selection and use of reading curricula and instructional materials;

E. The administration and interpretation of assessments;

F. The translation of assessment results into effective practice in the classroom specific to the needs of students; and

G. Methods of teaching reading and writing in the content area.

3. Coursework must explicitly address how curriculum and instruction should be differentiated to meet the specific needs of both younger and older students;

(C) Pedagogical Content Knowledge Requirements. Applicant must have received instruction in the methodology of teaching the specific content associated with the area of certification (e.g., Techniques of Teaching Math).

1. Instruction in this area may be integrated into required pedagogy semester hours or required content knowledge hours.

2. Up to six (6) hours of coursework in pedagogical content knowledge may be applied to the minimum hour requirement for Pedagogy Knowledge or Content Knowledge, but a particular course cannot be applied to meet the minimum hour requirement in both areas;

(D) Content Knowledge Requirements. Applicant must have successfully completed a minimum of thirty (30) semester hours in coursework directly related to the subject area of the certification. Coursework must be aligned with –

1. The Missouri Learning Standards applicable to the certification area and

2. The test framework of the approved certification exam in that subject area; and

(E) Field and Clinical Experiences (ten (10) semester hours). Field and clinical experiences should be appropriate to the progress of the student through the program and should be supervised through a close partnership of highly qualified professionals in appropriate school settings.

1. Early Field Experiences (one (1) semester hour with a minimum of thirty (30) clock hours). The early field experience includes placements in which candidates observe students, support teachers, and respond to specific class assignments. The candidate may work with students individually and/or in small groups as requested and under the supervision of the classroom teacher.

2. Mid-Level Field Experiences (one (1) semester hour with a minimum of forty-five (45) clock hours). The mid-level experience occurs between the initial placement and the culminating clinical experiences. At the mid-level, candidates continue to observe; respond to specific class assignments; and work with students individually, in small groups, and in whole class settings as requested and under

the supervision of the classroom teacher.

3. Culminating Clinical Experiences (eight (8) semester hours with a minimum of twelve (12) weeks in one (1) placement). The culminating experience refers to placements typically in the final sequence leading up to and including student teaching. Candidates actively participate and complete required assignments, work with students as requested and under the supervision of the classroom teacher, and have the opportunity and responsibility to lead the class over an extended period of time.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

5 CSR 20-400.570 Certification Requirements for English Language [Learners] Development (Kindergarten – Grade 12). The Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (the department) is amending the rule title and section (1), deleting section (2), and adding new section (2).

PURPOSE: This amendment clarifies the expectations for certification in English Language Development to make a certification in the area accessible to more educators.

(1) **Effective through July 31, 2028, [A]**an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach English Language Learners (ELL) who possesses good moral character may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license to teach ELL subject to the certification requirements found in 5 CSR 20-400.500 and the following additional certification requirements specific to ELL:

(A) General Requirements –

1. A valid Missouri permanent or professional certificate of license to teach[.];

(B) Professional Requirements –

1. Psychology/Education of the Exceptional Child, including the gifted, three (3) semester hours;

2. Literacy (minimum of six (6) semester hours) to include coursework in methods of teaching reading and writing, and to include instructional interventions for students with reading deficits; and

3. The applicant must achieve a score equal to or in excess of the qualifying score on the required exit assessment(s) as defined in 5 CSR 20-400.310 and 5 CSR 20-400.440. The official score shall be submitted to the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (department)[.];

(C) Content Knowledge for Teaching (minimum requirement of eighteen (18) semester hours) –

1. Linguistics and English Linguistics;
2. Language and Culture or Sociolinguistics;
3. Second Language Acquisition;
4. Instructional Techniques for Teaching English Language Learners;
5. Curriculum for Teaching English Language Learners; and
6. Assessment Strategies for English Language Learners[.]; and

(D) Field and Clinical Experiences (three (3) semester hours) –

1. Culminating Clinical Experience. A supervised clinical experience in which the candidates acquire experience in planning for and working with ELL students in various instructional settings in both elementary and secondary schools. The clinical experience should include collaborating with other educators to support student learning.

[(2) The requirements of this rule shall become effective August 1, 2017.]

(2) Effective August 1, 2028, an applicant for a Missouri certificate of license to teach English Language Development (ELD) who possesses good moral character may be granted a certificate of license to teach ELD subject to the certification requirements found in 5 CSR 20-400.500 and the following additional certification requirements specific to ELD:

(A) General Requirements–

1. A valid Missouri permanent or professional certificate of license to teach;
2. A recommendation from the designated certification official from an educator preparation program approved by the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (department); and
3. A score equal to or in excess of the qualifying score on exit assessment(s) mandated by the State Board of Education. The official score(s) shall be submitted to the department;

(B) Subject-Specific Requirements. An applicant for a Missouri certificate of license in English Language Development may be granted an initial Missouri certificate of license by completing at least fifteen (15) semester hours of coursework related to English Language Development and having demonstrated, to the satisfaction of the educator preparation provider, mastery of the following competencies;

1. Knowledge about Language Development –

A. Candidates demonstrate knowledge of English language structures in different discourse contexts to promote acquisition of reading, writing, speaking, and listening skills across content areas. Candidates serve as language models for English learners;

B. Candidates demonstrate knowledge of second language acquisition theory and developmental process of language to set expectations for and facilitate language

learning;

C. Candidates demonstrate knowledge of language processes (e.g., interlanguage and language progressions) to facilitate and monitor English learners' language learning in English; and

D. Candidates apply knowledge of English academic language functions, learning domains, content-specific language and discourse structures, and vocabulary to promote English learners' academic achievement across content areas;

2. English Learners in the Sociocultural Context –

A. Candidates demonstrate knowledge of how dynamic academic, personal, familial, cultural, and social contexts, including sociopolitical factors, impact the education of English learners;

B. Candidates demonstrate knowledge of research and theories of cultural and linguistic diversity and equity that promote academic and social language learning for English learners;

C. Candidates devise and implement methods to understand each English learner's academic characteristics, including background knowledge, educational history, and current performance data, to develop effective, individualized instructional and assessment practices for their English learners;

D. Candidates devise and implement methods to learn about personal characteristics of the individual English learners (e.g., interests, motivations, strengths, needs) and their family (e.g., language use, literacy practices, circumstances) to develop effective instructional practices; and

E. Candidates identify and describe the impact of his/her identity, role, cultural understandings, and personal biases and conscious knowledge of U.S. culture on his/her interpretation of the educational strengths and needs of individual English learners and English learners in general;

3. Planning and Implementing English Instruction –

A. Candidates plan for culturally and linguistically relevant, supportive environments that promote English learners' learning. Candidates design scaffolded instruction of language and literacies to support standards and curricular objectives for English learners in the content areas;

B. Candidates instruct English learners using evidence-based, student-centered, developmentally appropriate interactive approaches;

C. Candidates adjust instructional decisions after critical reflection on individual English learner's learning outcomes in both language and content;

D. Candidates plan strategies to collaborate with other educators, school personnel, and families in order to support English learners' development of language and literacies in the content areas;

E. Candidates use and adapt relevant materials and resources, including digital resources, to plan lessons for English learners, support communication with other educators, school personnel, and English learners and to foster student learning of language and literacies in the content areas;

