Digital Literacy Resources

The *Digital Literacy* database is available to MOREnet members. This resource empowers learners with digital citizenship skills to navigate today's virtual landscape. Interactive activities guide students through project-based learning activities using digital tools to create podcasts, multimedia presentations, social media campaigns, and more. Database articles explore a number of topics, including cyberbullying, digital research skills, and citizen journalism. (Rosen Digital)

American Library Association Graduate Program Scholarships -

The American Library Association (ALA) Scholarship Program has more than \$300,000 available to students who are studying in library science or school library media programs at the master's degree level. They include scholarships for students who are interested in children's librarianship, youth librarianship, federal librarianship, new media, and library automation. In addition, there are also scholarships available for minorities, persons with disabilities, and people who are already employed in libraries but do not have an MLS. The scholarship process is open annually from Sept. 1–March 1. Applications and reference forms (which must be submitted online) are available during that period. Instructions and general information remain available year round. You can apply for a variety of scholarships through the single online application hosted by the ALA Scholarship Program.

Libraries Transforming Communities: Accessible Small and Rural Communities

The American Library Association (ALA) has a special grant opportunity for small and rural libraries. Libraries Transforming Communities: Accessible Small and Rural Communities will offer more than \$7 million in grants to small and rural libraries to increase the accessibility of facilities, services, and programs to better serve people with disabilities.

To be eligible, a library must have a legal service area population of 25,000 or less and be located

at least five miles from an urbanized area, in keeping with Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) definitions of small and rural libraries.

ALA is now accepting applications for grants to be distributed over the next three years, ranging from \$10,000 to \$20,000. Applications are being accepted from Nov. 1, 2022, through Feb. 28, 2023.

Libraries & Veterans National Forum Toolkit

Libraries play a significant role in supporting veterans and military-affiliated patrons by welcoming them to the community, providing resources during transitions, connecting them with other veterans, and recognizing their service. The <u>Libraries and Veterans Toolkit</u> can help libraries create new or supplement current programs.

The Toolkit was created by librarians, for librarians. Their insightful contributions include success stories, ideas for library programming, and approaches to services for veteran and military-affiliated patrons. It is intended as a resource for library staff who are working with veteran and military-affiliated patrons for the first time, as well as for those who are already engaged in this work and are looking for new ideas.

The Toolkit contains a host of practical ideas for how libraries of all types and sizes can better support their veteran and military-affiliated patrons, including outlines for exhibits, book clubs, creative events, collections, celebrations, and spaces.

Reference Services for YOU: Missouri-centric

Do you have patrons who love geography and Missouri trivia? The function of the <u>center of</u> <u>population</u> used by the U.S. Census Bureau is to be a balancing point, and Missouri is once again in the middle. The mean center of population is the point at which a flat representation of the states and the District of Columbia would balance for identical weights representing the population. Each weight would signify the location of one person per the census.

After the 2020 Census, the <u>national mean center</u> of population is 37.415725 N, 92.346525 W, the most western and southern center of population to date. The 2020 center is 11.8 miles from the 2010 center in Texas County, MO, and 885.9 miles from the 1790 center in Maryland. Hartville is the nearest incorporated municipality to the 2020 center of population, a town of 594 in Wright County, MO. This is the fifth consecutive decennial census with Missouri as the <u>mean</u> <u>center of population</u>.



Libraries & Veterans National Forum Toolkit

Sarah Bean Thompson of the Springfield-Greene County Library had been trying to get a book club going for years at her branch. For whatever reason, it just never takes off. She got the idea of combining Legos with books from a friend in Colorado who had started a Bricks and Books Club at her library. She kicked it off with Dog Man and has had three sessions. Each one has grown, and the club is becoming such a hit!

For each session, they talk about the selected book, share thoughts, etc. For the Dog Man club, Sarah showed a video of parts of the musical *Dog Man* that was performed at the Library of Congress. Participants spend the second part of the meeting building something themed from the book with Legos.

The kids have a blast and have had the same group come each month and bring friends to the other meetings. After Dog Man, Sarah selected two Mark Twain Nominees since the kids would probably already be reading them and familiar with them. We read *A Wish in the Dark* by Christina Soontornvot and then created boats and tested to see which designs would float. The next month the club read *The Winterborne Home*



for Vengeance and Valor by Ally Carter and built the Winterborne Mansion and a giant pencil, because why not?

The kids requested books that were a bit shorter with shorter chapters for the next round, so they will be doing a mix of graphic novels and some shorter books for winter/spring. The group loves it! One month, two of the regular attendees were not able to attend due to sickness. One of the sisters said, "I don't care if my sister is sick again next month, I'm making sure I come to Bricks and Books because it's so much fun and I don't want to miss it again!"

Grant Opportunities

Spotlight on Literacy Grant • Deadline: Jan. 31, 2023 ·

Spotlight on Literacy (SLT) grants provide funds to create new or enhance current efforts to serve patrons of all ages through programs that support an educated and informed citizenry. Projects must identify a single target audience, as well as a literacy area to address such as early literacy, digital literacy, STEM literacy, health literacy, financial literacy, civic literacy, career literacy, etc. The SLT grant will open mid-December in the online grant management system, with applications being due by Jan. 31, 2023. The minimum to request will be \$2,500, the maximum \$15,000, with up to \$110,000 being available for this grant round. The grant period will be March 15, 2023, to Feb. 28, 2024. See the award guidance for additional details and requirements. Educational Presenter Grant • Deadline: Ongoing

This open-call grant is a combination of the previously offered Author Visit Grant and the Bicentennial Programs Grant, and will replace the two separate grants. Libraries can apply to bring an author or educational presentation to their community. This application is open to Missouri public libraries certified to receive FY22 state aid, Missouri school libraries publicly supported and publicly controlled, and Missouri academic libraries supported publicly or privately.
