

**LSTA Grants Awarded
August 2012**

Technology Mini Grant - \$107,921

Albany Carnegie Public Library - \$2,759

The Library will replace two multi-purpose staff computers with software and a barcode scanner; add a mobile checkout station; and add a library services staff printer to better meet patron demand and improve staff productivity.

Barton County Library - \$9,484

The Library will replace eight public access computers and uninterruptable power sources that are at end of life. This will update the equipment used by the public, providing the necessary hardware requirements to run Windows 7 and Office 2010.

Brentwood Public Library - \$3,160

The Library will replace its wireless firewall and access points to improve network performance. The Library will purchase two iPads to be used by library staff to extend library services beyond the walls of the library and into recreation centers, retirement homes, schools, day care centers, etc.

Cameron Public Library - \$3,920

The Library will install time and print management software, replace two public access computers, and add one new public access computer to improve access to the library's technology-based services and better meet patron demand.

Cass County Library - \$10,537

The Library will purchase ten laptops to be available for patron use in the library. The laptops will be distributed between the branches based on documented need and use.

Cedar County Library - \$2,709

The Library will replace two barcode scanners, one thermal receipt printer, and two wireless hotspots to improve customer service. The Library will also add a locking rack to improve the security of its automation server.

Dade County Library - \$4,436

The Library will replace four public access and two staff computers to improve network performance; add CASSIE time and print management software for more equitable access to public access computers; and add a wireless printer to improve the library's wireless network.

Daniel Boone Regional Library - \$9,410

The Library will install a self-checkout station at the Southern Boone County branch to provide patrons with a greater degree of privacy and independent access to materials. The station will also allow the library to make better use of staff time.

Dunklin County Library - \$7,501

The Library will replace a microfilm reader at the Kennett branch. The current reader is at end-of-life. The new reader will provide for better image control, additional storage options and an easier user interface.

Jefferson County Library - \$7,021

The Library will add a self-check station at the Northwest Branch to better meet patron demand. There are currently two self-check stations in use at the branch and patrons frequently experience wait time to use them.

Kansas City Public Library - \$4,454

The Library will purchase eight public access computers for use in teen areas at the Trails West and North-East branches. This will enable the branches to better meet patron demand.

Kirkwood Public Library - \$3,596

The Library will purchase a Simple Scan Station for use by the public in faxing and scanning documents. This will improve independent access for patrons to library services.

Maryville Public Library - \$6,418

The Library will create a mobile computer lab which will be used for computer skills and advanced electronic resource training classes. A training facilitator will be hired to schedule and hold tutoring sessions and to arrange for volunteer tutors when advanced training is requested.

Mountain View Public Library - \$8,018

The Library will replace eleven computers that are at end of life. This will improve network performance and better meet patron demand.

Polk County Library - \$9,168

The Library will add a multifunction printer at the main and branch libraries; and replace two catalog computers at the main library and add one at the branch. The new equipment will better meet patron needs, improve customer satisfaction and increase staff efficiency.

Ray County Library - \$7,164

The Library will replace a digital microfilm scanner that is at end of life. The new digital microfilm scanner will have improved image control and allow patrons to have continued access to the Library's microfilm resources.

Scenic Regional Library - \$5,403

The Library will replace a server that is unable to meet the demands of current library operations. The new server, server software and peripherals will improve network performance, data security, and staff efficiency.

University City Public Library - \$2,763

The Library will replace its public wireless access equipment with a system that is more dependable, able to take advantage of advances in technology, simplify user authentication, and expand wireless access throughout the whole building, better meeting patron demand and improving library services.
