Calling All Braille Readers

It is not too late to sign up to receive the Zoomax electronic braille reader from Wolfner Library. Stop getting the big bulky volumes of braille and get a machine that can hold hundreds of braille books at your fingertips.

The readers have a 20-cell braille display with 8-dot braille cells and 32 gigs of memory. A key feature of these readers is that you do not need the internet to use them. Electronic braille books can be sent to you on cartridges or books can be downloaded directly to the machine through your BARD, Braille and Audio Reading Download service.

January 4 - Seabiscuit by Lauren Hillenbrand (DB051968)

Recounts the rise of an "undersized, crooked-legged" thoroughbred horse who in 1938 was the year's number-one newsmaker over Franklin Roosevelt, Hitler, and Lou Gehrig. Hillenbrand tells Seabiscuit's story through the three men who made a true long shot into a winner: owner Charles Howard, trainer Tom Smith, and jockey Red Pollard. Bestseller. 2001.

January 11 - *The Fox and I* by Catherine Raven (DB106546)


Biologist and former national park ranger recounts her time spent in an isolated cottage in Montana, where she bonded with a fox. Raven examines the relationship between wildlife and humans, and reflects on what can be learned from the natural world and the meaning behind loss. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. 2021.

January 18 - *Julie and the Wolves* by Jean Craighead George (**DB034451**)

Julie, a thirteen-year-old Eskimo girl, runs away rather than agree to an arranged marriage. Lost and starving on the barren tundra, she makes friends with a pack of wolves who save her life. For grades 5–8. Newbery Medal.

January 25 - *The Second Creation: Dolly and the Age of Biological Control* by Ian Wilmut (DB051809)

A science writer and the two researchers who cloned the sheep known as Dolly trace the history of cell biology and embryology and explain the hypotheses and experiments that led to the birth. Explores potential impacts in agriculture and medicine, as well as moral and political implications. 2000.



February 1 - *My Love Story* by Tina Turner (**DB092875**)

Legendary singer aims to set the record straight about her career and complicated personal life. Covers her early life in Tennessee, her rise to fame with husband Ike Turner, her success as a solo artist, and the sometimes dark hours in between. Some violence, strong language, and some descriptions of sex. Commercial audiobook. 2018.

February 8 - Letter to my Daughter by Maya Angelou (DB067662)

Author of *I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings* shares life lessons in the form of reminiscences, poems and short essays with her thousands of young daughters all over the world. In "Senegal" Angelou commits a social faux pas that her hostess graciously ignores. Bestseller. 2008.

February 15 - Loving vs. Virginia: A Documentary Novel of the Landmark Civil Rights Case by Patricia Hruby Powell (DB088922)

A novel in blank verse telling the story of Mildred Jeter, an African American woman, and Richard Loving, a Caucasian man, who marry and then challenge the Virginia law forbidding interracial marriages in the 1950s. Some strong language. For senior high and older readers, 2017.

February 22 - In the Name of Emmett Till: How the Children of the Mississippi Freedom Struggle Showed Us Tomorrow by Robert H. Mayer (DBC09695)

Vividly explains how the brutal killing in 1955 of a fourteen-year-old boy in the Mississippi Delta inspired a generation of young people to fight for Black freedom. Details how the courageous activism of scores of Mississippi youth in the decade after Till's murder played a decisive role in dismantling the state's system of racial apartheid. Some violence and strong language. For grades 6–9.

February 29 - **Party of Two** by Jasmine Guillory (**DB099911**)

Dating is the last thing on Olivia Monroe's mind when she moves to LA to start her own law firm. But when she flirts with a gorgeous man at a hotel bar, she discovers too late that he is none other than hotshot junior senator Max Powell. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. 2020.

March 7 - I'm Glad My Mom Died by Jenette McCurdy (DB110152)

Jennette McCurdy was six years old when she had her first acting audition. Her mother's dream was for her only daughter to become a star, and Jennette would do anything to make her mother happy. So she went along with what Mom called "calorie restriction," eating little and weighing herself five times a day. She endured extensive at-home makeovers while Mom chided, "Your eyelashes are invisible, okay? You think Dakota Fanning doesn't tint hers?" She was even showered by Mom until age sixteen

while sharing her diaries, email, and all her income. In, *I'm Glad My Mom Died*, Jennette recounts all this in unflinching detail—just as she chronicles what happens when the dream finally comes true. Unrated. Commercial audiobook. Bestseller.

March 14 - When My Name Was Keoko by Linda Sue Park (DB055957)

Thirteen-year-old Tae-yul and his younger sister, Sun-hee, take turns recounting what happened to their family in Korea while under Japanese occupation during World War II. As the Japanese tried to suppress Korean culture, even people's names were changed—Sun-hee was called Keoko. For grades 6–9. 2002.

March 21 - *Radium Girls* by Kate Moore (**DB089743**)

Chronicle of the women employed during World War I as watch dial painters—requiring the use and ingestion of radium-laced paint—and their legal fight for compensation. Discusses the often-gruesome physical deformities and pain the women experienced and their determination to receive justice. Commercial audiobook. 2016.

