

Wolfner Talking Book & Braille Library Celebrates 100 years of Library Service for the Blind



Library services for the blind have a long, rich history in Missouri. In 1924, Dr. Arthur Boswick formed a department for the blind within the St. Louis Public Library system. This was done at the request of the St. Louis Society for the Blind. It wasn't until 1931 that the Pratt-Smoot Act was passed by Congress to establish free library service for blind adult readers and the St. Louis Public Library was selected as one of the first eighteen libraries nationwide to serve blind adults. Two years later, the National Library Service for the Blind's talking book program was initiated to serve readers who could not read Braille, and a uniform system of Braille was created.

In 1936, Dr. Meyer Wiener, an eye specialist and former director for the Prevention of Blindness on the Missouri Commission for the Blind, led a group of St. Louis citizens to raise funds to create a separate library building dedicated to serving the blind. The Henry L. Wolfner Memorial Association, named after Dr. Wiener's late colleague and fellow eye specialist, chose a site at 3842–3844 Olive Street to serve as the first building to house this new Wolfner Library. At this point in history, Wolfner had the second largest accessible collection and the largest children's collection for the blind in the nation. Only the Library of Congress had a larger accessible collection.

In 1963, the State of Missouri began to pay the St. Louis Public Library for the statewide use of Wolfner Library services and in 1968, Wolfner Library became the Talking Book Machine Agency for Missouri. The 1970s were a time of tremendous change for Wolfner Library. It moved locations in St. Louis multiple times before relocating to Jefferson City. In 1977, the Missouri State Library took over the administration of Wolfner Library and in 1985 Wolfner moved to Jefferson City. It wasn't until 1991 that Wolfner moved to our current location at the James C. Kirkpatrick Information Center. For a complete history of Wolfner, you can request MDB00006.

Bard Mobile App

The United States Postal Service works hard delivering audio books to you our patrons, but we do know that there are times you want a book a little bit faster.

If you are a member of Wolfner Library, who has access to a smart device (iPhone, Android, iPad, Fire Tablet), you are eligible to use Braille and Audio Reading Download (BARD), which is offered by the National Library Service for the Blind and Print Disabled, Library of Congress.

Registered patrons can use the BARD Mobile app to download books to their favorite smart device. BARD gives users access to all of our talking books and digital braille files at the touch of a button. To register or for more information, contact your Reader Advisor at 800-392-2614.

2024 Upcoming Book Club Titles

If you are a Wolfner patron, participate in our weekly book club by dialing in every Thursday at 2:00 p.m., or by using Zoom from a smart device.

Here's a list of books that will be featured for March, April and May, followed by instructions on how to join in:

March 21 - The Radium Girls by Kate Moore (DB089743)

Chronicle of the women employed during World War I as watch dial painters requiring the use and ingestion of radium-laced paint—and their legal fight for compensation. Discusses the often-gruesome physical deformities and pain the women experienced and their determination to receive justice. Commercial audiobook. 2016. [15 hours, 55 minutes]

March 28 – Circe by Madeline Miller (DB090711)

Circe grows up in the court of her father, the sun god Helios. Despised by her parents and others, she falls in love with a mortal who shuns her. When she takes revenge, she is banished. Those who wish her and others harm are transformed into pigs. Contains some descriptions of sex, some strong language and violence. Commercial audiobook. 2018. [12 hours, 11 minutes]

April 4 – The Ends of the World by Peter Brannen (DB087988)

Examination of the five known mass extinction events in the geologic record and their ties to Earth's carbon cycle. Discusses the dynamics for each event, which species survived and why, and the ways climate change could contribute to another extinction event. 2017. [14 hours, 59 minutes]

April 11 – Lord of the Flies by William Golding (DB048388)

With horrifying implications, a group of English boys are wrecked on a desert island and have to establish their own system of government. For senior high and older readers. [7 hours, 18 minutes]

April 18 — **When the Mississippi Ran Backwards** by Jay Feldman (**DB060365**) Chronicles a series of catastrophic earthquakes in the Mississippi River Valley from 1811 to 1812 that devastated the New Madrid frontier settlement and temporarily reversed the Mississippi's flow. Links the seismologic activity to the Indian Wars, a slave murder committed by Thomas Jefferson's nephews, and the War of 1812. 2005. [10 hours, 47 minutes]

April 25 – 96 Miles by J.L. Esplin (DB099009)

After a massive blackout hits rural Nevada, two brothers become desperate and decide to cross a deadly desert in search of help. Commercial audiobook. For grades 6-9. 2020. [8 hours, 2 minutes]

May 2 – Call the Midwife by Jennifer Worth (DB076915)

Autobiography of a woman who trained as a nurse/midwife and served in London's impoverished East End during the 1950s. Describes her sheltered background, life in an Anglican convent, and long hours among poverty-stricken patients. Basis for the PBS series. 2002. [12 hours, 28 minutes]

May 9 --- The Picture of Dorian Gray by Oscar Wilde (DB056794)

First published in the late nineteenth century. A beautiful youth has his portrait painted by an artist with a flair for the morbid. The portrait becomes the mirror of its innocent-appearing subject's inner life. Introduction by Edmund White. 1999. [8 hours, 42 minutes]

May 16 — *Eleanor of Aquitaine* by Allison Weir (DB051724)

Biography of Eleanor of Aquitaine (1122–1204), a feudal heiress who was wed first to King Louis VII of France and later to Henry II—the Plantagenet ruler of England. Describes her marriages and children, her adventures during a Crusade, the rebellion she led with two of her sons, imprisonment and her lifelong political involvement. 1999. [20 hours, 44 minutes] 5

May 23 – **The Cat Who Could Read Backwards** by Lilian Jackson Braun **(DB034788)** Jim Qwilleran arrives early for his appointment with the managing editor of the "Daily Fluxion." His recent employment history is not good, and he really needs this job. But they want him to be an art writer. As Jim begins his assignment, he and his sidekick, KoKo, find themselves hot on the trail of a murder at the art gallery. [5 hours, 23 minutes]

May 30 – **Seal of Protection, Collection One** by Susan Stoker (**DB101211**) Three novels and a novella of romantic suspense written between 2014 and 2015, featuring a team of Navy SEALS. In Protecting Caroline, a shy chemist and a Navy SEAL meet when terrorists hijack their plane. Also includes Protecting Alabama, Protecting Fiona and Marrying Caroline. Violence, strong language and explicit descriptions of sex. 2015. [22 hours, 43 minutes]

BARD Download Limits

Beginning Feb. 6, 2024, NLS patrons will be allowed to download no more than 250 books and magazines from BARD in any rolling thirty-day period. This includes both audio and braille titles. It does not matter which platform or combination of platforms are used to download the books and magazines.

Missouri State Library

The authorization limit is calculated by adding up the number of "unique titles" downloaded. This means you can download the same title on additional devices in the same thirty-day period without that download counting against the authorization limit.