4. Assessment and Evaluation –

A. Candidates apply knowledge of validity, reliability, and assessment purposes to analyze and interpret student data from multiple sources, including norm-referenced and criterion-referenced tests. Candidates make informed instructional decisions that support language learning;

B. Candidates demonstrate understanding of

classroom-based formative, summative, and diagnostic assessments scaffolded for both English language and content assessment. Candidates determine language and content learning goals based on assessment data;

C. Candidates demonstrate knowledge of state-approved administrative considerations, accessibility features, and accommodations appropriate to English learners for standardized assessments; and

D. Candidates demonstrate understanding of how English language proficiency assessment results are used for identification, placement, and reclassification; and

5. Professionalism and Leadership –

A. Candidates demonstrate knowledge of effective collaboration strategies in order to plan ways to serve as a resource for English learner instruction, support educators and school staff, and advocate for English learners;

B. Candidates apply knowledge of school, district, and governmental policies and legislation that impact English learners' educational rights in order to advocate for English learners;

C. Candidates practice self-assessment and reflection, make adjustments for self-improvement, and plan for continuous professional development in the field of English language learning and teaching; and

D. Candidates engage in supervised teaching to apply and develop their professional practice using self-reflection and feedback from their cooperating teachers and supervising faculty; and

(C) Field and Clinical Experiences. A candidate must complete a minimum of fifty (50) student contact hours in supervised clinical experiences. Settings may include a candidate's own classroom, other classrooms, or community settings. Preparation providers are strongly encouraged to provide experiences in both grades K-6 and grades 7-12. A candidate must engage in each of the following activities:

1. Targeted language instruction with English learners in various settings and group sizes, as possible;

2. Shadowing the administration of state-selected standardized assessment of English language proficiency, as schedule permits;

3. Implementing instructional plans;

4. Collaborating with colleagues to develop, reflect on, and study teaching practice;

5. Analyzing data from student formative and summative assessments, classroom observations, etc.;

6. Identifying language strengths and needs;

7. Setting instructional goals;

8. Developing plans for language instruction;

9. Creating supportive learning environments for language development; and

10. Assessing the impact of targeted language instruction using the state-selected standardized assessment of English language proficiency and other assessment results.

Chapter 4 – Mental Health Programs

PROPOSED AMENDMENT

9 CSR 30-4.045 Intensive Community Psychiatric Rehabilitation (ICPR). The department is amending sections (1), (3)–(7), (9)–(11), and (13), deleting sections (7), (8), (12), and the publisher's note, adding section (8), and renumbering as necessary.

PURPOSE: This amendment updates standards and regulations for the provision of Intensive Community Psychiatric Rehabilitation (ICPR) services for children, youth, and adults.

(1) Intensive Community Psychiatric Rehabilitation (ICPR). ICPR is separate and distinct from other community psychiatric rehabilitation (CPR) services. The individual treatment plan shall specify interventions and supports to be provided by ICPR staff that are separate from other CPR services (such as community support) to prevent duplication of services.

(B) ICPR in all settings (*[children/youth] children, youth, and adult*) must be approved by the department prior to implementation. Written proposals shall be submitted to the department and must include the following:

1. The proposed service, setting, and timeline for implementation;

2. Method for determining eligibility for the service;

3. Staffing patterns/staff qualifications, including identification of *[the]* qualified mental health professional (QMHP) who supervises the ICPR setting;

4. Evidence that the site(s) is safe;

5. Process for obtaining multidisciplinary input into treatment plans;

6. Type of documentation to be used;

7. Strategy for preventing the duplication of services and supports delivered by residential and community-based CPR staff;

8. Plan for financial separation of room and board from services; and

9. Plan for providing personal spending funds to individuals served.

(C) ICPR is intended for –

1. *[Persons]Individuals* who would be hospitalized without the provision of intensive community-based intervention;

2. *[Persons]Individuals* who have extended or repeated hospitalizations;

3. *[Persons]Individuals* who have psychiatric crisis episodes;

4. *[Persons]Individuals* who are at risk of being removed

(3) Staff Requirements. Staff requirements for ICPR in residential settings are as follows:

(A) Intensive Residential Treatment Settings (IRTS) and Psychiatric Individualized Supported Living (PISL), in accordance with 9 CSR 40-1 and 9 CSR 40-4~~[.001]~~;

(C) Treatment Family Home-Based Services and Professional Parent Home-Based Services, as specified in section (7) of this rule and 9 CSR 40-6~~[.001]~~.

(4) ~~[Treatment for Children/Youth and Adults]~~**Treatment Teams for Non-Residential ICPR Programs**. All treatment teams shall be supervised by a qualified mental health professional (QMHP). The team coordinates a comprehensive array of services available to the individual through the CPR program as specified in 9 CSR 30-4.043. Other services shall be provided as clinically appropriate to meet individual needs, however, shall not duplicate services being provided on site. Each team shall include~~;~~—

(C) ICPR shall include~~;~~—

1. Multiple face-to-face, **in-person contacts** with the individual on a weekly basis, and may require contact on a daily basis, as required for each service type;

2. Services that are available twenty-four (24) hours per day, seven (7) days per week for programs that require daily services; and

3. Crisis response services that may be coordinated with an existing crisis system;

(E) A crisis prevention plan shall be developed for each individual, including clinical issues that may impact transition to less intensive services; **and**

(F) At a minimum, quarterly treatment plan reviews shall occur to ensure individuals are receiving the appropriate level of services to meet needs and goals ~~[; and]~~.

~~[(G)]~~(5) Individuals no longer need ICPR when —

~~[1.]~~ (A) There is a reduction of severe symptoms; and

~~[2.]~~ (B) They are able to function without intensive services; or

~~[3.]~~ (C) They choose to no longer receive intensive services.

~~[(5)]~~(6) Documentation Requirements. ICPR services must be documented in accordance with 9 CSR 10-7.030(13), and as specified in this rule.

(A) For individuals currently enrolled in the CPR program, the following documentation is required upon admission to ICPR:

1. Verification they meet admission criteria;

2. Acuity level; and

3. Treatment plan update indicating the higher level of service the individual will be receiving.

(B) For individuals newly admitted directly from the community into ICPR, an intake evaluation must be completed to substantiate acuity and criteria for admission.

1. Each individual shall have a psychiatric evaluation at admission. For individuals discharged from inpatient ~~[hospitalization]~~**settings** into ICPR, a psychiatric evaluation completed at the facility/hospital may be initially accepted.

2. The comprehensive assessment must be completed within thirty (30) days of admission except for individuals admitted provisionally.

3. Treatment plans shall be developed upon admission and be updated at least quarterly, or more frequently if clinically indicated.

(C) Treatment plans shall be reviewed as required for each service type and documented in the individual record with a summary progress note, including updates to the treatment plan as appropriate.

(D) Upon change from ICPR services, a transition summary must be completed by a QMHP and included in an updated treatment plan.

(E) Documentation must reflect delivery of services and supports such as daily summary progress notes, group notes, individualized progress notes documenting interventions including crisis assistance, conflict management, behavior redirection, and prompting or reminders.

