Reference Services for YOU: Mental Health Resources

May is National Mental Health Awareness Month. The state of Missouri contributes many resources to support and raise awareness for mental health in our communities.

- <u>988 Suicide & Crisis Lifeline</u>: Missouri's new 988 mental health, substance use, and suicide crisis website and hotline for calls, chats, and texts. Support is free and confidential with 24-hour access. Find the downloadable toolkit <u>here</u>.
- <u>Locate Treatment & Services</u>: The Missouri Department of Mental Health compiles directories and suggestions of where to find providers for substance use, mental illness, and recovery.

- <u>Access Crisis Intervention</u>: Also, from the Department of Mental Health, ACI provides adults and children experiencing a behavioral health crisis with statewide, confidential 24-hour crisis lines.
- <u>SAMHSA Helplines & Treatment Locators:</u> The U.S. Department of Health & Human Services Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration provides specialized treatment locators and helplines for early serious mental illness, veterans, or disaster-related emotional distress.

Library Welcomes New Addition to Children's Area

Ste. Genevieve County Library is excited to announce a new unique addition to its facility, thanks to a Community Foundation Grant. "One of the most fun additions to new builds in library spaces is interesting focal points in the children's area," Library Director Shawn Long says. "I've seen libraries add trees to this space and thought that was so cool, it brings the outside in and allows the children to let their imaginations run wild."

However, large-scale sculptures like trees are not something you purchase from Amazon, so Shawn thought that idea may never happen. But a chance meeting with artist Kendall Hart made a tree project a potential reality if funding became available. Kendall, who did work at the Ste. Genevieve Museum and Learning Center, created his own traveling exhibit of Cryptids and is currently working on making a museum of his own to showcase them, including a Momo the Missouri Monster.

"I mentioned the idea to Kendall and he said he would love to work with us." Now it was just a matter of funding the project. In 2021, the Community Foundation released one last grant cycle, and when it was confirmed, Shawn knew what he was going to write it for. allowed children to use their imagination." After a few designs and a few edits, the current design was chosen, and Kendall started working!

"It took a few more months than anticipated, but I was focused on quality and making sure that it will survive the love that this tree is going to get," Shawn said. "After a crew of eight worked on getting it into its final location and Kendall fixing a few dings and reattaching a limb taken down for the move, the tree sculpture now stands proudly in the children's area."

At the present time, the tree doesn't have a name, and the library is hosting a naming contest with the community. Patrons of all ages can swing by the library now through May 15, and the best name will be chosen! MOREnet Receives Grant for Digital Equity Facilitator Training and Advertising Costs -

The Missouri Research and Education Network (MOREnet) was <u>awarded a grant</u> through the Missouri Department of Economic Development to train facilitators on digital equity. The grant also covers advertising costs for the first digital equity community event or training provided by library staff who completed facilitator training.

MOREnet has created a complete <u>Getting</u> <u>Started with Technology</u> curriculum to train Missouri library staff on 13 different modules, intended to reach underserved populations with resources to utilize technology in their everyday lives:

- Evaluating Bandwidth Options
- Accessing Internet Affordability
- Troubleshooting and Optimizing Home
 Internet
- Setting up a Home Internet Network
- Basic Internet Security for the Home
- Advanced Security Options for Greater Privacy

- Password Security
- Internet Search Engines
- Understanding and Managing Internet Tracking Programs
- Government and Financial Online Accounts
- Using Cloud-Based Resources
- Finding Accurate Information Online
- Phishing and Other Scams

Facilitator training is completely free, and comes with complete instructor notes, a detailed slide deck, handouts for the end user, template press releases, and social media graphics. In addition, each facilitator will be given access to the digital course to receive updates in real time. Facilitator training can be completed either in person at a <u>regional session</u> or online <u>via a</u> webinar. You're also welcome to start with a webinar and attend the regional sessions for a deep dive with MOREnet trainers.
