## Missouri Library Staff LibGuide -

# **Summer Library Program FAQs** -

Reading Challenges suggestions:

- Reading Challenge requirements –
   Encourage patrons to set their own goal
   for the summer reading challenge. Instead
   of a quantity of books, pages or minutes,
   stress the importance of reading each day.
   Your requirement can be simply reading
   every day and having patrons set their own
   goal for the amount of time they challenge
   themselves to.
- Research recommends reading a minimum of 20–30 minutes per day. (<u>Benefits of</u> <u>Reading Books: For Your Physical and</u> <u>Mental Health, healthline.com</u>; <u>What are the</u> <u>benefits of reading books? A lot, actually,</u> <u>today.com</u>).

- Benefits of reading 20 or more minutes per day:
  - Increase vocabulary
  - Strengthen communication
  - Enhance writing
  - Help to develop empathy
  - Build imagination
  - Can prevent summer slide
  - Reduces stress
  - Prevents cognitive decline
- Get creative with prizes and celebrations instead of only rewarding for the number of books or number of pages. Make completions and prize eligibility equitable for all patrons.

#### Reference Services for YOU: We're in Session

Following the current session of the Missouri General Assembly is easier than ever before! Below are resources to help your patrons stay on top of the happenings at the state Capitol this legislative session:

- Joint Bill Tracking: Search by keyword, sponsor or bill number. Search results will display a bill's number, summary, and sponsor as well as the last action taken.
- House of Representatives Videos: View live, in-progress floor debates and committee hearings as well as archived videos for past sessions from 2015 to the present.
- Senate Audio: Listen to the audio of live proceedings in the Senate chamber. The Senate's <u>audio archive</u> includes audio from 2009 up to the previous day's session.

- <u>Legislator Lookup</u>: Find and verify current legislators by entering a Missouri address or ZIP Code.
- Missouri Legislative Districts: View the Missouri Congressional, state House, and state Senate districts in this online map with layers for users to add or remove to best fit their needs.
- Governor's Legislative Actions: Review legislative actions such as signatures or vetoes of bills sent to the Governor.
- Missouri Revised Statutes: For current laws of the state of Missouri, search this site by keyword(s) or browse by chapter.
- <u>Lobbying Searches</u>: Search for registered lobbyists, principals, and expenditures from the Missouri Ethics Commission.

## Spotlight Program: Storytime with Adair County SB40 and Adair County Public Library

On February 2nd the Adair County Public Library and Adair County SB40 held their first Open Hearts Storytime at the Community Learning Center. The Center began in 2009 as a place for adults with developmental disabilities to get together and engage in fun activities and offer specific classes that teach everything from self-advocacy, cooking skills, appropriate relationship skills, budgeting and more. Adair County Public Library Director Dana DeVore, and SB40 Community Engagement Specialist Melissa Cline, worked together to find ways to engage these patrons with their local library in an environment that they felt comfortable. They decided to have a monthly storytime where the library came to the community center since the patrons were already familiar with that location.





Children's Librarian Breann Turner got to work and created a wonderful interactive story time. Being Groundhog Day, they decided to use that as the theme. The books included, *Will I See My Shadow?* and *Groundhogs Day Off.* Following the reading, participants were encouraged to create and decorate a groundhog head band. Breann used fun voices and interactions with the audience and everyone enjoyed it greatly. This will continue to be a monthly event and Adair County Public Library is excited to watch this partnership grow.

# **Grant Opportunities**

As of the writing of this newsletter, U.S. Congress has not established a budget for FY24 which stops the allocation and distribution of IMLS funding. At this time, the State Library does not foresee an issue with any of the grants, but a prolonged delay in enacting a federal budget could result in delays in first payments of the three long term grants. Since the long-term

grants come earliest in the Missouri State Library grant cycle, these are most likely the only grants affected. However, all future grants potentially can be susceptible to this funding allocation, or a lack thereof. The <u>grant call schedule</u> lists the application due dates and report due dates of all scheduled grants.

The **Digital Imaging Grant (DIG)** is currently open in the online grant management system. This grant required a <u>Letter of Intent</u> be submitted by Jan. 15, 2024 as one of the eligibility

## **Educational Presenter Grant · Deadline: Ongoing -**

This open-call grant is a combination of the previously offered Author Visit Grant and the Bicentennial Programs Grant, and will replace the two separate grants. Libraries can apply to bring an author or educational presentation to their

community. This application is open to Missouri public libraries certified to receive FY24 state aid, Missouri school libraries publicly supported and publicly controlled, and Missouri academic libraries supported publicly or privately.

# Missouri's Office of Broadband Development launches interactive map to help invest \$1.7 billion in BEAD funding

Missouri's Department of Economic Development's (DED) Office of Broadband Development (OBD) announced on Feb. 23, 2024, that it has launched the first version of the new Missouri Public Broadband Availability Interactive Map. The map, which uses the Sanborn Map Company's Broadband Navigator technology, will assist in the investment of \$1.7 billion in funding provided by the Broadband Equity Access and Deployment (BEAD) program.

The interactive map will assist Missourians during the BEAD challenge process, which will allow for the reporting of locations that lack service and should be eligible for funding. The challenge process is scheduled to open on March 18, 2024, and close on April 19, 2024. To be notified when the challenge process begins, subscribe for email updates from OBD.