~~[(6)]~~(7) ICPR for Children and Youth in **Non-Residential Settings**. Services are medically necessary to maintain a child with a Serious Emotional Disturbance (SED) in their natural home, or maintain a child with ~~[a serious mental illness or]~~ **an SED** in a community setting who has a history of failure in multiple community settings, and/or the presence of ongoing risk of harm to self or others, which would otherwise require long-term psychiatric hospitalization. ~~[Clinical interventions are provided by a multidisciplinary treatment team on a daily basis, and the interventions must be available twenty-four (24) hours per day, seven (7) days per week for stabilization purposes. The child's family and other natural supports may receive services when they are for the direct benefit of the child in accordance with their individual treatment plan.]~~

(A) When a child/youth is receiving this service, it is vital that the parent/guardian be actively involved in the program if the individual is to receive the full benefit of the program. Services shall be provided to the child/youth's family and other natural supports when such services are for the direct benefit of the individual, in accordance with their needs and treatment goals identified in the treatment plan, and for assisting in their recovery.

(B) Services shall include, but are not limited to~~;~~—

1. Medication administration/management of medication;

2. Ongoing behavioral health assessment and diagnosis;

3. Monitoring to assure individual safety;

4. Individual and group counseling; and

5. Community support.

(C) The ICPR multidisciplinary team shall include the following staff, based on the needs of the individual served:

1. Physician, psychiatrist, child psychiatrist, psychiatric resident, assistant physician, physician assistant, or ~~[A]~~ advanced ~~[P]~~**practice** ~~[R]~~**registered** ~~[N]~~**nurse** (APRN);

2. **Master's level** QMHP;

~~[3. RN;]~~

~~[4.]~~3. **An LPN licensed to furnish services within the scope of their practice;**

~~[5.]~~4. Community Support Specialist; and

~~[6. Individuals with a high school diploma, or equivalent certificate, under the direction and supervision of a QMHP.]~~

5. Credentialed peer provider.

~~[(D) Services are limited to ninety (90) days. Exceptions may be granted by the department and must be documented in the individual record.]~~

(D) Evidence-Based Practices (EBP) for Youth. Services involve proven treatment supports for children and youth

to address specific behavioral health needs. The selected EBP is based on individual needs and desired outcomes as identified in the treatment plan.

1. The EBP must be part of the approved list of EBP's or approved ahead of time by the department.

2. Activities associated with the service must include, but are not limited to –

A. Extensive monitoring and data collection;

B. Specific skills-training in a prescribed or natural environment;

C. Prescriptive responses to a psychiatric crisis and/or frequent contact with the individual's family members/natural supports, in addition to the arranged therapy sessions; and

D. Teams may be designated exclusively for individuals in ICPR or be mixed teams serving individuals in ICPR and CPR.

[(7) ICPR for Children/Youth in Residential Settings (Treatment Family Home-Based Services and Professional Parent Home-Based Services). Intensive therapeutic interventions are provided to improve the child's functioning and prevent them from being removed from their natural home and placed into a more restrictive residential treatment setting due to a SED.

(A) Services are for children whose therapeutic needs cannot be met in their natural home or an alternative therapeutic environment is required for transition back to their home or least restrictive setting.

(B) Providers must complete extensive, specialized training required by the department and meet department licensure requirements as specified in 9 CSR 40-6.

(C) The provider shall participate in pre-placement and ongoing meetings with the child's CPR treatment team and assist in development of the treatment plan. The provider is responsible for implementing the treatment plan and maintaining contact with the child's natural parent/guardian and completing documentation as required by the department.

(D) Services and supports are individualized and strength-based to meet the needs of the child and family across life domains to promote success, safety, and permanence in the home, school, and community. Therapeutic interventions target the child's serious mental health issues and promote positive development and healthy family functioning.

(E) Children must meet CPR admission criteria and their behavior must be sufficiently under control to live safely in a community setting with appropriate support.

(F) Staff of the CPR program who supervise the child's services must be available twenty-four (24) hours a day, seven (7) days per week to assist the provider if a crisis situation occurs.

(G) Placement, duration, and intensity of services is based on the specific needs of each child as specified in the MO HealthNet CPR Provider Manual, hereby incorporated by reference and made a part of this rule and available from the Department of Social Services, 615 Howerton Court, PO Box 6500, Jefferson City, MO 65102-6500, and as specified in the department contract, September 2019. This rule does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions to this publication.

(H) A maximum of three (3) children may receive services in a Treatment Family Home (TFH), subject to licensed capacity. One (1) child may be served in a Professional Parent Home (PPH).]

[(8) Evidence-Based Practices (EBP) for Youth. Services involve proven treatment supports for children and youth to address specific behavioral health needs. The selected EBP is

based on individual needs and desired outcomes as identified in the treatment plan.

(A) The EBP must be approved by the department.

(B) Activities associated with the service must include, but are not limited to:

1. Extensive monitoring and data collection;

2. Specific skills-training in a prescribed or natural environment; and

3. Prescriptive responses to a psychiatric crisis and/or frequent contact with the individual and/or family, in addition to the arranged therapy sessions.]

(8) ICPR for Children and Youth in Residential Settings. Residential providers shall participate in pre-placement and ongoing meetings with the child's CPR treatment team and assist in development of the treatment plan. The provider is responsible for implementing the treatment plan and maintaining contact with the youth's family members/natural supports and completing documentation as required by the department.

(A) Treatment Family Homes (TFH) and Professional Parent Homes (PPH). Intensive therapeutic interventions, provided to improve the youth's functioning and prevent them from being removed from the individual's home and placed into a more restrictive treatment setting due to an SED.

1. Providers must complete extensive, specialized training required by the department and meet department licensure requirements as specified in 9 CSR 40-1 and 9 CSR 40-6, as applicable.

2. A maximum of three (3) youth may receive services in a TFH at one time, subject to licensed capacity. One (1) youth may be served in a PPH.

(B) Intensive Residential Treatment Services (IRTS) and Psychiatric Individualized Supported Living (PISL). Services and supports are provided on-site where the individual lives under the supervision of a QMHP. Residential settings are structured to meet individual needs to ensure safety and prevent the individual's return to a more restrictive setting for services.

1. Serve youth between twelve (12) and seventeen (17) years of age and provide medically necessary services/supports to children and youth who have an SED and are transitioning from an inpatient psychiatric hospital or restrictive residential environment back to their home or community, or who are at risk of returning to inpatient care due to their clinical status or need for increased support.

2. Providers must meet requirements set forth by the department as specified in 9 CSR 30-4.045, 9 CSR 40-1, and 9 CSR 40-4.

3. Staff must be systematically trained to provide intensive interventions and supports to reduce the symptoms of mental illness and provide de-escalation and intervention techniques to individuals in a psychiatric crisis who are exhibiting behaviors potentially dangerous to themselves or others. A training plan must be in place for each staff identifying specific topics and frequency of refresher training on each topic, including documentation of course completion. Trainings must include youth-focused topics.

4. Support and rehabilitation services related to activities of daily living and crisis prevention and intervention must be provided.

5. Five (5) to sixteen (16) youth may be served in an IRTS.

A. IRTS serving one (1) through six (6) youth shall have at least one (1) staff member on duty at the residential

setting who is dressed and awake twenty-four (24) hours per day, seven (7) days per week.

