Each department of state government is assigned a title. Each agency or division in the department is assigned a division number. The agency then groups its rules into general subject matter areas called chapters and specific areas called rules. Within a rule, the first breakdown is called a section and is designated as (1). Subsection is (A) with further breakdown into paragraph 1., subparagraph A., part (I), subpart (a), item I. and subitem a.

RSMo—The most recent version of the statute containing the section number and the date.

EXECUTIVE ORDER

04-03

WHEREAS, the production of automobiles in Missouri is an essential component of this state's economy; and

WHEREAS, the manufacturing of automobiles in Missouri supports secondary industries including local suppliers of essential automobile parts and products; and

WHEREAS, the Missouri automobile manufacturing industry contributes to employment of Missourians not only within the automotive plant but through other industries developed because of the manufacturing industry; and

WHEREAS, Missouri must place an emphasis on the importance of the automobile manufacturing industry in Missouri and its important role in the economy; and

WHEREAS, Missouri seeks to encourage Missouri businesses, business organizations, and educational institutions to work together in gathering information and statistical data concerning the importance of the automotive industry and retaining the industry in Missouri.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BOB HOLDEN, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MISSOURI, by the power vested in me by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Missouri, do hereby create and establish the Missouri Automotive Partnership (hereafter "MAP"), a privately funded, not-for-profit organization that will provide research and information essential for the promotion of the automotive industry and automotive industry employment in Missouri. The Missouri Department of Economic Development shall provide appropriate support as needed for the MAP.

Purpose and Mission of MAP

The MAP shall assist the State of Missouri and the Missouri Department of Economic Development by advising state government as to the current automotive industry environment in Missouri, the United States, and internationally. The MAP shall bring together industry, labor, academia, and government leaders in an effort to find solutions to the competitive issues facing the automotive industry today. The MAP shall communicate industry needs and concerns to the State of Missouri in a timely manner. The MAP shall advise the state of proposed state economic policies and the possible impact of such policies on the performance of Missouri's automotive industry. The MAP shall share with state policy makers its informed opinion with regard to future structural changes in automotive markets and technologies that may affect the state's overall economy. The MAP shall sponsor research and public automotive forums on pressing issues of concern to both the automotive industry and the state. Finally, the MAP, through its activities, shall promote the increase of productivity and quality of automotive industry employment.

Duties of MAP

The MAP shall have the following responsibilities:

1. To undertake, as it deems appropriate, research and investigation into issues and problems related to the automobile industry; and
2. To review and analyze proposed legislation and regulatory changes that affect the automobile industry in Missouri; and
3. To identify and prioritize key issues relating to the competitiveness of the automobile industry; and
4. To recommend actions to strengthen the industry in the short and long-term and opportunities for future innovation and investment in the industry; and
5. To share with policy makers its informed opinion of future, structural changes in automotive markets and technologies that could affect the state's overall economy; and
6. To assist policy makers in developing strategies to assist the state in retaining, growing, and attracting highly productive, competitive, and quality automobile industry employment.

Members

The articles of incorporation and bylaws of the MAP shall provide as follows: The Board of Directors of the corporation will consist of no more than thirty-six (36) members. Members of the Board of Directors shall include but not be limited to the following:

1. Members representing each of the major automotive assemblers located in Missouri; and
2. Members representing Missouri based automotive industry supplier manufacturers; and
3. Members representing automobile dealers in the State of Missouri; and
4. Members representing organized labor; and
5. Members representing public or private higher education institutions; and
6. The Director of the Missouri Department of Economic Development; and
7. The Director of the Missouri Department of Natural Resources; and
8. The Director of the Missouri Department of Labor and Industrial Relations; and
9. The Speaker of the House of Representatives; and
10. The President Pro Tem of the Senate; and
11. Members representing related automotive support industries or aftermarket manufacturing; and
12. Members representing the local economic development issues from a regional aspect; and
13. Other members as the Governor may appoint.
14. Members of MAP shall serve without compensation, but may be reimbursed for reasonable expenses.

Members of MAP shall serve without compensation, but may be reimbursed for reasonable expenses.

