Introduction to Windows 2016 Server Administration, Tuesday, June 14, - Wednesday, June 15, 9 a.m. - 4 p.m., MOREnet Training Rooms, Columbia

Designed to build a foundation in basic server administration and introduce students to many of the features of Windows Server 2016. The class includes extensive exercises that reinforce Microsoft Windows Server 2016 network administration skills. The course will provide a foundation for understanding both Domain Name System and Dynamic Host Configuration Protocol, WSUS, and PowerShell. #### Project Enable

If you are looking for FREE training on how to create a more accessible and empathetic library space, you should check out Project Enable, a free online training created by Syracuse University's Center for Digital Literacy. Their vision is to "Provide professional development for library professionals from all types of libraries in order to build capacity for providing equitable

access and services to students with disabilities, an underserved population." This training has six modules that provide professional development for librarians, including Disability Awareness, Disability Law and Policy, Planning Inclusive Programs and Instruction, Assistive Technology in Libraries and Targeting Autism in Libraries. #### New Collections in Missouri Digital Heritage

Two new collections are now available through Missouri Digital Heritage. The Missouri State Museum Division of Youth Services Photograph Collection contains prints, slides, negatives and documents from the 1890s through the early 1940s related to the Chillicothe Industrial Home for Girls. This facility served as one of three facilities in the state designated for the treatment of juvenile offenders.

The <u>Missouri Supreme Court Reports</u> collection from the Missouri State Archives contains the

published opinions of cases argued in front of the Missouri Supreme Court from 1821 to 1955. These reports do not include all opinions issued by the Supreme Court, only those deemed "important and necessary to be published" by the Supreme Court.



This open-call grant is a combination of the previously offered Author Visit Grant and the Bicentennial Programs Grant, and will replace the two separate grants. Libraries can apply to bring an author or educational presentation to their community. This application is open

to Missouri public libraries certified to receive FY22 state aid, Missouri school libraries publicly supported and publicly controlled, and Missouri academic libraries supported publicly or privately.