B. IRTS serving seven (7) through twelve (12) youth shall have at least two (2) staff members on duty at the residential setting who is dressed and awake twenty-four (24) hours per day, seven (7) days per week.

C. IRTS serving thirteen (13) through sixteen (16) youth shall have at least three (3) staff members providing supervision of individuals during program hours, with a required ratio of two (2) staff members during designated individual sleeping hours.

6. One (1) to four (4) youth may be served in a PISL.

A. PISLs serving one (1) to four (4) youth shall have at least one (1) staff member on duty at the residential setting who is dressed and awake twenty-four (24) hours per day, seven (7) days per week.

(C) Children's Inpatient Diversion. A full array of intensive clinical services are provided to children/youth in a highly structured therapeutic setting. Services are designed to restore the child to a prior level of functioning, decrease risk of harm, and prevent transition to a more restrictive setting.

1. Emergency medical services must be available on-site or in close proximity.

2. A psychiatrist must supervise services which are delivered by a multi-disciplinary treatment team.

3. Licensed nursing staff must be available on a daily basis.

4. Licensed occupational and recreational therapists must be available based on individual needs.

5. The provision of services is limited to certified CPR programs for children and youth. The service must be accredited by a national accrediting body approved by the department, if applicable.

6. There shall be one (1) staff person for every two (2) individuals served during waking hours. The ratio for staff to individuals served may decrease to one (1) staff to six (6) individuals during sleeping hours.

(9) ICPR for Transition Age Youth in Non-Residential Settings. Services are delivered by transdisciplinary specialty teams using intensive wrap-around stabilization for individuals with substantial mental health and/or co-occurring needs, with the primary diagnosis being a mental disorder.

(A) Services are for individuals between seventeen (17) and twenty-five (25) years of age who may otherwise require inpatient hospitalization. The period of engagement varies based upon individual needs as specified in the treatment plan.

(B) A comprehensive assessment must be completed within thirty (30) days of admission.

(C) An individual treatment plan shall be developed within forty-five (45) days of admission and shall be updated as required by the department.

[(9)](10) ICPR for Adults in Non-Residential Settings.

(A) Services are delivered by teams using one (1) of the following methods:

[(A)]1. Linking and transitioning individuals from acute or long-term services to less intensive treatment. The time frame for services *[is approximately ninety (90) days or less, but]* varies according to individual needs;

[(B)]2. Modified Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) as approved by the department. The time frame varies based on individual needs; or

[(C)]3. Intensive wrap-around stabilization services for individuals with substantial mental health needs who may otherwise require inpatient hospitalization. The expected period of engagement *[is approximately ninety (90) days or less, but]* varies according to individual needs.

[(D)]4. Teams may be designated exclusively for individuals in ICPR or be mixed teams serving individuals in ICPR and *[rehabilitation services] CPR.*

[(E) A department-approved functional assessment must be completed monthly and documented in the individual record.

(F) Community support services shall not be provided while an individual is receiving ICPR non-residential services.]

[(10) ICPR for Transition Age Youth in Non-Residential Settings. Services are delivered by transdisciplinary specialty teams using intensive wrap-around stabilization for individuals with substantial mental health and/or co-occurring needs, with the primary diagnosis being a mental disorder.

(A) Services are for individuals who may otherwise require inpatient hospitalization. The period of engagement varies based upon individual needs as specified in the treatment plan.

(B) An initial comprehensive assessment must be completed within thirty (30) days of admission.

(C) An individual treatment plan shall be developed within forty-five (45) days of admission and shall be updated as required by the department.]

[(11) ICPR for Adults in Residential Settings] (B) [(IRT, PISLs, and Clustered Apartments (CA). Medically necessary services/ supports are provided to adults who have a serious mental illness and are transitioning from an inpatient psychiatric hospital to the community, or who are at risk of returning to inpatient care due to their clinical status or need for increased support. Services and supports are provided on-site where the individual lives under the supervision of a QMHP. Residential settings are structured to meet individual needs to ensure safety and prevent the individual's return to a more restrictive setting for services.

[(A)]1. Staff providing services/supports must be at least eighteen (18) years of age and have a minimum of a high school diploma or equivalent certificate. *[Two (2) years of direct health care experience, or a bachelor's degree in behavioral sciences, is preferred.]*

[(B)]2. Staff must be systematically trained to provide intensive interventions and supports to reduce the symptoms of mental illness, and provide de-escalation and intervention techniques to individuals in a psychiatric crisis who are exhibiting behaviors potentially dangerous to themselves or others. A training plan must be in place for each staff person identifying specific topics and frequency of refresher training on each topic, including documentation of course completion.

[(C)]3. Support and rehabilitation services related to activities of daily living and crisis prevention and intervention must be provided.

[(D)]4. Documentation must reflect delivery of direct, in-person (face-to-face) services and supports such as[,] daily summary progress notes, group notes, individualized progress notes documenting interventions including crisis assistance, conflict management, behavior redirection, and prompting or reminders.

5. Five (5) to sixteen (16) individuals may be served in an IRTS. One (1) to four (4) individuals may be served in a PISL.

6. PISL programs shall have at least one (1) staff on duty at the residential setting who is dressed and awake twenty-four (24) hours per day, seven (7) days per week.

7. IRTS shall have at least one (1) staff on duty at the

residential setting during the day and evening shifts for every eight (8) individuals receiving services, and one (1) staff on duty at the residential setting who is dressed and awake during the night shift for every sixteen (16) individuals served.

[(12) *Children's Inpatient Diversion.* A full array of intensive clinical services are provided to children/youth in a highly structured therapeutic setting. Services are designed to restore the child to a prior level of functioning, decrease risk of harm, and prevent transition to a more restrictive setting.

(A) *Emergency medical services must be available on site or in close proximity.*

(B) *A psychiatrist must supervise services which are delivered by a multi-disciplinary treatment team.*

(C) *Licensed nursing staff must be available on a daily basis.*

(D) *Licensed occupational and recreational therapists must be available based on individual needs.*

(E) *The provision of services is limited to certified or deemed-certified CPR programs for children and youth. The service must be accredited by a national accrediting body approved by the department.*

(F) *There shall be one (1) staff person for every two (2) individuals served during waking hours. The ratio for staff to individuals served may decrease to one (1) staff to six (6) individuals during sleeping hours.]*

[(13)](C) *Adult Inpatient Diversion.* A full array of intensive clinical services are provided to adults in a highly supervised twenty-four- (24-) hour, structured therapeutic setting. Services are designed to restore the individual to a prior level of functioning, decrease risk of harm, and prepare for transition to a less restrictive setting.

