HISTORICAL AND BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

Missouri Governor John Miller (1825-1832) was the first to advocate for a penitentiary in Missouri's new capital, Jefferson City. With the passage of the 1829 law regarding the new Permanent Seat of Government, the State assured that revenue from land sales would go both toward a seminary of learning and a penitentiary. On January 16, 1833 the General Assembly approved "An Act for the Erection of a Penitentiary within the State of Missouri." It was to be located in Jefferson City and run by two commissioners who would be elected by the General Assembly. In 1835 a contract between James Dunnica as Commissioner of the Penitentiary and J.A. Crump and E. Finley for stonework was approved. The first inmate, Wilson Eidson, was

received on March 8, 1836. The Missouri State Penitentiary (MSP) would be the first penitentiary west of the Mississippi River.

Tens of thousands of men and women would pass through the doors of the MSP by the time it closed in 2004. In its time, it saw prisoners from all over the country, including federal prisoners and women. The site grew to 147 acres.

The Department of Corrections as we know it today was not officially formed until 1946. Prior to that, correctional facilities were run by the State Prison Board as well as various charitable boards. Both minors and adults would be under its auspices.

Three so-called training schools for boys and girls were established by various incarnations of the Department in Boonville, Chillicothe, and Tipton, MO.

Later, the MSP became too crowded and now there are many major correctional facilities for adults scattered throughout the state.

Today the Department includes several divisions, including Probation & Parole, Inmate Education, and Planning, Research and Evaluation.

Timeline:

01/16/1833	“An Act for the Erection of a Penitentiary within the State of Missouri” is approved by the General Assembly.
03/08/1836	The Penitentiary receives its first inmate.
03/30/1887	The General Assembly approves “An Act to Provide for the Locating and Erecting a State Reform School for Boys,” which would be located in Boonville, MO. The first inmate, Menter Smith, was received on his 15 th birthday, January 15, 1889.
03/30/1887	The General Assembly approves “An Act to Establish an Institution under the Name and Style of the State Industrial Home for Girls,” which would be located in Chillicothe, MO. Its first two years of operation (1889-1890) would see only 11 girls.
03/19/1897	The State Board of Charities and Corrections is established that combines eleemosynary institutions with correctional facilities under one board.
06/14/1909	The State Industrial Home for Negro Girls is established. Due to difficulty finding a for the school, it would not open its doors until June 1916 in Tipton, MO. It was under the control of the State Eleemosynary Board for its first year of operation, but was then transferred to the State Prison Board when it was established in 1917.
03/17/1913	The Board of Pardons and Paroles is established by the General Assembly.
04/12/1917	“An Act to Create and Establish a State Prison Board” is approved by the General Assembly, consolidating the MSP, the Missouri Training School for Boys, the Industrial Home for Girls, the Industrial Home for Negro Girls, and any future institutions under one body; eleemosynary institutions are no longer part of corrections.

04/22/1927	The Missouri Intermediate Reformatory is established for men aged 17 to 25 convicted of a felony other than murder or treason. Construction begins in 1929 and the first inmate is received on January 12, 1932. This institution will be later known simply as "Algoa" and is located just outside Jefferson City.
06/24/1937	The Board of Probation and Parole is established by the General Assembly (no longer called "Pardons" and Paroles).
05/02/1946	The Department of Corrections is established, replacing the State Prison Board. With it come the Division of Penal Institutions, Educational Institutions, and the Board of Probation and Parole.
08/11/1951	With SB23, the General Assembly orders the Tipton Training School for Negro Girls to be closed and its inmates to be integrated with the Chillicothe Girls' School. This will not actually happen for five more years, though. The facilities are then supposed to be transferred wholly over to the Department of Corrections.
07/14/1955	The Department of Corrections is reorganized with HB377.
08/29/1956	The Tipton Training School for Negro Girls closes and its remaining inmates are transferred to the Chillicothe Training School for Girls.
07/23/1965	The Moberly Training Center for Men is established, created by the General Assembly with SB73.
1975	Whole departments across the state are reorganized, including Corrections. Corrections is now under the Department of Social Services. It will be moved out to its own separate department again in 1981.
06/30/1981	The Chillicothe Training School for Girls closes. In its place a new women's correctional facility is established.
06/23/1982	The Boonville Training School for Boys is slated to close, which it does within the next year. Its grounds, as with the girls' school, will be turned into an adult correctional facility.
09/15/2004	The Missouri State Penitentiary closes and its inmates are transferred to the new Jefferson City Correctional Center.

