2025 Upcoming Book Club Titles

If you are a Wolfner patron, participate in our book club by dialing in on the first and third Thursday of each month at 2:00 p.m., or by using Zoom from a smart device.

Here's a list of books that will be featured for September, October, and November, followed by instructions on how to join in:

September 4 — **Beloved** by Toni Morrison. (**DB026026**)

Related in kaleidoscopic fashion and set in rural Ohio during the period immediately following the Civil War, this chronicle of slavery and its aftermath traces the life of Sethe, a former slave. Sethe has a secret in her past so horrific that it has alienated the community, driven off her two sons, isolated her surviving daughter, and threatened her new, loving relationship with Paul D., also a former slave. Bestseller 1987. Some violence. [11 hours, 31 minutes]

September 18 — *Mission at Nuremberg* by Tim Townsend. (DBC16331)

Henry Gerecke, a Lutheran minister from St. Louis serving as an Army Chaplain at the close of WWII, was asked to minister to Nazi leaders standing trial at Nuremberg. Townsend shows the moral and religious issues confronting wartime chaplains. Violence. [14 hours, 12 minutes]

October 2 — **Slewfoot: A Tale of Bewitchery** by Brom. **(DB105459)**

Connecticut, 1666. Slewfoot, an ancient spirit, is known as a protector to the wildfolk and a demon to the colonists. To Abitha, a recently widowed outcast in her pious village, Slewfoot is the only one she can turn to for help. Together, they ignite a battle between pagan and Puritan. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. 2021. [14 hours, 17 minutes]

October 16 — *Evil Librarian* by Michelle Knudsen. (DB079820)

When Cynthia's best friend, Annie, falls head over heels for the new high-school librarian, she is amused at first. But after meeting Mr. Gabriel, Cyn realizes something isn't quite right and races to save the entire student body. Some violence and some strong language. For senior high and older readers. 2014. [9 hours, 16 minutes]

November 6 — *The Berry Pickers* by Amanda Peters. *(DB117941)*

A four-year-old Mi'kmaq girl goes missing from the blueberry fields of Maine, sparking a tragic mystery that haunts the survivors, unravels a family, and remains unsolved for nearly fifty years ... In Maine, a young girl named Norma slowly comes to realize there is something her parents aren't telling her. Strong language and some violence. [8 hours, 47 minutes]

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November 20 — Black Elk Speaks: Being the Life Story of a Holy Man of the Oglala Sioux as told through John G. Neihardt. (DB022552)

The autobiography of an Indian warrior and hunter who, because of his visions and psychic experiences, becomes the tribe's medicine man.

Youth

The Carrefour Curse by Dianne K. Salerni. (**DBC31082**) Narrated by Caroline Ward.

Twelve-year-old Garnet regrets that she doesn't know her family. Her mother has done her best to keep it that way, living far from the rest of the magical Carrefour clan and their dark, dangerous mansion known as Crossroad House. For grades 4–7. [5 hours, 55 minutes]

Dig, Dig, Dinosaur by Anjali Goswami. (DBC31073) Narrated by Griffin Lyskowski.

Three young adventurers embark on "an expedition to a faraway land." With the proper tools and an ambitious spirit, the adventurers dig for dinosaur bones, discovering and learning about various types of dinosaurs. Along the way, the adventurers strive to uncover dinosaurs bigger than the ones before, eventually revealing the biggest dinosaur at the end of the book. For preschool–grade 2. [4 minutes]

I Live in A Tree Trunk by Meg Fleming. (DBC31072)

Narrated by Penelope Barnes.

I live in a tree trunk. I live in a barn. I live in a shoebox. I'm down on the farm... Soon, all the other animals can't help but share what their homes are called, too. Readers will learn about porcupines, salamanders, groundhogs, and more. For preschool–grade 2. [9 minutes]

The Kitten Story: A Mostly True Tale by Emily Jenkins. (DBC31079) Narrated by Donna White.