Term of Membership

Each MAP member shall serve for a period of three years and may be re-appointed at the conclusion of his or her term. Appointments shall be made so that one-third of the membership of the MAP shall terminate each year. All the MAP members shall meet collectively or as subcommittees on a regular basis at least four (4) times per year.

Chairperson

The Governor shall select the initial co-chairpersons for the MAP who shall serve for a term not to exceed one year. Thereafter, the members of the MAP shall elect a chairperson or co-chairpersons who shall serve for a period of one year and may be retained for subsequent terms

by the MAP vote. If the MAP elects a single chairperson, then the MAP shall elect a vice-chairperson to serve for a term of one year and may be retained for subsequent terms by the MAP vote. The MAP shall represent the geographic diversity of the State of Missouri when electing the chairperson or co-chairpersons.

**EXECUTIVE ORDER
04-04**

WHEREAS, methamphetamine is an illegal and highly addictive central nervous system stimulant that can be injected, inhaled, smoked, or ingested orally. Methamphetamine can easily be made using store-bought materials and is the most prevalent synthetic drug manufactured in the United States. The ease of manufacturing methamphetamine and its highly addictive potential have caused the use of the drug to increase throughout the Nation; and

WHEREAS, the effects of methamphetamine use can include addiction, chronic physical and mental health problems, including psychotic behavior, and brain damage similar to the damage caused by Alzheimer's disease, stroke and epilepsy; and

WHEREAS, according to the National Survey on Drug Use and Health, over 12 million United States citizens reported trying methamphetamine at least once in their lifetime. The highest rate of methamphetamine use is among the 26 to 34 age group, with over 800,000 people reporting lifetime methamphetamine use during 2002. Furthermore, 9.8% of high school students in a nationwide survey in 2001 reported using methamphetamine during their lifetimes; and

WHEREAS, law enforcement statistics show an exponential rise in the number of methamphetamine labs in the state, causing Missouri to be the nation's leader in the number of methamphetamine lab seizures. As far back as 1998, Missouri was declared a High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area ("HIDTA") because of the number of clandestine methamphetamine labs located in the state; and

WHEREAS, the manufacturing of methamphetamine is very dangerous due to the fact that the chemicals used are volatile and toxic to the environment. Methamphetamine labs present a clear and present danger to the methamphetamine cook, their children, the community and law enforcement officials; and

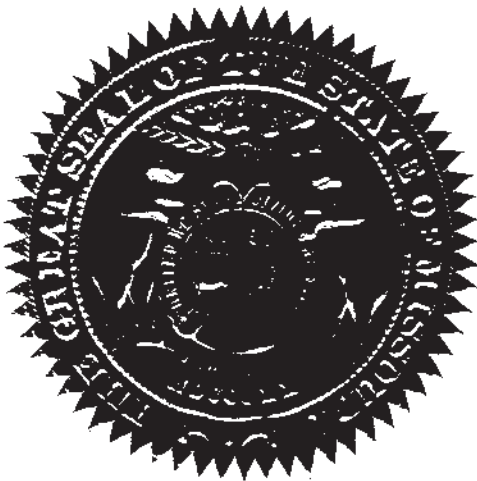
WHEREAS, the effects of methamphetamine pose a serious and growing risk to the health, safety and welfare of Missouri citizens and the state's environment, making it necessary to address these increasing risks in a more aggressive, comprehensive and coordinated manner.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BOB HOLDEN, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MISSOURI, by the virtue of the powers vested in me through the constitution and the laws of the State of Missouri, do hereby create and establish the Missouri Methamphetamine Education and Prevention Task Force. The Task Force shall consist of individuals from local, state and federal government, not-for-profit and private sector entities having an interest in addressing the education and prevention of methamphetamine use and manufacturing; and members of local, state and federal law enforcement, including representatives from community-based drug task force coalitions and the National Guard.

The Missouri Methamphetamine Education and Prevention Task Force shall work to reduce and ultimately eliminate the manufacture and use of methamphetamine throughout the State of Missouri. The primary goals of the Task Force shall include, but not be limited to the following:

- education of children, parents, communities, educators, retailers, health-care workers and others about the use and danger of methamphetamine manufacturing and use; and
- education of the public on the recognition and prevention of methamphetamine manufacturing and use; and
- coordination of public and private resources to address the education and prevention of methamphetamine manufacturing and use; and
- establishment of a central resource for information on the education and prevention of methamphetamine manufacturing and use; and
- coordination of efforts with the new Missouri Methamphetamine Treatment Task Force and the Missouri Methamphetamine Enforcement & Environment Protection Task Force to address all facets of the widespread problems created by the manufacturing and use of methamphetamine.

