#### Alfred A. Speer Capitol Collection

*Abstract:* Alfred A. Speer was one of four men leading the Capitol Dedication Ceremony Committee in 1924. The Committee was under the auspices of the Missouri Capitol Commission. This collection contains Speer's correspondence, newspaper clippings, publications and notes regarding the Ceremony, which was held in Jefferson City on October 6, 1924.

### Historical and Biographical Notes

Alfred A. Speer (1858-1935) served on the Capitol Dedication Committee in 1924. The Committee organized the Dedication Ceremonies, which took place on October 6, 1924 in Jefferson City. The Capitol Dedication Pageant was divided into five parts: a prologue and four epochs.

Prologue:

Features a woman dressed as the “Spirit of Jefferson City” accompanied by the four epoch queens and a children’s choir.

**Epoch One: Epoch of the Pioneer**

Picturing the early settling of the Louisiana and Missouri Territories, presided over by Mrs. Herbert S. Hadley, wife of the former Governor.

**Epoch Two: Epoch of Development**

Showing the growth of the state after settlement, presided over by Mrs. Elliott W. Major, wife of the current Governor.

**Epoch Three: Epoch of the World War**

Depiction of war scenes, presided by Mrs. Frederick D. Gardner.

**Epoch Four: Epoch of Progress**

An attempt to exhibit the rapid strides toward a greater civilization that have been taken in the past few years, presided by Mrs. Arthur M. Hyde.

Rain, thunder, and lightning cut the Pageant short at the end of Epoch Three. The Pageant closed with a fireworks display.

### Scope and Content

This series contains correspondence to and from the Capitol Dedication Committee, which is under the auspices of the Missouri Capitol Commission. The correspondence is largely from A.A. Speer. Original order was kept; half was arranged chronologically, the other half by topic. Most items are on onionskin paper. Beginning in July 1924, most of the chronological correspondence folders contain original letters by Blanche Leach (aka Mrs. Frank Leach), the director of the Dedication Day Pageant. All materials concern the Capitol Dedication, which was held on October 6, 1924.
