Documents Related to Executions, 1895-1977

### Scope and Content

George and William Taylor were convicted of killing Gus Meeks, Meeks' wife, and two children. The murder occurred on May 10, 1894 in Sullivan County, MO. A third Meeks child, Nellie, survived and told the story of the murders to the court. George Taylor escaped and was never caught. William was executed by hanging on April 30, 1896.

Noah McGinnis was found guilty of murdering Frederick M. Borcharding on April 16, 1899 in Butler County, MO. McGinnis was executed by hanging on December 20, 1900. (Some newspapers list the date as December 31.)