March 28 - Circe by Madeline Miller (DB090711)

Circe grows up in the court of her father, the sun god Helios. Despised by her parents and others, she falls in love with a mortal who shuns her. When she takes revenge, she is banished. Those who wish her and others harm are transformed into pigs. Contains some descriptions of sex, some strong language and violence. Commercial audiobook. 2018.

April 4 - The Ends of the World by Peter Brannen (DB087988)

Examination of the five known mass extinction events in the geologic record and their ties to Earth's carbon cycle. Discusses the dynamics for each event, which species survived and why, and the ways climate change could contribute to another extinction event. 2017.

April 11 - The Lord of the Flies by William Golding (DB048388)

With horrifying implications, this novel relates the experiences of a group of English boys who are wrecked on a desert island and have to establish their own system of government.

April 18 - When the Mississippi Ran Backwards by Jay Feldman (DB060365) Chronicles a series of catastrophic earthquakes in the Mississippi River Valley from 1811 to 1812 that devastated the New Madrid frontier settlement and temporarily reversed the Mississippi's flow. Links the seismologic activity to the Indian Wars, a slave murder committed by Thomas Jefferson's nephews, and the War of 1812. 2005.

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April 18 - Singing Over Me by Danielle C. Stammer (DBC06474)

On May 22, 2011, Joplin, Missouri, was hit by a tornado, historic in size. The path it left changed the city and its inhabitants forever. Danielle C. Stammer reveals how her family survived at St. John's Hospital and recounts the emotions and choices they made to get their family through the tornado and the following days, weeks, and months. It is a journey of renewal and growth in the midst of heart-wrenching losses.

April 25 - 96 Miles by J.L. Esplin (DB099009)

During a massive blackout in rural Nevada, two brothers struggle to survive without their self-reliance-obsessed dad and without enough water cross the desert for help.

The Blizzard by Betty Ren Wright (**DBC29123**) Narrated by Loretta Broker.

Although a blizzard prevents his cousins from visiting for his birthday, a disappointed Billy ends up having a very special day when his teacher and classmates must stay overnight at his family's house to wait out the snowstorm. For grades K–3. Reading time 16 minutes.

Christmas Day in the Morning by Pearl S. Buck (DBC29144)

Narrated by Audie Cline.

A boy surprises his father on Christmas morning by getting up early and milking the cows on the farm. For grades K-3. Reading time 14 minutes.

The Christmas Miracle of Jonathan Toomey by Susan Wojciechowski (DBC29147)

Narrated by Loretta Broker.

The widow McDowell and her seven-year-old son Thomas ask the gruff Jonathan Toomey, the best woodcarver in the valley, to carve the figures for a Christmas creche. For grades K-3. Reading time 25 minutes.

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The Donkey's Christmas Song by Nancy Tafuri (DBC24505)

Narrated by Loretta Broker.

Various animals welcome a new baby born in a stable with their special sounds, but the donkey is afraid that his braying will be too harsh. For preschool–grade 2. Reading time 4 minutes.

Snow Day! by Lester L. Laminack (DBC24490)

Narrated by Audie Cline.

Someone is very, very excited about the possibility of missing school due to snow, and plans a whole day of sledding, building forts, reading, and sipping hot chocolate rather than going to school for that test on chapter ten. For grades K–3. Reading time 10 minutes.

An Amish Christmas Star by Shelley Shepard Gray, Charlotte Hubbard and Rosalind Lauer (**DBC24482**)

Narrated by Anne Rottmann.

Three holiday stories celebrating the spirit of the season, the warmth of simple Amish traditions and the joys of coming home for Christmas. Reading time 8 hours, 54 minutes.

The Great Santa Search by Jeff Guinn (DBC24499)

Narrated by Christopher Baker.

When TV producer Bobbo Butler tries to save his ailing TV station, FUN-TV, with an American Idol-inspired talent contest intended to find the real Santa, the man himself throws his hat into the ring. Christmas Chronicles series, book 3. This series does not need to be read in chronological order. Book 1 is currently in production and will be released soon. Reading time 10 hours, 47 minutes.

How Mrs. Claus Saved Christmas by Jeff Guinn (DBC24498)

Narrated by Lesley LePage.

Jeff Guinn combines solid historical fact with glorious legend to deliver another heartwarming holiday book for the whole family. Christmas Chronicles series, book 2. This series does not need to be read in chronological order. Book 1 is currently in production and will be released soon. Reading time 10 hours, 21 minutes.

Time for Me to Come Home by Dorothy Shackelford (**DBC24500**) Narrated by Mary Beth Broughton.

A headlining country-music star trying to get home for the holiday is stranded in a snow-bound Chicago on Christmas Eve. Reading time 5 hours, 19 minutes.

A Victorian Christmas by Catherine Palmer **(DBC24380)** Narrated by Lesley LePage.

A beautiful patchwork of four novellas about love and joy at Christmastime. Reading time 11 hours, 15 minutes.
