


## THE JACKSON RESOLUTIONS

The Jackson Resolutions, Laws of Missouri 1848-1849.

"The right to prohibit slavery in any territory, belongs exclusively to the people thereof . . . "



U. S. Senator Thomas Hart Benton from Missouri refused to abide by the Jackson Resolutions and made his opposition to them the central issue of his 1850 re-election campaign. Benton lost the race to Whig candidate Henry S. Geyer because Benton believed the question of slavery in the territories should be decided by congress.

## LINCOLN'S RIECTION

In the presidential election of 1860, Abraham Lincoln did not win in a single Southern or border state. In Missouri, he finished a distant fourth place behind Stephen A. Douglas, John Bell, and John C. Breckinridge.

Worried that the new President might try to outlaw slavery, Southern states began to secede from the Union even before Lincoln's inauguration in March 1861.
