# **Historical and Biographical Notes**

The Missouri State Penitentiary (MSP) was the first penal institution west of the Mississippi River. It opened in 1836. Over the next 170 years, the Penitentiary grounds grew until the facility eventually closed in 2004. The buildings are now open for tours. Hundreds of thousands of inmates have passed through the gates of "The Walls."

The artwork by two Missouri State Penitentiary inmates was obtained by Curtis Crawford from Missouri State Highway Patrol Lt. Howard M. Fenimore's (1916-2004) son. Crawford then gave the drawings to Brenda Raymer who donated them to the Archives.

## Artwork, 1954

Extent: Seven drawings, 0.01 cubic feet.

Arrangement: Alphabetical by artist.

#### **Scope and Content**

Seven pieces of artwork created by two Missouri State Penitentiary inmates in 1954. The first drawing is by Samuel N. Reese, inmate no. 62676 (09/06/1949-04/30/1951) and inmate no. 69652 (04/08/1955-07/06/1976), serving life sentences for two murders. Reese was featured in the July 20, 1962 issue of *Time* magazine because of his artistic ability and work with the Penitentiary's newsletter *Jefftown Journal*.

All other drawings were created by James W. Thompson, inmate no. 65113 (09/14/1951-02/23/1954) and inmate no. 68331 (04/14/1954-05/04/1957) who signed his drawings with the 68331 number. Subject matter for the first five is the September 1954 Missouri State Penitentiary riot, to which Thompson was an eye witness. Historical accuracy was up to the artists.

A Missouri State Archives and Local Records conservator removed tape from these drawings, mended and stabilized the artwork in April 2023. Before and after treatment TIF scans are available in-house on the Z Drive.

These are copy print photographs on letter-sized cardstock made from originals belonging to Jo Herren, great-niece of former Deputy Warden of the MSP James Albert Dunstan. Subjects are the old C Hall, McClung Hall, McClung Park, and a portrait of Dunstan. All photos are digitized and available in-house on the Z Drive.
