Reference Services for YOU: Puppies for Parole

Do you know someone in your community thinking of adopting a new canine friend? While the Missouri Department of Corrections may not be the first place that comes to mind, the <u>Puppies for Parole</u> program is a great opportunity to give a dog a second chance.

Since 2010, Puppies for Parole has successfully trained and placed over 7,000 dogs through partnerships with animal shelters and animal advocacy groups. Each rescue dog is transferred to a participating institution for 24-hour care by an offender trainer. Trainers focus on teaching their dogs essential socialization skills and basic obedience commands to help them learn

how to interact positively with both people and other dogs, ultimately making the pups more adoptable. The offender trainers can also earn a certificate in animal handling while developing personal skills to support their rehabilitation and reentry prospects.

Teen Night Sparks Curiosity with Gravity Maze STEM Kit

Teen Night at the Hannibal Free Public Library was a hit as local teens gathered for an evening of fun, learning, and hands-on exploration using a STEM Kit provided by the Missouri State Library. The featured activity was the Gravity Maze, a marble-powered logic game that challenges players to build paths through a series of towers to guide a marble from start to finish. Participants worked in teams to solve increasingly complex puzzles, developing critical thinking and spatial reasoning skills along the way.

The colorful towers and satisfying marble runs kept everyone engaged, and the collaborative atmosphere made it easy for teens to share strategies and celebrate successes. We did several rounds together and then had timed races.





The competition was intense as cookies and stickers were on the line as prizes!

The Gravity Maze STEM Kit not only entertained but also introduced key STEM concepts in a playful, accessible way. Events like these continue to show how libraries evolve as dynamic spaces for learning and innovation. We already look forward to the next STEM kit we can borrow for Teen Night!

Grant Opportunities – State Library Grants

Educational Presenter Grant · Deadline: Ongoing

This open-call grant from the Missouri State Library provides funds for libraries to bring an author or educational presentation to their community. This application is open to Missouri public libraries certified to receive FY26 state aid, Missouri school libraries publicly supported and publicly controlled, and Missouri academic libraries supported publicly or privately.

Show-Me Steps To Continuing Education • Deadline: Ongoing

This open-call grant from the Missouri State Library provides financial assistance for library staff and trustees to participate in continuing education and training opportunities when local funds cannot finance the entire cost. Continuing education events can be for individuals or groups but must be pertinent to the operational

or service needs of the applicant's library. This application is open to Missouri public libraries certified to receive FY26 state aid, Missouri school libraries publicly supported and publicly controlled, and Missouri academic or special libraries supported publicly or privately.

All available grants are found in the <u>online grant management system</u> approximately 45 days prior to the application due date.

Grant Opportunities - National Grants

NEA Big Read • Deadline: Jan. 29

The National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) Big Read is a matching grant that provides \$5,000 to \$20,000 to awarded libraries for America250 programming inspired by a book from their list. Funded programs center around applicant's chosen book and its themes between Sept. 2026 and June 2027. Funds may be used for

books, tools to support partner work, public relations strategies, meaningful book discussion programs, and other programs related to the chosen book. NEA Big Read grant applications require an Intent to Apply by Jan. 15 and a final application by Jan. 29. Learn more at NEA Big Read - Arts Midwest.



USDA Community Facilities Programs

This United State Department of Agriculture (USDA) program offers funding through loans, loan guarantees, and grants to public bodies, non-profit organizations, and federally recognized Native American tribes to construct, expand, or improve rural communities' facilities

Other Grant Opportunities

Laura Bush Foundation for America's Libraries 2025-2026 Grant • Deadline: Dec. 31

The Laura Bush Foundation for America's Libraries 2025–2026 Grant provides funds to school libraries to extend, update, and diversify their book and print collections to encourage students to develop a love of reading and learning. Grantees may use funds to purchase school library books, e-books, and magazine

requests. Public school applicants along with neighborhood, charter, and magnet schools must be Title 1 eligible; private and parochial schools may apply if they have at least 50% of their student population qualifying for financial aid. T-Mobile - Hometown Grants · Deadline: Dec. 31

Open to small US towns with less than 50,000 people, T-Mobile Hometown Grants provide funding to build, rebuild, or refresh community spaces that help foster local connections and provide a community benefit when otherwise difficult to secure funding. The projects should be shovel-ready, physical builds, or improvements

that can be completed within 12 months of receiving the grant. Some examples of funded projects include technology updates, outdoor spaces, the arts, and community centers. Applications much include plans, budget, timeline, anticipated impact, and up to five letters of support.

Walmart Sparks Good Local Grants • Deadline: Dec. 31

The Walmart Sparks Good Local Grants provides grantees with \$250 to \$5,000 to address specific community needs with a focus area of Creating Opportunity, Advancing Sustainability, and/or Strengthening Community. Eligible organizations include 501(c)(3) public charities, government

entities (non-501(c)(3)), schools, and church or other faith-based organizations with a proposed project that benefits the community at large. Eligible organizations must also be located within the same service area as a Walmart store, Sam's Club, or distribution center.

Snapdragon Book Foundation • Deadline: Feb. 8

The Snapdragon Book Foundation provides funding to schools in the U.S. to improve school libraries for children through increased access to books. Grant funds range from \$2,500 to \$10,000 per applicant and may be used books that will be repeated used by school-aged children, processing or cataloguing fees from book

vendors, reference materials for use by students, and magazine or newspaper subscriptions. If Snapdragon cannot award the total requested amount, they may offer a partial grant. Eligible organizations include public, private, and experimental schools.