[(A)]1. *Emergency medical services must be available on-site or in close proximity.*

[(B)]2. *Intensive therapeutic services must be provided in a coordinated effort under the direction of a psychiatrist. Other staff on the treatment team includes licensed nurses, licensed psychologists, social workers, counselors, psychosocial rehabilitation specialists, and other trained supportive staff.*

[(C)](D) *Services shall include, but are not limited to:]-*

1. *Nursing;*
2. *Community support;*
3. *Psychosocial rehabilitation; and*
4. *Treatment for co-occurring disorders and other evidence-based services.*

[(D)]5. *The provision of services is limited to CPR programs for adults. The service must be accredited by a national accrediting body approved by the department.*

[(E)]6. *The staffing ratio for daytime and evening hours shall be one staff to six individuals served (1:6), and one staff to eight individuals served (1:8) during nighttime hours.*

13 CSR 70-94.030 Transformation of Rural Community Health (ToRCH) **is amended**.

A notice of proposed rulemaking containing the text of the proposed amendment was published in the *Missouri Register* on April 1, 2026 (51 MoReg 457-458). No changes have been made to the text of the proposed amendment, so it is not reprinted here. This proposed amendment becomes effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Code of State Regulations*.

SUMMARY OF COMMENTS: No comments were received.

ORDER OF RULEMAKING

By the authority vested in the Public Service Commission under sections 386.250 and 393.140, RSMo 2016, the commission adopts a rule as follows:

20 CSR 4240-23.040 is adopted.

A notice of proposed rulemaking containing the text of the proposed rule was published in the *Missouri Register* on February 17, 2026 (51 MoReg 312-314). Those sections with changes are reprinted here. This proposed rule becomes effective thirty (30) days after publication in the *Code of State Regulations*.

SUMMARY OF COMMENTS: The public comment period ended March 25, 2026, and the commission held a public hearing on the proposed rule on April 3, 2026. The record for the public hearing was held open until April 7, 2026, to receive additional responsive comments. The commission received timely written comments from five (5) people representing five (5) entities

during the comment period and five (5) people representing five (5) entities provided comments at the hearing. The comments were generally in support of the proposed rule with several suggested changes.

COMMENT #1: Scott Stacey, Deputy Counsel of Staff Counsel's Office, on behalf of the Missouri Public Service Commission staff (staff) commented in support of the rule. Mr. Stacey referred to staff's written comments, which included responses on March 24, 2026, and April 2, 2026. Present with Mr. Stacey was Claire Eubanks and Trevor Rucker of staff. Mr. Stacey commented that staff was in support of the proposed rule and were either opposed or not opposed to various comments of commentors as stated in staff's filed responses. Staff's April 2, 2026, filing also included recommended changes to the proposed rule and SRM Reporting Template for clarification and grammatical consistency that were not in response to filed comments by other parties. Staff specifically recommended the following revisions: 1) Add a definition for "generation resources" because this term is used in the definition for "capacity resources"; 2) Change the term "planned resource" to "planned capacity resource" for clarity; 3) Update the revision date for the SRM Reporting Template in section (2); 4) Minor wording changes for consistency; and 5) Adjust subsection numbers in section (1) to align with added and removed definitions. Staff's responsive positions will be addressed under each commentor's comments listed below.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The commission agrees with Mr. Stacey's comments and will accept some of the changes suggested by the Office of the Public Counsel (OPC), Union Electric Company, d/b/a Ameren Missouri, Evergy Missouri Metro, Inc., and Evergy Missouri West, Inc. (together referred to as "Evergy"), and Renew Missouri Advocates (Renew) as indicated below. The commission also agrees with staff's recommended clarifications and grammatical consistency revisions. Thus, the commission will modify the rule language in subsections (1)(J) and (1)(K) as published to rewrite from the plural to the singular; subsection (3)(D) changing filing the documents to submitting documents to be consistent with other parts of the rule and other commission rules; and the SRM Reporting Template for clarification and grammatical consistency. The commission will also add a definition in new subsection (1)(R) for "generation resources"; add the word "capacity" to subsection (1)(V) as published; add the word "wholly" for clarity to subsection (1)(H) as published; and renumber the remaining subsections as needed.

COMMENT #2: Lindsay VanGerpen, Senior Counsel, on behalf of OPC, submitted written comments and provided comments at the hearing. OPC proposed adding the word "appropriate" in the definition of "accredited capacity" in 20 CSR 4240-23.040(1)(A) to match the defined term from section 393.1080.4(1), RSMo, and 20 CSR 4240-23.040(1)(C).

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The commission thanks OPC for its comments and participation in the hearing. Staff commented that it agreed with OPC's suggestion of adding the word "appropriate." The commission agrees with OPC and staff's comments and will modify the language in (1)(A) as suggested. As a result, the commission will also add the word "appropriate" in subsections (1)(U), (1)(FF), and (1)(HH) as published for consistency.

COMMENT #3: Lindsay VanGerpen, Senior Counsel, on behalf of OPC, submitted written comments and provided comments at the hearing. OPC proposed striking definitions not used in either the proposed rule or in the updated SRM Reporting Template (20 CSR 4240-23.040(1)(E), (N), (R), (BB), (DD), and (JJ)).

The terms proposed by OPC include battery energy storage system (BESS); effective load carrying capability (ELCC); installed capacity (ICAP); pumped storage hydroelectric system; seasonal accredited capacity (SAC); and unforced capacity (UCAP). Staff commented that the terms ELCC, ICAP, SAC, and UCAP are included as dropdown options for accreditation methodologies in the SRM Reporting Template. Thus, those definitions should remain in the proposed rule. The term "pumped storage hydroelectric system" is included in the definition of "resource type" and should also be kept in the proposed rule.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: Staff agreed that the term "battery energy storage system (BESS)" may be removed. The commission agrees with OPC and staff's comments that the definition of BESS in subsection (1)(E) should be deleted and the remaining subsections renumbered. The commission agrees with staff that the terms ELCC, ICAP, SAC, UCAP, and pumped storage hydroelectric system should remain in the proposed rule.

COMMENT #4: Lindsay VanGerpen, Senior Counsel, on behalf of OPC, submitted written comments and provided comments at the hearing. OPC proposed modifying the reference to energy storage resource in the definition of "capacity resource" to match the defined term (20 CSR 4240-23.040(1)(H)).

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: Staff commented that it agrees that the term should be revised for consistency. Staff is recommending changing the term "energy storage system" to "energy storage system (ESS) resource" and using that term in the definition of "capacity resource." The commission agrees with staff that the term "energy storage resource" should be changed to "energy storage system (ESS) resource." The commission will modify subsections (1)(H) and (1)(P) as published, accordingly.

COMMENT #5: Lindsay VanGerpen, Senior Counsel, on behalf of OPC, submitted written comments and provided comments at the hearing. OPC proposed clarifying or striking the definition of "demand-side resources" (20 CSR 4240-23.040(1)(J)). OPC asserted the proposed definition does not identify what demand-side resources are. The term is only used once in a note in Exhibit 2 of the SRM Reporting Template.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: Staff commented that it does not oppose adding the wording "that reduce or shift demand" to the definition. However, the wording should be added earlier in the definition rather than at the end. Additionally, the term "demand-side resources" should be kept in the proposed rule. OPC states that there are difficulties with forecasting demand-side resources, but staff's position is that demand-side resources must be included in reporting to get a full resource adequacy picture. The commission agrees with staff that the definition should remain in the rule and that "that reduces or shifts demand" should be added to the definition in subsection (1)(J) as published.