With the creation of this Task Force, I strongly encourage all citizens, agencies and organizations to aid federal, state and local officials to assist and support the Missouri Methamphetamine Education and Prevention Task Force wherever possible in the education and prevention of the illegal use and manufacture of methamphetamines.

**EXECUTIVE ORDER
04-05**

WHEREAS, methamphetamine use results in a serious array of psychological problems, including depression impaired thinking, psychotic and violent behavior, paranoia and homicidal and suicidal thoughts; and

WHEREAS, methamphetamine use leads to serious chronic health problems, which include illnesses brought on by malnourishment, complications in pregnancies resulting in harm to the newborn and brain damage similar to that caused by stroke or epilepsy; and

WHEREAS, methamphetamine use results in impaired work, social and family relationships leading to loss of gainful employment, physical, emotional and economic abandonment of spouses and children and estrangement from family and loved ones; and

WHEREAS, methamphetamine use produces a rapid increase in tolerance and thus an accelerated progression to intense addiction and psychological dependence, which in turn lead to withdrawal symptoms lasting up to two weeks; and

WHEREAS, methamphetamine use is adversely affecting the well-being and quality of life of a growing number of Missouri citizens, as witnessed by the increase of Department of Health treatment admissions from 716 in 1995 to 3,607 in 2003 with 64% of these treatment admissions reporting their first use of methamphetamine beginning at age 21 or younger and with 48.5% of referrals for treatment coming from the criminal justice system; and

WHEREAS, effective community-based treatment is recognized as an essential component of any coordinated multi-agency and multi-disciplinary effort to reduce the incidence of substance abuse; nevertheless, Missouri communities are challenged with obstacles to treatment of methamphetamine users due to limits on funding, a lag in research on treatment methodologies and a lack of training opportunities for medical and mental health staff to assist them in more effectively diagnosing and delivering effective care of methamphetamine abuse; and

WHEREAS, working together in collaboration, law enforcement, prosecution, clandestine lab clean up, social services, education and treatment agencies can improve the lives of all Missourians.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BOB HOLDEN, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MISSOURI, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and Statutes of the State of Missouri, do hereby declare and establish a Missouri Methamphetamine Treatment Task Force consisting of representatives from local treatment agencies and organizations and one or more representatives from the Missouri Department of Mental Health, the Missouri Department of Corrections, the Missouri Department of Social Services and the Missouri Department of Public Safety.

The primary goals of the Treatment Task Force shall be:

- to promote research into best practice treatment approaches; and
- to increase the availability of training for treatment providers; and
- to support strategies to provide greater access to treatment services for those who need and seek treatment in their local communities.

I encourage all citizens, agencies and organizations to support the Missouri Methamphetamine Treatment Task Force as it pursues these goals.

04-06**

WHEREAS, methamphetamine is a highly addictive central nervous system stimulant that can be injected, inhaled, smoked, or ingested. Methamphetamine is the most prevalent synthetic drug manufactured in the United States. For the past three years Missouri has lead the nation in the number of methamphetamine laboratory seizures; and

WHEREAS, methamphetamine can easily be manufactured in clandestine laboratories using precursors that are readily available to the general populace. Many precursors, such as anhydrous ammonia, are obtained in an illegal manner, such as theft, which places the general public, primarily in rural smaller communities, in harm's way. The ease of manufacturing methamphetamine and its highly addictive nature, have caused the use of the drug to increase dramatically throughout the State of Missouri. The methamphetamine manufacturing process is extremely dangerous due to the highly volatile, corrosive, flammable and hazardous chemicals involved. The hazardous chemicals and the toxic by-products generated during the manufacturing process present a clear and present danger to Missouri citizens, communities, officials, and the environment; and

