Historical and Biographical Notes

The Missouri School for the Blind (MSB) opened as the Missouri Institution for the Education of the Blind in 1851. Originally a private charitable institution, it was placed under state control in 1855. The name of the school changed several times, usually through legislative act but sometimes by school fiat. Laws, biennial reports, and other state documents often refer to the school by a free-flowing combination of asylum, institute or school. The name was changed for the last time in 1879.

The Missouri School for the Blind occupied several sites before moving to its current location on Magnolia Avenue in the Tower Grove neighborhood of St. Louis. The school was intended, and continues to be, a residential school, with day school options.

In addition to being the first American school to teach the Braille alphabet, the Missouri School for the Blind operated the first Braille printing press in the United States.

The Missouri School for the Blind received its first Black student, Dulcima Nelson, in 1876. Integrated education continued until 1889 when a law titled "An act to revise and amend article one, chapter 150 of the Revised Statutes of Missouri of 1879, entitled "Of Schools," and all amendatory acts thereto" required all public schools to be racially segregated. The school remained separate enough to meet the requirements until reintegration came in 1954 after the *Brown vs. Board of Education* Supreme Court case struck down school segregation.

	division of special education which included the Missouri School for the		
	Blind. Effective March 12, 1947.		
1974	State Board of Education became the Department of Elementary and		
	Secondary Education under the State Omnibus Reorganization Act.		
	Effective May 2, 1974.

Fields vary slightly across the three volumes, but generally include pupil number, name, age, nativity (by state or country), admission date, age when became blind, cause of blindness, degree of blindness, other disability, relatives blind, religion, address of parent or guardian, discharge date and remarks.