COMMENT #6: Lindsay VanGerpen, Senior Counsel, on behalf of OPC, submitted written comments and provided comments at the hearing. OPC proposed modifying the defined term in 20 CSR 4240-23.040(1)(M) from "distribution system losses" to "distribution losses" to match the term used in the SRM Reporting Template.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: Staff commented that it does not oppose modifying the term to "distribution losses." The commission agrees with OPC and staff that the definition in subsection (1)(M) should be modified to "distribution losses" instead of "distribution system losses."

COMMENT #7: Lindsay VanGerpen, Senior Counsel, on behalf of OPC, submitted written comments and provided comments at the hearing. OPC proposed adding “required capacity” after “planning reserve margin” so that the defined term “planning reserve margin required capacity” is used instead of the undefined term “planning reserve margin” in the definition for “sufficient capacity” (20 CSR 4240-23.040(1)(FF)).

RESPONSE: Staff opposed the proposed change because the term “sufficient capacity” is defined in section 393.1080, RSMo. Staff also commented that a definition for “planning reserve margin” is being recommended in response to other stakeholder comments. The commission agrees with staff that the definition should not be revised as “sufficient capacity” is defined in statute. No changes were made as a result of these comments.

COMMENT #8: Lindsay VanGerpen, Senior Counsel, on behalf of OPC, submitted written comments and provided comments at the hearing. OPC proposed modifying the “winter season” defined term to “winter planning season” to match the term used in subsection (3)(B) of the proposed rule (20 CSR 4240-23.040(1)(KK)). Staff commented that it does not oppose the change.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The commission agrees the “winter season” defined term should be modified to “winter planning season” in subsection (1)(KK) as published.

COMMENT #9: At the hearing OPC opposed Evergy’s and staff’s proposed change to the definition of transmission losses in subsection (1)(II) as published. OPC stated its concerns were that the changes to the definition included two terms (“real power” and “transmission facilities”) that were undefined and unclear. OPC also submitted an additional written response on April 7, 2026, which reiterated OPC’s concern on the transmission losses definition.

RESPONSE: The commission disagrees with OPC as real power and transmission facilities are standard terms and do not need to be defined. No changes were made as a result of these comments.

COMMENT #10: James Lowery, on behalf of Union Electric Company d/b/a Ameren Missouri, submitted written comments and provided comments at the hearing. Present with Mr. Lowery were Andrew Meyer, Senior Director of Energy Management, and Steve Wills, Senior Director of Regulatory Affairs. Ameren Missouri generally agreed with staff’s amendments that were submitted on April 2, 2026, and indicated that the definition of “demand-side resources” appears to assume that an explicit capacity (in megawatts) is reported to Midcontinent Independent System Operator (MISO) when information on a utility’s demand-side resources are submitted to MISO. Ameren Missouri wanted to clarify that no such explicit capacity value is reported to MISO, but the company can supply such information to the commission.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks Ameren Missouri for its comments and participation in the hearing. Staff commented that since Ameren Missouri has stated that it is able to provide the information, staff does not recommend any changes based on this comment. The commission thanks Ameren Missouri for its comments and participation in the hearing. The commission agrees that if the information can be provided to the commission, then no changes to the rule are needed. No changes were made as a result of these comments.

COMMENT #11: Ameren Missouri stated the rule should provide clarity regarding future capacity purchases and how they should be included in the SRM Reporting Template. If

additional capacity was needed, Ameren Missouri would first try to procure the capacity bilaterally, which it would report in Exhibit 6 Contracted Resources. If additional capacity was bought in the MISO Planning Resource Auction, Ameren Missouri would report this in row 44 of Exhibit 3 Planning Resources. Staff agreed with Ameren Missouri’s explanation of how it would report the additional capacity in the SRM Reporting Template. Therefore, staff stated that clarification in the rule language is not necessary.

RESPONSE: The commission agrees with staff that no clarification is needed. No changes were made as a result of these comments.

COMMENT #12: Ameren Missouri stated that in Exhibits 1 and 2 in the SRM Reporting Template it is not clear for which region the forecast peak demand coincident to the RTO/ISO should be provided. Staff responded that once the appropriate RTO/ISO is selected from the dropdown list at the top of each sheet in the SRM Reporting Template, the appropriate region will automatically populate. For MISO, the sheets will show MISO LRZ 5. At the hearing, Ameren Missouri commented that it provides three (3) forecasts to MISO – non-coincident peak demand, zonal coincident peak demand, and coincident peak to the MISO region. Ameren Missouri further commented that the template only sought non-coincident peak demand and zonal peak demand. Also at the hearing, staff indicated that changes to the template may be needed to address Ameren Missouri’s comment.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: After reviewing the comments, the commission determines that changes should be made to the SRM Reporting Template to address Ameren Missouri’s comments. The commission determines that all three (3) demand forecasts that Ameren Missouri provides to MISO should be included in the SRM Reporting Template. The commission will make the following changes: 1) Add a section to Exhibit 1 Actual Demand for peak demand coincident to RTO/ISO zone (only applicable to MISO), 2) Add lines to Exhibit 2 Forecast Demand for coincident peak demand to RTO/ISO zone (only applicable to MISO), and 3) Update the coincident peak demand to RTO/ISO region fields on Exhibits 1 and 2 so that when MISO is selected, it will now display MISO Region rather than MISO LRZ 5. The commission will make these changes to the SRM Reporting Template and section (2) will be revised to reflect the new publication date for the SRM Reporting Template that is incorporated by reference in that section.

COMMENT #13: Ameren Missouri proposed adding a line to Exhibit 3 for “Planning Reserve Margin, %.” Staff did not oppose adding this information to the SRM Reporting Template and suggested the term “planning reserve margin” will need to be defined and provided a definition in its responsive comments. RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The commission agrees with adding a line to Exhibit 3 of the SRM Reporting Template and adding staff’s suggested definition of “planning reserve margin” as the new subsection (1)(X). The commission will also renumber subsequent subsections as needed.

COMMENT #14: Ameren Missouri proposed removing the commercial operation date (COD) column in Exhibit 5 Owned Resources from the SRM Reporting Template because the resources are already in operation and the COD does not impact the resources’ capacity. Also, more rows should be added to accommodate the number of units that Ameren Missouri will need to report (110 rows). Staff stated the COD for resources already in operation provides information for how long the resource has been in operation. Thus, the COD column in Exhibit 5 Owned Resources should remain. However, staff

indicated that Exhibit 5 Owned Resources should be expanded to allow all owned resources to be included.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The commission disagrees with removing the COD column, but Exhibit 5 Owned Resources will be expanded on the SRM Reporting Template incorporated by reference in section (2) to allow all owned resources to be included.

COMMENT #15: Ameren Missouri proposed adding a definition for “contracted capacity resources” in section (1). Ameren Missouri further stated the term “contracted resources” should be defined. Renew stated it supports the comments by Ameren Missouri regarding the need for a definition for “contracted resources.” Staff agreed with Ameren Missouri and Renew that the term “contracted resources” and also the term “company owned capacity resources” should be defined. Staff presented suggested definitions which the parties present at the hearing did not oppose.