When a cat-loving family decides to bring home a pet, their quest reveals the highs and lows of everyday family life in this heartwarming story. For preschoolgrade 2. [9 minutes]

Missouri Weird and Wonderful by Amanda E. Doyle. (DBC32939) Narrated by Ginger Fletcher.

Learn the many wild nicknames of our famous native amphibian, get an appreciation for how radical Scott Joplin's ragtime music was in the early 1900s, and discover the entire branch of medicine that was born here. Sports, history, wildlife, food, inventions, architecture, natural wonders, and just plain fun come to vibrant life in these richly illustrated, full-color pages. For grades 3–6. [52 minutes]

Treemendous: Diary of a Not Yet Mighty Oak by Bridget Heos. (DBC32940) Narrated by Ann Kovar.

Told in the diary entries of an acorn, this picture book follows a young acorn and its long life as an oak tree, from being buried by a squirrel to towering over other trees. For preschool-grade 2. [12 minutes]

Adult

Brannigan's Land by William W. Johnstone. (DBC29310) Narrated by Rick Wallis.

It's been close to twenty years since Brannigan hung up his six-guns. Now he's more content wrangling cows than criminals...now thieves and killers looking to settle old scores have tracked the ex-law dog to his ranch. They've made the mistake of targeting his wife and children, only to discover that Ty Brannigan enforces his own law with lightning-fast draw and a dead shot aim. Some strong language. Some violence. [11 hours, 14 minutes]

The Flower Sisters by Michelle Collins Anderson. **(DBC29304)** Narrated by Anne Rottmann.

Daisy Flowers is fifteen in 1978 when her free-spirited mother dumps her in Possum Flats, Missouri. Sentenced to spend the summer living with her grandmother, the wry and irreverent town mortician, Daisy draws the line at working for the family business, Flowers Funeral Home. Instead, she maneuvers her way into an internship at the local newspaper, where she learns of a mysterious tragedy from fifty years earlier. Some explicit descriptions of sex. Some strong language. Some violence. [7 hours, 3 minutes]

Indigenous Missourians: Ancient Societies to the Present by Greg Olson. (DBC29125)

Narrated by Vaughn Whiting.

Historian Greg Olson argues that the history of Indigenous people in present-day Missouri is far more nuanced, complex, and vibrant than the often-told tragic stories of conflict with white settlers and forced Indian removal would lead us to believe. In this path-breaking narrative, Olson presents the Show Me State's Indigenous past as one spanning twelve millennia of Native presence, resilience, and evolution. Some strong language. Some violence. [18 hours, 13 minutes]

It Shined: The Saga of the Ozark Mountain Daredevils by Michael Supe Granda. (DBC30985)

Narrated by Mark Simmons.

Expose of the life and times of the Ozark Mountain Daredevils band in and out of the spotlight, on and off the stage, and from the top of the charts to the bottom of the barrel. Follow the path of the band from its beginnings at the New Bijou Theater in 1971 to one of their last gigs on the stage of the Shrine Mosque in 2004. In between those dates, you will find a cornucopia of stories - some good, some bad, some ugly, all entertaining. Some descriptions of sex. Some strong language. [18 hours, 40 minutes]

A Killing in Capone's Playground by Chriss Lyon. (DBC30989) Narrated by Christopher Baker.

On December 14, 1929, St. Joseph, Michigan Police Officer Charles Skelly working a routine traffic crash came face to face with a killer, Fred Burke, a highly sought suspect in the St. Valentine's Day Massacre and now the most wanted man in the nation. Some strong language. Violence. [13 hours, 42 minutes]

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Men of No Reputation by Kimberly Harper. (**DBC30988**) Narrated by Shirley Baker.

Men of No Reputation is the first account to explore the life of Robert Boatright, one of Middle America's most gifted, but forgotten, confidence men. Boatright's story provides a rare window into the secret world of Missouri's criminal past, which influenced the methods of confidence men across the country. Some descriptions of sex. Some strong language. Some violence. [11 hours, 40 minutes]
