Bryden after being duly sworn deposes and says that on the 21<sup>st</sup> day of October 1838. that he ~~was~~ taken <sup>as a</sup> prisoner, by the prisoners called Mormon from his one house, sick with the fever and carried him about one mile, and released him, <sup>for</sup> <sup>the</sup> account of his health, and while in custody he was told by them, they had applied to the Governor divers <sup>times</sup> for protection, and he had never had sent them any assistance, and now they had taken the law in their own hands, and they intended to have the thing settled; because they believe the Governor to be as big a mob man as any of them, and the plunder which they were now taken, was to pay them back for the property, which they had lost in Jackson County, when they were driven from there, and this affiant says not.