Ameren Missouri also commented that the dropdowns in Exhibit 6 of the SRM Reporting Template should be corrected. Ameren stated when it contracts for capacity, it will not always know the location of the resource, so columns (d)-(h) in Exhibit 6 Contracted Resources should have a dropdown option of “unknown” rather than just “Y” or “N.” The “Maximum Operating Capacity Contracted” columns should also allow a response of “unknown” because Ameren Missouri contracts for the accredited capacity and, therefore, the maximum capability of the resource does not matter. Also, some dropdowns appear to be inoperable.

In response to other stakeholder comments, staff recommended adding a line to Exhibit 3 Planning Resources for system capacity purchases for contracted capacity that is not tied to a specific unit or resource. Staff explained this change may address Ameren Missouri’s comment regarding not knowing the location of a contracted resource. Regarding an unknown maximum operating capacity for a contracted resource, staff indicated those cells do not contain dropdown lists, so it would be acceptable to put “unknown” if an electrical corporation does not have that information. Further, staff stated that the dropdowns on Exhibit 6 of the SRM Reporting Template that did not have any options to select should be corrected.

During the hearing, Ameren Missouri commented that clarification was still needed regarding contracted resources that Ameren Missouri does not have information regarding the specific resource or unit. Staff responded at the hearing that capacity not tied to specific resources should be included in the system capacity resources added to Exhibit 3 of the SRM Reporting Template. Ameren Missouri accepted staff’s clarification.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The commission agrees that staff’s suggested definitions should be added to the rule and will make such changes. These definitions will be added as new subsections (1)(I) and (1)(J). The commission will also correct the dropdowns in Exhibit 6 of the SRM Reporting Template incorporated by reference in section (2).

COMMENT #16: James Fischer, on behalf of Evergy, submitted written comments and provided comments at the hearing. During the hearing, Evergy indicated it had six (6) proposed modifications to the proposed rule. Evergy indicated it agreed with staff’s amendments and/or responsive comments that were submitted on April 2, 2026, and proposed removing the definition of “demand-side resources” in subsection (1)(J) as published because the term is not used in the proposed rule or SRM Reporting Template. Staff disagreed and stated the term

“demand-side resources” is used in a note on Exhibit 2 Forecast Demand of the SRM Reporting Template and the definition should remain.

RESPONSE: The commission disagrees with the removal of the “demand-side resources” definition as the term is used within the SRM Reporting Template. No changes were made as a result of these comments.

COMMENT #17: Evergy proposed revising the definition of “demand response resources” in subsection (1)(K) to better reflect how Southwest Power Pool (SPP) and MISO approach demand response. Specifically, Evergy recommended adding two sentences to the end of the definition to clarify how demand response is quantified and measured.

Staff did not oppose adding the sentence regarding quantification as suggested by Evergy. However, staff opposed adding the second sentence attempting to define how demand response is measured. Staff’s position is that this is unnecessary for the definition of “demand response resources.” Staff stated that the requirements for measurement of demand response resources considered in resource adequacy determinations are set by the appropriate RTO/ISO, and can be different between RTO/ISOs, so the definition should remain flexible to accommodate any differences.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The commission agrees with adding the first sentence proposed by Evergy and agrees with staff that no other changes to the definition are warranted. Therefore, the commission will amend the definition of “demand response resource” in subsection (1)(K) as published.

COMMENT #18: Evergy proposed revising the definition of “transmission losses” in subsection (1)(II) as published to better align with the calculation of actual transmission losses. Staff responded that electrical corporations may get values for transmission losses differently for the purposes of resource adequacy, so the definition of “transmission losses” in the proposed rule was meant to be flexible to allow for these differences. If other electrical corporations do not object to Evergy’s proposed revisions, staff does not oppose the revisions. No other electrical corporations opposed the revisions suggested. OPC opposed the revisions suggested, as discussed above.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The commission agrees with Evergy and staff and will modify the definition of transmission losses in subsection (1)(II) as published to read “Transmission losses means the amount of real power, expressed as a percentage, that is lost in transmission facilities when delivering energy to load.”

COMMENT #19: Evergy proposed revising subsections (3)(B) and (3)(C) to remove exact dates by which electrical corporations in SPP shall submit an SRM Reporting Template to allow flexibility for anticipated changes in SPP related to submission dates and any future changes SPP makes to planning seasons or submission deadlines. Staff responded that specific dates by which SRM Reporting Templates shall be submitted should be kept in the rule. Staff stated the dates in the rule can be updated in future rulemakings if an RTO/ISO changes submission dates. **RESPONSE:** The commission agrees with staff that the specific dates by which SRM Reporting Templates shall be submitted should remain in the rule. No changes were made as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #20: Evergy proposed combining purchases and sales on Exhibits 5 and 6 of the SRM Reporting Template into one sheet and including on that sheet a place for reporting system

capacity sales that are not from a specific unit or resource. Staff opposed that recommendation. Staff stated it recognized that system capacity sales do not clearly belong in Exhibits 5 or 6. Staff suggested adding a line to Exhibit 3 for system capacity sales. Staff also stated that as a result, a definition for “system capacity sales” should be added to the proposed rule, as well as a definition for “system capacity purchases.” Staff further recommended adding lines to Exhibit 3 for planned system capacity sales, system capacity purchases, and planned system capacity purchases. The parties present at the hearing did not oppose the suggested definitions.

RESPONSE AND EXPLANATION OF CHANGE: The commission agrees with staff that lines should be added to Exhibit 3 of the SRM Reporting Template for system capacity sales, system capacity purchases, planned system capacity sales, and planned system capacity purchases. The commission also agrees with the addition of the definitions of “system capacity sales” and “system capacity purchases” given by staff in its responsive comments. The commission disagrees with Evergy that there should be a combined sheet for purchases and sales. Thus, the commission will add those definitions as new subsections (1)(JJ) and (1)(KK).

COMMENT #21: Evergy proposed that the accreditation methodology columns should be removed from Exhibit 7 Planned Resources in the SRM Reporting Template. Staff responded that Evergy did not include reasoning for why the accreditation methodology should be removed from Exhibit 7 and stated it is beneficial to know the accreditation methodology that electrical corporations are using to estimate the accredited capacity of planned resources so that staff can evaluate if the estimated accredited capacities are reasonable. RESPONSE: The commission agrees with staff that this information is beneficial and no changes were made as a result of this comment.

COMMENT #22: Nicole Mers, General Counsel, on behalf of Renew, submitted written comments and provided comments at the hearing. During the hearing, Renew indicated it had two (2) proposed modifications or comments to the proposed rule one of which has been addressed above. Additionally, Renew commented that the information reported pursuant to this rule, with appropriate treatment of confidential information, should be filed in a manner that is accessible to all appropriate stakeholders, similar to current reporting requirements for capital investment plans, renewable energy standard compliance, and other similar annual reporting. Alternatively, the information reported pursuant to this rule should be transmitted, with appropriate safeguards for confidential information, as part of the integrated resource planning (IRP) process, to appropriate stakeholders. Renew suggested that this can be accomplished by including the information in the minimum filing requirements of the future, new IRP rules.

Staff commented that submission of the SRM Reporting Template under the proposed SRM rule should be separate from filings under the future IRP rules. Staff stated it intends that submissions of the SRM Reporting Template will be non-case submissions in the commission’s electronic filing and information system (EFIS), rather than in a case docket. The general public is able to view non-case submissions in EFIS, except for confidential and highly confidential attachments. The designation of confidential information is covered by 20 CSR 4240-2.135.