WHEREAS, throughout the 1990s, the number of methamphetamine laboratory seizures in the State of Missouri began to rise dramatically. In 1993 there were twelve methamphetamine laboratory seizures, and during 2003 nearly three thousand were seized. Additional resources were needed to effectively deal with the escalating problem. In 1997, the state held its first methamphetamine summit. For the first time, law enforcement, environmental and other public safety officials met to share ideas and develop strategies to effectively combat the unsafe storage of seized chemicals and the escalating costs of responding to and disposing of methamphetamine laboratories. The methamphetamine summit also addressed property clean-up concerns and the need for health and safety training and personal protective equipment and supplies for law enforcement. From the summit was created the Missouri Inter-Agency Clandestine Lab Task Force; and

WHEREAS, the task force has contributed significantly to the development of the innovative and nationally recognized Clandestine Drug Lab Collection Station Program. This program utilizes the skills and expertise of local fire department/hazardous materials teams and law enforcement personnel to operate the collection station facilities strategically located throughout the state. These agencies manage the large volume of hazardous waste seized at methamphetamine laboratories throughout the state. Since the establishment of the first collection station in October of 1998, nearly 6,700 methamphetamine laboratories, consisting of over 282,000 pounds of hazardous waste and debris, have been processed through the program, resulting in a real cost savings of \$15 million over the traditional cleanup approach; and

WHEREAS, prior to 2000, there was no coordinated training program that existed to address the myriad of issues Missouri law enforcement faced when seizing methamphetamine laboratories. Beginning in 2000, enforcement and environmental officials developed an intensive health and safety/hazardous waste and emergency response clandestine laboratory certification program to train law enforcement officers to respond to, process, and properly manage methamphetamine laboratory incidents. Over six hundred officers have been certified through this training program resulting in the prevention of an untold number of serious injuries and/or deaths; and

WHEREAS, prior to 2000, law enforcement was being repeatedly exposed to harmful chemicals and had no personal protective equipment and supplies readily available and/or were cost prohibitive to obtain. Respiratory protective equipment, chemical resistant protective supplies, air monitoring devices and cleanup/packaging items are critical assets in protecting the well-being of law enforcement officials. Since 1999 340 self-contained breathing apparatus, 471 air purifying respirators, 325 air monitoring devices and 491 cleanup/packaging kits have been provided to law enforcement and fire department officials in the State of Missouri; and

WHEREAS, such circumstances create a condition of distress and hazard to the public health and safety, to children, citizens and law enforcement officials and the environment of the State of Missouri.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BOB HOLDEN, GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF MISSOURI, and by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and Statutes of this State and pursuant to the Laws and Revised Statutes of Missouri, do hereby declare and establish a Missouri Methamphetamine Enforcement and Environmental Protection Task Force, which shall succeed and replace the Missouri Inter-Agency Clandestine Lab Task Force, to be comprised of volunteers from local, state and federal agencies and private organizations and associations focused on enforcement and environmental methamphetamine concerns.

The Missouri Methamphetamine Enforcement and Environmental Protection Task Force shall work diligently to enforce all methamphetamine enforcement and environmental related laws and regulations in the State of Missouri, deliver and enhance the health and safety/hazardous waste and emergency response clandestine laboratory certification program and provide personal protective equipment and supplies to law enforcement and other officials.

The primary goals of the Missouri Methamphetamine Enforcement and Environmental Protection Task Force shall include, but not be limited to:

- providing law enforcement and other officials a safe, legal and effective place to temporarily store methamphetamine laboratory/clandestine drug lab chemicals; and
- providing for more efficient and effective management and disposal methods for methamphetamine laboratory/clandestine drug lab chemicals; and
- providing law enforcement with a health and safety/hazardous waste and emergency response clandestine laboratory certification program to train law enforcement officers to respond to, process, and properly manage methamphetamine laboratory incidents; and
- providing law enforcement with the personal protective equipment and supplies necessary to safely manage methamphetamine laboratory incidents and transport hazardous chemicals from methamphetamine laboratories; and

With the creation of the Missouri Methamphetamine Enforcement and Environmental Protection Task Force, I encourage all citizens, agencies and organizations to aid the local, state and federal officials to assist and to support the Missouri Methamphetamine Enforcement and Environmental Protection Task Force wherever possible in identification, enforcement, prosecution, and remediation of the illegal use and manufacture of methamphetamine.
