Excel Online High School -

Starting January 2021, the Missouri State Library partnered with Excel Online High School to help adults complete and obtain their high school diploma. Several Missouri libraries have implemented this program, and St. Louis County Library is one that has had great success. Since they started this program in January 2018, they have had over 103 graduates, with their most recent ceremony being March 4, with 32 graduates and 350 guests. Highlights of this joyous ceremony can be seen here. Under the direction of Ricqui Brooks, Adult Literacy Coordinator, Excel Online has changed not only the lives of the graduates, but their families and communities as well. Audio collections are at a high risk of loss due to the relatively short lifespan of their carriers and dependence on obsolete media for playback, but reformatting is a challenging and technical process that can require the involvement of vendors whose services might be difficult to afford without outside funding. This webinar will introduce participants to a variety of grants that fund audio preservation and reformatting

activities and offer guidance on selecting a grant-worthy project for their institution. Director of Audio Preservation Bryce Roe will also walk participants through each major section of a grant with tips and advice for preparing a successful application.
