
CSLP Promotional Funds -

Reference Services for YOU: National Indian Law Library -

With 574 federally recognized tribes and Native entities across the United States, navigating tribal legal resources can be challenging.

Indigenous groups develop their own tribal constitutions, laws, codes, and ordinances, which generally apply to their territories and members. The National Indian Law Library (NILL) has actively collected and published tribal law on the Tribal Law Gateway to increase access to tribal codes, constitutions, and court opinions. The Gateway provides pronunciations, histories, and relevant legal documents of each tribe, like the Cherokee Nation for example.

NILL also provides <u>Indian Law Bulletins</u> with information on new developments in federal, state, and tribal law. Patrons can search past bulletins or sign up to receive new bulletins by email.

The <u>Tribal Leaders Directory</u> also provides an interactive map of federally recognized tribes and native entities, along with their leadership and contact information.



Houston Library Hosts Open House and Holds Program to Highlight the New Quarters —

Houston's new library opened Monday after a Saturday afternoon of celebration to mark the completion of the project on First Street.

The \$2.9 million facility covers about 7,200 square feet and greatly expands library services in the county. Private donations, grants and contributions from Texas County government via the American Rescue Plan Act of 2021 funded the structure. It was a project of the Texas County Library Foundation, which noted more than \$400,000 in contributions came from local residents and businesses. Many participated in the Neighborhood Assistance Program, which gives generous state tax credits. A few still remain.

Luckily, heavy rainfall and storms held off until after the event. Organizers said they were surprised by the size of the crowd with the threat of inclement weather. A short program led by Library Director Louise Beasley was held in the shelter, and tours and refreshments followed for two hours.

Rep. Bennie Cook, R-Houston, hailed the project as an example of cooperation between various entities, and he said it showed what was possible when community residents and their leaders work together. Cook marked the event with a proclamation from the Missouri House. He was joined at the event by another state leader, State Librarian Janet Caruthers.

Among others speaking were Texas County Presiding Commissioner Scott Long; Houston Mayor Sam Kelley; Library Foundation President Terry Jones; Gwen Ross, president of the fivemember library board; and Kathy Richardson, a foundation member whose family worked on space dedicated to children.

Beasley, who joined the library as director just as the foundation was gearing up to begin the Houston branch work, highlighted the dedication of her small staff that moved more than 35,000 books from the former location on Walnut Street to the new home atop the Houston Storm Shelter.

Other key players also were praised: Gentry Construction Co. Inc., the general contractor; Sapp Design Architects, the firm that designed the building; and members of the Richardson family, who helped create the Evelyn Dieckhaus Creative Center for children. The Texas County Library staff worked long and hard and did a great job moving all the books in!!

Grant Opportunities – State Library Grants

Educational Presenter Grant • Deadline: Ongoing

This open-call grant from the Missouri State Library provides funds for libraries to bring an author or educational presentation to their community. This application is open to Missouri public libraries certified to receive FY26 state aid, Missouri school libraries publicly supported and publicly controlled, and Missouri academic libraries supported publicly or privately.

Show-Me Steps To Continuing Education • Deadline: Ongoing

This open-call grant from the Missouri State Library provides financial assistance for library staff and trustees to participate in continuing education and training opportunities when local funds cannot finance the entire cost. Continuing education events can be for individuals or groups but must be pertinent to the operational or service needs of the applicant's library. This application is open to Missouri public libraries certified to receive FY26 state aid, Missouri school libraries publicly supported and publicly controlled, and Missouri academic or special libraries supported publicly or privately.

<u>Summer Library Program Grant</u> • Deadline: Dec. 1

The Summer Library Program grant will open for applications in mid-Oct. with a due date of Dec.

1. This literacy-based grant requires a minimum of an eight-week reading program during the summer months when local schools are not in regular session. Maximum grant award amounts are based on the population of the library service area (tax district). The Summer Library Program