DIVISION OF INMATE EDUCATION

The Division of Inmate Education was officially created in 1955 when the Department was reorganized. Prior to 1955, there were some programs to education the inmates, but there was no separate division. Early programs were at the Intermediate Reformatory (Algoa) beginning in 1932 when that institution opened, and also at the MSP starting in 1947 or 1948. The MSP program consisted of a Supervisor of Education who supervised inmate instructors.

The “new” 1955 Division of Inmate Education had its own budget and worked with the Department of Education to meet their standards. Both academic and vocational educational programs were started. By 1971, the Division employed 55 staff who worked at MSP, Algoa, Moberly, and Tipton.

The Division is now re-named Offender Rehabilitative Services.

DIVISION OF PROBATION AND PAROLE

This Division began under the auspices of the Department of Penal Institutions as the Board of Pardons and Paroles, which was formed by act of the General Assembly on March 17, 1913. The Board consisted of three members appointed by the Governor. The Board's duties were to, "investigate fully the merits of all applications for executive clemency properly coming before the governor, and all applications for such clemency shall be heard and investigated without unnecessary delay. In each and every such case said board shall, for the information of the governor, make a written report of its findings of the facts in such case, together with their recommendation thereon." (1913 Laws of Missouri pp. 227-228)

Section 132 of SB 298 passed on April 12, 1917 repealed the 1913 act and replaced it with a State Prison Board. The Prison Board had very extensive duties, only one of which was to recommend prisoners' clemency to the Governor.

It didn't take long for another law to be passed. With SB 481, the General Assembly repealed all prior acts regarding paroles and replaced it with a new one. This new act created a Board of Paroles "in any judicial circuit in this state, composed of a single county and having two judges of the circuit court and which now have or may hereafter have a population of not less than 80,000 inhabitants, or more than 200,000 inhabitants, and which now or may hereafter adjoin a city containing a population of more than 500,000 inhabitants." (1919 Laws of Missouri p. 609) SB 254 did the same thing for cities with a population between 200,000 and 500,000. Finally, SB 270 established a Parole Commission for the Court of Criminal Correction in St. Louis. All three bills were passed in 1919. In 1921 the acts were amended slightly to change the population restrictions.

Although there were a few other minor changes between 1921 and 1937, the next big change regarding probations and paroles in Missouri occurred in 1937. On June 24, the General Assembly passed CSHB 511-514 that created the Board of Probation and Parole. The Board had the power to make recommendations to the Governor for paroles, commutations of sentence, and pardons. Probations would now be controlled by the circuit and criminal courts of Missouri, as per Section 1 of the new law.

On May 2, 1946, the State established a new board. This board was to be called the Board of Probation and Parole (like the one in 1937), but this time it would be part of the newly-created Department of Corrections. The Board was initially made up of three members appointed by the Governor. Later that membership grew to five; it is assisted by three other consultants called parole analysts as well as the Deputy State Compact Administrator.

A July 9, 1965 act established a Board of Probation and Parole in Jackson County. In 1975 the entire State's organizational structure was changed, and with that the Division of Probation and Parole was established. Around 1981, it went back to being called a Board of Probation and Parole.

[This summary is not intended to be a thorough accounting of the history of this board. It's possible other acts were passed that are not mentioned above.]

STATE BOARD OF CHARITIES AND CORRECTIONS

This supervisory board was formed by an act of the General Assembly in 1897 “that it might bring to the eleemosynary and penal institutions of the state the benefits of sympathetic supervision, and that it might also safeguard the interests of the people of the state in the administration of these institutions.” (Bulletin No. 1 p. 3) The Board of Charities and Corrections consisted of seven members who served as inspectors of the state’s public mental hospitals, schools, homes, and correctional facilities. They also supervised county-level almshouses (poorhouses), jails, and occasionally county hospitals. See also the Department of Mental Health state documents finding aid for further reports of state eleemosynary institutions and state hospitals.

STATE BOARD OF TRAINING SCHOOLS

As a result of Missouri's new 1945 State Constitution, this board was established on July 1, 1946 to administer the State's three training/industrial schools in Boonville, Chillicothe, and Tipton. The Board fell under the newly-formed Department of Corrections in the Division of Education. Prior to the 1945 Constitution, these three institutions were classified as correctional facilities. Now they would be considered educational facilities under Article IV Section 38. The Board was responsible for not only for setting students' educational courses, but also for hiring and firing staff.
