he ~~was~~ taken ^{as a} prisoner, by the prisoners called Mormon
from his one house, sick with the fever and carred
him about one mile, and released him, ^{the} for account
of his health, and while in custody he were told by
them, they had applied to the Governor divers times
of times for protection, and he had never had sent
them any assistance, and now they had taken the
law in their own hands, and they intenced to have
the thing settled; because they believe the Governor
to be as big a mob man as any of them, and the
plunder which they were now taken, was to pay
them back for the property, which they had lost
in Jackson County, when they were driven from
tharre, and this affiant sayseth not.

27 James Stone after being duly sworn deposeseth and
sayseth, that on the 20th day of October 1838. That the
people called Mormon came to his house, and told
him if he did not leave Daviess County against

next morning, against sun rise, that they would
take his head with there sword, and drew their
sword and waived it at him, and said they would
take his hearts blood if he did not leave county,
and then this affiant took them at their word
and left his house about 10 o'clock in the night,
he and 2 other men, and went back next morning
and his house were rased, and this affiant sayeth
on the 21st day inst that he with several other
men, saw the said people called Mormon herders
a number of catel, the amount not known he
supposed to be about 10 acres of ground covered
and they looke at them, until they started
them to wards Calwell county, and this affiant
sayeth not
