### HISTORICAL AND BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES

James Blair, Sr. (1871-1944) was an attorney from DeKalb County, Missouri. He married Grace Emma Ray in 1901 and the couple had five children together. The eldest child was James T. Blair, Jr. who grew up to become Governor of Missouri. The elder Blair became a Justice of the Missouri Supreme Court in 1915 and served through 1924.

Blair's biography from the 1923-1924 Blue Book pp. 115 & 117 reads:

“James T. Blair, Maysville (Democrat). – Born at Loudon, Tenn., November 11, 1871. He came to Missouri May 14, 1881. Educated in the public schools at Osborn, DeKalb county, and at Cumberland University, where he received the degree of A. B. in 1892 and of L.L. B. in 1895. He was president of Obion College in 1895 and 1896. He was married at Maysville June 19, 1901, to Miss Grace E. Ray. From 1903 to 1908 he resided at Springfield, Mo. He represented DeKalb county in the Legislature, 1899-1901. He was appointed and served as a member of the revision committee to revise the statutes of 1899, and served as Assistant Attorney-General from January 11, 1909, to April 11, 1911. He was appointed by the Supreme Court a member of the bipartisan commission created by the Forty-sixth General Assembly to aid the Supreme Court, which appointment he resigned when elected Judge of Supreme Court in 1914 for a term of ten years, expiring December 31, 1924.”