RESPONSE: The commission thanks Renew for its comments and participation in the hearing. The commission agrees with staff and no changes were made as a result of these comments.

20 CSR 4240-23.040 State Reliability Mechanism (SRM)

(1) Definitions. The following definitions shall apply in this rule:

(A) Accredited capacity means the deliverable or firm capacity value as determined and assigned to a resource by the appropriate regional transmission organization or independent system operator (RTO/ISO) for determining resource adequacy;

(E) Behind the meter generation (BTMG) means a generation resource located downstream of an electrical corporation’s interconnection point to an RTO/ISO’s system, such as a substation, but only one that is considered by the appropriate RTO/ISO in resource adequacy determinations;

(F) Bilateral contract means an agreement for the rights to future capacity;

(G) Capacity resource means a generation resource, demand response resource, or energy storage system (ESS) resource wholly owned, partially owned, or contracted by an electrical corporation for providing resource adequacy;

(H) Coincident peak demand means the demand experienced by an electrical corporation at the time that the appropriate RTO/ISO experiences peak demand during the applicable time period;

(I) Company-owned capacity resource means a capacity resource for which an electrical corporation has an ownership stake for a portion or all of the accredited capacity;

(J) Contracted capacity resource means a capacity resource for which an electrical corporation has an agreement for a portion or all of the accredited capacity;

(K) Demand-side resource means a resource or program that reduces or shifts demand that is included in resource adequacy determinations submitted to the appropriate RTO/ISO and may be considered a capacity resource in accordance with the rules of the appropriate RTO/ISO or may be included in an electrical corporation’s peak forecast but not both;

(L) Demand response resource means a resource that is considered by the appropriate RTO/ISO in resource adequacy determinations that can be dispatched by the appropriate RTO/ISO or electrical corporation to reduce or shift demand. Demand response is the quantified impact reduction of electricity consumption, across one (1) or more customer sites deployed in response to system reliability needs or an economic price signal;

(M) Distribution losses means the amount of real power that is lost across an electrical corporation’s system that is included in the electrical corporation’s forecast peak demand;

(P) Energy storage system (ESS) resource means a resource capable of capturing energy, storing it, and dispatching the energy back into the bulk power system or the utility’s distribution system, and accredited by the appropriate RTO/ISO in resource adequacy determinations;

(R) Generation resource means a resource capable of producing electricity and dispatching the electricity into the bulk power system or the utility’s distribution system, and accredited by the appropriate RTO/ISO in resource adequacy determinations;

(S) Installed capacity (ICAP) means an accreditation method by which a capacity value is assigned to a generation resource based on the demonstrated output of the generation resource or the contracted output of the generation resource;

(T) Load diversity factor means the ratio of an electrical corporation’s coincident peak demand to the actual peak demand of the service territory and shall be determined by dividing the coincident peak demand by the non-coincident peak demand;

(U) Maximum operating capacity means the current maximum intended output of a generator as designed by the manufacturer (e.g., nameplate), as modified after initial installation, as determined based on annual testing required by an appropriate RTO/ISO, or as limited by licensing, permitting, or other operating restrictions;

(V) Non-coincident peak demand means the maximum peak demand experienced by an electrical corporation during the applicable time period, regardless of the demand experienced by the appropriate RTO/ISO;

(W) Planned capacity resource means a capacity resource that has not yet been placed into operation or for which an electrical corporation has not yet purchased or contracted;

(X) Planning reserve margin (PRM) means the percentage, set by the appropriate RTO/ISO, above the forecasted coincident peak demand for which an electrical corporation must have adequate capacity resources to meet. For electrical corporations that take part in the SPP resource adequacy process, the PRM is the base PRM;

(Y) Planning reserve margin required capacity means the capacity determined by the appropriate RTO/ISO for which an electrical corporation must have equal to or greater than accredited capacity for the applicable time period;

(Z) Planning season, for electrical corporations that take part in the MISO resource adequacy process, means the seasons (summer, fall, winter, spring) in a planning year;

(AA) Planning year (PY) means from June 1 of one year through May 31 of the following year that is used for the SRM Reporting Template as described in section (2) of this rule;

(BB) Power purchase agreement (PPA) means an electricity supply agreement between a power producer and an electrical corporation;

(CC) Public Utility Regulatory Policies Act of 1978 (PURPA) qualifying facility (QF) means a cogeneration facility or a small power production facility that meets the requirements of 18 CFR 292.201 through 292.211 and has obtained a QF certification in accordance with 18 CFR 292.207;

(DD) Pumped-storage hydroelectric system means an ESS where water is pumped to a reservoir at a higher elevation during times of lesser demand, and then the water is released to a reservoir at a lower elevation with the water passing through turbines to generate electricity at times of increased demand;

(EE) Resource type means the fuel or source from which a capacity resource obtains energy, including but not limited to natural gas, coal, oil, solar, wind, nuclear, hydroelectric, geothermal, and pumped-storage hydroelectric system;

(FF) Seasonal accredited capacity (SAC) means an accreditation method by which a capacity value is assigned to a capacity resource based on the availability of the capacity resource during times of increased demand during the relevant season;

(GG) Service territory means the area in which the electrical corporation has been approved by the commission to provide electrical service to customers;

(HH) Sufficient capacity means owned or contracted-for capacity that meets the planning reserve margin or successor metric established by the appropriate RTO/ISO or established by the commission if the electrical corporation is not a participant in a regional transmission organization or independent system operator;

(II) Summer planning season, for electrical corporations that take part in the SPP resource adequacy process, means June 1 through September 30 each year;

(JJ) System capacity purchases means purchases for a specific amount of accredited capacity not tied to specific generation

resources;

(KK) System capacity sales means sales for a specific amount of accredited capacity not tied to specific generation resources;

(LL) Transmission limitations means known and measurable constraints within the appropriate RTO/ISO's system that limit the amount of power that can be delivered from an electrical corporation's capacity resources to the electrical corporation's system;

(MM) Transmission losses means the amount of real power, expressed as a percentage, that is lost in transmission facilities when delivering energy to load;

(NN) Unforced capacity (UCAP) means an accreditation method by which a capacity value is assigned to a generation resource after adjusting the ICAP for the expected availability or historical availability of the generation resource or fuel availability; and

(OO) Winter planning season, for electrical corporations that take part in the SPP resource adequacy process, means December 1 through March 31 each year.

(2) Reporting form. The SRM Reporting Template shall include the electrical corporation's plan to own or have rights to sufficient capacity to meet its capacity obligations for the upcoming planning year and each of the three (3) subsequent years. The SRM Reporting Template, revised April 17, 2026, is hereby incorporated by reference and made a part of this rule. The SRM Reporting Template is available at www.psc.mo.gov/. This rule does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions.

(3) Reporting.

(D) An electrical corporation shall submit supplemental SRM Reporting Templates if inaccurate information or mistakes are identified in the electrical corporation's initial submission or previous supplemental submissions of any of the above within fourteen (14) days of the discovery by the electrical corporation of the inaccurate information or mistakes.
